FORLÌ, Italy, Nov. 1.—Nothing can happen to me before my task is done," this was Premier Benito Mussolini's assurance today to the Fascists, following yesterday's attempt against his life at Bologna.

His would-be assassin was lynched after he had fired a shot at the premier.

### RUNNELS GINNINGS SHOW A DECREASE

Ginnings in Runnels county up to October 18, 1926 totalled 33,765 bales, according to W. A. Esmond, county government reporter, as compared with 35,317 bales for the same date in 1925, which shows a decrease of about 2,000 bales.

It is estimated that from two-thirds to three-fourths of the 1926 Runnels county cotton crop has been gathered and ginned.

The meeting will discuss the 5-year balanced farm program which has been adopted by many West Texas counties. It is a part of the program of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

## RANGERS SENT TO HIDALGO CO.

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, Nov. 1.—To prevent election disorders at the general election tomorrow, Governor Ferguson ordered six or seven Texas rangers to proceed to Hidalgo county.

Mr. A. Voter, going to the polls tomorrow throughout the nation finds himself the final judge in the following contests.

United States Senate—Thirty-six Senators are to be elected from 33 states. United States House of Representatives—the entire membership of 435 membership of 435 members are to be chosen.

Prohibition—Referenda in eight states on various questions dealing with liquor laws and their enforcement.

Governors and state tickets are to be elected in 33 states.

### LITTLE INTEREST IN THE GENERAL ELECTION HERE

Little interest is being manifested in the general election this year as compared with 1924 when the Republicans put out a ticket to oppose Ferguson in her race for the governorship.

All tickets and ballot boxes have been sent out, and Tuesday the 1926 general election will be held. The Republicans are not as strong this year as they were last year and the vote is expected to be light over the entire state.

John Heck's name has been placed on the ticket as candidate for commissioner of precinct No. 3, to replace that of George Miller, deceased, who was renominated for another term in the first primary, while the name of Jim Shaw, of Wilmeth, has been placed on the ticket instead of Mr. Heck's name as candidate for justice of the peace at Wilmeth.

### HALLOWEEN QUIET HERE THIS YEAR

As far as could be learned, Halloween was very quiet here over the week-end. Parties started on Friday night and continued through until Sunday night, but no serious disturbances were reported to either the sheriff's force or to the city police.

The celebration here is usually a big event but this year it was very quiet. No arrests were made and few gates were missing from their fences, while porch furniture and other property left out doors was not bothered.

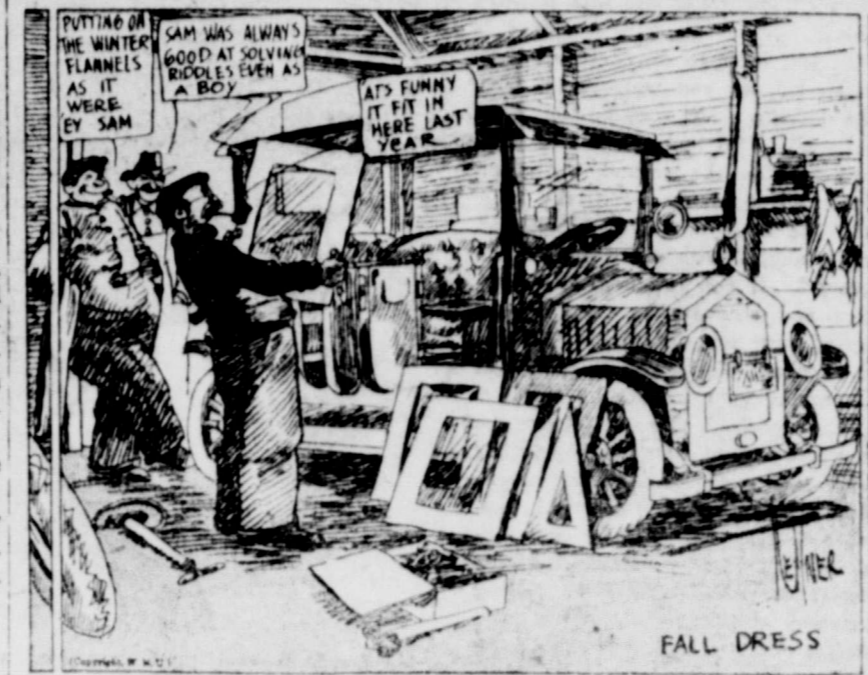
The Central ward school was entered and youths proceeded to ring the bell for a short time but no serious damage was done to any of the buildings.

