BALLINGER MERCHANTS READY FOR XMAS BUYING

Only 36 days until Christmas. Thanksgiving will pass within a few days and then the holiday season really opens and the shop early signs will be evident on every hand. Thirty days may seem a long time in which to buy Christmas presents, but there are always enough people who put their buying off until the last minute to make the final few days before Christmas a nightmare for the clerks who try to satisfy late shoppers from a depleted stock of gift goods.

Ballinger firms this year are reminding the public in a most forceful way that the time for gift exchanging is near at hand. They are putting Christmas goods on display daily and it is their belief that the public will buy if it sees the exact suggestion before its eyes. Some stores report that they have already made many sales and have wrapped and put the articles away for delivery at Yuletide.

The large cotton crop and the heavy bank deposits have been the cause for many salesmen selling the largest bills of gift goods in Ballinger this year that have ever been sold in a small West Texas city before. Local firms are stocking up heavily on these lines, knowing the people will buy, and by purchasing stocks early from the wholesalers and in large quantities the retailers will be able to offer goods at better prices and make the same margin of profit.

MANY TEACHERS GOING TO DALLAS

Many Runnels county teachers will attend the Texas State Teachers Association convention which meets in Dallas on Nov. 26th, 27th and 28th. This was decided upon at a meeting of teachers from all over the county which was held here last Saturday. Most of the schools will turn out next Wednesday for Thanksgiving and will not resume work again until the following Monday. This arrangement will allow every teacher time to attend the association meeting and be home in time to resume school and lose no time. El Paso will send one of the largest delegations to the meeting in Dallas and will ask for the 1926 convention. Letters and news stories are being sent out of El Paso to every part of the state asking for the meeting and emphasizing the fact that only one meeting of the teachers has been held West of Fort Worth in the forty-odd years of the association's existence. El Paso, with over 18,000 enrollment in her public schools, and with a population of over 100,000, claims to have the active support of West Texas and the Rio Grande valley in the convention fight.

Supt. W. A. Cain, Prof. Ivan P. Oliver, Prof. Kennedy and Miss Mary Fleming will attend the meeting from the local schools. Every teacher in the Ballinger schools belongs to the association, being 100 per cent in enrollment. County Superintendent R. E. White will also attend the convention and with him will go teachers from all over the county, representing the rural schools. Supt. White stated that a large per cent of the county teachers hold memberships in the T. S. T. A. and that he hoped to make it 100 per cent by the date of the Dallas meeting.

Don't forget that the district convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce meets in Coleman on December 18th.

Plan Air Service for Guards (By Associated Press) FRANKFORT, Ky., Nov. 19.—Provision for an air service in the Kentucky National Guard may be submitted to the state legislature when it meets soon. Adjutant General Kehoe already has used airplanes in investigation work over the coal strike zones in the state.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Lieutenant Leigh Wade, one of the army world flyers, testifying before the court martial trying Col. William S. Mitchell today told of various experiences during his 3,000 hours of flying in every type of plane known to the aviation personnel.

Regarding the world flight he said that he believed the circumstances which attended the hop from Scapa Flow to Iceland constituted undue hazard to human life. The lieutenant replied in the affirmative when asked whether he was considering leaving the army air service. Why, he was asked. "I feel there is very little opportunity offered me," he replied.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The defense notified the Mitchell court martial today that it expected to complete its presentation of evidence tomorrow except for the testimony of Col. William S. Mitchell himself, who will testify in his own behalf.

OFFICER DENIES WIDOW'S CHARGE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Denying that he had sought to influence the testimony of Mrs. Margaret Lansdowne which she gave before the court of inquiry investigating the Shenandoah disaster last month, Captain Paul Foley testified today before that body that the statement which he sent her contained nothing that Mrs. Lansdowne had not said to him in the presence of three witnesses.

The statement was prepared for her consideration, he added, and was in a form that would make it unnecessary for her cross examination before the court and with a view of leaving Mrs. Lansdowne in a dignified position. The widow of the former commander of the Shenandoah declared before the court martial trying Col. William S. Mitchell last week that the statement was false and an insult to the memory of her husband.

CRUIER'S SEVEN MILE VOICE A SOURCE OF PRIDE TO VILLAGE

(By Associated Press) BURNHAM-ON-SEA, England, Nov. 19.—It is a far cry from this little old-world village to Point Buoy, on the Bristol Channel, but it means something to James Cox, the town trier.

For many years his voice has been heard resounding along the Marine Parade to Point Buoy, seven miles away. For this reason, when Mr. Cox competed in the national contest for town criers, the great metropolitan dailies described him as the man with "the seven-mile voice."

