LEDGER'S CAMPAIGN IS WELL UNDER WAY NOW

The subscription campaign of the Daily Ledger and the weekly Banner-Ledger, Runnels county's two leading newspapers, is in full sway this week with many of the schools already preparing to make reports to the Ledger office in Ballinger.

This week, Troy Simpson, of the circulation department of the Ledger, and R. E. White, county school superintendent, have visited some fourteen schools in telling the school children of the county just how the campaign will be worked.

Mr. Simpson and Mr. White were out again Friday afternoon and completed a visit to all of the schools West of the Colorado River. Next week they will visit the schools in the Northwestern part of the county and will also go into the Northern section.

Saturday, tomorrow, four rural schools of the county will have committees in Ballinger visiting prospective subscribers and working for their schools to win the first prizes, which are Brunswick Radiolas for the first winners in both Class A and Class B. Other prizes are also offered.

The contest will have 48 rural schools as contestants and according to reports received in Ballinger, they are all working hard to come out ahead. Supplies were mailed out this week to the 48 schools and reports are expected to start coming in next week-end, about November 13th.

A youth at one of the schools visited by Mr. White and Mr. Simpson, proved to be an exceptionally good salesman as he sold the county superintendent a subscription to The Daily Ledger for one year, almost before Mr. White could get out of his car. There are many good salesmen among the pupils of the rural schools and this campaign is expected to be the greatest the Ballinger Printing Company, printers and publishers, have ever sponsored.

Ballinger citizens are requested to aid the rural students in working for their schools to win the prizes when they are solicited in the city during the next three or four weeks. The contest will be one of much healthy rivalry among the rural schools of this county and will be interesting not only for the students but also for the parents of the school children.

Cash commissions will be paid to all schools where no prize is awarded, so none will lose in this great subscription campaign.

EVANS FOUND NOT GUILTY OF CRIME

Edward Evans, negro, was found not guilty of manslaughter in connection with the killing of Lawrence Price on the farm of Charles Black near Marie on October 2nd, by a jury in the district court here Thursday afternoon.

The case went to trial Wednesday afternoon and Evans pleaded not guilty to the charge. A jury was selected, immediately followed by testimony of several witnesses. The trial was concluded about the middle of Thursday afternoon.

Willard McMillan was foreman of the jury.

Walter U. Early, district attorney, and C. P. Shepherd, county attorney, were the prosecutors, while Judge A. K. Doss defended Evans.

Court has recessed for this week but additional cases will come up for trial next Monday afternoon when Judge J. O. Woodward and District Attorney W. U. Early return from their homes.

J. E. ("Choe") Davenport, charged with burglary, was given two years in the penitentiary. He entered a plea of guilty.

During this week's court's session there were fourteen pleas of guilty here. Two defendants were each given two-year suspended sentences; two were given 5-year suspended sentences; one was given a year sentence; and nine were given two-year sentences in the penitentiary.

WINTERS, Nov. 5.—John Branham, about 45 years old, oil mill worker, was killed here this morning about 6:30 o'clock when he was smothered to death in a mountain of cotton seed at the Winters Cotton Oil Mill.

Branham was working with another man in the seed house at the time in feeding the conveyor that removes the seed from the seed house to the main part of the mill. The co-worker of Mr. Branham had just stepped out of the house for a few minutes, leaving Mr. Branham by himself. When he returned Mr. Branham could not be located. A search through the mill was made but the man was not found.

Search was then instituted in the seed house, where the limp body of Mr. Branham was discovered. He gasped for his breath only one time after being removed from the seed.

All efforts to revive the unfortunate man were futile.

John Branham was about 45 years of age, and a man with a family, consisting of a wife and two children. He had lived in this county for several years.

Deceased was a brother of E. T. Branham, of the E. T. Branham Grain Company, of Ballinger.

Mr. and Mrs. Branham went to Winters early Friday morning. Mr. Branham is known here to be survived by four brothers and three sisters. He probably has other relatives but only these are known here.

Brothers of deceased are: E. T. Branham, Ballinger; Oscar, Edgar and Willis Branham, of near Winters. The sisters are: Mrs. Homer Briley, of Winters; Mrs. Alfred Eoff, Winters; and Mrs. Oliver Green, Winters.

It was learned here at noon Friday that funeral services for Mr. Branham will be held Saturday afternoon at Crews.

