## 14 DEAD TAKEN FROM COAL MINE

(By Associated Press)  
ECCLES, West Virginia, March 10.—The known death toll from the Crab Orchard Improvement Company mine disaster has reached four men. This became known today when three more bodies were located within the workings of the mine where twenty-nine men were entombed Monday.

Ten men were found alive in the mine last night. Five are still missing, but the company officials and rescue workers were hopeful that at least two of the five are still alive. The five missing men were working in a section of the mine isolated from where the blast occurred.

## OIL PRODUCTION INCREASES

LAREDO, March 10.—While the oil shipments from the Noleda Field of Duval county showed a decrease of 33 carloads in February as compared with January shipments, the shipments of Miranda crude from Miranda City during the month of February showed an increase of 137 carloads over the month of January.

The decrease in the Noleda Field was due to the fact that the Humble-Walsh oil producer near Benavides has decreased its flow.

## ROAD CONTRACTS FOR \$1,240,683.00

The highway commission received bids first of the week and have been tabulating them on the resurfacing of 416 miles of highway work which was formerly held by the American Road Company.

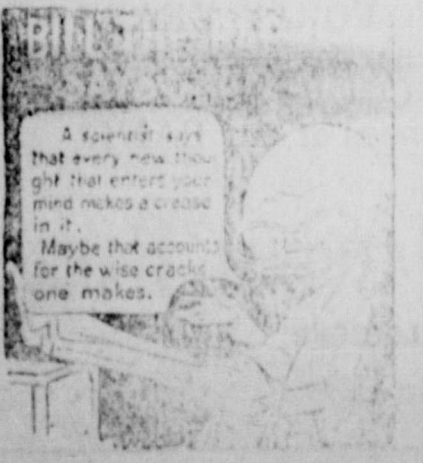

## SOUTH FACES CALAMITY WITH BIG COTTON CROP

### COURT RULES ON STATE ROYALTIES

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, March 10.—Oil royalties from University of Texas lands are to go in the permanent building fund as the result of a ruling by the Texas Supreme Court today in mandamus proceedings.

The mandamus sought by the board of regents of the university against Gregory Hatcher, state treasurer, was granted, and the funds will go to the permanent building fund instead of to the available building fund.

An act of the Thirty-Ninth Legislature placed the royalties in the available building fund, but the court today held that this act was unconstitutional.

### LEAGUE VOTES ADMIT GERMANY

(By Associated Press)  
GENEVA, March 10.—The sub-committee of the League of Nations assembly today unanimously recommended that Germany be admitted to the league. The sub-committee report said that it had found that Germany had fulfilled all the necessary conditions required of her to become a member of the body.

The members of the League of Nations council met this afternoon to discuss ways and means for solving the council membership crisis which grew out of the objection of some of the outside nations who are seeking membership.

### NEW HOME GOING UP ON BROADWAY

Joe Huffman, of the Harwell Motor Company, has let the contract and work started Wednesday on a new home on Broadway. The new home is to be a five-room and bath frame building with modern conveniences. Mr. and Mrs. Huffman will occupy the dwelling as soon as it is completed and rent the one in which they are now living.

### BRIAND NAMES NINTH CABINET

(By Associated Press)  
PARIS, March 10.—Aristide Briand for the ninth time premier of France, today completed reconstruction of the French cabinet. The cabinet under Briand resigned last week.

Although downhearted over the defeat of his eighth cabinet last Saturday in the Chamber of Deputies on the government's financial bill, Briand was prevailed upon by President Doumergue as an act of patriotism to again take the helm and form another cabinet.

GRANDBURY, Tex., March 10.—Radicalism and a tendency toward revolutionary thought among the farmers is being created under the economical injustice of the present agricultural situation, Colonel Clarence F. Ousley, director of the Safe Farming Association, declared in an address here today when he appeared before a meeting held to forward the more cotton on fewer acres program.

"This is the greatest aspect of the cotton problem in the South," Col. Ousley said, and he predicted Southwide bankruptcy if even approximately as much cotton is produced this year as was raised in 1925.

