YOUTH, 19 FACES 9 STATES HELD FORGERY CHARGE ELECTIONS TUES.

Ben Scott, age 19, is in the Runnels county jail here, facing charges of theft and forgery.

Scott was arrested Tuesday by Deputy Sheriff John White after Mr. White had received word from Deputy Sheriff Fisher, of Rowena, that Scott had tried to sell 220 pounds of seed cotton to a Rowena gin but that the owner of the gin would not buy the cotton for fear that it was stolen.

Scott came to Ballinger and sold the cotton to Edwin Day of the Day Gin, who gave him a check for \$13.20. The check was made to Granville Lattimer, which name Scott gave Mr. Day when he started to make out the check.

The youth came up town and went to Weeks Drug Store, where R. W. Earnshaw cashed the check for him. The name, Granville Lattimer, was written across the back of the check.

Scott then went to Higginbotham Bros. & Co., it is alleged, and purchased about \$8 worth of goods. At the time of his arrest he had the remainder of the check in his pocket. He is being held in jail.

According to County Attorney C. P. Shepherd, two charges were filed against Scott, one in the county court for theft and one in the justice court for forgery.

Scott's parents live in the Tenneyson community. They formerly resided in Ballinger.

HARDWARE STORE IS BURGLARIZED AT MILES

(By Associated Press) NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 15.—Returns this afternoon showed former Governor Sanders was 2,422 votes behind Senator Broussard, wet, for the Democratic Senatorial nomination in Louisiana.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—A number of contests in yesterday's primary elections held in nine states were still in doubt today, with the World Court, the Ku Klux Klan and prohibition the chief issues.

In Maryland, the race for the Senatorial nomination between Senator Welter and Representative John Phillip Hill, leader of the jets in the House, is still in doubt.

Senator Smith, Democrat, has apparently won the nomination over Edgar Brown in South Carolina.

Charles Waterman is leading Senator Means for the Colorado Republican Senatorial nomination. Former Governor Sweet is ahead of Belmont Hargraph and Senator Dale for the Democratic Senatorial nomination in this state.

Senator Jones, Republican, and Scott Bullitt, Democrat, are leading in Washington for their respective party Senatorial nominations.

Senator Dale, Republican, had no opposition in Vermont.

In Massachusetts, Senator Butler, Republican, and former Senator Walsh, Democrat, had no opposition in their party Senatorial nominations.

The race between Senator Broussard, and former Governor Sanders for the Democratic Senatorial nomination is still in doubt in Louisiana.

Elections for state officers were held in Michigan and New York.

A celebration is in order. The announcement is made that the cost of living in the United States has decreased eight-tenths of one per cent.—Rock Island Argus.

HOUSE PREPARES SAYS POLITICS WILL GET WARM WORK IN AUSTIN

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Sept. 15.—Both the Senate and House members of the 39th Legislature in called session seemed determined to get to the business of validating the \$100,000,000 worth of road district bonds affected by the United States supreme court in the Archer county case, done before taking up further business.

The Senate has under consideration 189 validation bills, one general validation bill for district bonds and other for validation of all county-wide bonds.

The House has 182 bills up for validation.

Several committees are going over the bills and some reports are expected to be made when the House meets this afternoon.

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Sept. 15.—James E. Ferguson issued a statement today saying the legislature now in special session seemed inclined to validate the road district bonds and go home, but that the partisan crowd opposed to the governor was trying to investigate her administration and opposed going back to the former administration.

Ferguson said that with the announcement of Alvin Owsley, of Dallas, as a candidate for the United States Senate against Earle B. Mayfield, "it looks as if politics will get warm in Texas soon."

ASKS STATE'S OK APPOINTMENTS WANTS SOLDIER DEAD RETURNED

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Sept. 15.—Confirmation of the appointment of Chairman Hal Mosely and John Cage, members of the State Highway Commission, today, was asked of the Senate by Governor Ferguson.

Senator Strong, chairman of the governor's nomination committee, reported favorably on all of the governor's judiciary appointments except two, Judge Moore of the 16th district, and W. W. Witcher, district attorney of the 72nd district.

