Down at Kerrville, where it is
said there is more hospitality and
courtesy to the square inch than
in the whole acreage of some
other towns, traffic officers find

The card is signed by the board
of city commissioners, and on the
reverse side of the card the
traffic rules are set out briefly.

visitor to Kerrville who is pre-
sented with one of these cards
goes away with a great deal
better feeling than he would if
he was leaving the cost of a fine
behind to help enrich the coffers
of some unreasonable traffic
officer.

most any little irregularity, and
then let some home "bully" run
rough shod over the public at
breakneck speed.

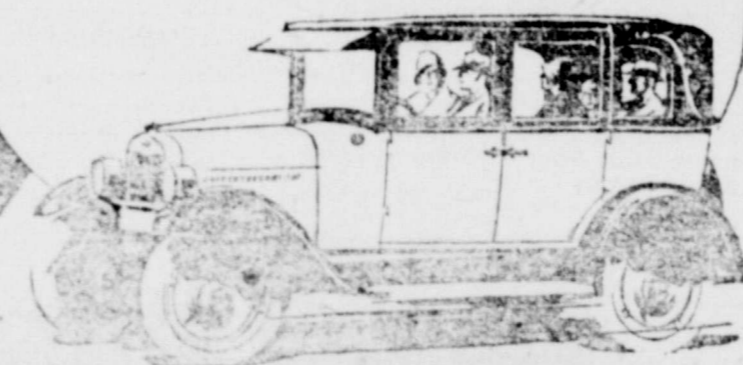

Smith failed to get a majority over Brown and former Senator Dial, the other candidate. Democratic nomination is equivalent to election in this state. John Richards and Ira Blackwood will be the candidates for the gubernatorial nomination.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 1.—Lieutenant Governor Young continued today to increase his lead over Governor Richardson in the race for the republican nomination for governor. Young's lead this forenoon was 13,011 over Richardson. Senator Shortridge, Coolidge republican, had more than doubled his advantage over Robert Clarke, his leading anti-world court opponent, in the race for the republican nomination for the United States Senate.

U. S. MAY BE COURT MEMBER

(By Associated Press)
GENEVA, Sept. 1.—Conference members of the permanent court of international justice, summoned to discuss reservations under which the United States is willing to become a member, opened today.
Prof. Van Eysinga, Dutch member of the court, was elected president of the conference.
The first reservations quickly adopted, were that the United States would have no legal relations with the League of Nations, that the United States would be permitted to participate in the election of judges, and that the United States would be authorized to contribute a fair part of the court's expense.
Opposition unexpectedly developed to that part of the fourth reservation declaring that the statutes of the court shall not be amended without the consent of the United States.
