2 DEAD; 13 HURT; IN BRITISH PLANE

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Aug. 19.—The number of deaths in cross-channel airplane crash near Folkeston was brought to three today with the death of the pilot.

LONDON, Aug. 19.—The British air ministry began an investigation of the crash of the French cross-channel airplane at Aldington yesterday.

An American and an Italian were killed in the crash and thirteen others, including seven Americans, were injured. The American victim was Robert Blaney, of Boston, and a graduate of Harvard University. Vigo Rizzi, Italian, was manager of London's noted Ambassadors Club.

The accident was the most serious airplane tragedy England ever experienced. The plane collided with a barn while making a forced landing in a fog. The pilot of the plane is not expected to live.

BUSY ON TESTS IN CONCHO CO.

The big oil play for the time being seems to be centered in the Southern part of Rannels county and over the line a few miles further South in Concho county.

With work pushing forward on the construction of the Fowler No. 1 derrick, under contract by the Red Bank Oil Company, and location having been made for a well on the R. W. Bruce farm three miles South, there are still four more projects under way to the South and Southeast in Concho county.

The Exploration Company has spudded in a test to send down to a depth of 2800 feet on the Hartgrove brothers ranch, seven miles below Paint Rock on the Colorado River, and reports from the well Wednesday stated that the bit was down about 100 feet.

Four miles Southeast of Paint Rock, Eugene Mayes is making a hole at a depth of about 400 feet on the Wilson Hartgrove ranch. A little South of this in the Doul community Culbertson Brothers are drilling around 500 feet, and it is reported that Kemper-Kimberlin are taking steps to push down 100 feet deeper in Shultz No. 1.

Concho and Rannels operators are racing for the first pay dirt, and while the Concho drillers have a little the lead of the Rannels county tests, the area under exploration will be within reach of Ballinger regardless of where the first well is brought in.

It is rumored that a third block is about ready to be closed for a drilling contract in the Southern part of Rannels county. Companies doing wildcatting seem to have a good opinion of this territory, as evidenced by the closing of three blocks within the last few weeks.

WRECKING HOTEL FOR NEW ANNEX

The West wing of the Central Hotel, the two-story annex which originally formed the main building of the hotel, is being razed, and work is going forward to carry out plans for remodeling the building and increasing the guest rooms. The plans call for an increase of about twenty rooms.

A third story will be added to the West wing and this section will be rebuilt throughout. Modern heating, plumbing, etc., will be installed in that portion of the building being wrecked, and the improvements will cost between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

PUEBLO, Colo., Aug. 19.—A posse of men, bloodhounds and men in airplanes continued a search today in the "man hunt" for Lester and Forrest Gonce, boy desperadoes, ages 14 and 18 years, who terrorized this section for a week. The youngsters are fugitives from the state reformatory where they were confined for crime.

After shooting their way to freedom from an attempted arrest during a filling station robbery in Kansas recently, the pair disarmed a deputy sheriff and headed West, later making raids and terrorizing resort towns.

2 MORE HELD IN HALL MURDER

(By Associated Press)
SOMERVILLE, N. J., Aug. 19.—Henry Carpenter and Willie Stevens were held for the grand jury today on charges of murdering Rev. Edward Hall and Mrs. E. Leonora Mills, Hall's choir singer, whose bodies were found in an orchard four years ago.

The two additional arrests were made following the reopening of the four-year-old mystery murder. Mrs. Hall, who knew of her husband's intimacy with the singer, is already under bond and also charged with murder in connection with the death of her husband and woman companion. Carpenter is her cousin, and Stevens is her brother. Nothing was given out to indicate how the two men had been connected with the killing.

USING TROOPS TO SUPPRESS REVOLT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, August 19.—The Nicaraguan government is mobilizing and dispatching troops "all over the country" to suppress revolutionary outbreaks. Lawrence Dennis, American charge d'affaires at Managua, advised the state department today.

All telegraph wires have been cut and railway operations have ceased, Dennis said, and the trouble has been brewing since the Chamorro faction took over the government by a military coup.

"My many friends of the movies, men, women and little children, God bless thee," said Valentino, according to statements coming from his room at the Polyclinic Hospital where for a time it was feared the noted moving picture star would not survive.

**MOVIE CARTOONS REQUIRE
LARGE PRODUCTION STAFF**

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—An
animated cartoon comedy, re-
quiring seven minutes to screen,
requires fifteen artists working
two weeks to produce.

Pat Sullivan, creator of "Felix
the Cat," said that each reel of
500 or 600 feet needs from 5,000
to 9,000 separate drawings, while
the artist's capacity must be from
100 to 200 drawings a day.

"I make the basic drawings and
outline the story, but the bulk of
the work must be done by the
fourteen other artists or ani-
mators," Sullivan said. "Every
drawing first is done in pencil on
transparent paper which is held
on a drawing board by two pegs.
A drawing completed, the artist
fits another sheet of paper on the
board and draws the next posi-
tion, changing the figure to suit
the action."

The drawings then are copied
on celluloid and the "blacks" de-

noting clothing filled in.

When the drawings are com-
pleted the picture photographed
in sequence according to a care-
fully prepared chart which shows
the exact timing. Twelve to fif-
teen days are required for the
photographing.

The detail of the drawing is
illustrated by the requirement of
forty figures to make a figure
cross the street in the picture,
with the object moving one-
fourth of an inch at each step.

**Love Scenes' Background
Must be Kept in Harmony**

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Aug. 19.—
The old-fashioned parlor with

scene, even in a picture film.

The background for a scene

PHILADELPHIA, August 19.—"Laziness" was termed the principal vice of modern high school pupils and "frankness"

their outstanding virtue in a symposium on secondary education taken among teachers from fourteen states, attending summer sessions at the University of Pennsylvania.

Ninety-five per cent of the educators noted an increasing tendency to shift too much of the burden of child training from the home to the school. Half of the teachers declared there was too much parental devotion to outside interests, such as social activities and politics.

The teachers likewise criticized their own shortcomings. Many deplore what they described as a disposition on the part of some members of their profession to view it merely as a "stepping-stone."

Of the teachers experienced in both rural and city schools, seventy-three per cent said they found rural pupils more obedient

and anxious to learn than those in the city, but only forty-five per cent expressed a preference for rural teaching.