AUSTIN, Sept. 15.—Governor Ferguson today re-appointed Charles Austin State Commissioner of Banking; and T. E. Hubby, Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner, for the term beginning September 1, 1926, and ending August 31, 1927.

Their names with 165 others will go to the Senate for confirmation.

WOMAN ESTABLISHES CRECHE IN HOUSTON

(By Associated Press) HOUSTON, Sept. 14.—The industrialization of South Texas has brought an ancient European institution, the creche, to Houston.

A private school and nursery is operating here where working mothers, or those who desire to play evenings, may leave their offspring in charge of a teaching staff. The maximum age limit is eleven years.

A distinct departure from the European practice is noted in the announcement of Mrs. Ida Ward, head of the school, who incorporates in her plans a method by which mothers leaving their children in her care are to have a voice in the training given.

The creche originally served a purely economic need and gave no attention to the children except as to their physical condition.

Serbia Has "Blue Grotto" BLEED, Yugoslavia, Sept. 14.—A new "Blue Grotto," similar to those of Capri and the Island of Busi in the Adriatic, recently was discovered accidentally by some gendarmes near Jrushevatz in searching for malefactors.

The grotto is thirteen feet high and thirty-three feet long and through the middle of it flows a stream filled with fish.

Holland is Draining Zuyder Zee

(By Associated Press) VOLENDAM, Holland, Sept. 14.—Holland is draining the Zuyder Zee in order to make more grazing land for the fat cattle who supply the world with Dutch cheeses.

When the feat is accomplished this town, long one of the show spots of the Netherlands, will be a herring town without a harbor. The brown sailed fishing fleet will be left high and dry and the pink cheeked Dutch girls who parade the dykes on Sundays when the fleet is in port will no longer have any reason for parading.

Other towns of the Zuyder Zee will share Volendam's fate. The villages which have always been connected with the sea must turn to agriculture or become extinct. Tourists who go to Zuyder Zee towns to see the colorful costumes and hearty fishermen must go elsewhere when the bed of the Zuyder Zee has been annexed to the fertile fields behind the dykes.

COMMISSIONERS COURT IN REGULAR SESSION

The Commissioners Court of Runnels county is in regular session this week looking after the business of the county. Bills were presented, approved, and ordered paid at the first day's meeting.

The county treasurer's report has been checked, and Wednesday the court was checking the tax assessor's rolls.

TWO KILLED BY I. & G. N. TRAIN

(By Associated Press) PALESTINE, Sept. 15.—One unidentified white man is dead and another is perhaps fatally injured as the result of being struck by an International & Great Northern freight train near Neches, Texas today.

A scrap of paper showing that the dead man had picked cotton for Jim Patton, of Jacksonville, was the only clue to his identity.

Few Red-Tressed Girls Lured by Movie Career

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Sept. 14.—Red haired femininity, whose successful world conquests are traditional in song and myth, has been routed at filmdom's first line of defense—the casting bureau.

Not only are the auburn-haired lassie's chances of passing this skirmish line considerably less than those of her darker tressed sister, but in the first place her susceptibility to becoming movie-struck seems to be of less degree.

Figures in the casting bureau tell this story, certified to by Fred Datig, casting director:

There is only one chance in 245 that a red-haired girl will become fired with ambition to be a queen of the silversheet.

Of 2460 girls listed in the casting records, only 20 have red hair. Others are listed as follows: blonde 1022, light brown 518, dark brown 421, black 479.

Bank Vault Warehouse For Valuable Crop

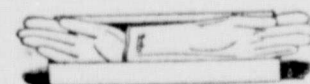

AN ORDINANCE

An Ordinance Regulating Traffic on the public streets within the corporate limits of the city of Ballinger, and giving traffic on Hutchings Avenue, 8th Street, and Broadway Street right of way over traffic emptying into said three streets, providing for all vehicles traveling upon any street to come to a stop before entering portions of said streets; providing for the parking of cars on any public street in the city of Ballinger; and fixing penalties for violation of any of the provisions thereof:

Be it Ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ballinger, Texas:

(Section 1)

Hutchings Avenue running in a Northeasterly and Southwesterly direction through the city of Ballinger in Runnels County, Texas, and that portion of same from the North or East line of Sixth Street, to the South or West line of Thirteenth Street, including the intersection of said Hutchings Avenue with said Sixth and Thirteenth Streets is hereby declared to be a right of way street, and all traffic upon said Hutchings Avenue within the area above

designated is hereby declared to have and is given right of way over all traffic moving into said Hutchings Avenue from any other street, alley or by-way.

