RAIN CAUSES MUCH DAMAGE AT K. C.

(By Associated Press)
KANSAS CITY, July 9.—Thousands of dollars worth of property was damaged last night and today by the most violent rainstorm Kansas City has experienced in twelve years.

The weather bureau station figures showed 4.76 inches of rain fell within a few hours.

Considerable damage was also done in Wichita by wind and rain storms, reports here today said.

Parisian Woman Advocat Tells Women "Be Yourself"

PARIS, July 8.—Be yourself is the advice of Mlle. Juliette Veiller, Paris lawyer, to women who are trying to dress as mannish as possible.

"The essential thing is to be normal and natural," she said. "There is only one domain in which woman seems compelled to effect mannishness—that is the intellectual domain. But even if she is trying to invade the realm commonly supposed to belong to men there is no reason why she should have to wear mannish clothes."

ENCAMPMENT CLOSES TODAY

Thursday afternoon, after the boys had completed their sheep and dairy cattle judging, and after the girls had completed their model club meetings, a swim was given the visitors at the club lake by Ballinger Country Club members. A large number of the visiting boys and girls took advantage of this swim.

Thursday evening after supper, the encampment crowd and many local citizens gathered at the grandstand in Fair Park for the evening's program which was one of the most interesting ever presented at such an encampment. A. L. Ward, of the swine department of Texas A. & M. College, was one of the principal speakers. Other leaders also made short talks.

A club play was presented which was very interesting and amusing throughout. It brought out many of the true happenings of the farm life of today.

The closing work of the camp was a poultry judging contest by the boys and girls. This was one of the most interesting features of the encampment.

The encampment adjourned shortly after lunch Friday afternoon.

One hundred Japanese students will reach Pacific coast cities this season for a brief sojourn, as the first step in what its promoters expect to be an influence for mutual good-will between the two countries. The program calls for an annual interchange of students, the Americans going to the Island Kingdom to gain a clearer understanding of that country, and the Japanese coming to the United States for a like object.

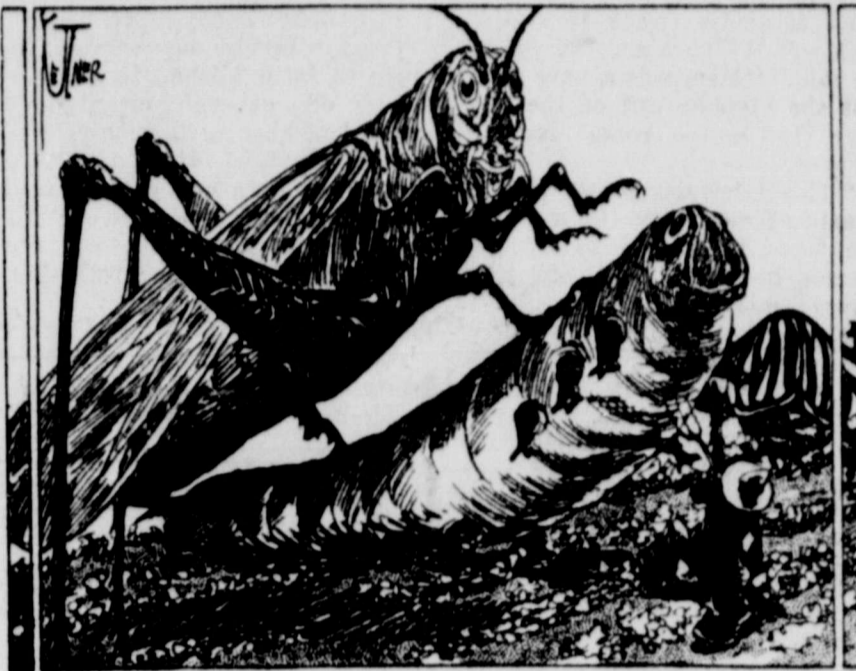

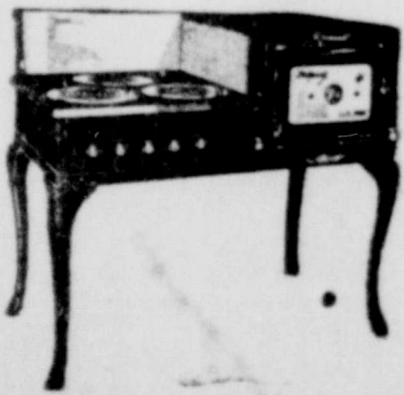

"NIGGER CAVE" WILL BE IN KENTUCKY NATIONAL PARK

(By Associated Press)

GLASGOW, Ky., July 9.

When the United States government takes over Mammoth Cave as a national park, as already provided for, there will go with it another cave hardly known to tourists, but known around here today as "Nigger Cave," because before the Civil War a run-away slave made his home in it for two years.

"Nigger Cave," one of many in this region, lies about six miles from the entrance to Mammoth Cave and its opening is on the West side of a mountain knob. Years ago the region abounded in deer and turkey and in the Sixties a hunter following a wild turkey came upon it and judging from the well beaten trail that led to it decided that some large animal made its home there.

The hunter, whose name long has been forgotten, lay in wait and about dark saw a negro man emerge from the entrance, get water from a nearby pond and pick up some brush and sticks and then return to his underground abode.

The negro, who was captured the following day, wore a quilt wrapped about his loins and had on a tattered coat, admitted he was a runaway slave on his way to Canada, but having found the cave decided to make his home there. He had built of stones a small furnace in the cave and this and a kettle and an old bucket and a pile of straw completed his housekeeping equipment.

