## LINERS CARRYING 6000 BATTLE WITH STORM

(By Associated Press)  
NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Three steamships were in distress today as the result of storms on the Atlantic Ocean, and at least twelve liners were battling toward land with nearly 6,000 passengers aboard when the storms developed.

The ships in distress were the British freighters Antioe and Laristan and an unidentified vessel reported in distress near the Panama Canal.

### EDEN HAS BIG DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

When the council members called at the office of Mr. Splawn yesterday, the president told the members of the committee that their appointment had not been sanctioned by the student assembly and that therefore he could not treat them as official representatives of the student body.

### MEXICO BUILDING BIG SYSTEM OF GOOD ROADS

LAREDO, Tex., Jan. 26.—In a few years Mexico will have finished the task of building the great national system of high ways that will extend over the entire breadth of the country. "Good Roads," an organ published in the city of Mexico and dedicated to good roads in Mexico, declares.

"The most important of these will be the Laredo-Mexico City Highway and the road to the Guatemala border," the magazine states. "These roads will form a direct line of communication between North and Central America and will doubtless become in future years the main arteries of Pan-American tourist traffic."

Guatemala, Salvador and Costa Rica, lacking in rail communication, have fairly good automobile roads. Salvador and Guatemala are criss-crossed with a network of roads. Guatemala is at this time building a number of important roads. The revolutionary period in Honduras, during the past six years, has greatly impeded the progress of road building in that country, but it is certain that in the near future that country, too, will realize the need of adequate communication and take steps accordingly.

Nicaragua is another country that lacks good roads, but it is hoped that when the new roads throughout Mexico and Central America are opened for travel Nicaragua will fall in line with the rest and provide good high ways.

## MEXICAN OIL SUITS APPEALED

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 26.—Twenty-seven injunction suits have been brought by foreign oil companies which seek to restrain the government from putting in to effect the retroactive clauses of the new petroleum law.

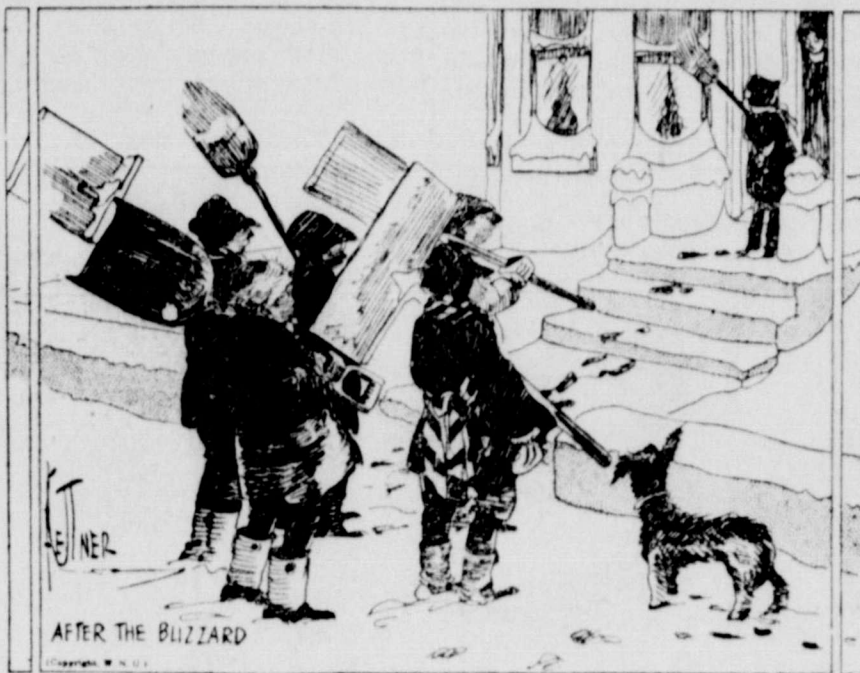
The injunctions were denied by the district courts and all have reached the supreme court of Mexico on appeal.

## RUBBER PRICES COMING DOWN

WASHINGTON, January 26.—Prices of crude rubber have been greatly affected by the campaign against the high cost of the product now being maintained, according to the opinion of Secretary of Commerce Hoover.

On December 10th, Mr. Hoover said today, when he asked for the co-operation of the American people in an effort to meet the situation, that spot crude rubber was selling for \$1.20 per pound, and for delivery within three months the price was \$1.05 per pound. The spot price of crude rubber yesterday was 68 cents per pound, and for three months delivery is was about 64 cents per pound.

## 61 INDICTED IN BIG RUM RUNNING RING

### SAYS SNOW HAS A CHILD'S MIND

STEPHENVILLE, Jan. 26.—The mentality of F. M. Snow, on trial here for the murder of his stepson, Bernie Connally, last November, is that of a child about nine years of age. This was the testimony of Mrs. Jean Sheppard, social worker and psychologist of the Dallas public schools.

Mrs. Sheppard was called as a witness by the defense and testified today that Snow's mind was about on a par with that of a nine-year-old child.