(Section 2)

Eighth Street running through said city of Ballinger in a Northwesterly and Southeasterly direction and at right angles to said Hutchings Avenue and that portion of said street lying between the East or South line of Sealey Avenue and the North or West line of Broad Street, is hereby declared to be a right of way street except at the intersection of said street with Hutchings Avenue, at which intersection traffic on said Hutchings Avenue has the right of way over traffic on said Eighth Street, and at all other points save and except said intersection with said Hutchings Avenue, the traffic on Eighth Street as aforesaid, within said limits, shall have the right of way over all traffic entering into said Eighth Street from any other street alley or by-way.

(Section 3)

Broadway Street running through said city of Ballinger in a Northwesterly and Southeasterly direction and at right angles to said Hutchings Avenue, and that portion of said street lying between the East or South line of Sealey Avenue and the North or West line of Broad Street, is hereby declared to be a right of way street, except at the intersection of said street with Hutchings Avenue, at which intersection traffic on said Hutchings Avenue has the right of way over traffic on said Broadway Street, and at all other points save and except said intersection with said Hutchings Avenue, the traffic on Broadway Street as aforesaid, within said limits, shall have the right of way over all traffic entering into said Broadway Street from any other street, alley or by-way.

(Section 4)

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person in charge of or operating a motor driven vehicle to drive or propel same or cause same to be driven or propelled on to the said Hutchings Avenue within that portion and area of same above designated, from any other street, alley, or by-way, without bringing such motor driven vehicle so operated or driven by such person or in his or her charge, to a full stop within ten feet before so entering upon the boundary line of said Hutchings Avenue.

(Section 5)

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person in charge of or operating a motor driven vehicle to drive or propel same or cause same to be driven or propelled on to said Eighth Street or Broadway Street from any other street, alley or by-way, within that portion or area of same above designated, with the exception of Hutchings Avenue, which has right of way over all streets as above provided, without bringing such motor driven vehicle so operated or driven by such person or in his or her charge, to a full stop, within ten feet before so entering upon the boundary line of said Eighth Street and Broadway Street.

(Section 6)

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person driving or operating a motor driven vehicle or in charge of same, to drive upon the intersection of Hutchings Avenue with Eighth Street, Seventh Street, and Broadway Street at a

greater rate of speed than ten miles per hour, and which said rate of speed shall not be exceeded while such motor driven vehicle is upon either of said three street intersections, and any such driver, operator, or person in charge of any such motor driven vehicle while crossing the intersection of Hutchings Avenue with said three streets, and all other streets shall have due regard for the traffic rights of other persons who may be attempting to cross said Hutchings Avenue at right angles with any such vehicle on Hutchings Avenue, and shall use reasonable diligence and caution to avert any collision with any other vehicle or person at said street intersections.

(Section 7)

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person driving or operating a motor driven vehicle upon any public street within the corporate limits of the city of Ballinger, Texas, to park said motor driven vehicles in any other manner than at an angle of forty-five degrees with the sidewalk or curb on any public street, and with the right front wheel of any such vehicle within twelve inches of such sidewalk or curb.

(Section 8)

Any person or persons riding in any such motor driven vehicles and exercising authority over the action and movements of the actual driver or operator of such vehicle, such person or persons being the owner or owners of such vehicles or legally entitled to the use and possession thereof, shall be equally liable and subject to the penalties of the law for violation of this Ordinance, as is the actual driver or operator of such car.

(Section 9)

If any part or portion of this Ordinance is held to be unconstitutional, the invalidity of any such part or portion of same shall not affect the validity of the re-

maining part or portions thereof.

