4,000 BARRELS BEER ARE SEIZED

(By Associated Press)
ATLANTIC CITY, Nov. 19.—Four thousand barrels of alleged high powered beer, together with complete equipment for a modern brewery, were seized by federal prohibition officers today in a raid on the Atlantic City Brewing & Ice Company.
Agents placed the value of the liquor equipment at \$224,000.

INDIANS SHUN GEYSER AS SIGN OF SPIRITS

(By Associated Press)
YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo., Nov. 19.—The American Indian believes the famous geysers of the Yellowstone National Park are a conflict of the evil spirits in the deep recesses of the earth, and consequently he has shunned the park at all times within the earliest knowledge of the Western white pioneer.

The Eastern tourist who expected to combine Western atmosphere with the wonderland of nature, was disappointed during the summer if he expected to see any redskins. Park officials recorded only six Indian visitors for the season.

During the early days of exploring in the West, the white man encountered a complete lack of knowledge of the park among the Indians. Three tribes—the Shoshones, the Crows and the Blackfeet—lived on every side of the park, according to their legendary history, but avoided entering the geyser region. When Indians went with the white explorers or military forces thru the park, they offered up sacrifices before entering the geyser region, usually through the "calumet of peace," the peace pipe.

The Yellowstone geysers were definitely associated by the Indians with their idea of hell, according to the legends of the Wyoming and Montana tribes. The rumbles within the earth that herald the geyser eruptions, the redskin regarded as the forging of warlike weapons by the spirits and each eruption bespoke a victory or defeat of one band of spirits.

A living Shoshone chieftain of more than 80 years, we saw, sounds the opinion of the Indian about the geysers as "heap, heap bad."

Barbara Tough, a maid in the Hall home, said she could not say positively she saw a razor, the property of Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall, in its accustomed place after the slaying of Rev. Hall and his choir singer-sweetheart, Mrs. Elenora Mills.

The state rested its case this afternoon.

Observatory Tests to See if Earth Shrinks

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Nov. 17.—An attempt to accurately determine whether the earth is shrinking is to be made by scientists of the world who have begun tests to detect and measure possible moves of the earth's crust. The principal observatories in various parts of the globe are co-operating with the Royal Observatory at Greenwich.

The first experiments consisted of wireless signals sent by stations in the United States and on the Continent at the rate of 61 rhythmic signals per minute. The time of the signals were registered by observatories at San Diego, California; Algiers, Shanghai, Paris, Washington, Berlin and Australia.

SAYS HAVANA HAS RECOVERED FROM STORM

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Nov. 19.—Havana, Cuba has recovered from the cyclone which struck there October 20th, and Fausto Simon of that city writes George Nalle of Austin that the damage was not as great as reported.

Sr. Simon was the host to Mr. and Mrs. George Nalle, and Miss Dorrage Ferguson, son-in-law and daughters of Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, when they were feted there nearly two years ago.

"We, of course, cannot deny that the damage of the storm was quite heavy, especially in the surrounding country," Sr. Simon wrote, adding that the reconstruction work was rapid and that Havana, "since the storm visited us has picked up remarkably and in fact our city looks much better than before. People were not satisfied to replace just what was damaged, but they made improvements at the same time.

"In Havana proper, you can hardly see any sign of damage, everything having been repaired with remarkable speed and even the Prado and the parks are all in best condition. The electric light and power system, the water works, telephone and telegraph systems, and finally the railroads are all now in fine condition.

"Our season will go on in the same way as planned and Americans will find all the amusement and fun as in former years."

Uncle Sam Preserves Indian Burial Ground

(By Associated Press)
YAKIMA, Wash., Nov. 17.—Menassee Island in the Columbia River, burial ground for Western Indians for uncounted generations and particularly sacred to the Yakimas, has been set aside by the government as a Red Man's city of the dead.

Since the days when thousands of Indians from Western plains and mountains made annual pilgrimages to the fishing grounds of The Dalles and the "sun-water" of the Columbia, bringing their dead with them, the island has been a holy ground for the aborigines. Formerly it was covered with large "dead houses," built of cedar, on the shelves of which reposed the mummified bodies of the red men. Sine-wrapped bows and stone-tipped arrows were deposited with some of the older remains, and more modern weapons with some of the more recent.