## Pioneer Poultry Man Is Called By Death

E. A. Jeanes, pioneer producer of West Texas, died at his home, 700 Ninth Street, Sunday morning at 5:30 o'clock, following an attack which he first suffered Friday morning about 9:30 o'clock when he became unconscious and remained in that state until he died.

Funeral services will probably be held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the home with Rev. O. F. Hatfield, general superintendent of the Nazarene church for the San Antonio district, officiating.

Mr. Jeanes had been in bad health for some time but had been up and around looking after his business and was on the streets almost every day until the Friday morning he was stricken in the yard at his home. He was hurriedly taken inside the house and a physician summoned. His condition was announced to be very grave by attending physicians, and members of his family were summoned. A son Carl R. Jeanes, of Coleman, was the first to arrive. The wife, Mrs. Lydia Anna Jeanes, was at home, as were two other sons, E. Paul Jeanes, who was in business with his father; and E. A. Jeanes Jr., also in the poultry and produce business. Other sons and a daughter were notified in the West and they started immediately for Ballinger.

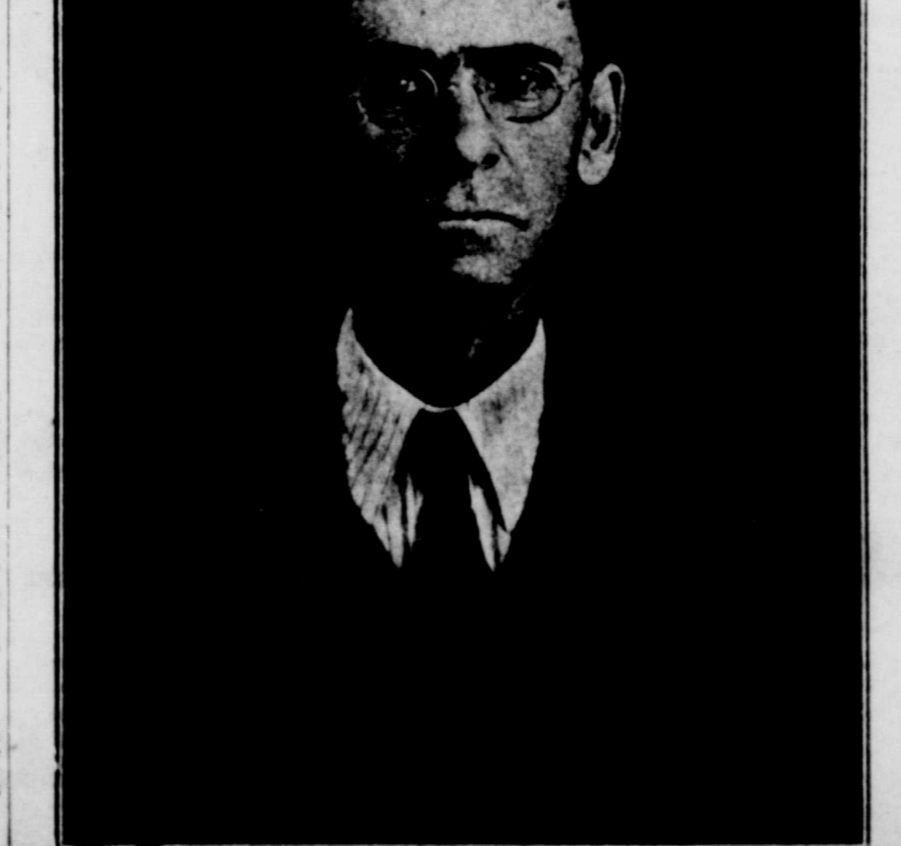
Elisha Anderson Jeanes was

born in Alabama on June 12th, 64 years ago. He moved to Texas when a young man and lived at Crawford for some time, and after his marriage to Miss Lydia Anna Raby on February 14th, 1885, he lived in McLennan county, Lampasas, Temple and Alvin, coming to Runnels county from Alvin.