(Section 10)

Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than one nor more than Two Hundred Dollars.

(Section 11)

All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

(Section 12)

The fact that practically all of the traveling public are now using automobiles and the streets of this city are now constantly thronged with motor driven vehicles and the use of same without proper regulation is a constant menace to the public safety and to property rights, and to the life and well being of the inhabitants of this city, creates an urgent public necessity for the immediate passage of this Ordinance, and all rules requiring reading more than one time are hereby expressly suspended, and this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force upon and after its first reading, passage, approval and publication.

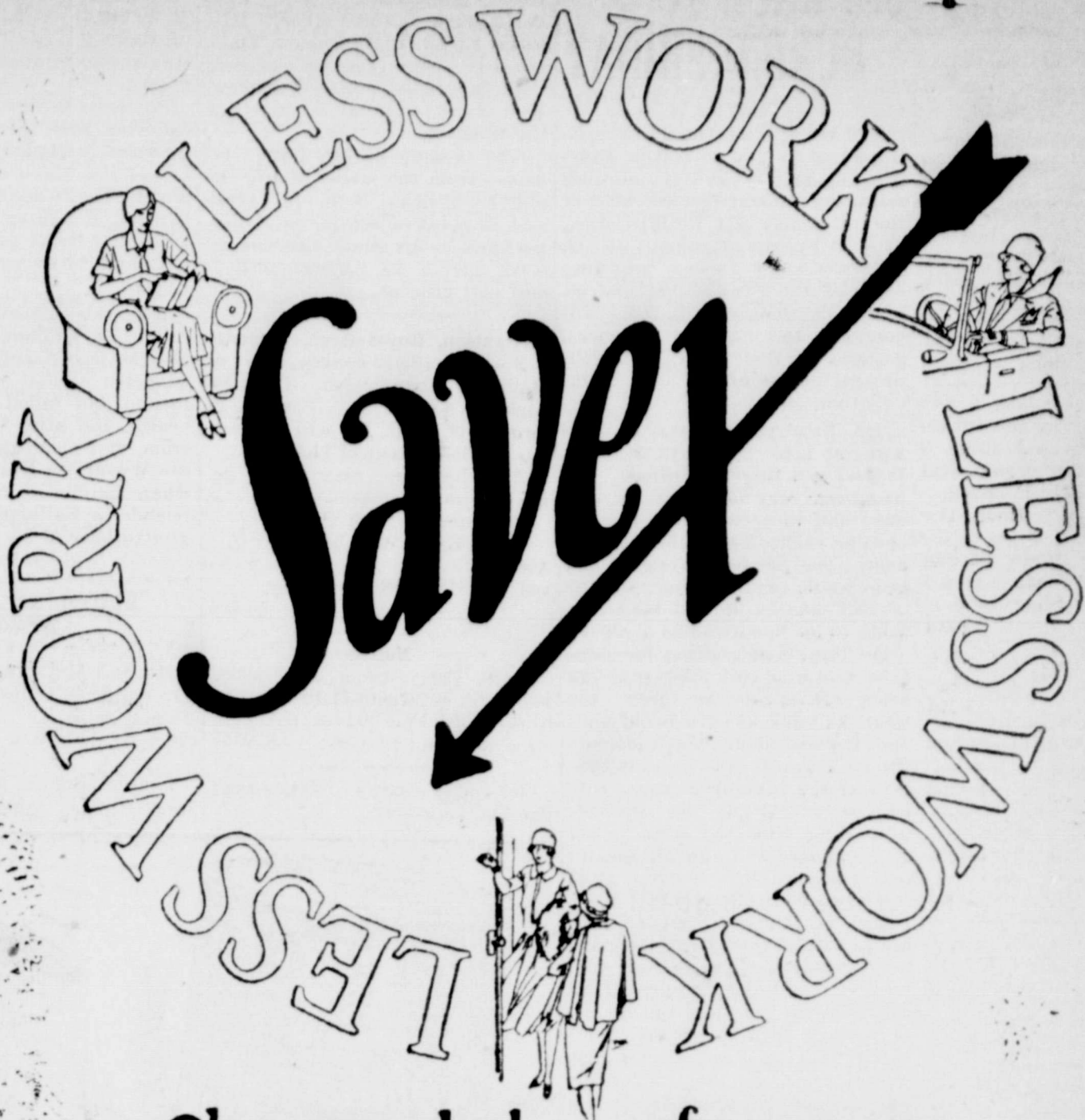

DR. RAPE TO BE BURIED FRIDAY

The remains of Dr. Thomas A. Rape will be laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery Friday morning following funeral services held at the residence, 804 Phillips Ave., at 9:30 Friday morning. Dr. O. F. Sensabaugh, former presiding elder of the Brownwood district of the Methodist Church, will conduct the funeral services, assisted by Rev. S. L. Culwell, present pastor of the local Methodist church.

Dr. Rape passed away at his home at 7:45 Tuesday evening, following a lingering illness. He had been very low for several days and those watching by his bedside realized that the end was near. The pioneer physician had been feeble for some time, and for several months he had been confined to his home and to his bed.

Dr. Rape had realized for some time that the end was drawing near, and before he grew too weak he advised with loved ones and friends about arrangements for his funeral. His request concerning the funeral arrangements will be carried out, the services to be held from the front porch of his home, and the Masons to take charge of the remains after the services at the residence.

