PIONEER TEXAN SAYS WOLVES DO NOT RUN IN LARGE PACKS

(By Associated Press)

SAN ANTONIO, July 26.—Movie and other accounts of wolves running in packs are all wrong, is the assertion of W. K. Baylor, pioneer Texan and frontiersman of San Antonio, who also denies that the Texas wolf ever attacked a man. The coyote, however, will, when hungry, come into or close to human habitations and carry off anything he can find, Mr. Baylor said.

Awe-compelling scenes depicting wolves stealthily following their prey until it falls from exhaustion is also nature taking, Mr. Baylor said. In his experience on the trail he has seen single wolves following wounded deer, but never in packs.

While the Munchausen variety of wolf may howl on the trail, a coyote never does, Mr. Baylor asserted. Furthermore, he opined that the coyote is too senseless an animal to know when a person or another animal is weary.

FRENCH BATTLE OVER DAMASCUS

(By Associated Press)

DAMASCUS, July 26.—A pitched battle between French troops and Druse tribesmen for the possession of Damascus has been raging for five days.

French authorities claim a victory, while admitting in a communique that 40 of their forces have been killed and 97 wounded. Loss among the tribesmen is unknown.

AUSTIN, July 26.—A decision as to whether Governor M. A. Ferguson will resign in compliance with the terms of an election bet made with Dan Moody will be made today. This was made known today when former Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey stated that Mr. Ferguson would make a statement early Monday night on the question.

In her opening speech at Sulphur Springs, Mrs. Ferguson challenged the attorney general in a wager, declaring that she would resign if she did not defeat Moody by 25,000 votes. If Moody would resign if she beat him one vote.

Much interest is being shown in the settlement of the wager, and the Fergusons have promised to issue a statement tonight. Up to one o'clock this afternoon the governor had declined to make any statement.

DALLAS, July 26.—Dan Moody had a majority of 683 votes over the field of his opponents when the Texas Election Bureau tabulated returns from 238 counties of the 252 in the state, including complete returns from 56 counties.

The figures were: Moody, 342,738; Ferguson, 232,534; and Davidson, 101,841. All others in the race divided 7,671 votes.

USE AIRPLANES IN PEACETIME WORK

(By Associated Press)

SAN ANTONIO, July 26.—Shields have been turned into plowshares and now, army airplanes, emblematic of intention to spread death and destruction, are being used out of San Antonio to save human lives.

Ships ordinarily used for training or other routine purposes have been converted into messengers of mercy.

The army planes several times have taken anti-crotalus serum from Fort Sam Houston to distant points to treat persons bitten by rattlesnakes. This was done twice within five days recently, when Major R. E. Scott of Station Hospital flew in a Kelly Field ship to Sanderson, 240 miles West, to administer the serum to a 12-year-old boy, and when the same officer went to Eagle Pass to treat a young man. With Lieut. W. A. Pitts piloting the machine, each trip was made at the rate of a mile a minute.

Previously, other trips had been

made, but the army, under the direction of Col. Martin L. Crimmins, retired, also has sent serum by train in cases where the person's life was not in the balance, and also has treated snake-bite victims at its own hospital.

Another instance of the value of the airplane was that of last winter when a commercial ship flew from San Antonio to Winchester, in Fayette county, with a quantity of anti-toxin, needed at Winchester to avert a threatened epidemic of diphtheria. There was no landing place, but the aviator dropped the bottle, well wrapped in excelsior, and it was unbroken.

As for the snake-bite relief, the army is anxious to give aid whenever possible, but Col. Crimmins pointed out that it is not necessary to call on Fort Sam Houston. Supplies of the serum are available also at Fort Brown, Fort Ringgold, Fort McIntosh, Fort Clark, Camp Marfa, and Fort Bliss, in fact from Brownsville to El Paso, through snake-infested country. Col. Crimmins suggested that snakebite victims be taken to the nearest army post machine, each trip was made at the rate of a mile a minute.

In the latter event, the

remedy often must be sent by airplane and it subject to possibly fatal delay.

**Noises in Big City Can Be Coped Up
Just Like Hens on Farm, Says Expert**

Can a scream be socked up? Yes, and furthermore a street car's clangor can be confined to the street, and the blare of a saxophone in the apartment above can be imprisoned there, reports the National Bureau of Standards at Washington, D. C., which just has finished experiments in preventing noises of a big city from disturbing the quiet of its homes and apartments.

"Noise can be kept out of a room, just as well as a snowstorm can," reported Dr. Paul S. Heyl, chief of the Bureau's sound laboratory. "The main difference is that to keep out snow the stouter the wall the better, while to ward off noise the flimsier the wall the better."

To prove publicly that he can play traffic policeman to a speeding sound, Dr. Heyl had a partition which he promised would be "soundproof" built between two adjoining

ballrooms of the Mayflower hotel at Washington. He arranged to test it on the night that the big Charity Ball was to be in one ballroom, and at the same time a ball to members of the Diplomatic Corps in the other.

Came the first dance! A nine piece jazz orchestra struck up a spirited fox trot in the Charity Ball room. Another orchestra played a dreamy waltz in the Diplomatic Ball room. But no confusion resulted. Not a fox trot note could be heard in the room where the waltz was being danced. Nor did a single waltz note drift into the neighboring room.

"The music from both orchestras was caged in the intervening soundproof partition," Dr. Heyl explained. "The partition is made only of hair felt which is supported by thin boards of sugar cane fiber. The musical sounds became tangled and lost in this wilderness of hair and fiber."

**Unknown Village Found
in Remote Arctic Region**
(By Associated Press)

RIGA, July 26.—A hitherto unknown village in a remote interior of the Arctic zone, is reported by the Russian officer, S. Popow, in the "Russkije Wrenja."

On his wanderings through Northern Siberia, Popow stumbled on a village of 38 male and female inhabitants who had never seen a stranger before. Their village is thousands of kilometers from any human habitation and enclosed on three sides by a vast bog.

Popow, who lived among the villagers for two years, describes them as being almost primeval in their habits and instincts and as having but a vague notion that they are Russian. They speak Russian, but so profusely interspersed with old Slavic words as to be almost unrecognizable.

Pow-Wow Every brave and squaw is decorated with more paint than a modern flapper and even the horses have crimson moons on their sides and withers. Last year one who had ridden 123 miles with a squaw on her back, had a red moon as big as a silver dollar on each cheek. The parade starts in Banff village and has its finale in the courtyard of the Banff Springs Hotel where the Indians are targets for many pale-face cameras, and where they are formally reviewed by Pow-Wow officials and given prizes for excellence of costume, etc. They camp in the Elk Pasture has many picturesque scenes with flags flying in front of them—one the treaty flag given Chief Peter Wesley by Queen Victoria—and is the scene of wild pony racing, wrestling on horseback, bucking bronco exhibitions, bow-and-arrow contests in which wonderful skill is shown and many other stunts. When the Pow-Wow is over Chief Peter Wesley, whose Indian name is Mookelie, waves down the address- none flagstaff in front of his teepee with his own hands.