### 97 PER CENT COUNTY TAXES COLLECTED

Only about three per cent of the state and county taxes of Rannels county were delinquent on the first day of March. Up to that time Collector W. L. Brown's report showed that out of a total tax amounting to \$226,953, the sum of \$219,704 had been collected. This does not include poll tax money.

The voting strength of the county is 6093. This does not include those who are qualified to vote without payment of poll tax, nor the "overs" and "unders."

Today's weather forecast calls for continued rain today over much of Texas with clearing and colder weather tonight and tomorrow.

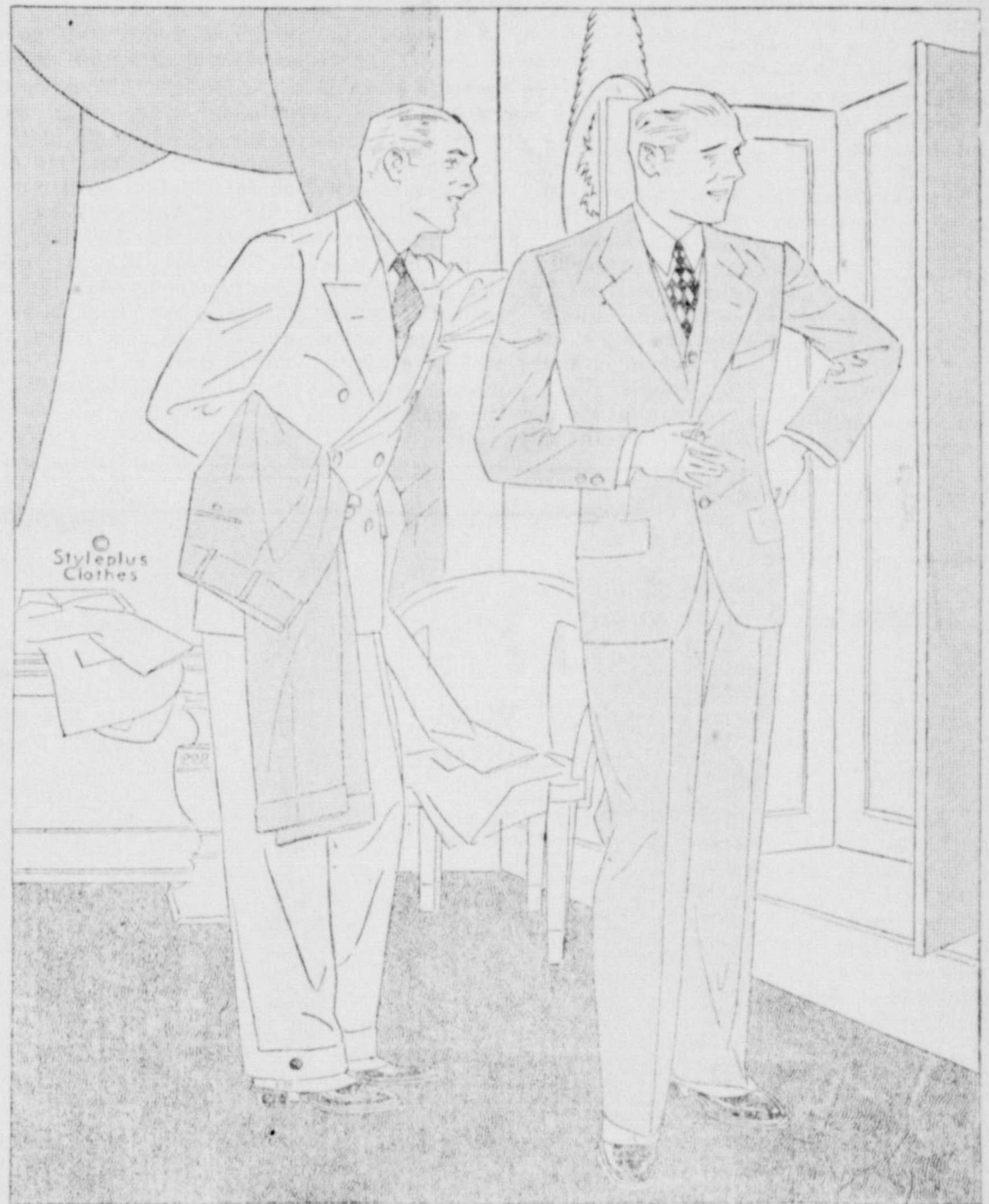

**TO DANCE OR NOT TO  
DANCE**

Amarillo was mighty happy a  
few months ago when the West  
Texas Chamber of Commerce  
voted to hold its 1926 convention  
there, but troubles are beginning  
to pile up in the convention city  
and before the task has been com-  
pleted Amarillo's convention  
committees will come to the con-  
clusion that their joy last spring  
was ill-advised. It is one of the  
greatest conventions of the  
South, and entertaining it is one  
of the greatest jobs any West  
Texas city has ever undertaken.

The real troubles have not yet  
become apparent in preparations  
for the Amarillo convention; just  
the minor questions have come to  
the surface, such as whether to  
permit dancing as a part of the  
convention programs. The brethren  
of the West Texas Methodist  
conference recently adopted a  
resolution pleading with Amarillo

to prohibit all kinds of dancing  
during the convention, declaring  
that modern dancing is sinful and  
destructive of good morals, and  
claiming that all the religious  
bodies of West Texas endorsed  
the Methodist's stand on the mat-  
ter. Of course, Amarillo doesn't  
want to offend the Methodists,  
nor does it want to give its ap-  
proval to anything that is sinful  
or destructive of good morals.  
But what is Amarillo to do, since  
experience has shown that danc-  
ing is an inevitable accompani-  
ment of conventions of the West  
Texas Chamber of Commerce?  
Especially since plans have al-  
ready been made for a big ball,  
