ENCAMPMENT OF RURAL CLUBS HERE JULY 7 TO 9

Plans are being formulated by the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce and the citizens of Ballinger to have as their guests here on July 7, 8 and 9, the Runnels County Boys' and Girls' Rural Clubs at an encampment to be held in Fair Park and the tourist park, it was announced Tuesday morning by J. D. Motley, secretary of the organization.

"Plans are being made for this event," Mr. Motley said, "and within the next few days we expect to have a completed program for the three-day encampment."

All members of boys' and girls' clubs in Tom Green, Taylor and Concho counties will also be invited to attend this encampment, Mr. Motley announced.

Parents of the club members will also be invited to come to Ballinger for the encampment and everything in the city will be turned over to the clubbers by the city officials. The county officials will also co-operate to make the event a success.

"This encampment will be strictly a boys and girls affair," declared Mr. Motley, "the city officials will turn their offices over to members of the clubs as selected by those in charge of the gathering, and the county officials will also give up their offices for the clubbers."

There will be plenty of entertainment and amusement for the visitors. The Ballinger Band will be on hand each evening, and there will be contests for both boys' and girls' groups, and instructions on every farm subject.

C. W. Lehmburg, county agricultural agent, will be in charge of the boys' department of the encampment, and Miss Eula Key, county home demonstration agent, will handle the activities of the girls' organizations.

The chamber of commerce will entertain the visitors during one of the three days' meet with a monster barbecue.

A complete program for this encampment will be arranged and published within the next few days.

START WORK ON BLUFF CREEK BRIDGE MONDAY

The contractors who received the contract for the Bluff Creek bridge, North of Ballinger, commenced work on construction of the bridge early Monday morning and they will rush the work to completion.

This is the bridge in a section of Runnels county North of Ballinger which being built under the supervision of the Commissioners Court with the assistance of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce. The bridge will be of much benefit to the residents of the Bluff Creek section.

(By Associated Press) EAST LAS VEGAS, New Mexico, June 15.—Carl McGee, Albuquerque editor, the storm center of New Mexico politics for the past six years, went on trial here today, charged with manslaughter, growing out of the shooting of John Lasseter, highway engineer, last August.

The shooting occurred during an altercation between McGee and former Judge Davis Leahy, a political enemy.

W.M.U. MEET IN BALLINGER TODAY

WOOL SALE IS BIG SUCCESS

Some six or eight buyers from firms of the Eastern centers are here Tuesday buying wool offered for sale by sheepmen of Runnels and Concho counties. About 175,000 pounds of spring clip from a few of the flocks of the two counties was concentrated here during the past few days and the Ballinger Wool Growers Association advertised the sale in the wool buying centers of West Texas.

Short wool is not selling very fast, R. G. Erwin, secretary of the association, said Tuesday afternoon, but the long wool is bringing from 30 cents to 30.75 cents. The highest price paid per pound for the long clip was 35.75 cents.

The sale was late starting, but at noon some 300 of the 800 bags had been sold, and at 3:00 in the afternoon Mr. Erwin stated that some 60 per cent of the holdings had been disposed.

Three sellers rejected bids on their clips.

According to the secretary the buyers are each purchasing about the same amount of the wool. No one buyer had gone much higher than the others in price.

A representative of the Mallory and Morgan steamship lines, was also present for the sale. A large number of the producers were on hand at 9:00 o'clock Tuesday morning, but only one buyer was present at that time, the others arriving a short time later.

Romance and Lovely Women Absent in Picture Collection

(By Associated Press) LONDON, June 14.—Romance and lovely woman do not figure largely among the 600 pictures in this year's Royal Academy. There are scarcely half a dozen pictures displaying the figure of a woman. Most of the pictures are portraits and landscapes, very lovely mild landscapes, many of them. Many critics are inclined to believe most of the painters of the British Academy are woman-haters and haters of color.

MRS. HALLEY'S FATHER DIES

(By Associated Press) TEMPLE, June 15.—J. L. Bailey, 78, pioneer Bell county citizen, and an extensive land owner, died at his home here last night after a brief illness. Funeral services will be held Wednesday.

Mr. Bailey was the father of Mrs. Velma B. Halley, of Ballinger, Grand Matron of the Eastern Star of Texas. Five other children also survive.

Dr. W. B. Halley left Tuesday morning for Temple in response to a message from Mrs. Halley informing him of the death of her father, J. L. Bailey, who died at his home in Temple Monday evening at 6:00 o'clock. Mrs. Halley has been at the bedside of her father for some time.

Mr. Bailey is also the grandfather of Charles Bailey, who has been living with Dr. and Mrs. Halley for the past few years. Mr. Bailey is well known in Ballinger, having visited his daughter here several times.

