Many Present to Hear Armistice Day Program

Armistice Day in Ballinger was successful in every way. The morning service drew a large crowd of both ex-service men and of people from the city to listen to the program presented on the court house lawn at 10:15 o'clock. The only hitch in the day's activities was the failure of the speaker, Rev. Francis A. Parsons, of San Angelo, to arrive in time to take part in the morning service. Rev. E. W. McLaurin filled his place and spoke to a large and attentive audience.

The Ballinger Band played a short concert on the lawn while the crowd was gathering and furnished patriotic numbers during the program. Following Rev. McLaurin's address the crowd faced the West and stood in silent prayer until taps were sounded.

Following the program on the court house lawn the ex-service men, their wives, Auxiliary members, school board, city officials, and others assembled at the American Legion club rooms where a luncheon was served at noon. Post Commander McLaurin gave the address of welcome, and was responded to by J. A. McCurdy, secretary of the Sweetwater Chamber of Commerce. Following the dinner Rev. Francis A. Parsons made a short address to the Legionnaires and guests, which was greatly appreciated. Rev. Parsons is a forceful speaker and it was a great disappointment to everyone that he did not arrive in time to deliver his address on the lawn in the morning. Other speakers at the luncheon were Supt. R. B. McLean, of the Sweetwater schools; J. D. Motley and L. Cohen.

The parade headed by the Ballinger Band got under way on time at 2:00 o'clock and was almost two blocks in length. The Legionnaires came first after the band, and the school board, faculty and "pep" squad from the local schools, brought up the remainder of the procession.

The parade stopped at the end of the pavement leading to Fair Park and the large crowd of people down town went to the park to see the football game between the Sweetwater and Ballinger high schools.

Supper was served at the Legion hall at 6:00 o'clock to all who came.

Sweetwater was here strong Wednesday. Cars from that city began to arrive here at 10:00 o'clock in the morning and continued to arrive until noon. About 60 people were in the party, together with their football team and a large number of fans. It was feared that the rain the night before would cut the attendance from Sweetwater, but the delegation leaders stated that the roads were good up to within six miles of Ballinger when they got into mud.

MOODY FILES SECOND SUIT

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Nov. 12.—A suit against the Sherman-Youmans Construction Company of Houston, for the cancellation of contracts in Harris and Galveston counties was filed today in the district court of Travis county by Attorney General Dan Moody.

A temporary injunction restraining the company from receiving or disbursing funds and the recovery of approximately \$30,000 is asked.

AUSTIN, Nov. 12.—The right of the attorney general to file a suit against the American Road Company without a request from the State Highway Department was questioned by Governor Ferguson in a letter today to Chairman Frank Lanham of the highway commission. She instructed Lanham to take every step possible in contesting such a right of the attorney general.

BLIND SCHOOL AGENT HERE

O. W. Miller, field agent for the Texas School for the Blind at Austin, is in Ballinger this week on a trip covering all West and North Texas in the interest of that institution.

Mr. Miller is not soliciting any funds or help for the school. It is a publicity campaign that he is making more than anything else. He is visiting all the towns of importance in this part of the state and talking before high schools, rural schools and chambers of commerce to let them know something of the great work which is being done in the institution and something of its size and facilities.

The school is a state institution, supported and operated by the State of Texas. It is one of the best equipped schools in the South, having eleven buildings, including power plant, gym, swimming pools, and factories where vocational training is taught. In addition to this training eleven full grades of literary work are taught and when a child finishes the school he is capable of making his own living anywhere with the trade and general education learned.

White blind children between the ages of 6 and 21 are accepted in the school free of cost to anyone except the state, and they are educated and raised with the same care as in the best of homes. The school is non-denominational, however, the religious side of life is stressed and ministers from all churches come to the institution voluntarily to preach and teach the Bible. It is not necessary that the child be totally blind to enter the school, and children whose eyesight is affected to such an extent that they cannot do high school work are accepted and treatment is given them as well as education.

