BOXES DIES AFTER BOUT

(By Associated Press)
MILWAUKEE, April 20.—Clever Sencio, Filipino boxer, died here today alone in his hotel room after a ten-round engagement with Buddy Taylor here last night. The 21-year-old boxer was found upon his bed in a pool of blood.

Whether death had been caused by punishment which all but knocked him unconscious in the tenth round had not been determined.

\$500,000 FOR FT. SAM HOUSTON IN BILL

SAN ANTONIO, April 20.—The House passed a bill appropriating \$500,000 for the construction of permanent quarters at Fort Sam Houston, Tuesday. News of the appropriation was received by W. H. Furlong, acting manager of the Chamber of Commerce, in a telegram from Congressman Harry M. Wurzbach.

Voting the money for improvements at Fort Sam Houston where the Second Division is stationed with the men living in the temporary frame cantonments erected during the late war emergency, is the first allotment of approximately \$12,000,000 which the War Department seeks to get available for expenditure in making improvements at all army camps and flying fields in and near San Antonio.

FOUR TAYLOR COUNTY MEN GET PEN TERMS

Monday, the first day for trial of criminal cases of the April term of forty-second district court opened with four verdicts returned during the morning assessing penitentiary terms.

Three of the men found guilty by juries Monday morning were given one year terms. They all pleaded guilty to the charges against them.

J. W. Walker, Phillip Powell and Archie Searey were given a year each for selling and possessing intoxicating liquors.

Jack Allen, charged with theft of an automobile, was given two years.

A second charge of bootlegging against Searey was dismissed.—Abilene Reporter.

Historical Pictures are Possessed of Long Life

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., April 20.—Time does not dim interesting chapters of history. Consequently the motion picture based in part at least on some crucial moment of world evolution is capable of sustaining interest a long period.

This is the judgment of Jesse L. Lasky, in charge of Paramount production. He finds that history is one of the richest sources for material from which successful pictures may be made. Altho the present trend is toward subjects of international interest one typically American can hold the public interest for an indefinite period if it be based on the more vivid chapters of the nation's history.

Citing "The Covered Wagon" as an example, he pointed out that it is still booking and making money wherever shown. Ten or twenty years will not dim its popularity.

"Pictures for the most part, which deal with modern problems, are in the theatres today and on the shelves tomorrow. Take 'The Ten Commandments,' it is history—biblical history. The spectacle has established records in theatres the world over."

"The Pony Express, 'Vanishing American' and many other big films were mentioned by Lasky, who said that Paramount's future plans provide for many more screen records of outstanding historical episodes.

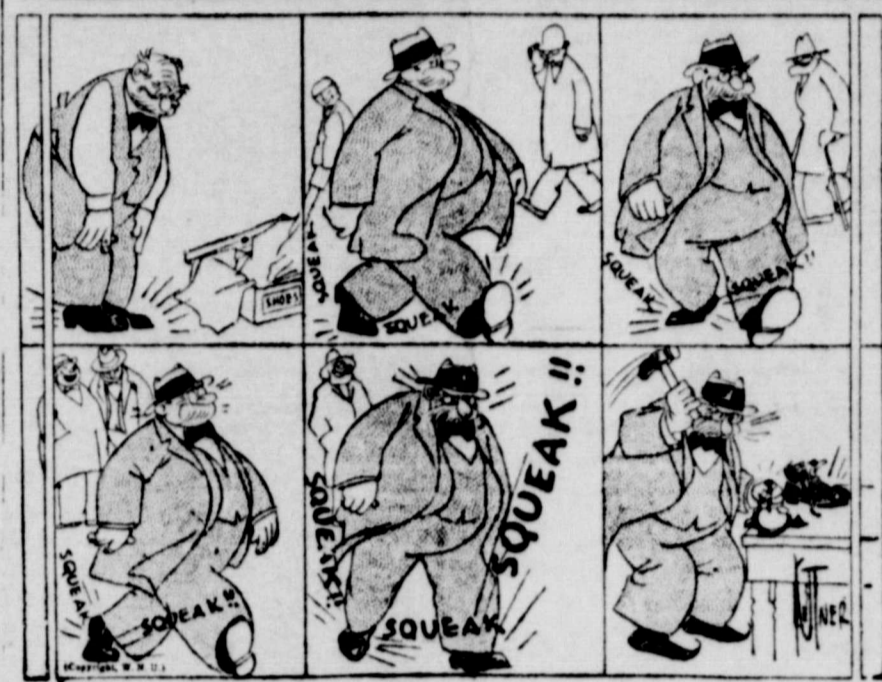

A. P. MEETING IS HELD TODAY

NEW YORK, April 20.—Members of the Associated Press from the North and South American continents met today at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel for their annual meeting and luncheon, with 100 journalists from Latin America as special guests. Secretary of State Kellogg came from Washington to be the principal speaker. Also on the program were remarks by Frank Noyes, of the Washington Star, president of the Associated Press, as toastmaster; Kent Cooper, general manager of the Associated Press; and Jorge Mitre, publisher of La Nacion, Buenos Aires.