INDIAN ATTORNEY GENERAL HAS BIG ROLE

(By Associated Press) OKLAHOMA CITY, June 15.—Houston B. Teehee, a Cherokee Indian, now plays an important part in the government of his native state as an assistant attorney general.

As register of the United States treasurer from March 1915 to November 1919, his name appeared on all bonds and currency. Originally the family name was Tihhi, meaning "The Killer," but friends called Houston's father Teehee, and by some error it has since been carried on the Indian rolls. Teehee's father took an active part in the politics of the Cherokee nation, holding many of the high tribal offices.

Houston received his early education in a small Indian school. He later went to the Cherokee Male Seminary and Fort Worth University. For ten years he clerked in a grocery store, reading law at nights. Eventually he reached the bar. In the meantime he entered politics.

Noted Mexican Matador Sees Thrill in Politics

(By Associated Press) MEXICO, D. F., June 15.—Bull-fighting having merely whetted his appetite for excitement, Rodolfo Gaona, Mexico's mightiest matador, is preparing to get a real thrill out of life. He plans to enter politics.

Gaona, called by admirers "The Caliph of the Bull Ring," is in his field what Babe Ruth or Jack Dempsey are to baseball and boxing. After a brilliant career he retired from the ring last year with a fortune estimated at 2,000,000 pesos.

Leon, his native town in Guanajuato state, is prepared to make Gaona mayor or send him to congress, just as he pleases.

Figures previously submitted have brought the total up to almost \$600,000 spent in his behalf, and have placed as the grand total, nearly \$2,000,000 collected for the three rival tickets.

Mountain Birdmen Have Two Months of Summer

(By Associated Press) CHEYENNE, Wyo., June 14.—The air mail pilots who fly over the Rocky Mountains between Salt Lake City and Cheyenne, might just as well live in the Arctic region, as far as summer concerns them.

For only two months—July and August—are summer to the letter carrying birdmen. The other ten months they wear a thick bear-skin-lined flying suit and during a flight, keep the heating appliance, attached to the motor, going full blast. The pilots' summer clothing consists of a jumper overall suit.

In other sections the pilots don their summer flying suits and turn off their engine heaters from May to September.

Dan Asks Where the Money Went

HALLETSVILLE, Tex., June 15.—The money recovered by him from the American Road Company figured largely in Attorney General Dan Moody's recent speech here.

"Ferguson wants to know how I got back a half million dollars from Kansas City," he said. "But the people of Texas want to know why the money was taken to Kansas City in the first place."

Referring to the assertions of James E. Ferguson, that the American Road Company verdict had caused the state "a financial loss," Moody said, "shortly after the rendering of the judgment which saved the state \$600,000, Jim Ferguson asserted that the roads treated by the American Road Company would have to be resurfaced.

"How did he know that? It was in the winter time, when asphalt could not be put on roads successfully. The state maintenance engineer, a man who ought to know something about the best methods of highway maintenance, advised the commission in writing that if any sort of surfacing was to be undertaken, an asphalt treatment could not be applied as it would wear out in a short time.

"That report Ferguson and his highway commission tried to keep a secret from the people of Texas."

Cadman Sees Radio as Great Religious Force
(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, June 15.—Radio can be made a great force for righteousness in matters involving national morals and behavior if it is guided by "sound thinking, accurate information, reasonable temper and magnanimity of feeling," believes Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, president of the Federal Council of Churches.

"When employed, as it should be, with respect for other people's views, radio also can be made a powerful agency for the reconciliation of differences," he said.

"Religious people are usually right in what they affirm and wrong in what they deny. They

are strongest in their agreements and weakest in their disagreements. To emphasize the former and decrease the latter for the reconciliation of right minded men and women should always be the aim of the radio preacher. He need not sacrifice his principles in doing so."