The runaway was sold to Bob

Foster, a slave trader, who carried him to his plantation in Georgia instead of selling him again, and taking a fancy to him, gave him his freedom some years later.

Texas Stockmen to Get Educational Service

A. L. Ward, director of the new educational service which has been instituted by the Texas Cotton Seed Crushers' Association, spent part of Thursday in Ballinger attending the annual Boys' and Girls' Clubs Encampment and assisting in the judging of the dairy cattle and sheep which the boys took very much interest in on Thursday.

Mr. Ward at the present is connected with the swine department of the Extension Service of A. & M. College, but on August 1st he retires from this work to take charge of the new service which is being opened by the Texas Cotton Seed Crushers' Association. Main offices of this service will be in Dallas.

H. W. Lynn, of the Winters Oil Mill, and president of the Texas Cotton Seed Crushers' Association, recently announced that the executive committee of the association had decided to start this service for the farmers and stockmen of the Southwest, especially in Texas.

This service will include giving out of all information pertaining to the feeding and breeding of livestock in the state.

Following is a statement issued by Mr. Lynn at Winters recently as to the purposes of the organization:

"Farmers and livestock men," Lynn says, "like other business men, realize the importance of

economic production and marketing, and are studying their methods of operations more closely than ever before in the history of agriculture.

"The research divisions of the colleges and universities of the United States are studying every phase of animal production, and by their study and experiments in the laboratory, field and feed lot, have contributed vast stores of valuable, definite information that will be helpful to the livestock breeders and feeders throughout the state.

"One of the objects of this educational service of the Texas Cotton Seed Crushers is to make available to the average farmer, as well as to the larger feeders of all classes of livestock, data and information regarding the best and most successful feeding practices."

Mr. Ward, Thursday evening at the Hotel Central, in a short interview, told what he expected to do in this work in the way of assisting the farmers and livestock breeders of the state.

"Pure seed selection and proper feeding methods of cotton seed are the most interesting to the farmers and livestock men of Texas and the South," Ward declared. "The cotton seed crushers are in the business to furnish the largest supply of protein feed in the world. Farmers and livestock men are interested in the preparation of this feed as a fattening for their herds.

"The small grain crop of Texas has already proven to be one of the best ever raised and prospects are good for a large maize and corn crop. In spite of the fact that the crops in Texas this year will surpass all other years, it will nothing like fill the need of feed on the Texas farms, unless it is supplemented with protein feed.

"Protein feed is the feed of the South. It is the richest of all feeds for dairy and beef cattle.

work stock and sheep, and recent experiments show that it may be prepared successfully for hogs and poultry. A properly balanced ration of protein feed for hogs has been found to be one of the best methods for the fattening of swine and will give the hogs much weight and growth.

"The Texas Cotton Seed Crushers' Association is not going to experiment with the farmers but is going to give them proven facts that have been studied for years by the Texas A. & M. College and also other agricultural colleges of the South. Everything this new department will give out in the way of answering feeding and breeding problems will be based on facts derived from investigations and experiments from some recognized agricultural college.

"The farmers," Mr. Ward asserted, "by properly supplementing their feeds with protein feeds can save millions of dollars for themselves, yearly. Protein feed is recognized by sheepmen as being largely indispensable at times. The pea size of the cake is being used very freely by the sheepmen to fatten their herds.

"The association felt that it was necessary that this new service be established in order to assist the farmers, breeders, and

stockmen in solving their feeding and breeding problems." Mr. Ward said he would spend a lot of time on the farms and ranches advising the feeders of proper feeding methods.

Offices have already been opened in the Santa Fe building at Dallas and Mr. Ward will have several able assistants in this work.

\$85,000 VALUE OF STATE PENITENTIARY PRODUCTS

(By Associated Press) HUNTSVILLE, Tex., July 8.—Value of the annual production of the industrial department of the state penitentiary here will reach a minimum of \$85,000, Rev. A. R. Watson, prison chaplain, told the Associated Press. He has made a detailed study of all the activities of the prisoners.

The industrial department is composed of the machine shop, blacksmith shop, garage, electric plant, stove shop, tin shop, pattern shop, carpenter shop, foundry and boiler shop—all under the management of N. L. Boudreaux, master mechanic. Each shop or division of the department is housed in a separate building of concrete, brick, and corrugated iron.

On the average, 70 men are employed in the industrial department. "No prisoner is overworked, and yet every one is expected and required to do the work assigned him," Rev. Watson said. "The manager is reasonable in his requirements, and the men of his department all seem glad to co-operate with him in making the department a success."

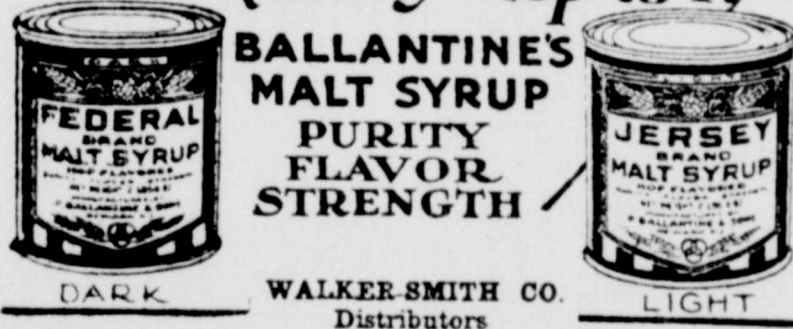
