NEW YORK, May 27.—Earl Carrol was found guilty today of perjury in connection with a grand jury investigation of the "bath tub" party in his theatre at which Joyce Hawley, nude show girl, served drinks from a bath tub.

NINE PRISONERS IN COUNTY JAIL TODAY

At the present there are nine roomers and boarders in Sheriff Earl McWilliams' "board in g house" on the court house square, it was learned this morning. Six of these boarders are white men, two are negroes, and one is a Mexican.

One of the boarders is a protege of Sheriff Bob Miller, of Concho county, who is using the Runnels county jail for his prisoners. "We can not get below nine," Sheriff McWilliams said Thursday morning. "We have tried awfully hard, but as soon as we release one another turns up for a room."

ONION CROP BEST EVER RAISED HERE

H. C. Brunson was exhibiting three onions in the city Thursday and the three weighed about five pounds. Mr. Brunson said that the onions were produced without irrigation, being raised on dry land. He put out the sets last fall and paid no attention to the crop until the big white onions were fully matured and ready for use.

Others who planted out onion sets last fall have met with splendid success, and the experiment has demonstrated that this is an ideal country to raise onions in under normal conditions.

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams has about \$1,200 worth of forbidden liquor in a cell on the third floor of the county jail here, which he has confiscated since he went into office about eighteen months ago.

Sheriff McWilliams and his deputies in that time have rounded up several stills and captured several bootleggers, and almost every time they made a raid they confiscated several gallons of moonshine whiskey. Most of this fire-water is now safely domiciled on the third floor of the jail.

There are about 60 or 70 gallon fruit jars of the corn whiskey, and each jar is very clear, there being no trash or other sediment as in most moonshine liquor. There are several five or six gallon demijohns full of "corn" and several kegs of whiskey in this cell. All the stuff is very neatly sealed for safe keeping.

The sheriff also has several cases of beer that he has taken in raids made this summer since the beer making season opened. He has two or three coppers, several cases of beer in regular beer bottles; beer in half-gallon and quart jars, neatly sealed and also in grape juice, ginger ale, vinegar and several other kinds of bottles.

In his office at the court house, Sheriff McWilliams keeps the stills he has taken since he became sheriff. He has all sizes, and when he confiscated them they were equipped with everything that goes to make a first class still.

Sheriff McWilliams will hold this whiskey until he has orders from the court, Judge J.O. Woodward, of the 35th Judicial District, to pour it out.

H. W. LYNN HEADS TEXAS SEED CRUSHERS

A story under a San Antonio dateline, accompanied by his picture, was carried in the state daily papers of Thursday reporting the election of H. W. Lynn, of Winters, as president of the Texas Cotton Seed Crushers Association. Mr. Lynn was selected to head the seed crushers at the annual convention held at San Antonio this week.

BROWNWOOD, May 27.—The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Zim Barry, both aged 35 years, were found in the barn at the home of Mr. Barry's father, E. S. Barry, near Proctor, Comanche county, last night.

The coroner's verdict was that Barry shot and killed his wife and then fatally wounded himself. They had been married but three months. No motive for the tragedy is known.

PANHANDLE, May 27.—A short time after they had agreed to separate and had gone to their tent home near the railroad station here to divide their belongings, last night, Porter Davis, a truck driver, age 31 years, and his wife were dead.

According to the coroner's verdict, Davis shot his wife and then killed himself. Three children survive.

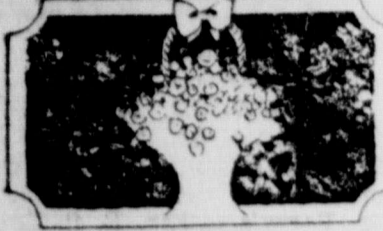

50,000 CHICKENS SINCE JAN. 4TH

Since January 4th, this year, the Currie Mercantile Company, Seventh Street, has hatched about 50,000 baby chicks for farmers and poultry raisers in Runnels and Concho counties, it was learned this morning on inquiry at the establishment.

Every three weeks since January 4th 10,368 eggs have been placed in the mammoth electric incubator for setting.

It is estimated that more than 65,000 eggs have been placed in the incubator since it was started in operation on Jan. 4.

At the present there are about 5,000 eggs setting, 1,000 of which were only placed in the incubator Wednesday.

"For several weeks we were booked up as far as five weeks ahead," Wix Currie, owner of the plant, stated. "We were unable to supply the demand of the chicken raisers but we are just about caught up now."

More than two-thirds of the

eggs placed in the machine for incubation brought forth fine healthy chickens. The company feels that it has had an exceptionally good year in hatching the chicks and will be back next year stronger than ever in the business.

SHERIFF RETURNS FROM UNSUCCESSFUL SHEEP HUNT

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams has returned from an extended trip into the sheep raising country of the Southwest, where he has been trying to pick up some kind of a clue to the theft of 216 head of fine sheep, valued at about \$1,600, owned by Feb McWilliams, prominent Runnels county ranchman, who missed the sheep last week when he started shearing his flock.

Sheriff McWilliams found no trace of the sheep. He visited Sonora, Junction, Menard, Eldorado, Rock Springs, Del Rio and other places in the Southwestern part of Texas in an effort to locate the sheep but no trace was found.

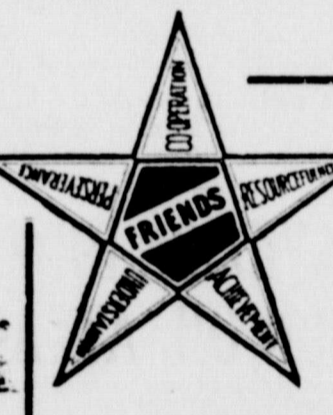

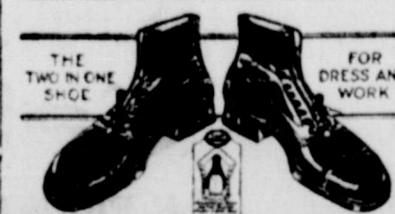