It was in 1895 that Mr. and Mrs. Jeanes moved to this county with their family and made their home on Valley Creek, the old Jeanes place, which is still known as such. Mr. Jeanes was a farmer at that time but later opened a produce business in Ballinger, he being one of the first in West Texas to take notice of this industry. He believed strongly in the future of Ballinger and Runnels county as a produce district. He remained on the farm however, and came into Ballinger to look after his produce concern.

In 1911 the firm of E. A. Jeanes & Company was formed here and it progressed rapidly. The name of the firm still lives, but Mr. Jeanes sold out a few years ago to enter the poultry business on a commercial scale. He built the poultry and produce business in this county from the ground to what it is now. He was one of the first to start raising poultry for sale. At the time he com-

## CRIMINAL DOCKET CALLED IN COURT

The criminal docket of the Runnels county district court was called Monday afternoon about 2:00 o'clock by Judge J. O. Woodward, presiding judge.

The opening of this week's docket was delayed about one hour on account of the Santa Fe passenger train being late. District Attorney Walter U. Early was aboard the train.

At 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon three cases had been heard by the juries in the court, all being pleas of guilty entered by the defendants.

J. D. Abbot, charged with forgery in two cases, entered pleas of guilty in each case and was given two years in the penitentiary for each offense.

Joe Castro, Mexican, charged with auto theft, was given two years after entering a plea of guilty.

George Perry, charged with burglary, was the last defendant heard. The jury was still out when another case was called for trial.

FT. WORTH, Nov. 1.—Charges that city officials of Fort Worth, members of the Knights of Columbus and Roman Catholics in general have entered into a conspiracy to persecute Rev. J. Frank Norris on a charge of murdering Dexter E. Chipps, Ft. Worth lumberman, were filed in Judge George Hosey's court here today.

The charges were presented by application for a change of venue filed by a defense attorney.

The application avers that the fundamentalist pastor cannot obtain a fair and impartial trial in either Tarrant or Dallas counties and it asked that his case be transferred to some other county in Texas, free from the prejudices which exist here.

The court recessed until 2:00 o'clock to permit the prosecution attorneys time to prepare their answer to the request for the change of venue.

District Attorney Robert Hanger, leading the prosecution forces, announced that the state would resist the application.

During the recess the defense subpoenaed 31 witnesses who will testify on application for the change of venue. They will testify that the defendant cannot obtain a fair trial in Tarrant county.

FT. WORTH, Nov. 1.—For the third time in his militant career, Rev. J. Frank Norris, Baptist pastor, today faced the temporal bar of judgment to answer to a criminal charge.

The fundamentalist leader is charged with the murder of Dexter Elliott Chipps, Ft. Worth lumber man, who was shot in the office of the First Baptist Church last July 17th.

Dr. Norris stepped into the criminal district court room here punctually at 9:00 o'clock, appearing fresh and unperturbed, with two of his attorneys with him. He sat on the witness bench and read from a paper which he held.

The court room was comfortably filled with only those who held passes for admittance.

**Rains and Floods to Benefit Farm Soils**  
(By Associated Press)

DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 1.—The silver lining of the rain clouds that poured tons of water over each Iowa acre during September will be visible to farmers of the state when next year's crops are harvested.

A few weeks ago, flooded streams and inundated lowlands foretold huge crop losses. But cheering statements from experienced observers indicate that this year's scattered losses will be offset by many indirect benefits through the replenishing of the water reservoir.

For many years the water reserve has been depleted. Scarcity of top soil water has interfered with crop growth and the gradual lowering of the permanent ground water level has caused shortage of well water.

This year's rains came at a season when the crops were dormant. The water thus penetrated the lower levels, and also replenished the soil water supply. It is estimated that only about 25 per cent of the precipitation was carried off by the streams and that the balance has so saturated the soil that the benefit will be marked during the next growing season, and may be noticeable for the next three or four years.