METHODISTS TO START CHURCH

The building committee of the Methodist church will meet Monday night, April 26th, to open bids for dismantling the old church. The work of tearing down will begin immediately following the letting of the contract on that date, and as soon as the old church is razed and the material sorted and stacked according to specifications the contract for the building of the first unit of the new church will be let.

Next Sunday will be the last day for the congregation to hold worship in the old building. Arrangements have been made for the use of the skating rink, and all furniture will be moved there and services held in the rink building until the first unit of the new church is completed.

All specifications for dismantling the old building are in the hands of W. A. Francis, chairman of the building committee, and anyone wishing to bid on the work can get same from him.

The skating rink will be seated and Sunday school space allotted to each department and the work of the church can be handled very nicely there during the summer months. The committee expects the new unit to be completed in about four months, which will put the congregation in their new home before cold weather commences.

LABOR MEETING AT HOUSTON

HOUSTON, April 20.—Herman Kerchel, of Dallas, president of the Texas State Federation of Labor, who is here attending the federation's annual convention predicts that the time will come when there will be no strikes and when employees and employers will dwell in perfect harmony, and further declares that that time is near at hand.

Within the year, Kerchel said, there had not been a single labor dispute of any consequence in this state. "We have almost reached a condition of no strikes in Texas," the labor chief said.

DRYS PRAISE VOLSTEAD ACT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 20.—The drys continued their roll call of churches today before the Senate prohibition committee and witnesses responded with a swelling chorus of praise for the Volstead Act.

With Williams McDowell, one of the ranking bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church, taking the lead, the churchmen declared that the conditions had improved under the dry regime.

The law was defended by several witnesses on the charge that it had corrupted the youth of the land. Dr. Daniel Polin, head of the United Christian Endeavor, said that the "hip-flasked" younger generation was not so numerous in the country as had been reported.

One auto salesman stated Tuesday morning that he had averaged selling one six-cylinder car a day for the past six days. Hard times evidently have not hit Ballinger yet and with the present outlook for a good crop year and another just harvested the wolf can be driven from the door for a while yet.

West Texas towns all seem to have their eyes on Sul Ross College in case the institution is moved. When asked in regard to cold checks, one Ballinger banker declared his bank handled on the average about 300 a month. Of that number a major portion are not really what can be called "cold" checks, but are just the result of carelessness. The majority of the depositors do not keep up with their bank accounts and are frequently overdrawn before they realize it. In a nearby city one bank handles on the average 1,000 cold checks per month, and for the month of March handled over 1,200 representing over \$38,000.

CHILDRESS—This city will soon have an up-to-date fireproof modern hotel if present plans do not fail to go through. Present crop outlook for the year is reported to be the best in many years.

WELLINGTON—The recent poultry show held here proves the fact that poultry business is worth while as there were hundreds of fine show birds in competition for prizes as well as many entries for the prizes for eggs were in competition.

SAN SABA—A large lobo wolf was trapped in San Saba county recently and ranchmen are very much relieved as much young livestock has been destroyed by this animal.

DEL RIO—Much complaint has been received lately from ranchmen who have had many of their goats sheared with hand clippers by thieves who make the rounds by night thru the pastures, catching the goats and clipping the mohair.

MINERAL WELLS—Much interest is now being shown here and the old time bustle of business is rapidly returning since the location of the Baker Hotel which will be under construction soon at a cost of \$500,000.

DALHART—This part of the Plains is now assured of one of the best small grain crops in many years. The late rains and heavy snows have brought out the wheat and oat fields to their fullest capacity for production and

M., Apr. 20.—Brothers of the Franciscan order of the Roman Catholic church in the Southwest are preserving the traditions of their organization, which arose from the martyrdom of priests who spent centuries in the conversion of the Pueblo Indians from their pagan beliefs to Christianity.

Much research work is being done by scholars to bring to light the facts of the spiritual conquest of the Pueblos, which which they believe to be one of the most colorful pages in the history of the Americas.

Father Theodocius Meyer, after considerable study in the archives of the mission of Santa Barbara, California, has compiled a list of fifty-one members of the order who gave their lives in the period from 1542 to 1696. The result of this research contrasts the religious brothers with the proud conquistador, the one for the prize of mystical gold and gems, the other for the prize of human souls.

The history of the Christianization of the Indians showed that there were waves of persecution of the priests at intervals of forty or fifty years throughout nearly two centuries. They reached their climax in 1680, when the Pueblo Indians rose in rebellion against the tyranny of the Spanish rule, and killed nearly every white man in New Mexico. By a pre-arranged plot, thirty-one missionaries in a score of Pueblos, many of them 100 or more miles apart, were killed one day.

Five of the religious brothers were killed in another massacre in a lesser uprising on June 4, 1696. The first of the priests to lose his life at the hands of the Pueblo Indians, was Fr. Juan de Padilla, who was killed at Gran Quivera on November 20, 1542.