Mr. Miller called on several different individuals, organizations and county officials while in Ballinger, making inquiries regarding blind children who should be entered in the institution. The school has been in operation for 69 years and during that time has turned out many students who have made their way in the world and were very successful. The school has an enrollment of about 300 at present, but has accommodations for about 200 more. The buildings are fire-proof, being constructed of concrete, and are steam heated.

TEACHERS WILL GATHER HERE

A meeting has been called of all rural school teachers of Rummels county to meet in Ballinger Saturday afternoon, November 14th at 1:30 o'clock, in the district court room of the court house. County Superintendent R. E. White is mailing a letter to all the teachers, urging them to be present and giving an outline of the work which will come up for discussion.

The main business to come before the teachers will be the consummation of organizing the Rummels County Interscholastic League, and the enrollment of the various schools. This work has been postponed each year heretofore until the meeting of the institute, but the county superintendent feels that this work should be attended to now and forestall interruption at the district institute which will hold only a three-day session in Ballinger this year.

Mr. White's letter also urges all the teachers to ask their trustees for time off to attend the meeting of the Texas State Teachers Association which will convene in Dallas on November 26th, with headquarters at the Baker Hotel. He also urges teachers to send in their dues for the coming year to the association, so he can report Rummels county 100 per cent at that meeting.

RUSSIA'S WAR CASUALTIES 754,000

MOSCOW, Nov. 12.—Russia lost 754,000 men in the World War, the statistical department has announced. During the 40 months of warfare the government spent 25 billion dollars, which placed a military tax of \$750 on each peasant's household. By the end of 1916, Russia had mobilized 15,780,000 men, which represented 47 per cent of the total able-bodied men of the country.

WAR TIME AVIATORS BACK COL. MITCHELL

TRAINS WRECKED; SEVERAL KILLED

(By Associated Press)
PLAINSBORO, N. J., Nov. 12.—At least two persons were killed and scores of others injured today when a Pennsylvania Railroad express train running from St. Louis to New York rammed another Pennsylvania train running from Washington to New York, in a heavy fog.

Railroad authorities believe that other bodies will be found in the wreckage of the two rear cars of the Washington train.

NEW BUILDING COMPLETE 1ST

If the present schedule is carried out the new Ballinger high school building will be ready for occupancy by December 1st, and that date, or somewhere thereabouts, will be moving day for the schools. The high school will vacate the old high school building to make room for the Junior school students.

The purchasing committee of the school board met Monday to buy the electrical fixtures for the new building, and as soon as these are installed the building will be ready for occupancy. The plumbers are connecting up the radiators in completing the heating system, and other finishing work is being rapidly completed.

The work of removing the surplus dirt taken from the basement and terracing the yard surrounding the building is well underway. The manual training and domestic science rooms were recently completed and these classes are getting their work arranged in the new building.

The contract called for completion of the building by the time of opening of school more than two months ago, but various causes have contributed to the delay. Fortunately the school board had the West ward building to fall back on.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Hisses and boos came from 300 war-time aviators at an Armistice Day dinner last night when a telegram was read from Secretary of War Davis refusing to permit Col. William S. Mitchell to attend the dinner. The aviators at the dinner comprise Post 743 of the American Legion, with a membership representing every squadron that had active duty at the front in France during the World War.

The post telegraphed President Coolidge that it endorsed unequivocally Mitchell's opposition before his court martial.

In an address by Representative La Guardia, a former flyer, he said, "Billy Mitchell is not being judged by his peers but he is being judged by nine 'dog-robbers' of the general staff."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The story of how she received communications from two officers connected with the navy department, before she testified in the Shenandoah inquiry, was told before the Mitchell court martial today by Mrs. Zachary Lansdowne, widow of the captain of the wrecked dirigible.

