## O'ROURKE DENIES "DRUNK" STORY

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Oct. 27.—Surprising the House investigating committee by appearing voluntarily, Frank O'Rourke, secretary of the State Prison Commission, today denied before the committee the accepting of any money for procuring pardons for the convicts in saying that what he did was to help the prisoners at their request to get in connection with attorneys.

As to the electrocution of S. A. and Forrest Robertson, Dallas negroes, O'Rourke countered the testimony of Commissioner Walter Sayles, chairman of the prison commission; Warden N. L. Speer, and Chaplain A. R. Watson, saying that the spectators were not drunk but excited.

O'Rourke denied that he told J. B. McAfee, of the Ramsey prison farm, to see if the boys could get together some money, that the daughter of Governor Ferguson was going to visit the system with a man on pardon matters.

## MRS. BAILEY IS DEAD IN DALLAS

DALLAS, Oct. 27.—Funeral arrangements for Mrs. Ellen Murray Bailey, wife of Joseph Weldon Bailey, former United States senator, awaited word from her son, Weldon Bailey, of Tucson, Arizona.

Mrs. Bailey died at the family home last night after a lingering illness.

Another son, Joseph Weldon Bailey Jr., of Dallas, and her husband were at the bedside when the end came.

## COURT DENIES PONZI WRIT

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Oct. 27.—Charles Ponzi, Boston financial wizard, today was denied a writ of habeas corpus by the Court of Criminal Appeals and was remanded to the custody of Massachusetts authorities.

Ponzi, from his cell in the county jail at Houston, has been fighting extradition for four months. Two hearings were held before Governor Ferguson before she honored the requisition of the governor of Massachusetts for Ponzi to return to serve from seven to nine years for being a "common and notorious thief" in connection with his financial schemes that were operated in Boston six years ago.

HOUSTON, Oct. 27.—A motion for a rehearing before the Court of Criminal Appeals in the Chas. Ponzi case will be filed within fifteen days, according to Henry Kahn, one of Ponzi's attorneys.

## ASKS PERMIT TO EXTEND RAILWAY

## COMMITTEE TO SELL \$3,000 WORTH STOCK

### INCREASE TO AID COUNTY SCHOOLS

The \$3,500,000 appropriation bill, signed by Governor Ferguson this week, increased the per capita apportionment of the school children of Texas from \$11.50 to \$14 and has been a "life saver" for schools of Runnels county, Hoyt Smith, assistant to County Superintendent R. E. White, said Wednesday.

"This," Smith declared, "will benefit Runnels county in the sum of \$15,175, with the Ballinger schools getting a share of about \$2,500." Other independent districts of this county will also be given aid by the increase.

In the 43 common school districts of Runnels county there are 3,240 students. The supplemental appropriation will aid them about \$8,100.

Runnels county this year has a larger scholastic enrollment than ever, Mr. Smith said, there being in the six independent districts and forty-three common districts about 6,970 students.

The increase came just in time to assure many of the schools of the county the regular terms while had the \$11.50 per capita apportionment remained, many would have had to cut their terms short and the rural school children would not have been given the benefit of their regular term.

Many of the schools in the county are now opened and within the next few weeks all of the common district schools will be in operation for the 1926-27 session.

DALLAS, Oct. 27.—John H. Kirby, Houston capitalist, has accepted the chairmanship of the board of directors of the Society for Scientific Development of Texas' Natural Resources, Judge John Spellman, president of the society, announced here today.

The board is composed of 100 prominent citizens of Texas and is to direct the work of the society, which has been founded to gather scientific information on the state's resources.

## OFFICERS HERE SEARCH FOR MISSING S. A. GIRL

(By Associated Press)

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 27.—Search for Pearl Howell, 16 years of age, who disappeared from her home here Monday while recovering from an operation, was extended to Ballinger as police here sought to locate a woman with whom the girl was acquainted.

According to the girl's mother, the woman had tried several times to persuade the girl to leave home. The girl disappeared from home while her mother was absent.

Members of the local sheriff's department have been on the watch for the Howell girl and the woman who is believed to have lured the girl to leave her home, according to Sheriff Earl McWilliams, who Tuesday afternoon late received a telegram from Sam Street, chief of detectives of the San Antonio police department.

Sheriff McWilliams said he had notified his deputies and that bus line drivers in and out of Ballinger had been instructed to watch for the pair.

According to the telegram received from Chief Street, it was believed the young girl and the woman were headed for Ballinger via bus line through Fredericksburg, Mason, Brady, Eden and Paint Rock.

George Allen, driver of the Ballinger-Eden bus who makes connection with the San Antonio-San Angelo busses in Eden, told Sheriff McWilliams Tuesday evening that five men and one woman occupied the San Antonio bus at Eden and that only one man came on through to Ballinger with him. Other bus drivers are watching for the couple.

Officers here are of the opinion that the girl, if she is in this section of the country, went on through to San Angelo and did not come to Ballinger Tuesday evening as was expected.

The girl, according to the description furnished local officers, is about 16 years of age, with black bobbed hair and blue eyes. She is about 5 feet 3 inches in height.

## ADOPT PLAN TO HOLD MANY BALES COTTON

DALLAS, Oct. 27.—A \$5,000,000 corporation to hold 1,250,000 bales of cotton off the market for eighteen months or long enough to restore to normal conditions, was the plan adopted here today by a committee of the Texas Bankers' Association for the purpose of saving the cotton situation in Texas.

The committee voted in favor of the corporation plan at the suggestion of Eugene Meyer, representative of President Coolidge, who is travelling through the South in an effort to improve the cotton market.

Mr. Meyer arrived in Dallas today.

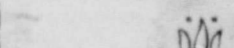

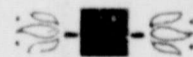

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—The exhaustion of America's natural store of motor fuel was put beyond the realm of probability by W. S. Farriss, president of the American Petroleum Institute, in a survey of the oil industry today before the third conference on education and industry at the University of Chicago.

Not only did Farriss point out the virtually unlimited sources of supply but he predicted that new fuel economies and new motor efficiencies will compensate or even over-balance any increase in fuel cost.
