SAW TRIO NEAR SPOT OF DOUBLE KILLING

(By Associated Press)
SOMERVILLE, N. J., Nov. 18.—Mrs. Jane Gibson, "pig woman" in the Hall-Mills case, supported by a physician and a nurse, raised herself on a hospital bed in court here today to point to Mrs. Frances Stephens Hall and her brothers, Willie and Henry Stevens as the three persons she saw near the spot where the bodies of Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Elenora Mills were found.

The woman-farmer, introduced by the state as an eye-witness to the double killing, was brought to court in an ambulance from a Jersey City hospital.

Her story was substantially the same as that she had previously told except that she said she saw Henry Stevens at the spot after she had previously seen Mrs. Hall and Willie Stevens in a sedan parked in Derussey's Lane.

She declared she heard voices of men and women and the words "explain letters," and several oaths by the men. An oath preceding the demand, "let's go," she testified.

She then told of four shots. Looking for corn thieves was given as her reason for being in the vicinity on the night of the double killing.

IN 11 MONTHS FIREMAN LEARNS TO READ, WRITE

(By Associated Press)
FT. WORTH, Nov. 18.—There is a fireman here who eleven months ago could neither read, write nor "figure." Now he peruses the newspapers, manipulates the multiplication table and pummels the King's English into submission.

This fireman, Walker Davis, 36, bestirred himself to acquisition of the "three R's" when he saw fellow firemen being promoted to lieutenantcies, through examinations whose questions he could not read. Accordingly he set himself up a one-man school, day and night.

Last week, examinations were held again for lieutenantcies. Davis made a grade of 93.9 per cent. Although not promoted, because three other men made even better grades, Davis, undaunted, expects to "hit 'em for a commission," next time.

A remarkably retentive memory is the asset mainly responsible for Davis' rapid fire education. Several years ago, as drayman, he could remember and deliver correctly 60 packages whose addresses were read to him when pitched into his wagon.

Besides that, examining officials say Davis answers readily catch questions requiring quick, independent thinking.

LEADERS AGREE ON TAX PROGRAM

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—A tax program contemplating a permanent reduction of \$325,000,000 was agreed upon today by Senator Simmons, of South Carolina, and Representative Garner, of Texas, ranking Democrat in the House, and members of the congressional committees for handling tax legislation.

TURKEYS SHIPPED EAST BY EXPRESS

The Santa Fe East bound passenger train lingered here long enough Wednesday afternoon to take on passengers and also two express cars of dressed turkeys prepared for Eastern markets by local produce houses.

The express cars were iced here and the fowls dressed and placed in the cars. They were consigned to New York and other Atlantic coast cities where they will furnish the piece de resistance on Thanksgiving Day.

Another car was scheduled to be shipped out Thursday afternoon to Northern markets.

These are the first carlots of turkeys to be shipped from Ballinger by express. Several cars went out by freight from this concentration point during the present season.

Each car Wednesday carried about 25,000 pounds of turkeys, or about 2,000 birds. The total value of the two cars expressed was approximately \$15,000, according to prices paid poultry fanciers of this section. The car hauled by the Santa Fe today contained about the same weight in turkey meat, 25,000 pounds and was valued at around \$7,500.

Leahy, charged with the murder of Ramsey.

Martinez was Leahy's chauffeur.

KING ILL, MARIE CALLS OFF TOUR

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 18.—Queen Marie of Rumania will go direct to New York when she leaves Louisville tonight, and will sail for home on the first available steamer.

The illness of King Ferdinand was the reason for her decision to cancel the remainder of the American tour.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 18.—Queen Marie of Rumania, will abandon her American tour at Detroit Saturday, because of the serious turn in the condition of King Ferdinand.

The royal visitor will arrive in New York Sunday and expects to sail for Europe on November 24. The queen authorized this announcement today.

PRISON AGENT GETS 7 HERE

Bud Russell, Huntsville penitentiary agent, spent about forty minutes here at noon Thursday eating a little lunch while waiting for Sheriff McWilliams to feed the seven prisoners in the county jail that were "sent up" to the state penitentiary.

Mr. Russell came in on the noon train and left about forty minutes later for Abilene in a bus with the seven prisoners who will be taken to the state prison with other prisoners whom he will pick up while en route back to Huntsville.

Those who left the jail for the pen were: Abbott, Granger, Cotton, Perry, Johnson, Davis and Castro.

Only one prisoner was left, "Few Cloes," a negro, who is charged with forgery. "Few" was not arrested before the grand jury of recent session adjourned and he was not indicted, but he has entered a plea of guilty before the justice court, and declared he wanted to go with those convicted.

Williams and Davenport, two other prisoners sentenced to serve prison terms, have been taken to Slaton to stand trial there.

