TIDE TURNED IN THE CATTLE INDUSTRY, SAID

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, Oct. 21.—There is every indication the tide has turned in the cattle industry in Texas, H. H. Schutz, government statistician here, said today. With the exception of a few sections, the state is in excellent condition with good prospects for fall and winter grazing. In a number of sections, the range is far above normal due to the heavy September rainfall.

"The condition of the range and the way cattle are growing and putting on flesh have restored confidence of the stockmen. It is too bad the ranges are not more heavily stocked," Mr. Schutz said.

Condition of sheep and goats is 95 per cent normal, as compared with 85 per cent for cattle. Compared with conditions at the corresponding period last year, the sheep show a three per cent improvement; goats two per cent and cattle six per cent.

"In at least six counties cattle are being largely replaced with sheep and goats, because of the continued summer drought," Mr. Schutz said.

Livestock and range conditions by sections of the state indicate that in the Plains district, if the frost holds off until the grass can cure, no feeding will be necessary until late winter. Winter prospects are said to be the best in five years, with the price and demand for cattle increasing steadily.

In West Central Texas, some of the counties need more rain to make the winter range but the other counties are in fine shape. In many places where the grass is good the range is heavily stocked. Grass and weeds are growing rapidly in Central Texas. Winter prospects are good, with exception that some of the Southern counties of the section need more rainfall. Little restocking is expected before spring. A heavy movement was noted during the summer drought months.

In East Texas good fall pasturage is assured, except in strips. There is little tendency to restock, however.

In the El Paso territory, cattle are fattening rapidly. The range is said to be the best within ten years. Large numbers of cattle

The ladies of the Episcopal Church met with Mrs. Ira L. Sims Tuesday afternoon to plan for the entertainment of their new pastor.

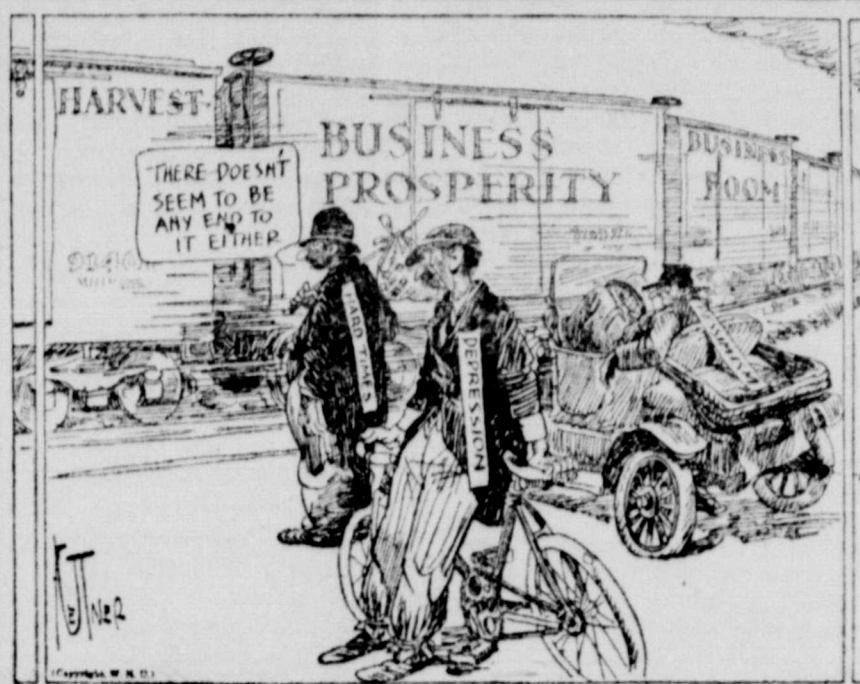

Brings Ferguson's Name Into Highway Investigation

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Oct. 21.—The week's agitation, centering on charges of reckless and inconsistent expenditures of state highway department funds, probably will result in a special session of the Texas legislature for a thorough investigation of the state administration.

Speaker Lee Satterwhite of the House of Representatives, declared last night in Washington that he would call a special session if Gov. Ferguson did not do so. Mr. Satterwhite is in Washington attending a hearing on tax reduction. In a statement given out at that place he intimated he would await, however, the result of the investigation being conducted by Attorney General Dan Moody before calling an extra session of the lawmakers.

Mr. Satterwhite, in discussing the charges, said that the highway commission named, last February, by Governor Ferguson, made one of its first acts the awarding of a contract for the maintenance of a thousand miles

of highway to the American Road Company of New Jersey. The New Jersey corporation has sublet all its contracts, it is alleged, and although it has not expended a single cent on road work, profits made on the contract are said to be enormous.

