BANKERS ORGANIZE TO CUT COTTON ACREAGE

E. D. Walker, of the Ballinger State Bank, was elected county chairman of the Runnels County Bankers' Association to carry out the decreased cotton acreage program as adopted by the association Friday night at their annual meeting held at the chamber of commerce offices here.

The plan as adopted by the Texas Bankers' Association is to be carried out in this county, and Mr. Walker will have charge of the work.

Officials of the state committee in charge of this work sent to John McAdams, Winters banker, an outline of the organization for the various counties in Texas, and Mr. McAdams presented the plan to the county bankers Friday night. The program was unanimously adopted and plans will be started immediately to carry out the provisions.

Bert E. Low, of Winters, presided at the meeting here. John Q. McAdams was the principal speaker. Mr. McAdams used for his subject, "The Panoramic View of the Present and Future." His talk was very interesting and instructive.

Another speaker of the evening was Homer D. PIRATES GET \$70,000 OFF SHIP

(By Associated Press)

HONG KONG, China, Nov. 13.—Twenty-six pirates boarded the French steamer Hanoi at Kwantchouwan, shot and killed the guards, ransacked the vessel, robbed the passengers and then abandoned the ship.

The pirates took with them \$50,000 worth of bullion and \$20,000 in loot from the passengers, and a large quantity of guns and ammunition, it was learned here today.

COTTON CONSUMPTION SHOWS LITTLE INCREASE

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Cotton consumed during October totaled 568,532 bales of lint and 75,539 bales of linters as compared with 543,679 bales of lint and 75,750 bales of linters for October of last year, the Census Bureau announced today.

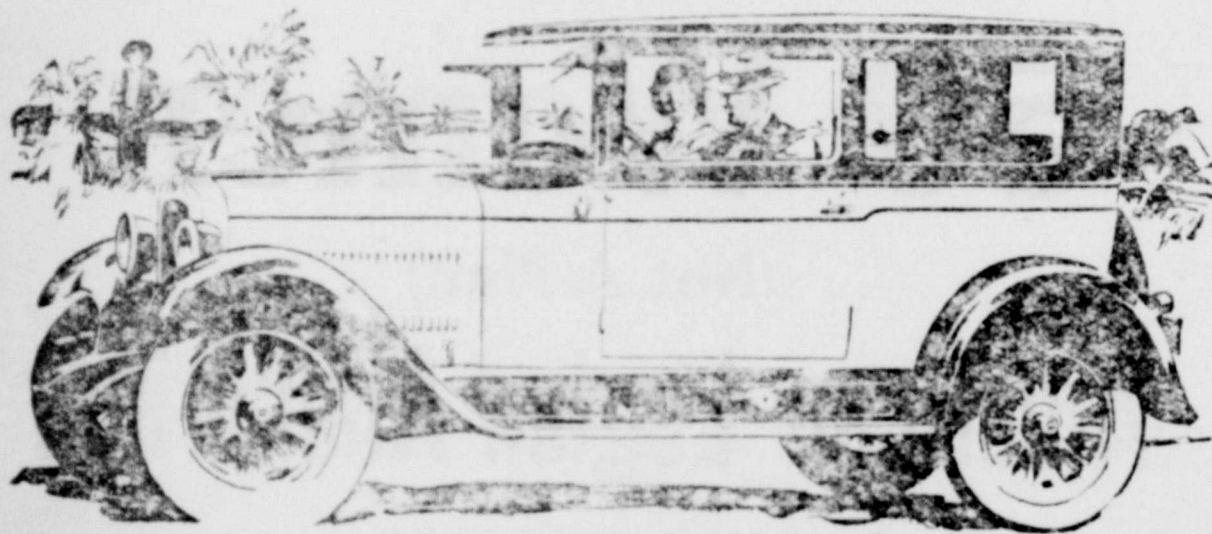

Schools

Regular attendance upon school and systematic study are essential to good school work.

It is quite noticeable to school authorities that many parents of school children have become very lax in their duties with reference to these matters. Quite often parents grant permission to their children to be out of school for a day or for a half day for no good and sufficient reason. The reason is usually nothing more than a request from the child supported by some flimsy pretext which the overly fond parent is led to believe will prove helpful to the child.

It is respectfully submitted that parents have no moral right to hold school people responsible for the success of their children in school when they are lax in matters of attendance, allowing pupils to attend social affairs on school nights, failure to require systematic home study, and failure to have the home schedule conform to the school hours that the child may be punctual as to school duties.

Parents forfeit the respect and confidence of their children when they write excuses for them when it is quite certain that they have failed to comply with school expectations. Let each parent and each child assume their full measure of responsibility if we are to succeed in developing the boys and girls into strong, worthy, white men and women.