SANTA FE DENIED PLAINS RAILWAY

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The Burlington and Frisco railroad systems were authorized today to proceed with the construction of new lines in the Plains territory of the Texas Panhandle, and the Santa Fe and the Texas, Panhandle & Gulf systems were denied similar permission.

The controversy as to which group should undertake the development has been before the Interstate Commerce Commission for many months, with the South and East plains territory of the Panhandle involved.

The Burlington system, through a subsidiary, the Fort Worth & Denver was authorized to build a total of 292 miles in the South Plains. The line's main stem would run from Estelline thru Plainview to a point in Castro county, a distance of 132 miles. A branch line of 50 miles would extend to Lubbock and another 19 miles of this line to Silverton.

The Frisco, thru the Quanah, Acme & Pacific, was permitted to build 27 miles from Rains to Flowdala.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 19.—At least five dry dock workers were killed and fifty injured today in an explosion on the Norwegian oil tanker Mantillan.

DUISBURG, Rhineland, Nov. 19.—Mattia Battistini, the eminent heritone, got a taste of German red-tapism when the morning after his concert a tax official called on him with a printed tax form reading: "Well known singers are assessed eight per cent of their income, others 20 per cent."

As Battistini was asked to pay 20 per cent taxes, he suggested that in view of "his successful career of 50 years as a singer" he might be justified in expecting the "well known" assessment.

To which the functionary, after conferring with his superiors, sent the reply: "An official query is being sent to the City Council as to whether you are sufficiently celebrated to be entitled to pay only eight per cent."

STOCK SHOW TO SELECT CHAMPION FAT BULLOCK

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—The 27th anniversary of the International Livestock Exposition will be observed this year Nov. 27-Dec. 4. The prize award of the show, if one can be ranked above another, is selection of the grand championship fat bullock, to be chosen this year by George Gordon-Davis of Buenos Aires.

More than 11,000 head of livestock and 5,000 samples of hay and grain have been entered for the \$100,000 prizes and trophies. Besides these, there are contests in which 1,200 farm youths, picked from 650,000 Boys' and Girls' club members, will compete.

Besides the American entries there will be more than 500 head of livestock from Canada. Last year the Prince of Wales' prize bull, King of the Fairies, won first prize in his class.

Thirteen times in 15 years the Canadians carried off the wheat prizes, but last year L. P. Yates, of Fishtail, Montana, took the crown.

Committee Favors Bearcats In Unfinished Coleman Game

"Coleman, Texas, Nvo. 18. Supt. H. C. Lyon, Ballinger, Texas.

"My Dear Mr. Lyon: Mr. Lane, the third member of the district committee, has not, up to date, reported his decision to me in regard to the Coleman-Ballinger game. Two of the committee, however, have rendered their decision which is to the effect that the game should be played over on neutral ground.

"The committee hopes that the schools can agree upon the time, the place and the officials and it feels sure that there will be no difficulty in doing that.

The above letter was received here Friday by Supt. H. C. Lyon of the city schools, who is, like other Ballinger football fans, highly elated over the fact that the contest will probably be played again and on neutral territory.

The district committee, composed of the superintendents of the Brady, Coleman and Bertram schools, has ruled on this matter, although the decision of the third member has not yet been reported.

The score at the end of the unfinished game was 7-7 and with about 4 minutes to play when Coach Frank Stringer of the Coleman Blue Cats, protested an extra point given Ballinger by the umpire and referee ruled that a Coleman lineman was offside when the Bearcats were trying for the extra point. The game was not completed and the matter reported to Roy Henderson, athletic director of the Inter-scholastic League. Henderson referred the matter back to the local district committee.

It is not known where this game will be played or when, as Friday Ballinger fans had the Winters game on their mind. If Ballinger defeats Winters as is expected by the pessimists of both towns, the game will probably be played Thanksgiving; if they lose the game probably never will be played.

FOWLER WELL UNDERREAMING

Erroneous reports sent out from somewhere other than Ballinger Thursday declared that a heavy showing of gas was struck at a depth of 2,315 feet in the Red Bank Oil Company's No. 1 Fowler, located on the Dr. W. W. Fowler farm, section No. 514 of J. H. Wills survey, five miles South of Ballinger.

The well was at a depth of 2,315 feet Friday morning, and drillers were about to complete underreaming after nearly a week's work in endeavoring to clean out the hole to the bottom. It was stated Friday morning by drillers in charge of the test that about 14 feet of the hole was left to be underreamed and as soon as that was completed the last joint of casing would be set and drilling would be resumed.