Burnham-on-Sea, where the portly and dignified Mr. Cox, with his flowing coat and quaint appurtenances of office, has become an institution, thrilled with pride. At last, the worth of its hero had been recognized.

But from America came the report that Mr. Cox's accomplishment was doubted. This surprised and disturbed many of the citizens, but Mr. Cox maintained dignified silence.

F. S. Patey, proprietor of The Gazette, was named spokesman in behalf of Mr. Cox and the village. "There is no disputing the fact

locally that James Cox can be heard for a distance of seven miles. This has been proven on more than one occasion. When Mr. Cox is crying on the Marine Parade his voice can be distinctly heard at the Point Buoy, which is seven miles down the Bristol Channel from Burnham-on-Sea. Captains of vessels more than once have heard Mr. Cox making his announcement of lost, stolen or strays and have testified to this fact."

Backhaus and his manager were required to leave the train, but finally persuaded the officials they were no dangerous anarchists.

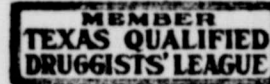

WILL PROTEST FEDERAL TAX

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Nov. 19.—To voice the protest of Texas against the federal inheritance tax and continued inroads that Texans declare congress is making in the province of the state's taxpayers, Democrats and legislators have been summoned here to a state-wide conference to be held in the Senate chamber of the state house Monday, November 23rd.

The call for a state meeting originally sounded by the Texas Tax Clubs thru George H. Colvin of Fort Worth, state chairman, has drawn the support of Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, Lieutenant-Governor Barry Miller, Speaker of the House Lee Satterwhite, legislators and officials of the Democratic Party.

Jed C. Adams, National Democratic Executive Committee man from Texas, will preside at the state meeting. Former Governor James E. Ferguson, representing Gov. M. A. Ferguson, will make the opening address at the conference. Speaker Satterwhite and Lieut. Gov. Miller will have places on the program of what has been designated the first unofficial session ever held by a Texas legislature. The meeting will be devoted exclusively to consideration of the proposals of the House ways and means committee to continue the federal inheritance tax and allow states credits amounting to 80 per cent of the amounts collected.

Nathan Adams, Dallas banker and widely known authority on Texas finance and industry; Senator John Davis, chairman of the Senate finance committee; and Representative Eugene Blount, chairman of the House appropriations committee, will deliver addresses explaining in detail the tax relations of the state and federal governments and their views on the injustices of the federal tax. A separate caucus of members of the two legislative branches will be held at the noon

hour at a hotel with Lieut. Gov. Miller presiding.

Samoan Babies are Thriving on Milk of Young Cocoanuts

(By Associated Press) PAGO PAGO, Nov. 19.—Young cocoanuts for young Samoans is the advice of the United States government to South Sea mothers unable to secure milk for their babies.

The use of cocoanuts for babies is still an experiment, but so far is considered successful. Each child is given the meat of four very young cocoanuts daily, together with all the coconut milk he can drink.

Child welfare work in Samoa has been organized so that all villages in American Samoa are visited at least once every two weeks. In each village a committee of women has been appointed. Babies are taken to the weekly meetings of this committee. When a baby increases in weight the mother is praised publicly; when it loses the mother is called to account.

