MEXICO CHURCH FIGHT GROWS

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO, D. F., July 28.—The Calles government today issued orders refusing to permit priests, when they cease to function Saturday at midnight, to turn over their churches to committees of Catholic laymen.
Instead of this the government orders the churches to be placed in charge of committees to be appointed by the mayors of each town and city.
Officials investigating the reports from Aguas Calientes of the first death by violence in the religious turmoil have made no report.
Meanwhile the Catholics throughout the republic are flocking to the churches and cathedrals to worship, because Saturday all services in which priests participate will be discontinued as a protest against the Mexican government's religious policy.

Brownwood, Coleman, Stamford, Breckenridge, Cisco and many other of the towns in the district are putting out similar advertising and are endeavoring to have the largest crowd ever here for the biggest and most interesting American Legion meet of the district.
Local committees are busy planning for this convention which Legionnaires expect to be the best ever held.
R. C. Winters, of Abilene, Division Commander of the American Legion, will be endorsed here for the office of State Commander, who will be elected at the Amarillo convention in September.
Mr. Winters candidacy has been endorsed by the Travis post of Austin, and various other posts throughout the state. The 17th district will place his name before the nominating committee and it is expected that he will be one of the most active among those at the state convention in September.
M. C. Atkins of Pat Williams Post No. 8, who is in charge of the local committees which are making plans for the district convention, urges every member of the local post to be present here on Saturday and Sunday to aid the Legionnaires and members of the Auxiliary in entertaining the visitors.

STORM LOSS IN FLORIDA HEAVY

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., July 28.—The West Indian hurricane which Monday crossed from the Caribbean Sea to ravage the lower Eastern coast of Florida, today hammered at the sea gates of the upper peninsula.
The hurricane left behind distressed shipping.
Damage done by wind and wave is mounting into millions of dollars.
The fate of several ships in the path of the hurricane is still unknown.

NEW BAND UNIT FOR BALLINGER

H. H. Carsey, director of the Ballinger Band, is issuing a call for new band members between the ages of 10 and 20 years and he wants this to be a separate unit from the already organized Ballinger Chamber of Commerce Band.
Mr. Carsey in announcing the plans for an organization of a new unit for the local musical organization issued the following statement in connection with the work he has already given much of his time to in this city:
"Musical training is eminently worth while, at home, at school, through college and throughout life in broadening the sympathies and enriching the emotions. Anything worth while requires effort, application and perseverance develops character and those sterling qualities of habit that will subsequently make a successful business man.
"Modern tendencies encourage idleness, aimlessness and superficial street-slang smartness. Give the boy something worth while to do and direct his surplus energy into doing it. His every effort at self improvement will pay enormous dividends for life. Moderns include music as an essential to comprehensive education and psychologists value it for its importance in mental and physical discipline."
Mr. Carsey declares that Ballinger has plenty of youngsters who would make good musicians if given the chance to take the lessons given by the instructor here.
He also states that he needs the co-operation of the parents of the boys who are now under his direction in the band work of the city, if Ballinger is to keep a first class band in shape for public occasions.
"I want to start every boy in Ballinger between the ages of 10 and 20 who can be induced to take band work and anyone else for that matter," the director declared. "Ballinger needs every potential band boy available for music at her fall fairs and numerous other occasions that arise. The boys need the musical training. The cost is insignificant compared to the benefit derived, especially where there is full co-operation from the parents."
Ballinger at the present boasts one of the best young bands in West Texas, but unless other youngsters are started out in band work the present rating can not be held very long.

The grand jury has been investigating the killing of D. E. Chipps by Rev. Norris, and quite a number of witnesses were called before the body Tuesday.

WILL PERFECT MARKET PLANS

The poultry meeting which was scheduled for last Wednesday afternoon in Ballinger, and which was called off on account of rains, will be held Thursday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock in the court house, it was announced by the committee in charge of the organization of a county-wide poultry marketing association.
Plans have just about been completed for this organization and the county-wide meeting is to be held here Thursday afternoon for the purpose of perfecting the organization.
The committee has visited almost every section of the county and several thousand hens have been put in the pool to produce eggs for the organization.
"All poultry raisers who are interested in getting better prices for their eggs, chickens and turkeys are urged to be present at this meeting," one of the members of the organization committee stated this morning.
A large representation of poultry growers is expected at this gathering.

H. C. BRACEY, 82, KILLED BY AUTO

LARGEST VOTE IN HISTORY TEXAS

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, July 28.—The largest vote in any Texas primary or general election was cast in Saturday's primary, the Texas Election Bureau said today in announcing the count thus far tabulated.
From 249 counties, 151 of which are complete, a total of 791,456 votes have been turned in to the bureau. The next highest vote was in August 1924, when in the primary 789,027 votes were cast.
In the count tabulated up to noon today Moody only lacked 373 of having a majority over the field in the governor's race. This is a fifty per cent gain over the Tuesday tabulation, and if he maintains this gain the final tabulation will give him a safe majority.

