

## STORM CHECKS HEAT; 160 DEATHS TO DATE

(By Associated Press)  
NEW YORK, July 24.—The four-day heat wave in New England and the middle Atlantic states was somewhat ameliorated Thursday by storms, but not until 160 lives had been claimed directly or indirectly by the intense heat.

Forty deaths were added to the list during the last twenty-four hours in the New England states alone. Eighteen deaths were reported from New Jersey, nine from New York city, and four from New York state.

Claud Smith, 10-year-old son of W. E. Smith of Stacy, was drowned in the Colorado River near that place Wednesday afternoon while in swimming with other members of the family. His cries for help attracted the attention of the father who went to his aid, but to no avail. He was taken from the water and rushed to Voss to meet T. D. Stayton and W. T. Moore rushing from Coleman with the J. E. Stevens Company lungmotor. Too much time had elapsed and all efforts to revive him were futile.

Funeral services will be conducted this (Thursday) afternoon at 4:30 o'clock by Rev. G. F. Mickey and interment will be made in the Brown Ranch cemetery. Deceased is survived by his father, two sisters and a younger brother.—Coleman Democrat-Voice.

## HOTEL WORK TO START AUG. 10

All bids that were handed Col. G. G. Odom, owner of the Central Hotel, for the remodeling of the hostelry, were refused for the present, it was announced Saturday.

Col. Odom received bids on July 20 for the remodeling and modernizing of the present structure and all were refused. Several contractors of San Angelo, Abilene and this section of the state made bids on the work.

The plans as were first accepted by Col. Odom have been returned to Roy E. Lane, Waco, architect on the building, for further changes, Col. Odom said Saturday, and it is expected that they will be returned to Ballinger within the near future by Mr. Lane, who visits this section of the state often. Mr. Lane has several buildings under construction in San Angelo.

Twenty-four more rooms will be added to the hotel, Col. Odom announces, and a third floor to the old two-story wing of the hotel which will be made modern throughout.

"The second and first floors of the old structure will be remodeled and made practically new," Col. Odom stated. "Modern heating and plumbing fixtures will be installed in every room of the building."

Col. Odom expects to receive further bids between now and August 10, when he expects to start work on the remodeling contract.



## FAMILY IS CREMATED WHEN HOME BURNS

MUSKOGON, Mich., July 24.—Ralph Christie, prominent business man of this city, his wife and two children, Marian, age seven years; and Charles, age twenty-one months; were burned to death today when their home here was destroyed by fire. Christie was forty-one years of age and his wife was thirty-seven.

AUSTIN, July 24.—Preliminary report for inheritance tax purposes of the estate of the late Morgan Jones, millionaire and railroad magnate of Abilene, has been received by the inheritance tax division of the comptroller's department.

The estate is valued at \$7,102,000 and the bulk of it is left to the nephews and other relatives of the testator. There also are substantial bequests made to educational institutions at Abilene.

Jones was the owner of the Abilene & Southern Railroad, which operates in the Western portion of the state. Since the death of the owner of the road several months ago there have been reports of the sale of the road to one of the big trunk lines of the state.

Before the inheritance tax is computed an investigation is to be made by William Woodall, chief of the inheritance tax division, who will check up the assets of the estate to determine the amount due the state inheritance taxes.

Woodall stated that the tax will slightly exceed \$200,000, according to present indications.

Chipps, prominent lumberman, last Saturday, has been learned, District Attorney Hanger announced today. The man, however, had not accompanied Chipps to the church, as was stated before, but he will be used as a state's witness.

Declining to reveal the man's name, Hanger explained that the man had kept silent in order to avoid publicity in the case.

He received his injury Thursday afternoon in a baseball game between the Laundry and Foundry teams of San Angelo, but was not considered in a serious condition until shortly before his death.

Young Hunter was a member of the 1925 San Angelo high school football team and was preparing to take up studies at A. & M. College in September. Friends of the youth, who were members of last year's football squad, were pallbearers.

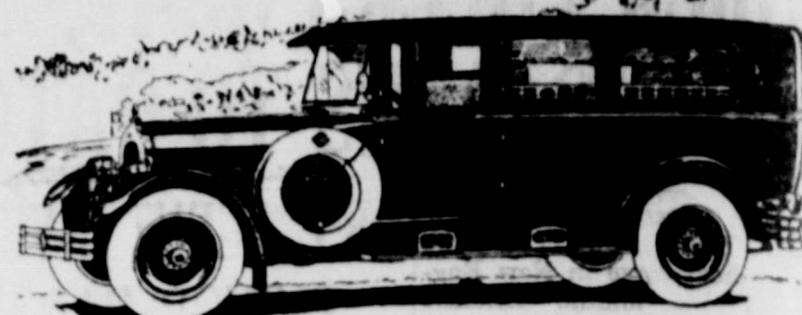

### Printing Replaces Pen on College Sheepskins

(By Associated Press) ANN ARBOR, Mich., July 21.—Printing presses have supplanted penmen in inscribing the names of graduates of the University of Michigan upon their degrees.

Seven years of experiments preceded the handing out of the first printed sheepskin to a Michigan graduate. The first problem was the ink, the usual printers ink creating a smudge, failing to absorb properly and failing to dry properly. Finally an ink prepared for printing on celluloid solved the problem. Used on the vellum, it gives a brilliant black, not to be easily distinguished from the indelible inks formerly used by the penmen.

Then it was found that not only did the margins of a sheepskin vary as much as three-quarters of an inch, but that trimming the margins until they were square bettered the situation but little. Press registration was eventually accomplished by establishing colored points on the press by which the vellum was lined up, these points showing through. The vellum was then held in place and largely protected from soiling by a "frisket."

In printing in the lettering, forty-eight point Old English is used for the name and a script similar to the body of the diploma for the date. The cost of printing is estimated to be about a fourth of that of hand lettering.
