SNOW STORM AND ZERO WEATHER GRIPS NORTH

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Sept. 24.—Snow and frost that nipped fields of un-ripened corn in Minnesota, rain from two to four inches in Central Illinois, a tornado in Northern Ohio, real winter temperatures in Montana, North and South Dakota, Wyoming and the Pacific Northwest added today to the September weather vagaries.

Coming out of a summer climate into that of real winter in the brief space of a few hours has caught the vast domain in the states named in the grip of an early freeze, and will result in considerable damage.

At Helena, Montana, the temperature dropped to six degrees above zero and the whole Northern Rocky Mountain region is suffering under temperatures lower than ever recorded at this season of the year.

In Ohio the loss is counted at more than \$100,000 in the counties of Erie and Sandusky as the result of a tornado which swept through that section.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 24.—Near freezing temperatures, accompanied by snow which swept here yesterday prevailed again today.

Snow has reached a depth of six inches in places in Minnesota, North and South Dakota, according to reports received here from the storm-swept area.

This blizzard is the first cold spell of the season.

MOODY LEADS IN NAMING PROBE

DISEASE FEARED IN STORM AREA

(By Associated Press)
MIAMI, Fla., Sept. 24.—The hurricane stricken lower East coast of Florida today bent its strongest efforts to the prevention of disease and the removal of homeless refugees to cities Northward for shelter and care.

Additional surveys of the sixty-mile coastal area between West Palm Beach and Lake Okechobee, where the hurricane spent its fury showed 349 known dead and 1,100 injured, with a property loss of approximately \$165,000,000.

TRYING TO MERGE SEVERAL ROADS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—Permission to consolidate into its New Orleans system several Texas and Louisiana railroads, already owned by the Southern Pacific Railroad, was sought today from the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Abolition of separate corporate organizations of the Southern Pacific, the application said, would allow economy in operation and no change in ownership would result.

COURT TO RULE IN LEAHY TRIAL

GEORGE WEST, Tex., Sept. 24.—Taking testimony on the motion of Harry Leahy for a change of venue continued today. Judge Cox had heard a number of witnesses regarding conditions for a fair trial here for Leahy, and he is expected to rule on the motion for a change of venue this afternoon.

Leahy is charged with the murder of Dr. J. A. Ramsey, of Mathis, Texas, and when the case was called for trial he filed a motion asking for a change of venue.

TUNNEY WINS ON JUDGES' VERDICT

(By Associated Press)
PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 24.—Tex Rickard, who promoted the Dempsey-Tunney fight, said today that he might promote a return title match between Gene Tunney and Jack Dempsey. Jack has asked for a match, challenging Tunney to give him an opportunity to recover the belt.

Rickard declared that the fight may be put on next spring.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 24.—The heavyweight title in the prize fight ring passed last night from Jack Dempsey to Gene Tunney on judges' decision. It was the first time a champion has been forced to give up the belt on a points decision in nearly forty years of glove fighting. Every other champion since the days of John L. Sullivan's reign has passed from the throne by way of a knockout. Dempsey remained in the ring and on his feet for the full ten rounds last night, but his challenger Tunney won nine of the ten rounds and the big Jack Dempsey lost on the decision of the judges. The seventh round went to a draw, neither man winning this frame.

The fight was staged before a crowd of 132,000, and while Dempsey and Tunney were pounding each other rain which began to fall a few minutes after they entered the ring was increased to a heavy downpour.

Tunney was the favorite with the fans and received the big hand when he walked into the stadium.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—Thousands of radio fans of Great Britain heard the description of the Dempsey-Tunney fight broadcast from the ringside in Philadelphia.

The broadcasting was said to have been beyond expectations.

TWO INJURED IN BLAZE AT DALLAS

DALLAS, Sept. 24.—Two firemen were slightly injured and damage estimated at about \$75,000 was caused by fire here today. The first started in two hosiery shops and spread rapidly to the A. Harris department store in the downtown section.

SAYS GOVERNMENT REPORT IS BEST FOR THE FARMERS

A drop of \$4 and \$5 per bale in cotton following the issuing of the government report caused

some to criticize the government and question the policy of the agricultural department in compiling condition reports, ginning reports, and publishing of same. Some contend that such reports are detrimental to the interest of the farmer while others hold that the reports are for the protection of the farmer.

In commenting on the proposition Friday a prominent local cotton buyer stated that if it was not for the government reports that reports made up by private interests would be manipulated in the interests of the speculator and against the interests of the farmers. He holds that if any kind of reports are compiled they should be compiled by the government, and on the most reliable basis possible.

Cotton is selling lower at present than at any time since the World War, and \$55 per bale less than on the same date a year ago. At the same time farmers are paying more to get their cotton picked than was paid last fall, and if anything else except cotton has shown such sharp de-

clines on the market it has not been reported here.