SEEKS WAY TO OUST "MA"

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, July 28.—Ways and means of ousting Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson from the governorship were discussed today and yesterday as delegates throughout the state prepared for Saturday's county conventions.
Some of the political leaders are openly demanding the governor to quit at once according to her agreement to resign immediately if Dan Moody led her by one vote in the primary.
The latest tabulation gave Moody a lead of nearly 120,000.
Other leaders said Mrs. Ferguson could not be forced to resign. The spirit of satisfaction over the attorney general's victory has softened the views of others who expressed the belief that the victors would be content with the governors' resignation at the close of the special session of the legislature which she has called for September 13.
Representative W. A. Williamson, of San Antonio, announced that it was his intention to ask the special session of the legislature to declare the governor's office vacant.

J. J. Erwin has returned from Rule and other towns North of Ballinger, where he had been visiting relatives. "Crops are fine, both feed and cotton, and the farmers are getting plenty of rain in that section," Mr. Erwin stated.

**D. C. UNDERWOOD CAME
TO RUNNELS JULY 28, 1882**

D. C. Underwood, the news-
man, one of the oldest settlers of
Runnels county and still going
strong, came to this county 44
years ago today, he told a Ledger
reporter Wednesday morning.
"Times sure have changed,"
Mr. Underwood said, "forty-four
years ago we used to get our mail
at Old Runnels, three times a

week. That was before there
was any Ballinger. It was longer."

Mr. Underwood is one of the
oldest and most active pioneers
of this part of the state and what
he does not remember about the
early days is neither in writing
nor in the minds of anyone. He
is the chief source for early his-
tory of this section of the state.

There is a movement to revive
the old songs under their original
names instead of under new
names.

"I have been in Runnels county
44 years today," he said, "and I

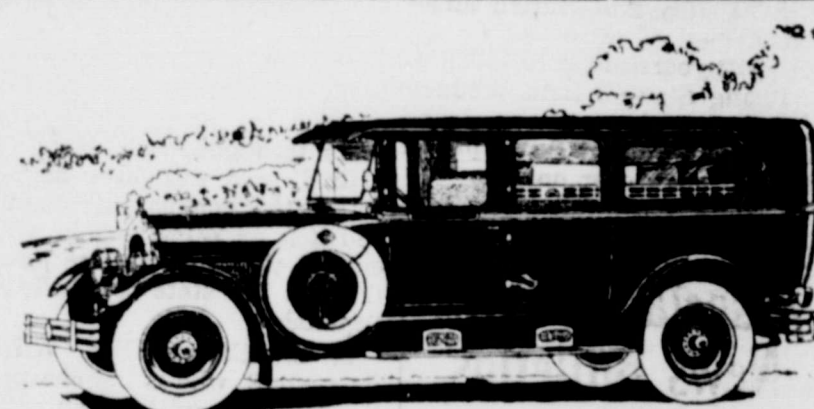

MAKES ARREST IN NEW PURCHASING MILES ROBBERY SYSTEM FOR CITY

Officers here believe the men were planning a similar stunt for San Angelo on Saturday night, but as everything did not look very favorable they continued through to Carlsbad.

Officers here received word of the arrest of the three men early Tuesday morning.

In a secret compartment under the front seat of the Ford touring car which they were driving were found punches and other tools which are used by burglars in the knob-knocking business, the officers reported.

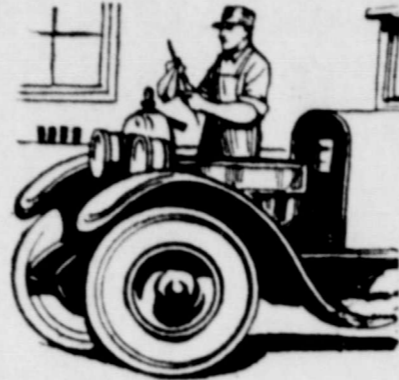

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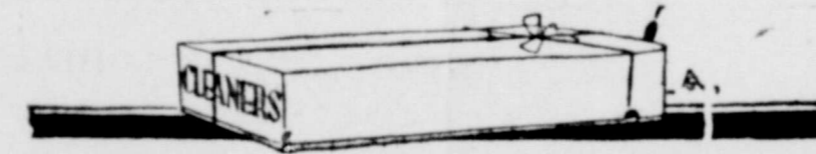
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
