FRENCH CABINET QUIT PLACES

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Oct. 27.—Premier Poincaré and his cabinet resigned today. The premier called on the president this afternoon and presented the collective resignations.

PARIS, Oct. 27.—Premier Poincaré informed the president that the cabinet could not continue its work of restoring French finances without being assured of a favorable majority of parliament. The decision of the ministers to resign was unanimous, and was caused by the attitude taken by the Radical and Socialist parties at their recent congress at Nice, where the principal tax levy on capital was adopted.

OIL FIELD BOILERS PRODUCE HIGH PRESSURE ON 'COLD GAS'

SNYDER, Tex., Oct. 27.—A vast mable gas has been discovered in the oil fields of this section and is being used to operate machinery and pumps.

The gas is said to insure the most economical operation in the history of oil production. Small wells, which otherwise would require more oil for their boilers than they could produce are now operating at a profit. For a time the gas mystified oil men and chemists, but it finally has been analyzed as an air containing about 93 per cent nitrogen.

One of the strange sights here is to see boilers producing pressure without fire. The gas is run into boilers and in two minutes a pressure of 125 pounds is attained. From the boiler the "air" is carried under pressure through the usual steam lines to pumps and machinery.

The air has been used to drill three different wells within a radius of three miles. Additional producers have all struck this gas in sufficient quantities to finish their wells.

Men in the field use the air for anything steam would accomplish. All they need to do is to turn the air into the boiler, which merely acts as a reservoir to equalize pressure. It also is used to inflate automobile tires and for refrigeration.

Watermelons, milk, water, or anything the men wish to cool is placed under the exhaust of an engine, which is covered with ice instead of being hot with steam. A watermelon left under the exhaust for two hours will freeze solid.

The air itself is not actually cold, but the release of pressure produces the effect of cold, similar to the process of manufacturing ice with ammonia under pressure.

The gas makes between three and five million cubic feet a day, from the first well, with a rock pressure of more than 300 pounds.

20 KILLED; 30 HURT; WRECK

MEMPHIS, Oct. 27.—Twenty persons were killed and between twenty-five and thirty injured when the "Sunnyland," fast St. Louis & San Francisco passenger train northbound from Birmingham to Kansas City, was derailed near Victoria, Mississippi today.

This is in accordance with reports received here at the Frisco offices. The cause of the wreck is undetermined.

ALL TROUBLES ARE SETTLED

PARIS, Oct. 27.—Greece's representatives announced at the opening of today's meeting of the League of Nations council, that through the friendly mediation of Rumania a direct agreement had been reached between Greece and Bulgaria for the evacuation of their respective territories.

\$115,000 BLAZE AT SAN ANGELO

Fire broke out in the Walker-Smith wholesale grocery building at San Angelo Monday night and destroyed the entire building and stock. The loss was estimated Tuesday morning at \$115,000.

The fire was discovered Monday night at 8:30 o'clock by Patrolman Stephenson and an alarm immediately turned in and the fire truck rushed to the scene of the fire. The basement was on fire and it was not thought that it would amount to much at first. A door on the South side leading to the basement was broken in and the chemical apparatus brought into action. A little later some windows on the North side of the building were broken and with a draft started through the building the fire almost immediately got beyond control. Seven lines of hose were laid and the fire fighters commenced spraying the building from all angles, but the blaze could not be exactly located until it had broken out all over the house. All windows had heavy steel bars and heavy net wire covering them and with the doors locked it was hard matter for the firemen to get into the building to fight the flames.

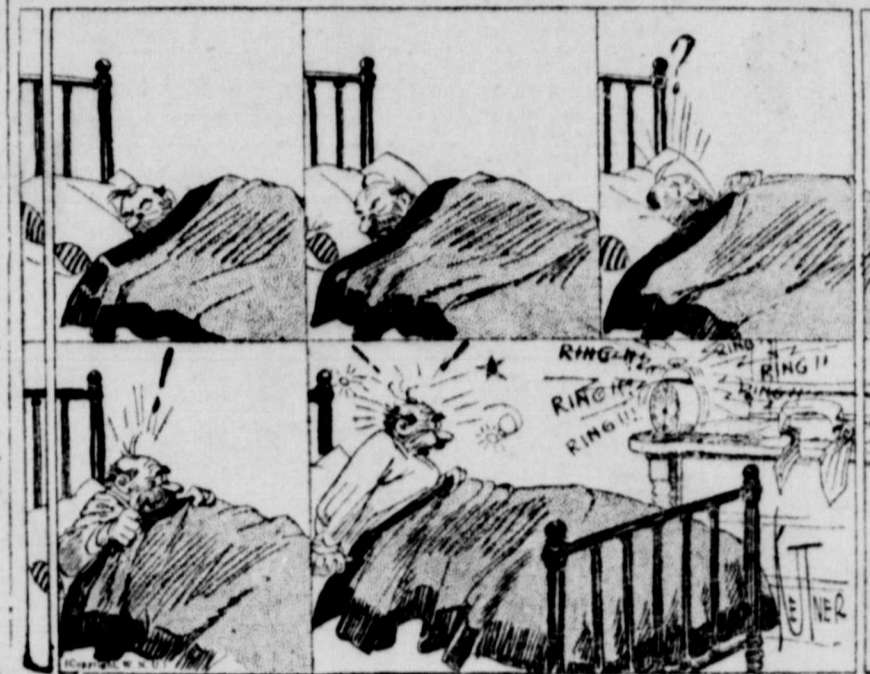
The North wall of the building was the first to cave in and everything, including all the stock, was a complete loss. The plant was located on West Fourth Street.