with a queen, and everything, for  
who ever heard of a queen's ball  
without dancing?

We will give Amarillo our sym-  
pathy as the industrious people of  
that thriving city prepare for the  
worst. Their troubles are just  
beginning, and will be multiplied  
as the time for the convention  
approaches. After the conven-  
tion Amarillo will be eligible for  
admission to the "Nevermore  
Club," along with Brownwood  
and some of the other towns  
which in times past have eagerly  
sought the opportunity of enter-  
taining the greatest convention of  
the Southwest.

**NEGRO KILLER MAY  
DIE ON JUNE 15**

John Smith, negro killer of  
Sheriff Dick Pauley of Coleman  
county, in Coleman last spring,  
who was sentenced to die in the  
electric chair by a Brown county  
jury in the 35th District Court  
here last year, was returned to  
Brownwood this afternoon at  
2:45 o'clock by Sheriff Bert Hise  
and three of his deputies.

Smith has been held in the Fort  
Worth jail for safe-keeping since  
his trial here last year.  
The Houston attorney, em-  
ployed to defend Smith by his  
parents, appealed the case to the  
Criminal Court at Austin, but the  
verdict was affirmed by the court  
and now Smith will go to the  
electric chair within a short time.

Judge J. O. Woodward stated  
at noon today that he would  
either announce the date of the  
negro's execution this afternoon  
or defer action until tomorrow.  
Judge Woodward when asked  
if he had set the date, said he  
had not but that it would prob-  
ably be about June 15th.

The negro has been closely  
guarded since he was taken from  
jail in Fort Worth. He will also  
be closely guarded while in the  
Brown county jail.—Brownwood  
Bulletin.

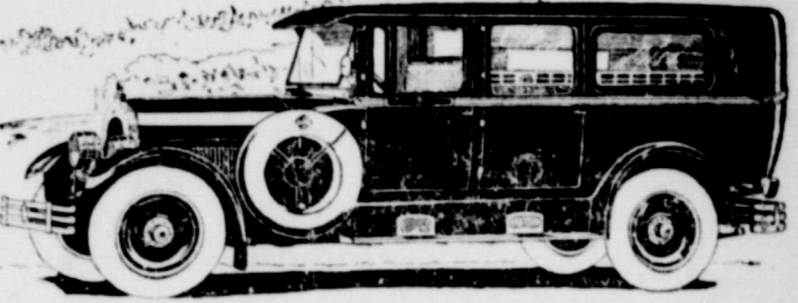

## & M. EXPERT GIVES RULES OF CORRECT DRESS

(By Associated Press)  
COLLEGE STATION, Texas, March 9.—A turned up nose is accentuated by a hat with a turned up brim or with brims having a greater roll in front than in the back. This statement is made by Mrs. Dora Russell Barnes, clothing specialist of the Extension Department of Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College here, in a sketch of what woman should buy in hats.