Both of the officers, she said, called on her before she appeared before the board, and one of them, Capt. Paul Foley, the board's judge advocate, sent her a letter purporting to outline an attitude of acquiescence in the board's method of procedure.

The witness has been called to support Col. Mitchell's charge that an attempt was made to induce her to testify falsely before the board of inquiry.

The other officer was Capt. Walter Gherardi, aide to Secretary Wilbur, but Mrs. Lansdowne merely said that she had told him that she did not hold the secretary personally responsible for her husband's death.

MARTIAL LAW IS DECLARED IN PEKIN

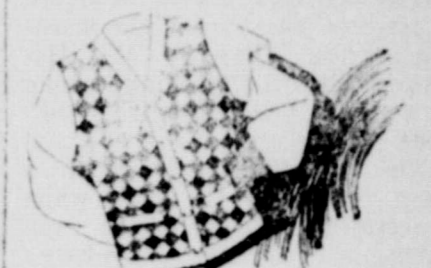

PLAINVIEW, Tex.—The highway from Lubbock to Canyon, a distance of 115 miles is to be oiled by the State Highway Department. The entire road will be graded and rolled and treated with special asphalt oil by a method similar to that employed in Illinois. 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SPEAKS FOR A FREE PRESS

COLUMBIA, Mo., Nov. 10.—A universally free press would make peace congresses and leagues of nations unnecessary, George B. Dealey, president of the Dallas (Texas) News and a former vice-president of the Associated Press, said here today in accepting a stone from St. Paul's Cathedral, London. The stone from the famous old church was given by the British Empire Union to the School of Journalism of the University of Missouri.

Presentation was made by Sir Esme Howard, British ambassador to the United States, and the gift was accepted by Mr. Dealey on behalf of the school.

Mr. Dealey, one of America's foremost journalists, declared that the journalists of continental Europe had not yet arrived at that vision of an untrammelled press which England mothered and America inherited.

"The lack of vision," he said, "is responsible for the more or less frequent social and political upheavals that have taken place in European countries in modern times. Their acquisition of it would count immensely for inter-

national peace and international harmony.

"For newspapers have the duty of publishing not only the overt acts of men and governments, but they have also the duty of enlightening the people as to the true conditions that lie behind these acts. What is needed is a clear and perfect understanding on the part of the masses of the motives which actuate governmental and economic policies. When this idea of news publication is universally attained, peace congresses and leagues of nations will be unnecessary, for where there is understanding national suspicions are automatically dissipated."

How and When to Prune Roses
"When and how is the best time to prune rose bushes? Does pruning produce a strong bush and more and larger blooms?" Any time during the winter, after the bushes have become thoroughly dormant, is the proper time for pruning roses. Do not prune after the buds begin to swell in the spring. Cut out entirely, close to the ground, all of the old and tough looking branches. Leave the more vig-

orous and newer shoots. Head these back about half way. By giving such a pruning, the bush looks like it is cut to pieces and ruined, but it is not. Instead, it is in shape to take on new life.

Properly pruning an old rose bush will not only cause it to take on new life and produce a stronger and more vigorous bush, but it will cause larger and more beautiful flowers to be produced. It is only the young, vigorous growing wood that can produce the largest and finest blooms, and the only way to provide this new and vigorous growing wood is to prune heavily every few years, as outlined above.—The Progressive Farmer.

Adventurer Sailing Around World in Thirty-Foot Yawl

MANILA, Nov. 10.—Otto Karl Fritz Pahl, sailing into Manila Bay, completed the first leg of a voyage which he hopes to make around the world in a 30 foot yawl.

Starting from Shanghai June 7 with two companions, Pahl reached Hongkong June 29 after a rough voyage. Here his two comrades left him, but an American named Richard Lofstadt joined him and sailed across the China Sea to San Fernando, province of La Union, P. I. where he too deserted the vessel on account of the hardships experienced on the 13-day trip from Hongkong. Pahl sailed for Manila alone, making the 150-mile journey in eight days.