Brownwood last week defeated the San Saba team 7 to 0 in a hard fought game. Last week Fredericksburg took Menard to a 25 to 0 defeat and Fredericksburg is showing up to be a strong team. Ballinger took Sonora down last week 59 to 0 in an easy game, while Winters defeated Clyde. Clyde, however, is not in this district and the game did not count. Rochelle defeated the Cherokee squad.

After Saturday only four teams will remain in the running. Brownwood will be one of the teams while Ballinger, Winters, Rochelle or Fredericksburg will have a chance to remain in the race.

E. A. JEANES SR., IS BURIED IN OLD RUNNELS CEMETERY

E. A. Jeanes Sr., pioneer produce and poultry man of Runnels county, who died in Ballinger last Sunday morning, was buried in the Old Runnels cemetery instead of Evergreen cemetery as was stated in Thursday's issue of this paper.

Indian War Hero Is U. S. Postman

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—"Charges Alone," the full-blood Arikara Indian of North Dakota who fully lived up to his name during the World War by killing or capturing ninety Germans single-handed, has had fulfilled his desire to be a letter carrier for Uncle Sam.

Through executive order, President Coolidge authorized his appointment without regard to civil service rules and Postmaster General New has proudly taken him in. The war record of "Charges Alone," or Thomas Rogers as he is known by his Americanized name, won prompt appointment. He has been assigned to Mandan, N. D.

Marshal Foch when in North Dakota on his American trip picked Tom out of the crowd of Indians and, placing his hand on his shoulder, cried out: "Tom Rogers was the bravest soldier in France."

Tom never talks about his war record but it is a noteworthy one. He was born at Fort Berthold, N. D., June 4, 1891, attended the Santee, Nebraska, Indian State Normal School for six years, and on August 1, 1917 enlisted in the Second North Dakota Regular Infantry. Arriving in France about November 27, 1917, he was assigned to the First Division with the Eighteenth Infantry, later being transferred to the

Intelligence Section as observer, raider and sniper. Let Tom's Major tell of his daring:

"For three months prior to the Battle of Soissons, Tom, who was a scout, was sent out every night to the German front to get information as to what organization was there. His manner of getting the desired information was a novel one. A white lieutenant accompanied him as far as it was safe to go; Tom then went on alone to the front, creeping thru the grass, bushes and weeds, and when a sentinel passed, captured him with his bare hands and took him back to the American camp where he was questioned. In case the sentinel attempted to give the alarm Tom 'croaked' him and carried his coat to camp. In ninety nights he was on this service, he did not make a single failure to bring in his man or a coat. He brought in thirty-three of the latter."

Tom was but one of the 12,000 Indians who served with the Americans during the war and of whom 132 were killed and 87 wounded. When President Coolidge sent the thanks of the nation in the form of testimonials to the Indian tribes, Tom was designated to receive that for the Arikara Tribe.

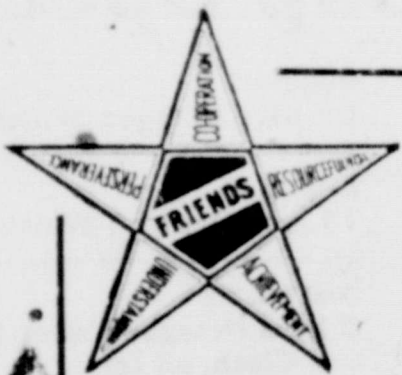

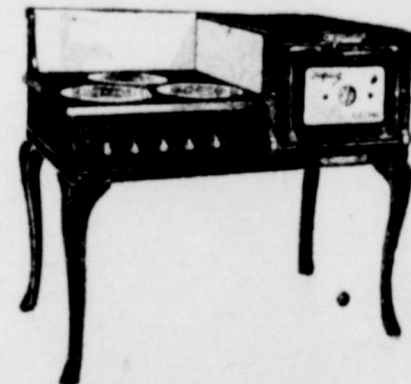

Design Airship Car to Use as a Motor Boat
(By Associated Press)

AKRON, O., Nov. 5.—An all-metal airship car, designed for army and navy training dirigibles, under construction by the Goodyear-Zeppelin works here, is so designed that it will be detachable from the bag of a dirigible and can be used as a motor boat. The cabin boat will be operated like a motorboat except that aviation propellers above the water will give it motivating power.

The car is especially designed for coastal use. In time of war it could be used readily as a surface craft and within a few minutes time attached again to a dirigible bag for air service.