### MAVERICK BOY LOSES AN EYE

R. S. Bowden was in the city Tuesday from the Maverick section. Mr. Bowden had just returned from Dallas, where he carried his son, Elbert, for an operation in which one of his eyes was removed. Mr. Bowden left the young man in the hospital at Dallas, but he was getting along nicely and will be able to return home in a few days.

Elbert suffered injury to one eye while playing when he was only four years of age, and the injured eye recently became infected and had to be removed.

### PROPOSES CHANGE IN COURT MARTIAL LAW

WASHINGTON, January 26.—An investigation of the Mitchell court martial case with a view of revising the law concerning military courts was proposed today in a resolution by Representative Connally, Democrat, of Texas.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Thirteen members of the coast guard and forty-eight other individuals were indicted today by the federal grand jury which has been investigating an alleged bootleg liquor ring, headed by Bill Dwyer, former race track owner.

Nine of the coast guard men named in the indictments are still active in the service. Three separate indictments were returned by the grand jury, charging sixty-one of the defendants with violation of the federal prohibition laws and conspiracy to violate the law.

The grand jury has spent weeks investigating the alleged rum runners. It is alleged by the federal authorities that the rum ring had control of eighteen steamers in the smuggling business.

Dwyer, the alleged leader of the ring, and more than a score of his confederates were arrested in December, and since then four boats supposed to have been in the whiskey trade have been seized by federal agents.

### MONDAY NIGHT WAS ALSO COLD WEATHER

Snow melting was a slow process throughout the day Monday and the mercury settled to eleven degrees above zero before stopping its downward trend Monday night. The trees, and all the outside world was given another coating of ice, and real winter weather again greeted the West Texas Tuesday morning.

The snow storm and cold snap is the severest this country has experienced since the boys returned home from the task of freeing the world of kaiserism. The prospects Tuesday were promising for a general thaw-out.

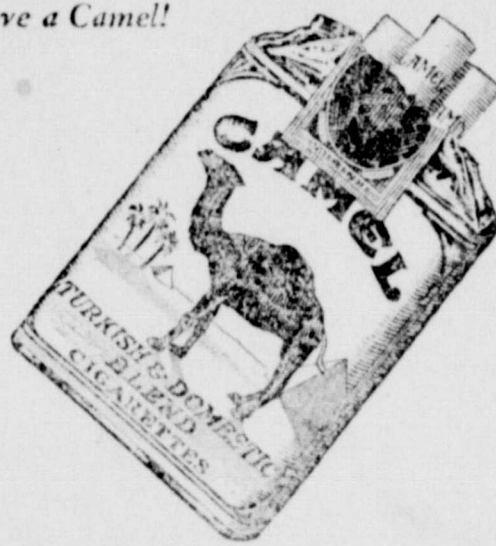

LONDON, Jan. 26.—Blind men who act as guides to pedestrians when dense fogs settle over London have been complaining because of lack of "business" due to this winter's weather, which has been exceptionally clear and cold.

Thousands of persons frequently become lost in the fogs, even within a block or so of their homes or offices. It is on such occasions that the blind men, who find their way by "feel" and instinct, take up their stands at prominent corners and offer their services as guides. It has been estimated that a real fog here entails a loss of approximately 350,000 pounds to business in less than 24 hours.

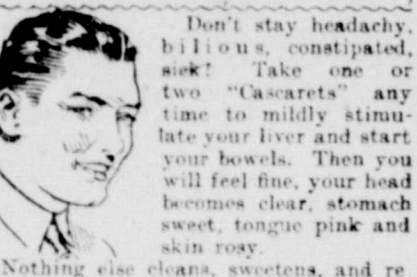

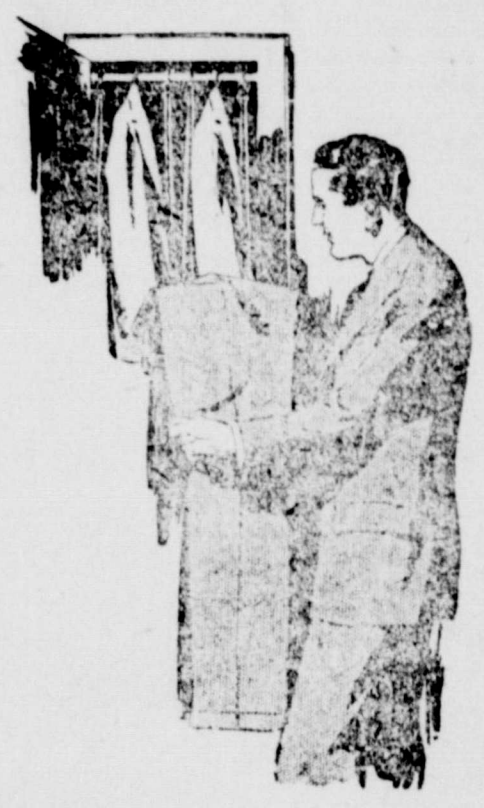
