Someone has suggested that perhaps the Ballinger preachers are responsible for that Sunday morning interference.

Texas stations will observe silent night beginning Wednesday night. This will give the fans an opportunity to reach out for a distance with less interference.

Out of 500 questionnaires sent out by Station WFAA to farmers 163 farmers stated definitely that their radio had saved them money, the average saving being estimated at \$148.64.

Fans are tuning up their sets and looking forward to test week beginning next Sunday night when all stations in Canada, United States, Mexico and Cuba will be silent from 10:00 to 11:00 o'clock. Foreign stations will broadcast a program for the silent countries.

A recent test by KOA, Denver, to determine which was the most popular program among the fans, the vote was five to three in favor of classical programs. Texas voted largely for jazz stuff.

KWKH, Shreveport, is conducting a drawing in which a new Dodge auto will be given away to someone acknowledging receipt of the Sunday afternoon programs. More than 40,000 letters and cards were received following the first announcement of the contest.

Between 12:00 and 3:00 o'clock at night on Tuesday, January 26, WOC, Davenport, will broadcast a special dance program for radio clubs in South Africa, New Zealand, the Far East and European countries.

BARRYMORE TOOK YOUTHS WITH HIM TO PICTURES

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, January 18.—A dramatic story, revolving around a young director and an even more youthful actress working in their first big production, was behind the filming of John Barrymore's latest picture, "The Sea Beast."

When Warner Brothers announced Millard Webb as the director to handle the famous actor, Hollywood shrugged its shoulders and wondered. Then Webb decided on Dolores Costello, a girl who had been on the movie lots only three months, to play opposite Barrymore. There were more movements of the shoulders and wonderment.

Miss Costello was given her role because she met the type demand and because being the daughter of Maurice Costello, it was thought she could act. As for the youthful director handling a veteran of the stage in a production new to both of them, Webb said:

"Barrymore is one of the easiest players I have ever directed. For nerve he has no superior; in fact, his nerve brought us into trouble. John was at the top of one of the masts and the scenario called for him to slide down a long cable to the deck. I yelled to ask him if he was ready, merely jokingly, for I planned to send a sailor 'double' to come down.

"Then I saw he was serious and as I called 'camera,' down he came about three times as fast as a regular sailor. He completed the scene before someone called

my attention to the fact that his legs and hands were badly burned, cut and bleeding.

"Again, a fight between John and his half-brother was called for. John put so much reality into it he fell, breaking three ribs and causing a delay of as many weeks. It took us more than seven months to make the picture."

When the schooner, "The Three Brothers," began hunting whales, several of the giants were killed, but they would not last long enough for the completion of the scenes. So an enormous "prop" whale was constructed and operated through mechanical devices from shore.

It was at one of the biggest moments of the picture that the young Miss Costello came to test. The girl was to cry and the

director wanted real tears, but she could not get herself in a "crying mood" throughout the day.

"The next morning I said something to her about my responsibility for her opportunity and asked whether she was going to live up to my expectations," Webb said. "She began crying immediately and what a scene we got!"

Two Richest Men in the World Never Went to College



JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER
CHICAGO—The two richest men in the world, Henry Ford and John D. Rockefeller, never went to college, it was pointed out by President Jesse Grant Chapline of La Salle Extension University, in an address here at an educational conference.

"When men can succeed in the world of business as well or better without a college education, it indicates something wrong with education," said President Chapline. "Of twenty-three industrial companies listed on the New York Stock Exchange, fourteen are operated by men who never went to college."

Julius Rosenwald, head of Sears, Roebuck and Company, started in business when he was sixteen years old. Lord Leverhulme, the soap king of Great Britain, Charles M. Schwab, and James A. Farrell, steel magnates, and John Wanamaker, Philadelphia merchant and former Postmaster General of the United States, began business at the same time.

B. Duke, the tobacco magnate who recently became nearly \$100,000,000 rich, attended university. A. W. Douglas, manufacturer of the D. Archi-

bold of the Standard Oil Company and John N. Willys, the automobile manufacturer, are among men who started in business life as boys of thirteen years.

"If we could get college education that would produce results like that there would be no complaints of it. The education of which there is never any criticism is that which puts knowledge in a man's mind, by which he can make his way to success. The fault with higher education in America is that it has tended to become a social asset rather than the kind of training that enables a man to win in the struggle of life."

TAGGED DUCK KILLED HERE

Edwin Schuchard, money order clerk in the Ballinger postoffice, opened communication with the United States Biological Survey at Washington, D. C., Monday, in an effort to find out from whence a wild duck which he killed on the Colorado River while on hunting Sunday.

Mr. Schuchard killed a big Mallard drake and found a government band on the bird's leg. The band was numbered 232002, and also contained the wording, "Notif. Biol. Surv., Washington, D. C."

This is part of the program carried out by the government in keeping track of its migratory game, and as soon as the notice of the capture of the duck here has been received at Washington,

Mr. Schuchard will be notified and given the particulars in connection with the marking and releasing of the wild duck, which was no doubt from some far distant point.

The tag on the duck's leg was scarred and worn, and showed to have been in use for some time. The bird probably came from Canada, and possibly it came in a few days, or it might have been a year or two in getting down in this part of the globe.

The biological survey will check up as soon as it receives notice from Mr. Schuchard, and the records will show the place and time the duck was banded and released.

Local nimrods expect to profit by the killing of the tagged duck, in that steps will be taken to have the game laws governing duck hunting changed. It is claimed that the season opens too early here, or closes too early, as ducks do not begin to come in here until late in January, while the

season closes on the last day of the month.

So far as is known this is the first tagged duck ever shot in this part of the country.

"I hate interference and prohibition of any kind, and though I have never touched spirits I have made up my mind to have my schnapps from time to time, since it has been prohibited in Norway," she wrote to her son, Bjorn Bjoernson, actor-manager of the Norwegian National Theatre.

Madame Bjoernson is the widow of Norway's greatest national poet, Bjornsterne Bjoernson. She has for years taken an active interest in public affairs.