As for the gas showing, the boiler probably contains a little gas when it is brought to the surface as the water shows a few bubbles, but the water coming from the well is not bubbling and there is no scent of gas around the hole.

It is believed, however, that there is a little gas under the water, but just how much it is not known. Drilling will be resumed as soon as the hole is cleaned out and it is hoped that something will be determined then.

Bruce No. 1 Drills
Zeoh McCamey No. 1 Bruce, located on the R. W. Bruce farm eight miles South of Ballinger and three miles South of the No. 1 Fowler, is drilling around 2,200 feet without any further hindrance than that some time ago when a string of lost tools kept them on a fishing job for about three weeks.

The contractors on this well have been making very good time since the string was recovered, and it is hoped that a showing will be found in this hole within the near future.

It is understood that the Moore-King No. 1, near Crews, has been

spudded, but that drilling has been stopped. The reason for the suspension has not been announced.

Three other locations have been rumored but neither of the wells have been officially announced here. One of the wells, it is understood is to go to 4,000 feet if pay is not found at a higher depth.

With the wood set up and out of the way, a fancy interior, of tapestry panels, takes a full stage setting. This set is not the old fashioned curtain and wings, but the panels lace together so that three sides of a room is built. All the doors and windows open just like the ones in your home. In addition to these nice sets a rough set for kitchen and cabins takes a full stage and completes the scenery, making a set for every occasion.

The lighting system on stage is the very latest and is so arranged that a character can stand anywhere on the stage and never make a shadow in any direction. The lights are soft, yet when everything is on, more than 6,000 watts are used. All reflection is white frosted and white frosted globes are used, giving a bright, clear light, and not blinding the actors.

The first Auxiliary show will use everything on the stage and off and it is hoped that the crowd will use every available seat in the new auditorium.

The Sixth Annual American Legion Show will be given about December 16th and 17th. Plans call for the biggest production ever produced by the Legion.

Memorial Honors War Runner Who Sacrificed

(By Associated Press)
BULLY-LES-MINES, France, Nov. 18—As the miners of this little town emerge from the shafts each day they have before their eyes a story, carved in stone, of the deed of one of their number who carried on, even in death, during the "days of hell" at Verdun a decade ago.

Fernand Marche was a runner attached to the French forces at Verdun, and when the Germans began a new assault he was sent with an urgent message to the colonel of a front-line regiment. On his way, Marche was mortally wounded but dragged himself to a crossroads, where some other runner might see his body.

Thus he died, holding aloft one hand in which the previous message was clutched. Another runner did come along, took the message from the stiffened fingers and delivered it. Then he went to Fernand's regiment and told how he died.

This moving gesture has been treasured in the hearts of the hero's fellow townsmen, who, with the help of the mining company, have now erected a monument to Marche's memory. The monument represents him as he must have appeared to the second runner who found his body, his right arm thrust toward the sky, holding its message.

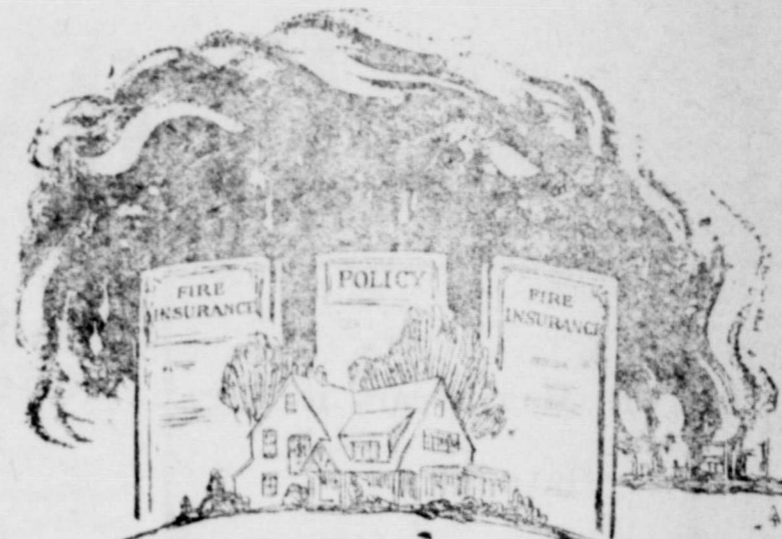
