## MOODY FILES SUITS RECOVER MONEY

### OFFICIALS BLAMED FOR TRAIN WRECK

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Officials of the Denver, Rio Grande & Western Railroad were sharply criticised today by the safety department of the Interstate Commerce Commission on the grounds that their operating methods were chiefly responsible for the wreck last August 20th, near Granite, Colorado, in which two persons were killed and 117 injured.

The failure of a telegraph operator to deliver a message properly and the failure of responsible operating officials to enforce the rules governing the handling of train orders was the cause of the accident, W. P. Borland, director of the Bureau of Safety reported.

### FRENCH GOVERNMENT TO TAX FORGETFULNESS

(By Associated Press)  
PARIS, Nov. 5.—A tax on forgetfulness is the most up-to-date thing in French revenue novelties.

The gentleman who leaves stock certificates in his taxicab and madame who forgets everything from her cigarette case to her pocketbook will now pay rather heavily when they claim their belongings at the Lost Property Office in Police Headquarters.

Money and securities will be returned to their owners at a charge of 4 per cent of their value. Jewelry, "except anything having no intrinsic value," is redeemable on the same terms. The "no intrinsic value" clause is expected to kill a very promising publicity field in the matter of lost jewelry. For every other article, new or nearly new, two francs will be charged; for everything else, one franc.

### WHEELER ASKS CHARGES DISMISS

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Senator Wheeler, democrat from Montana, and prosecutor of the Senate Daugherty investigation asked the District of Columbia supreme court today to dismiss the indictments charging him with conspiracy to defraud the federal government in connection with oil prospecting permits in Montana.

The two principal grounds for the motion advanced were that the senator was acquitted by a jury in the federal court in Montana on a charge based on an identical allegation of facts as that in the District of Columbia court and that that court has not jurisdiction over the offense charged or sought to be charged.

Every room in the house will be finished completely in "sheet rock," and this is probably the first home in Ballinger to employ this finish throughout. The work will be finished and the house occupied by Mr. Dankworth by December 1st.

### UNIFICATION IS DOUBTFUL

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 5.—Including the vote of three conferences yesterday and the combined vote of thirty annual conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, showed today that the vote stood 29,685 favoring and 2,171 against unification with the Methodist Episcopal Church, making final passage appear improbable.

The three-fourths total vote required by the Southern church for unification is yet to be passed by 13 conferences.

### MAY TURN SAWDUST INTO FIREPROOF BOARD

(By Associated Press)  
TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 5.—A synthetic board, non-inflammable and resisting heat and cold, may soon be manufactured from sawdust.

A group of lumber men here became interested in the possibilities of the product, after a demonstration proved that the synthetic board would withstand a flame that would cut through steel. Sawdust and other mill waste are treated with chemicals and made into a pulp. The pulp then is pressed into boards of any size.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Director Lord, of the budget bureau, appeared before the House ways and means committee today to present data through which the committee will try to determine for itself how far it should go in reducing taxes.

Secretary Mellon has set the limit at \$300,000,000 as the amount of revenue which he believes the government can spare next year.

AUSTIN, Nov. 5.—A suit asking for the cancellation of all state highway contracts in Texas which are held by the American Road Company was filed here today by Attorney General Dan Moody. The suit charges fraud and demands the cancellation of the company's charter in Texas. This action is considered the culmination of the highway investigation which was conducted by the attorney general and which gave rise to demands for a special legislative session to investigate the department at Austin.

The attorney general asks the recovery of \$650,000 from the defendant and alleges that the company made profits of \$1,115,000 on a gross business of \$1,700,000 from April 1, 1925 to October 1, 1925.

The officials of the company named as individuals are: E. S. Seyser, W. K. McIllyar, Whitaker Brodnax, T. D. McGinnis, H. H. Cleaver and Miss H. L. Johnson.

### LOCAL SHERIFF GETS REWARD

Sheriff Earl McWilliams is in receipt of a letter from the Collins-Decker Company of Greenville, Texas, enclosing a check for \$50 for the arrest of C. M. Bertram. Bertram was a salesman for the Collins-Decker Co. in this territory, selling player-pianos, and it is alleged that he misappropriated money which he had collected for the company. A complaint was filed in this county and a warrant issued for his arrest. After some time and considerable follow-up work on the part of Sheriff McWilliams, Bertram was located in California, was placed under arrest in San Francisco and the Rannels county sheriff was notified.

J. Lee Tarpley, of the West  
Texas Free Employment Bureau  
at Abilene, estimates that the  
early freeze has cut the West  
Texas cotton crop from 10 to 60  
per cent. Mr. Tarpley is con-  
stantly in touch with the farmers  
of West Texas and especially that  
part of West Texas North of Lub-  
bock, where he says the damage  
was the greatest.

The Bankhead Highway East of  
Baird is now ready to receive a  
coat of asphalt and as soon as  
completed, connecting it up with  
the Eastland county pike, the  
stretch from Baird to the Taylor  
county line will be put in shape  
as rapidly as possible. With state  
and federal aid Callahan county  
is spending \$700,000 on this high-  
way, and it will be one of the  
best sections of that highway.

Different papers over the state  
have been carrying lists of prices  
on common articles back in the

of the prices quoted: 1 lb tobacco  
\$2 1-2; one pint whisky 6 1-4c;  
5 pounds pork 27c; 6 pounds veal  
13c; Easter hat \$4.50; 25 pump-  
kins 50c; 5 days work (hired  
hand) \$2.50; one cord wood 50c;  
21 barrels hard cider \$3.75. These  
prices were in effect on Dec. 20,  
1827, and the bill looks like a  
Christmas order with the excep-  
tion of the Easter hat.

The Runnels County Fair Asso-  
ciation is pretty lucky in being  
able to announce that it will  
come out okay financially, on this  
year's show. Practically every  
other fair in West Texas this  
season has had to announce a  
loss and some lost as much as  
\$10,000. Every fair held in this  
territory this year experienced  
bad weather and the weather was  
not wet enough to collect rain  
insurance either. The local fair  
board will make a complete fin-

ancial statement as soon as it  
can be compiled and passed by  
the executive committee.