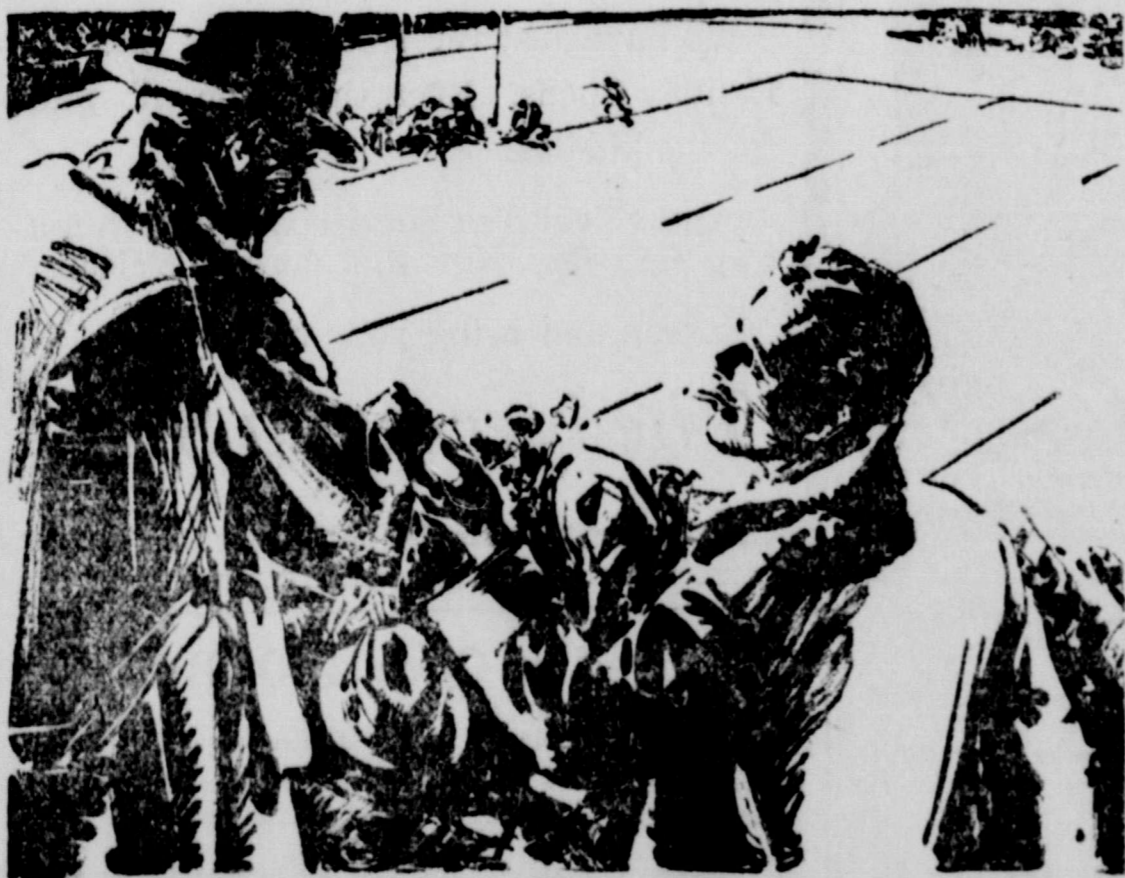

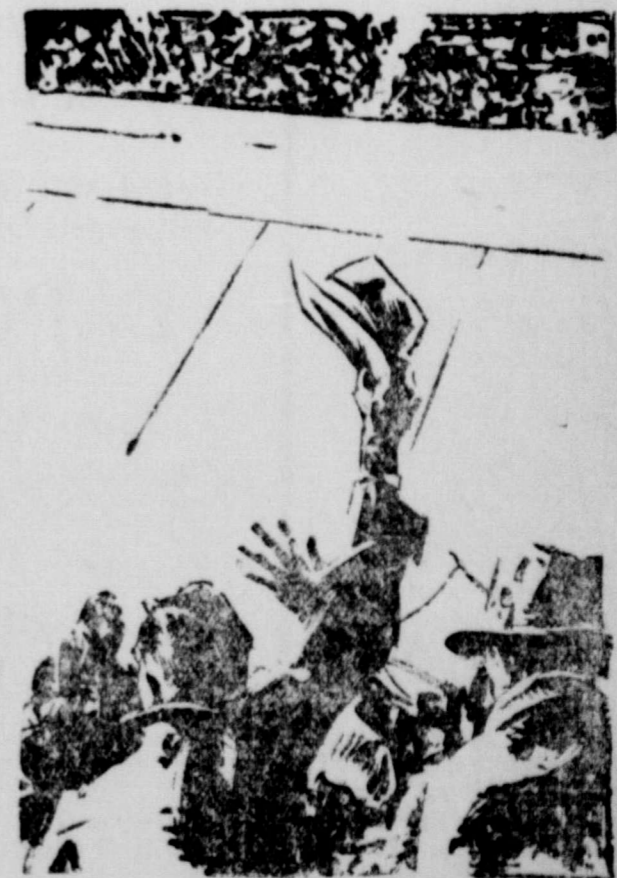
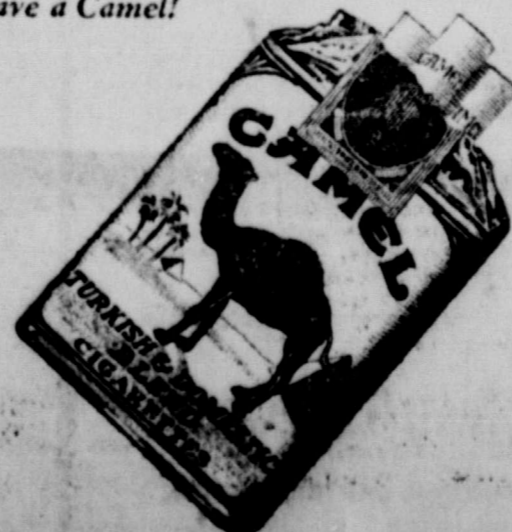

WANT AIR MAIL ROUTE TO SOUTH AMERICAN CITIES

(By Associated Press)
BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Nov. 19.—A proposed air mail route to pass thru New Orleans and extend to Panama, thru Brownsville, Tampico and other Mexican points and South American cities, is being supported throughout the Rio Grande Valley. Representative John Garner of this congressional district, has indicated that he will support a measure carrying an appropriation to inaugurate the service.

