## NEW DIVISION AT UNIVERSITY TO HELP TEXAS

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, July 8.—Development and conservation of the natural resources of the state is the objective of the Division of Conservation and Development of the Natural Resources of Texas, recently established by the regents of the University of Texas.

Announcement of the creation of the new division was made in a catalogue recently issued. As constituted, the division is made up of the Bureau of Economic Geology, the Engineering Experiment Station, and the Industrial Chemistry Experiment Station.

"In 1901, the university established and for four years maintained the University Mineral Survey, the object of which was to aid in making known the mineral deposits of the state," the catalogue announcement said. "This organization was discontinued in 1905.

"In 1909, the regents established the Bureau of Economic Geology and Technology, with objects broader in scope, although similar in character to those of the University Mineral Survey. The staff of the bureau, which for the first two years consisted of but two men, was later enlarged by the addition of two more geologists, a testing engineer, and another chemist.

"The continued enlargement of the work resulted in the organization in 1915 of the three divisions of geology, chemistry, and engineering, and the appointment of a head for each of these departments.

"Further enlargement of the scope of work of this character by the university is provided for in the establishment of the Division of Conservation and Development of the Natural Resources of Texas, the object being to unify under this head the university's contribution to the development and conservation of the varied natural resources of the state."

## GUARD LEAVES TONIGHT AT 8:30

Forty-eight members of Company C of the 142nd Infantry, Texas National Guard, will leave Ballinger tonight on a special train for Palacios where they are to spend about two weeks in annual training with companies from other sections of Texas.

The special will be made up here of an engine, a baggage car and one passenger coach. In addition, a second unit will be picked up and in Santa Anna and Brownwood three more companies will be put on the train, and on down the line other companies will join the Ballinger unit en route to the camp.

Capt. W. C. McCarver held a meeting of the company Thursday morning at 10:00 o'clock and a second meeting was to be held in the afternoon. At noon Capt. McCarver stated that it was practically decided that the local unit would leave out on the special instead of the regular 5:20 passenger train for Temple, as has been the usual method of transporting the guard companies.

The special train will arrive at Palacios about 3:00 o'clock Friday afternoon.

First Lieutenant Ross Murchison and Second Lieutenant John L. Clark are the other commissioned officers of the company who will go to the camp.

Company C will return to Ballinger in about two weeks.

This year's camp in Palacios is the first to be held in the east city. Heretofore the annual camps have been held in Galveston and Camp Mabry, Austin, but recently Palacios was selected as the permanent annual encampment site for the Texas National Guard.

The indictment involved the release by the custodian of about \$7,000,000 in sequestered assets of the American Metal Company, representing the sale of enemy interests in the concern to alleged Swiss owners.

Daugherty pleaded not guilty to the indictment on May 20.

## WEST TEXAS GETS A GOOD RAINFALL

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, July 8.—A rain reported, for the most part, as a great benefit to truck, fruit and corn production, fell over North and West Texas yesterday and last night.

The precipitation was unusually heavy in the Panhandle, reaching the proportions of a cloudburst in the vicinity of Clarendon, where more than half a mile of the Fort Worth & Denver Railway track was washed out. Dirt roads were rendered impassable.

## DIVERS FIND TWELVE BODIES ON SUBMARINE

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, July 8.—Divers who entered the battered United States submarine S-51 today, reported there were about twelve bodies inside the vessel. One body was seen wedged behind the machinery in the engine room with the others reported to be in the torpedo room.

If the divers' estimate is correct, it means that the bodies of 13 sailors were washed from the hulk by the waves when the collision occurred.

There were 36 men in the submarine, three were saved and eight bodies were later recovered.

NEW YORK, July 8.—With seaweed and water pouring from the holes in her forward compartments, the submarine S-51 was pulled into the dry dock at the navy yard in Brooklyn today.

Navy officers, after an examination of the submarine that was raised from the ocean floor off Block Island, Rhode Island, Monday, announced that it would require six hours to pump out the water and remove the debris which had accumulated during her nine months stay under the sea.

Why not a real estate boom for Ballinger? All over the country one hears of real estate booms, first in California, then in Florida and on over to the Southwestern part of the United States, San Antonio and South to Corpus Christi and many other smaller towns in South Texas. There are many nice plots of ground in the Northern and Northwestern parts of the city that would make good building sites for homes. Ballinger should have a building boom. It is the best city of 5,000 people in Texas.

The board of trustees of the Ballinger Independent School District has had several gatherings since the new superintendent, H. C. **C. I. A. REGENTS PRESENT LARGE BUDGET TO BOARD**

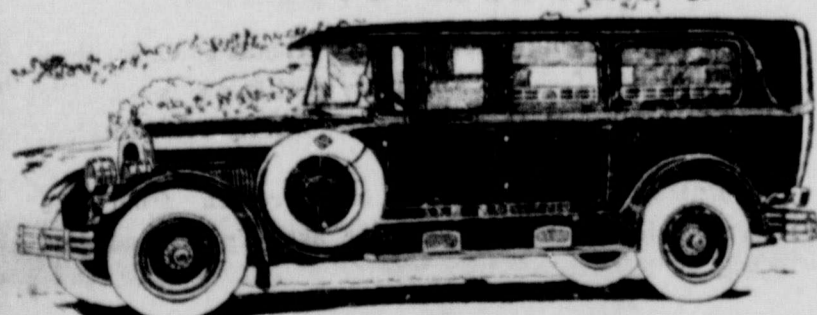