Three members of the commission are close friends of the governor's husband, James E. Ferguson, and it has been openly charged, Satterwhite added, that he is responsible for their acts. It is asserted that state money is being wasted in enormous sums, and demands have been made that the lower house assemble and investigate these charges. Under the law a special session of the House can be called by the speaker on a petition signed by fifty members, should the governor refuse to act in the matter.

TWO BROTHERS FOUND MURDERED

DOYLESTOWN, Pa., Oct. 21.—Believed to have been shot and stabbed by robbers, Thomas and Joseph Erwin, brothers, were found dead today on their farm near here.

The two brothers lived alone. Joseph was about 52 years of age, and Thomas about 50. Nathan Erwin, a brother of the slain men, said that his brothers had no enemies that he knew anything about, and he was unable to say whether they kept any considerable amount of money about their home or not.

DR. RUBY EMBRY ITALIAN SHIP DEAD AT ABILENE LEFT SINKING

Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Embry and Mr. and Mrs. Jess Jones left for Abilene shortly after noon Wednesday in response to a message informing them of the death of Mr. and Mrs. Embry's daughter, Dr. Ruby Embry. The Higginbotham hearse also left for Abilene, and the body of Miss Embry will be brought to Ballinger late this afternoon, and probably laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery Thursday.

Dr. Embry's body was found in a chair in her home about ten o'clock Wednesday morning. The body was somewhat decomposed, and it is believed that she had been dead since Monday night. Dr. Embry lived alone, and neighbors noticed that her car stood in front of the gate all day Tuesday, and Tuesday night it was observed that the lights to the car were burning. Becoming suspicious that something was wrong the neighbors notified the officers Wednesday morning. The police entered the house and found the body in a chair in front of the gas stove. The electric lights were on and the gas burning.

A telephone message to The Ledger from the Abilene Reporter-Printer stated that the coroner's verdict would probably be that death was due to natural causes. Dr. Embry was ready to retire, or she had just gotten up when she died.

Dr. Embry graduated as a physician several years ago and for some time had been practicing medicine in Abilene. Before locating in Abilene she spent some time in New York.

NIECE KILLED IN AUTO CRASH

Dr. Alvin Swindell and family returned home Wednesday from Ennis, where they were called to attend the funeral of Miss Maggie Nell Miller, age 13, niece of Mrs. Swindell, who was killed in an auto wreck Sunday afternoon. Dr. Swindell and family left Ballinger in their auto Monday morning, attended the funeral Tuesday and arrived home today.

J. F. Miller, of Ennis, brother of Mrs. Swindell, was out driving with his family and two or three friends Sunday afternoon, when another auto crashed into the Miller car broadside, knocking the automobile over and into a ditch. All the occupants of the car were injured and the girl killed instantly.

According to an account of the tragedy as given to Dr. Swindell, Mr. Miller was driving along the highway parallel with the inter-urban track and near a crossing. The other car was coming in an opposite direction and on the other side of the track, the driver speeding to cross the track ahead of an inter-urban car, which he did by "the skin of his teeth," but just as he did so he crashed into the Miller car with the fatal results.

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 21.—The radio listener in Sweden must pay for his entertainment, but nevertheless license holders increased to 75,000 against 6,000 last year. A fee of 12 krona paid by listeners has provided funds for an improved program. Demand on the present broadcasting stations has necessitated fresh arrangements.

It is planned to build a high-power station in the center of the country having a wave length of 1,730 meters.

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**FAVOR ELECTION OF
ROAD COMMISSIONERS**

A canvass of the members of the legislature to determine how many are in favor of a special session of the law-making body at this time has precipitated a discussion of the status of the highway commission, and started a movement for taking the naming of the highway commission out of the hands of the governor and making the office an elective one.

By all means the members of the highway commission should be elected by the people. The office of highway commissioner is one of the most important in the state. It is said that the commission handles approximately twenty million dollars annually, and disbursing this amount of money and supervising the building and maintenance of highways in 250 counties is not a job to be handed out in payment of political obligations, if the people are to get value received for their highway money.

**CAN'T ORDER POLL TAX
BY MAIL**

Poll tax payers must either appear in person or be represented by some one as their agent in the payment of poll taxes. We recently stated that Tax Collector Brown was mailing out cards showing the amount of taxes due, together with a blank form on the card for writing an order for poll tax, which taxpayer could return with check in settlement of his obligations. This was true, but the card cannot be mailed in where the poll tax is involved. The taxpayer must either appear in person when he wishes to pay his poll tax, or give the order to someone as his agent.