City to Enforce Ordinance Governing Street Market

City officers started in Tuesday morning to enforce the street marketing ordinance which was recently enacted, prohibiting the marketing of any kind of produce on certain streets in Ballinger. City Marshal Pilcher started the enforcement by moving all produce wagons from the court house square, directing them to the designated market place which has been provided for the purpose between Seventh and Eighth streets on Strong Avenue.

The block has been graded and gravelled, making it a good market place in either dry or wet weather, and the location is only half a block from the main business section of the city. Cotton and all kinds of produce will be directed to this spot to be sold.

According to the ordinance it is against the law to sell any kind of produce on the streets named in the ordinance and the person who drives his wagon on the streets and offers stuff for sale is violating the law. The ordinance was passed for the sole purpose of helping to regulate traffic and all vendors are asked to go to the designated spot to sell their produce.

SPEAKER ADMITS REORGANIZING BREAK WITH GOV. FORD RAILWAY

AUSTIN, Oct. 27.—Although former Governor James E. Ferguson declined to discuss the conference with Lee Satterwhite, speaker of the House of Representatives yesterday, Satterwhite admitted today that there is an open break, and claims that he tried to be Ferguson's friend but that the latter would not let him.

Satterwhite said that he would not call a special session unless the results of the investigation of the highway department now being conducted by Attorney General Dan Moody showed that it was necessary.

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 27.—The discovery of an oyster bed covering nearly 400 square miles off the coast of Patagonia has been reported to the ministry of agriculture by the chief of the fisheries bureau, recently returned from a survey of the Gulf of San Matias.

The location of the oyster bed is in the South Atlantic Ocean, about 100 miles from the coast of Patagonia.

CITIES OBSERVE 150TH NAVY DAY

WASHINGTON, October 27.—Appeals for public support of the navy were voiced throughout the country today on the occasion of the annual Navy Day celebration. This is the 150th anniversary of the navy, and also the birthday of Theodore Roosevelt.

Open house was ordered for ships at ports on all coasts and for navy yards and other shore stations.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 27.—Secretary Wilbur and Rear Admiral Jones, president of the navy's general board, extolled the spirit that was handed down by Paul Jones in Navy Day addresses here today before the Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce.

The secretary devoted a great part of his address to the readiness for sacrifice and service of those men who wear the navy uniform, while Admiral Jones went into the question of aviation, reiterating his argument that the fleet is now and will continue to be the ultimate force employed to exercise sea power.

Today has been set aside by the nation to be called Navy Day. The national organizations of the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary have asked local units to pass resolutions endorsing the movement, and this was done by the Ballinger organizations at the last regular meetings. The law makes it unlawful to trap, kill or have in possession pelts of beaver, otter or fox for a period of ten years from the passage of this law.

An open season is given on everything else, which is from November 13th to February 15th, except musk-rat, and a season is given on this animal from Nov. 15th to March 15th.

It is against the law to have these pelts in your possession, and it is also against the law to buy them when they are offered for sale. I. O. Wooden furnishes us with a copy of the law and states that the law is being violated every day. Mr. Wooden says he can not buy these furs except in the open seasons, and will not do so.

BIRD MALARIA TO BE STUDIED

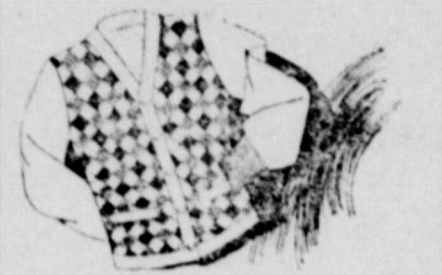
(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Oct. 27.—Malaria in birds is to be studied by the Southern Medical Association at its meeting here November 9-12 as a part of the program devoted to this disease. How birds catch and carry the disease is to be detailed in one of the papers prepared for the National Committee for Control and Study of Malaria.

Dr. George L. Carlisle, member of the local committee on arrangements, said malaria is recognized as a constant menace to health and property.

This will be one of the sectional meetings of a program covering a wide range of medical and surgical subjects. "Treatment of Chronic Malaria," will be the subject of one of the papers at the first day meeting, while on the second day the section will study the prevalence of malaria in certain parts of the delta region of Mississippi and Arkansas.