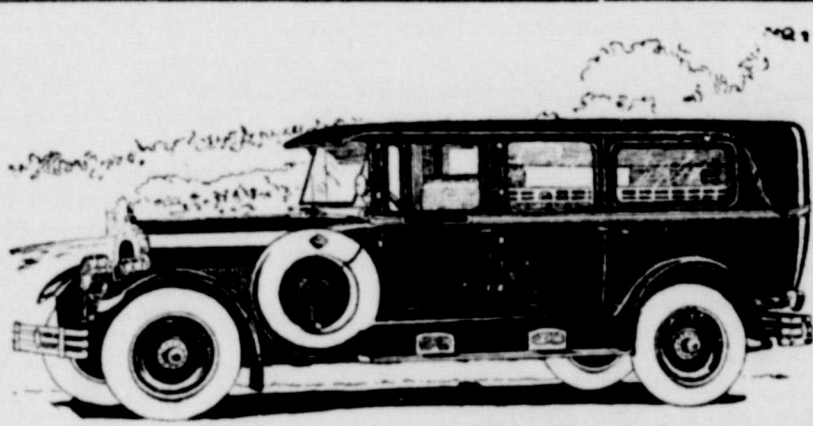

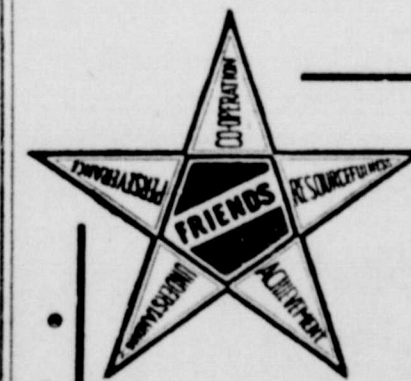

In the judgment of Odd McIntyre, writer, raconteur and world traveler, the most interesting man he ever met is Frank Shutts, of Miami, Florida. He is the sort of a fellow you might meet either at the forks of the creek or in knee breeches waiting to be presented at court. McIntyre says in the current issue of Hearst's International Cosmopolitan.

Shutts comes nearest of any man he ever knew to typifying the genuine American, says his Boss, well, because with all his great success—he is a millionaire, a publisher of a great newspaper, a distinguished lawyer and adviser and counsellor of men both great and small—he is "still just a square-footed country boy as original as the Hoosier soil from which he sprang."

Once Will Rogers, the cowboy humorist, is said to have picked Shutts out of an audience to take a bow, saying that he was "one bird who has made millions and still calls the maid the hired girl." It is related of this Hoosier-Florida product that once at a dinner, when a visiting duchess inquired as to his favorite dish, evidently expecting him to respond with the name

of some French delicacy, Shutts replied that it was Ohio River mud catfish. And after dinner, he offered the duke a rat-tailed Pittsburg story.

Yet Shutts, according to those who have known him many years, is in no wise eccentric. He has, says McIntyre, merely learned the simple but neglected art of being himself. Only America, he says, could produce such an odd, genuinely human anomaly.

"Frank Shutts' success," the writer says, "as we know it in America is a less noteworthy achievement than maintaining a proper balance when fortune smiles. In New York, one sees so much spang of the British—Mayfair manners glossing across-the-railroad-track origin. French menus disguising pot licker as bouillon de seves—and so much pseudo-intellectualism that the rolling gait of the sod buster is becoming as welcome to many of us as the sparkling spring in the desert."

George Ade recently wrote an article called "To get along, keep on being a country boy." Shutts proves Ade's point 100 per cent, McIntyre says.

Tomato "Firing" Warned Against

(By Associated Press)

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, June 15.—J. J. Tannenbaum, plant pathologist of Texas A. & M. College, has called attention of tomato growers in Texas to the danger of "firing" and the signs of its presence in the plant, which he says, must be reckoned with if growers are to profit from this crop.

Contrary to belief of some farmers that "firing" is caused by heat from the sun, Mr. Tannenbaum declared the infestation is due to a disease known as septoria leaf spot. Unfortunately, he adds, the early stages of the disease are seldom noticed, but an observant eye will find traces of the disease in round, brown, smooth spots on the foliage and sometimes on the fruit itself.

The leaf spot destroys the foliage of the plant, Mr. Tannenbaum asserts, which militates against the quality of the fruit by causing it to sour, or by permitting the sun to strike the tomato, lowers its value through an actual burn. This burn may be recognized on the tomato by a resem-

blance to papery white, dry appearing spots. These spots, under transit conditions, develop "leaks."

Fusarium wilt, another check to tomato cultivators in Texas, Mr. Tannenbaum declares, is often unwittingly kept in check by rotation of crops. Although ample moisture may be present the plant wilts and dies when attacked by a fungus present in the soil that destroys the water cells in the roots of the plant, he said. This disease can be recognized through splitting the roots or stems of the infected plant which will appear dark to brown.

Houses of Art Market Grouped as Wall Street (By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, June 11.—In a little section between two of Manhattan's most famous avenues, Fifth and Park, from Fifty-sixth to Fifty-ninth streets, is one of the art centers of the world.

There, like stock and bond brokers have gathered in the vicinity of Wall Street, antique dealers have located near the art auction houses.

Within short walking distance of each other are two of the largest art galleries auction establishments in the country—the

American and the Anderson—where many foreign and domestic collections are sold each season.

In addition to the numerous American shops in the vicinity are the branches of French, English, Spanish and Italian houses such as Cattadori, Seidletz and Van Baarn. New York's rapid progress as an art capital attracted them to this country.

There is not the hustle and confusion in this market, however. A walk through the houses is more like a visit to the museums. But the "transactions" run into millions of dollars annually.