TUXPAM, Mexico, Nov. 19.—The first daily aerial passenger and express service to be inaugurated in Mexico is in operation between Tuxpam and Tampico, about 100 miles up the coast. One plane has been put in operation by the Cia Mexicana de Aviacion and leaves Tampico daily at 7:00 a. m. The trip is made in one hour and 30 minutes and the return trip is made from 9:00 a. m. to 10:30 a. m.

An effort is being made to carry government mail between the two ports besides passengers and express. Two passengers are carried on each trip, each being allowed to carry one suit case, and the fare is the same as that of motor buses.

New French Champagnes to be Good But Less of Them
(By Associated Press)

REIMS, Nov. 19.—Champagnes of France this year are going to be good in quality but there will be less of them. The champagne harvest was finished in splendid weather and the grapes in the cellars, ready for the special preparation necessary for the production of the world's most renowned sparkling wine, are expected to furnish about 2,750,000 gallons.

Mildew and blight caused much damage, the secretary of the Champagne wine-growers' association reported, but the crop is generally healthy.

Women play an important part in the wine industry of Champagne. It is women who dig out the vines which are attacked by phylloxera and who replace them with vines imported from the United States. Women prune the vines and harvest much of the crop. They also make up a large part of the labor required in the cellars and in labeling and

FARMING ON UPGRADE IN THE SOVIET

(By Associated Press)
COLLEGE STATION, Texas, Nov. 19.—Russia as an agricultural country is rapidly coming back into her own. This was told the students and faculty members of Texas A. & M. College recently by Prof. Valerian Obolensky, Ossinsky, Russian economist and professor of the Agricultural Academy of Moscow, the greatest agricultural institution in Russia.

Prof. Ossinsky said that while Russia in 1921 had only produced 205 million bushels of wheat, less than 50 per cent of her normal pre-war crop, and had only produced 1,130 million bushels of all grains exclusive of millet, that this year, Russia had produced 660 million bushels of wheat, 817 million bushels of rye and 697 million bushels of oats, a total production of all grains exclusive of millet, 2,635 million bushels.

"The normal pre-war production of wheat was 759 million bushels, her normal pre-war production of all grains was 2,898 million bushels," he said. "This shows how nearly Russia is back to her pre-war production in agriculture, and the pre-war production will be exceeded next year."

Prof. Ossinsky said that in five years Russia would produce sufficient cotton to supply all her domestic demand for cotton goods. This remarkable recovery of a nation, thought by many to be in a state of starvation, has been brought about by the development of a stabilized government and the repeal of those radical un-economic laws that throttled production in the years after the war, the professor declared.

PARIS, Nov. 18.—Stenographers and typists in Paris, "to live freely and in a manner worthy of their profession," are eligible to a union that claims \$26 a month as a minimum wage for its members.

Typists who are not also stenographers, the union insists, should receive at least \$24. During the time when a stenographer-typist is an apprentice she should earn \$17 to \$22 a month.

Royal Children in Japan May Have State as Schoolmaster

TOKYO, Nov. 18.—Princes and princesses of the blood will have the government as their schoolmaster, if an ordinance before the privy council is approved.

Characterized as the first action of its kind in the country, the measure was drafted for the purpose of enforcing educational standards in the imperial princes' families so as to ensure Japan against ignorant or poorly educated rulers.

Beginning at the age of six, royal children, under provisions of the ordinance, must go to

school 14 years, or study at least this length of time.

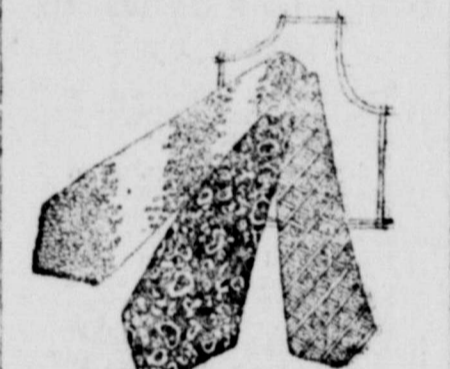