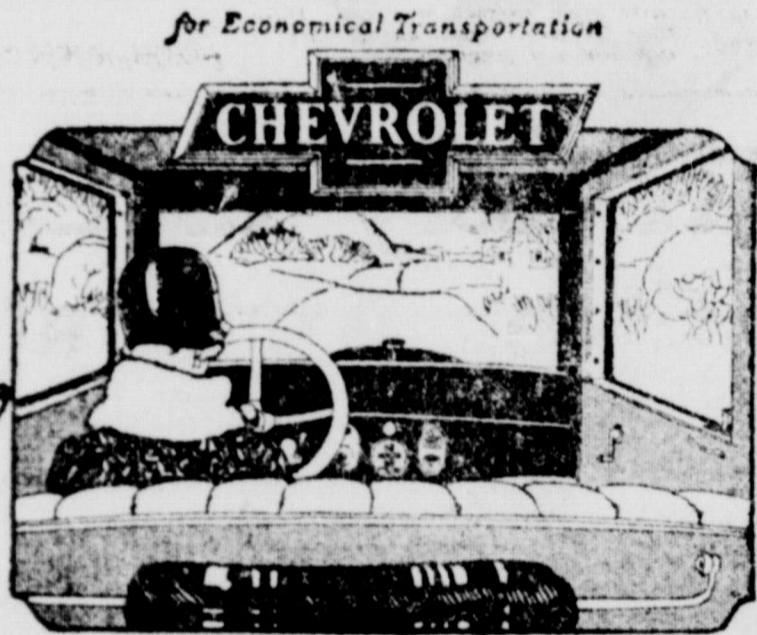

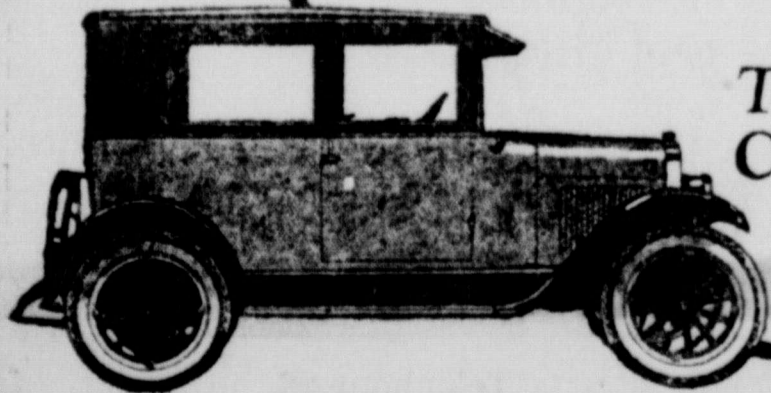

IRRIGATION MEETING AT ROBERT LEE TOMORROW

A big irrigation meeting will be held in Robert Lee Friday to consider the forming of a new district and the erection of a dam above Robert Lee on the Colorado River. Many prominent men in the irrigation world will be

present at the gathering to discuss the feasibility of the proposed project.

Harvey stated that city property in Cotulla has advanced 1,000 per cent already and the election for the issuance of bonds has not even been held. The election for that Southwest Texas project has been called for November 30th and will call for issuing bonds in the amount of \$7,000,000.

ROBERT LEE, Tex.—Preliminary steps looking toward the great Colorado River irrigation project in this county were taken at a meeting here. Porter A. Whaley manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Gib Gilchrist and J. Nagel, prominent engineers and a committee of Coke county citizens spoke on the project. An extended discussion was held and another meeting to be held here November 14, when Frank Keli, C. M. Caldwell, A. Lincoln, J. J. Lee with other prominent builders will discuss the project thoroughly with Coke county property owners and a definite decision will be reached as to whether the project will be pushed.

This is intended to stimulate chamber of commerce activities and support as well as give proper credit to the workers.