COTTON MONEY

Upwards of four million dollars will be put in circulation in Runnels county as result of the county's 1926 cotton crop.

This is not so bad, and it figures about \$200 for every man, woman and child in the county if the cost was distributed on a per capita basis.

While the cotton farmer did not pocket the profit he is entitled to, he furnished employment for others in producing the crop. The four million dollars went for labor, picking, ginning, etc., and made it possible for many laborers to keep the wolf away from the door.

Less than one-half the citizens of the county are engaged in growing cotton, but indirectly many others depend on the cotton crop to keep their bank account properly balanced, and while there is a move on foot to rent the acreage it must be admitted that cotton is the money

crop of the county. Under favorable conditions there is no county better adapted to cotton production than Runnels county. This places us in the cotton belt and cotton will continue to be the money crop as long as there is a demand for the staple, even at the prevailing price.

The solution for the marketing problem, or the price problem, can easily be solved if the farmer will produce more of the things at home needed for his table and not be forced to pay out his cotton money for products which he can grow with as much ease as he grows cotton. If the cotton crop is to be made the money crop of the farm, a balanced farm program, or more of a live-at-home program must be adopted, and carried out on the farm.

While there are probably eight or ten thousand people in Runnels county who are engaged in growing cotton with which to help clothe the world, there are about 25,000 people who want three meals per day and they are looking to the farms for the food.

The money which the farmer pays out for labor in helping to make the cotton crop will come back to him for the other products of the farm—poultry, pork, eggs, butter, etc.

Thus, after all has been said, the cotton crop is the money crop, and if the farmer plays the game safe he will get most of it.

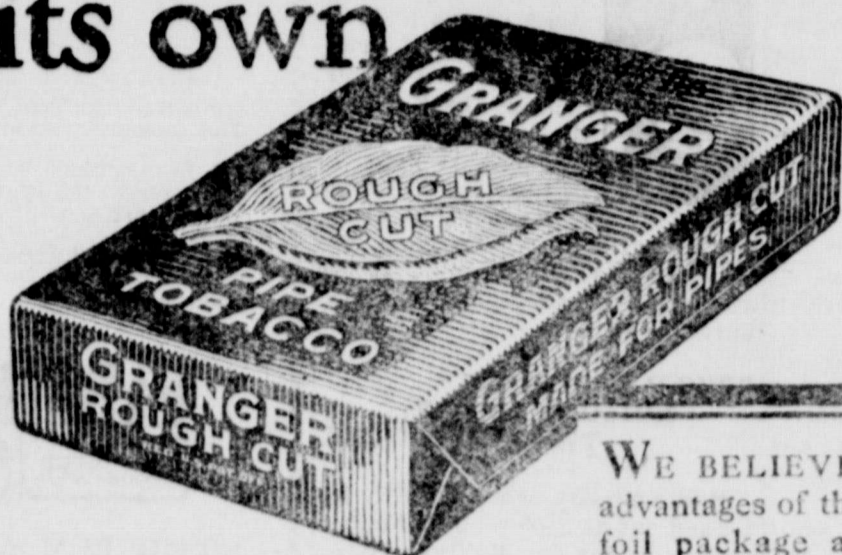

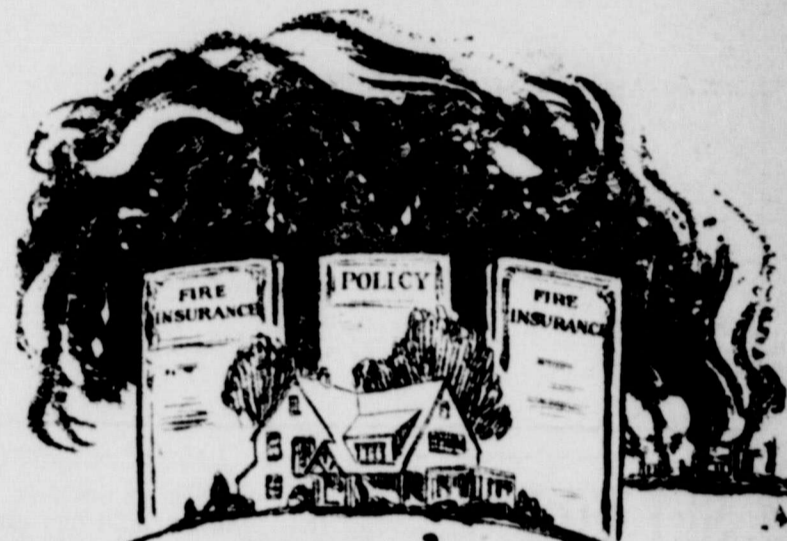