"Large noses," she said in a statement which the college is circulating, "and sloping shoulders are made to look longer by a hat with the front and back brims the same width.

"A drooping mouth is accentuated by a drooping hat brim. Very small, close fitting hats are not in keeping with large figures.

"Soft, irregular edged, turned up brims are generally more becoming than sharply defined curves.

"People with scrawny necks and straggling hair want to avoid a hat turned up in the back.

"Height of crown and width of brim should be related.

"Lines in trimming should follow the structural lines of the hat.

Remember that age demands softer lines than youth.

On the general subject of hats, which most husbands know is important, Mrs. Barnes says:

"A becoming hat is most essential. No face, however, beautiful, can rise above an unbecoming hat.

"When purchasing a hat stand before a full length mirror to get the effect, both front, back and sides, and do not follow the extreme fashion or fads in hats, unless they are becoming to you. One of the hats seen most frequently this season is the small shape with the peak crown which is very high. This shape is rather trying for the older woman. It is meant mainly for youth. There are small shapes and medium size shapes with slightly rolled brims, also a few mushroom

shapes shown which are graceful and will perhaps suit the older women better than the latest fad.

"When purchasing a hat, study your own lines, know the kind of shape your special face should carry above it and know the color which emphasizes your eyes and skin.

"Study the costume with which your hat is to be worn. Know how to put on the hat. Remember that your facial expression is either enhanced or ridiculed by the way the hat is worn, by the tilt, the color and the adjustment of the hat.

"Do not be persuaded into buying something because it is stylish. Combine style, taste and becomingness. The eye has a tendency to travel in the direction of the lines of the costume. Vertical lines give apparent height. Horizontal lines add width. Sharply defined curves exaggerate roundness or thin angularity."

### POSSIBLE ERUPTION OF MT. MCKINLEY TO BE WATCHED

(By Associated Press)

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, March 9.—Alex Liska, Alaska guide and mountain climber, believes it possible that Mt. McKinley peak may be in active volcanic eruption. To find out he plans to ascend it, following the route taken by the late Archdeacon Hudson Stuck, who in 1913 scaled the heights, approaching from the Northeast.

Stuck described the crest of the mountain as containing a crater-like snow basin about twenty-five by sixty feet in dimension. He made his trip in company with Harry P. Karstens, Robert G. Tatum, a missionary, a third veteran of the Klondike, and three Indian boys. On the summit, reached June 7, the instrument reading disclosed the peak to be 20,300 feet above sea level.

The Stuck expedition made its start March 17, nearly three months being required for the ascent. Proceeding by dog team from Nenana, a month later camp was established 4,000 feet up at Muldrow glacier. This was 20 miles from the top. The remainder of the trip was more difficult, the greatest obstacle being a steep ridge between the lower and upper glacial floors.

The spectacular eruptions of subterranean forces in the North in recent years, bringing into being the Valley of Ten Thousand Smokes and other natural phenomena, lends interest to the undertaking.

### EDUCATION BY MAIL URGED UPON BOYS

(By Associated Press)

YELLOW SPRINGS, O., March 9.—Education by mail, direct from subject to student, is being put in practice for American boys by Dr. Sven V. Knudsen, professor at Antioch College here.

"My Friend Abroad" is the name given by Dr. Knudsen to his system which consists of letter writing between boys in America and boys abroad—from Lapland to the Argentine, from Jerusalem to Singapore, from Poland to Trinidad.

"Education through letters written from one boy to another can be made into a more personal

thing than can text books written for quantity consumption," Dr. Knudsen believes. "If we can only bring geography, sociology and such subjects, which deal with the surrounding world, closer to a boy's personal life, he will like them ever so much more."