DECATUR, Tex.—Community schools will be conducted in rural sections of Wise county if plans of County Agent Jameson materialize. Rural instruction in terracing is being sought by him through the co-operation of the extension department of A. & M. College.

**Says Trained Choirs Injure Church Singing**

CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—Trained choirs have taken the life out of church singing by congregations and are defeating their own original purpose, declares Dean Peter C. Lutkin of the college of music of Northwestern University. Dr. Lutkin this fall established a college course for church choir leaders.

"A church choir should stimulate and not discourage congregational singing," said Dr. Lutkin, "but the average professional church musician looks upon hymn singing as a bore. This attitude is all wrong. But it will persist until there are training schools for church musicians which stress religion above artistry. And the church itself should supply such training."

**How to Acquire Grace of Movement**

**First Study Poise and Balance, Says Film Beauty, With These Exercises Given Below**

UNLIKE beauty, grace is a quality with which few women are born, but which can be acquired easily. It is dependent upon one thing, perfect balance. Once this is acquired, it is very easy to carry yourself gracefully and with distinction.

If you want to discover just how much balance you really have, take the dancing position called the "arabesque." That means to stand with one foot on the ground, the other foot and leg extended in the back and the body and extended leg at right angles with the foot on the ground. If you can hold this position and rise on the toes without losing your equilibrium your balance is excellent, if not you should begin improving your balance by exercise.

Exercise for poise and balance are much more important than any other kind. The well-known setting up exercise is the best one I know. It consists of standing with the heels together, the toes out, rising on the toes bending the knees to a squatting position, with the arms at right angles to the body, rising again and lowering the heels.

Another good exercise for balance is this: Place a book on the floor



A few feet in front of the body. With one foot extended bend the body at the waist and pick up the book. To walk or dance gracefully the weight of the body must be distributed equally on each foot, otherwise ungainly muscles appear and your carriage is awkward.

**ANGELO WANTS POSTAL TELE.**

San Angelo citizens want Postal Telegraph and Cable Company service, according to a story appearing in the San Angelo Standard recently and they are taking steps through the Board of City Development there to get the new service or better service through the Western Union Telegraph Company.

According to the story in the Standard, service of the Western Union there has been very bad and messages are not promptly delivered and called for; the office does not have enough telephones, and only a few hours service is given on Sunday, and during the week the office closes at 11:00 o'clock.

The news item further stated that Ballinger and Winters had asked for Postal service from

Abilene. The Ballinger part of the story is new to the citizens here, however several have recently complained of the Western Union service here. J. D. Motley, secretary of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce, said he knew nothing of Ballinger citizens requesting the Postal Co. to extend their line to this city, but that Winters had asked for such service.

No serious complaints have been made against the local Western Union office but it is general talk here that the service is not keeping up with the progress of the city and that it has remained the same since the city started growing.

Several cotton men recently circulated a petition which was presented to the Western Union urging that the uptown office be kept open longer in the evenings during the cotton season. The request was refused and the same service is being given as before the harvest season opened.

In many West Texas cities the cotton men use the railroad wires for the night messages and it helps out quite a bit.

It is understood that other West Texas towns are asking the Postal Co. to come in and give them service the Western Union is not supplying.

**Undersea Volcanic Action United Aleutian Islands**

SEATTLE, Nov. 1. — Three islands in the Aleutian chain, 1100 miles Southwest of Alaska, have been united by submarine volcanic eruptions.

The coast guard cutter Haida, just returned from an Alaskan cruise, reported that Bogosloff, Castle and Fire islands have been joined by lava formations. Bogosloff Island appeared out of the sea in 1796 and Fire Island arose above the surface in 1883. Twice since the latter date they have been united by volcanic action and separated again.

CLYDE, Texas—Waterworks and sewage bonds in the sum of \$60,000 were voted here recently by a vote of 3 to 1.

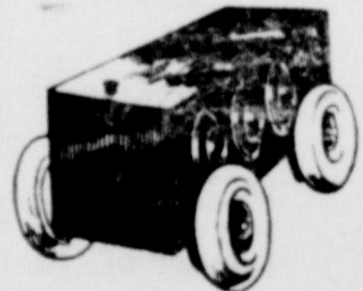