Born in Tallapoosa county, Alabama, July 7, 1849, Dr. Rape came to Texas when a young man, and located in Runnels county, then the Western frontier of Texas, more than forty years ago. He was 77 years, 2 months and 7 days of age, and more than half of his life was spent in this country. He was an old time doctor of early days in this country, traveling by horseback in calling on his patients when ranch houses were few and far between in this country, and when the only roads were cow trails. Dr. Rape practiced medicine in Old Runnels in 1884-85 and 86 before Ballinger was surveyed out and before the Santa Fe secured right-of-way to build its line West from Temple. He located in the frontier town in July 1884. The night was never too dark, the weather too cold, or the distance too great when Dr. Rape received a call to go to some ranch house, or cow camp and administer to the suffering of early settlers of this country.

When the time came for moving the town from Old Runnels, five miles North of the city of Ballinger, to the new county site, Dr. Rape was among the first to come. He transferred his office from Runnels to Ballinger and continued his practice up to the time his health failed him.

Dr. Rape was a charter member of the Methodist church of this city, and a lay-preacher, often filling the pulpit in the absence of the pastor, and those who knew him best throughout his long life of usefulness are familiar with the consistent and conscientious life he lived among his fellowmen. He was also a member of the local Masonic lodge, transferring his membership here from the Runnels lodge.

Surviving Dr. Rape is his second wife, a brother, Rev. J. J. Rape of Weatherford, two nieces and a nephew who made their home with him when they were children. His brother will be here

for the funeral. One of the nieces, Mrs. Maude Avent, lives in California; the other, Mrs. Katie Bigby, of Cleveland, Ohio, recently spent three weeks here with her uncle; and the nephew, Tom Rape, will not be here for the funeral.

The passing of Dr. Rape removes from the walks of life the oldest physician both in years and in point of service in Ballinger, and in his death this county loses one of its earliest settlers and best citizens.

He had many friends in Ballinger who will regret to hear of his death.

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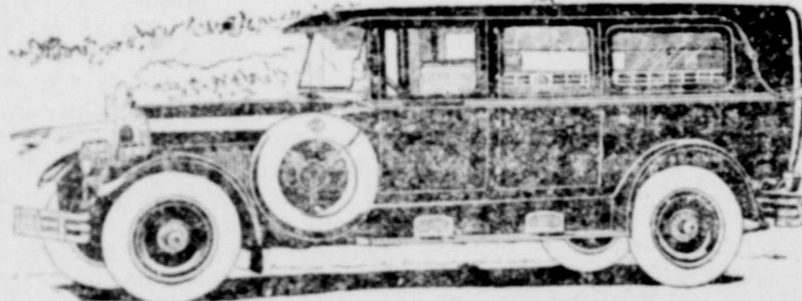