Strengthening of international good will among the young people of various nations will result from the scheme, he thinks. In letter writing, he urges American boys and boys of foreign countries to write about their personal lives, their everyday customs, their viewpoints, their families, schools, and their play.

"The old stigma against the stage is missing, for the type of girl that gave it a bad name virtually has been eliminated thru the strict requirements. Logically, this improvement in conditions has materially lessened the opposition of our better families to their daughters going on the stage."

The director who trained Marilyn Miller, Ruth Laird, Ann Pennington, Gilda Gray, Claire Luce, Fred and Adele Astaire, Oscar Shaw and many other Broadway stars, predicts the chorus girls of the future will be faced with even greater requirements.

## RECORD RUN TO BROTHER'S DEATH

SWEETWATER, March 10.—While Jack Bell, well known radio entertainer with station WFAA, Dallas, was appearing before the Sweetwater Rotary Club Tuesday at noon his brother met accidental death somewhere in Massachusetts, a wire advised.

Failing to charter an airplane to connect with a fast train to St. Louis from Fort Worth, Jack Bell and his partner, Jack Davis, known as "The Two Jacks," left here at five minutes to three in a Chrysler car thru the courtesy of the Toler Motor Company. Authorities at Abilene, Breckenridge and other towns en route were asked for right of way for the desperate race with death. Attempt was made to cover the 200 odd miles in time to catch the Texas Special at Fort Worth at 8:00 o'clock. Both WBAP and WFAA were requested to broadcast for road clearance for the race against time. The Two Jacks were filling an engagement at the Palace Theatre here this week. At the Rotary luncheon they had concealed themselves behind screens and gave part of their program via loud speaker while the chairman for the day's luncheon read a purported wire that they had been suddenly called to Dallas. The real wire ironically followed.

Details concerning the death of Bell's brother were lacking here. The car carrying Jack Bell by two motorcycle policemen and piloted thru Abilene. The motor cops led the car at a fast clip thru the city out Grape Street and on to the Albany road. The car was making 85 miles an hour when it reached Abilene, the motorcycle officers said.

Asked how quickly the car got to Abilene from Sweetwater, Chief Bob Burch said, "Oh, about fifteen minutes." The distance is forty miles.

Actually, it was about forty minutes after the speeding car left Sweetwater until it whizzed thru Abilene.

## CITY LEAGUE IS LOCALS' PLAN

The warm days are putting a little pep into baseball fans here and plans are now under way for the organization of a four-team "city league." Those talking up the proposition plan to call a meeting at an early date of all fans and baseball players, organize four teams and get the season under way as soon as possible. ## BETTER OUTLOOK CATTLE INDUSTRY

(By Associated Press)

FT. WORTH, March 10.—The range and the cattle industry has gone through fire since 1920 and has probably fared worse than any other major line of production, but liquidation has now gone far enough to assure to some degree a more stable condition of the cattle industry as a whole and better times are ahead for the cattlemen.

William Jardine, secretary of agriculture, brought this broad reassurance to the members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association when he addressed them at their golden anniversary convention here today.

Mr. Jardine told the cattlemen that the United States department of agriculture is fully alive to the economic problems of the cattle business of which there are several and he said that the department is making every effort to help solve the problems.

The secretary pointed to the extensive range studies which are being conducted by the department.

(By Associated Press)

SAN ANTONIO, March 8.—The story of a certain San Antonio merchant who increased an employe's salary when he was informed that the man was a former convict, was told by the Rev. J. K. Berry, religious director of the local Young Men's Christian Association, at a recent meeting of the Ministerial Alliance.

The employe, who had a wife and child, was released from a state prison a short time ago after serving a term for forgery, Mr. Berry said, and when he was given employment by the local merchant he started to tell his employer that he had been in trouble. The merchant, however, cut him short, saying that the trouble did not matter, and the young man went to work.

A few weeks ago the employer received an anonymous letter warning him that this employe had served a term and would rob him at the first opportunity. The merchant showed the employe the letter. The latter admitted he was a former convict, adding he had tried to make that plain when he was employed.

"That's all right," the employer assured him. "Your salary is increased \$10 a week."