In the same year two other priests were killed, one at Tiguex and the other at Pecos.

The three padres had remained behind among the savages after the first of the conquistadores had despaired of finding the mythical wealth of the Indians, and had returned to Mexico. The Gran Quivera, where the first one died, was reputed at that time to be a large Indian city where great wealth was to be found, and there was also some talk that there was the Famed Fountain of Youth.

The Spaniards had heard such stories from their Indian guides, and when they found the village to be only a small settlement on top of a barren mesa, they turned back tired and discouraged. Even to this day, however, the mesa where the ancient pueblo stood is honeycombed by holes of treasure seekers, who still have faith in the old legends of hidden wealth.

By odd coincidence, the three villages which were the scenes of the first martyrdoms were all abandoned in later years, while most of the other pueblos which existed at that time are still inhabited by the Indians.

During the century and a quarter that followed the first shed-

ding of the blood of the missionaries, there were only ten deaths.

PRODUCE SHIPPERS GAIN BY NEW RATE DECISION

(San Angelo Standard)

The Railroad Commission of Texas will not recommend an increased rate on poultry and poultry products as sought by the railroads, and it will mean a saving of upwards of \$5,000 a year to the San Angelo section alone on egg shipments. This was reported here Monday by R. A. Kimberling of the Concho Poultry and Egg Company. Mr. Kimberling was at Austin at a hearing before the commission most of last week, and the def-

inite action of the commission was communicated to him here in a letter.

The railroads had asked an increase to \$1.26 from the present 69 cent rate here. On a carload of eggs from San Angelo that would have meant an increase of \$120.84 on each car of eggs shipped from here. Mr. Kimberling estimated his carload shipments of eggs yearly at between thirty and forty cars, thus indicating a sizeable saving in retaining the present rate.

The railroad commission decided that an increase in rates would be detrimental to the poultry industry, which it considers in its infancy. It further held that the railroads were getting a fair rate at present schedules.

Represented at the hearing last week were the car lot shippers of Texas as well as rate men from cities that would have been most vitally effected in a change.

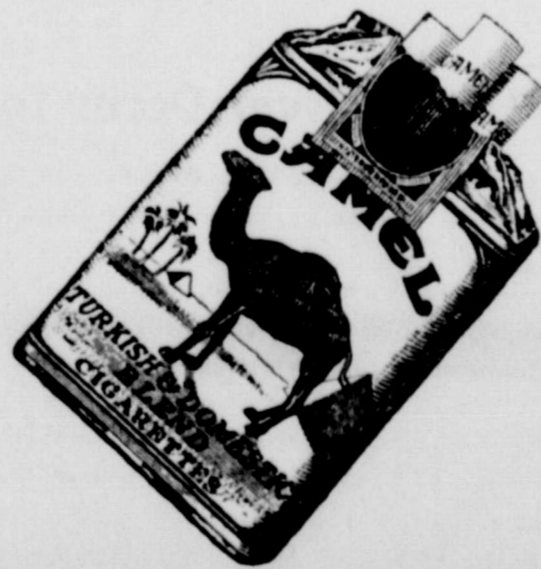

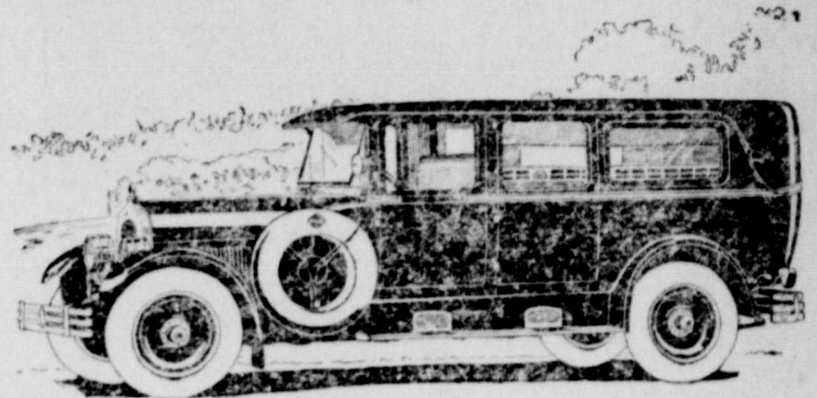

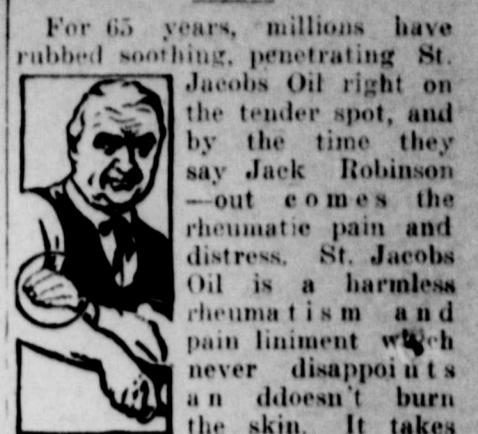
