HUSBAND ADMITS CLUBBING BRIDE

New Chapter Added to Jones Sandbagging Case

As an aftermath to an alleged mysterious sandbagging story, in which Charlie Jones of this city was said to have been slugged on the night of November 13th, a complaint for aggravated assault was filed Tuesday against Jones, himself.

Jones was found wandering around near the home of Perry Boswell, it is charged, about 3:00 a. m., Sunday, November 14th. The man was in a semi-dazed condition and he informed officers that he was dragged from his home and knocked unconscious. In a statement to the officers, Jones declared that he was not slugged, as before claimed, but that he fell down and hurt his head.

Sheriff McWilliams and his force of deputies spent quite a good deal of time trying to run down the mysterious affair but failed to get any clues. Later, however, Mrs. Willie Mae Osborne, formerly Miss Willie Mae Bales came into court and gave testimony that is alleged to have cleared the matter up. She gave the testimony that resulted in the filing of a complaint against Jones, charging him with an aggravated assault in and upon the witness.

It was declared in testimony that Mrs. Osborne with her father, was an invited guest in the Charlie Jones home on the night of the alleged sandbagging, and that when Jones was found wandering around that she had left the home of the said Charlie Jones and spent the remainder of the night across town at the home of John Hampton, having left the Jones home, she asserted, because of the alleged assault on her by the defendant.

In her testimony the complainant alleges that she was sleeping in the room with Charlie Jones and wife on the night of the alleged assault when she was forced to flee to the Hampton residence for safety.

County Attorney C. P. Shepherd filed the complaint in the county court Tuesday, and bond was made by Jones in the sum of \$500 for his appearance in the court at a later date.

Willie Mae Osborne (Bales) formerly resided here with her parents. Later the family moved to Marble Falls, where they now reside. They were here on business when the alleged offense was charged to have been committed.

Stone Walls of Paris

Giving Way to Parks

PARIS, Nov. 22.—A belt of parks, athletic fields and inexpensive apartments have replaced the stone walls that have formed a belt around Paris since the days of the Norman attacks during the ninth century.

The work of tearing down the fortifications, some of which in their present form date back to 1190, is nearing completion. Between the Porte de Versailles and the Porte de la Plaine, a park of more than 7,000 acres has been created for the use of municipal exhibitions and fairs. Tennis courts have been laid out in several parts of the former stone ring.

Tourists are losing an interesting sight of Paris but Parisians are gaining room in which to live, play and move.

Great Britain will have a co-operative national theatre, said to be the first of the sort ever attempted in England. The first production will be launched about Christmas in London.

That is the conclusion of H. W. Alberts, director of demonstration farms for Alaska.

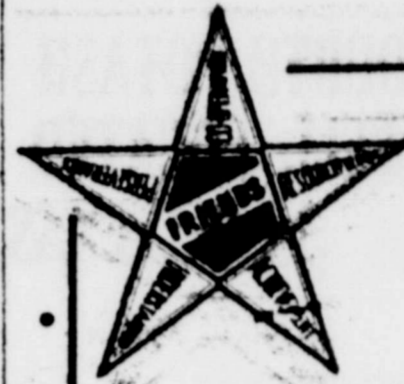
"The only thing standing in the way of successful apple growing," he says, "is securing a region where the moisture conditions will permit the trees to harden. The cold is no barrier, but owing to the rapid growth during the long summer days, the wood does not have opportunity to harden, and, absorbing an excess of moisture, is subject to freezing."

"We expect to overcome this by a new stock and make apples and cherries part of Alaska's products." Alaska grown vegetables, which attain great size and are especially free from parasites, have a wide sale on the Pacific Coast.

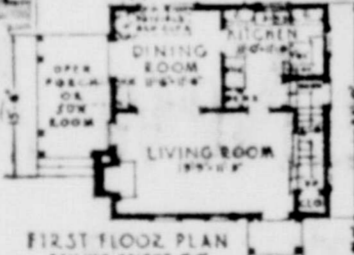

Housewife of Moderate Means Puts O. K. on This



A FLAVOUR of old New England is somehow built into this practical two-story dwelling for the family of modest pocket-book. Built along traditional lines, it has nevertheless a surprisingly modern appearance and adapts itself equally well into the rural or suburban environment. By merely shifting the open porch or sunroom to the back of the dining room instead of on the side, this house can easily be put on a thirty-foot lot, although a fifty-foot lot makes a much better investment where it is feasible.

The exterior walls are of siding, white or cream, with shutters painted green for contrast. The roof is of weathered shingles and the well-proportioned chimney is of common brick whitewashed.

Simple lattice work on both the porches suggests planting an abundance of wisteria, clematis, ramblers and other climbing plants which together with some shrubbery relieve the severity of outline.

In the interest of economy, all hall space has been avoided except the small passage on the second floor. On the other hand, closet space has been used profusely and should delight the woman of the house. Downstairs are the ever handy clothes closet right beside the front door, a broom closet and two china closets in the kitchen. Upstairs are two clothes closets in each bed room and two good-sized linen closets as well.

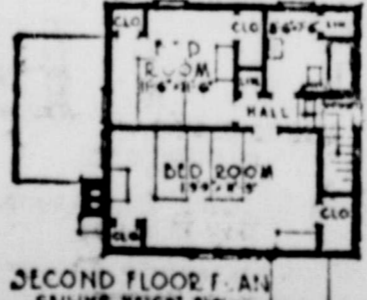
Every room has a double exposure. The living room is especially well ventilated, having windows or outside doors on three sides and a clear sweep through into the dining room on the remaining side. There is the open fireplace which one has come to look for in every well planned house and about which family life centers during the cold winter months. Unless the dining room is shut off with French doors, it would be well to use the same decorating scheme for both rooms, in order to maintain harmony between them and to give a sense of spaciousness.

An unique feature is the provision made in the plan for two built-in beds down stairs, one on the porch for the fresh air addict and another in the dining room, beneath the double windows, to be used in times of illness or for the unexpected guest.

The kitchen is small, but all up-to-date ones, but compactly arranged. In addition to the supply of closets already described, careful planning has placed the sink beneath one window, with the cupboards on either hand, a built-in breakfast nook if desired, with a window to make one's work more pleasant. The inside entrance saves many steps over the old style back door.

The upstairs contains only two bedrooms but each is of good size and the bathroom is unusually large. Where an extra room is desired for a study or play room or simply for storage, space in the basement may easily be partitioned off with sheets of cinder, the cane fibre board which is sound-deadening as well as resistant to heat or cold. Left plain or artistically decorated, this is the easiest and most economical way of finishing off unused space.

The general construction of this house is in keeping with the sensible floor plan. The value of the building has gone not into frills and unnecessary externals but into such worthwhile features as good plumbing, hard wood floors, rust-proof gutters and complete celotex insulation, walls and roof, to cut down the heating costs in winter and to keep the house cool in summer. The cost of building this house will vary of course with the locality and with grade of materials employed, but taken all in all, it can be erected with a considerable saving over the less expertly planned houses of the same general type.

Nueces county is boasting about leading the state in cotton production, having ginned more than 100,000 bales. That is nothing to boast about and the county which can show the largest poultry and egg crop is the banner county of Texas this year. There are numerous cases of where farmers have realized more profit from a small flock of turkeys than from many acres of cotton.

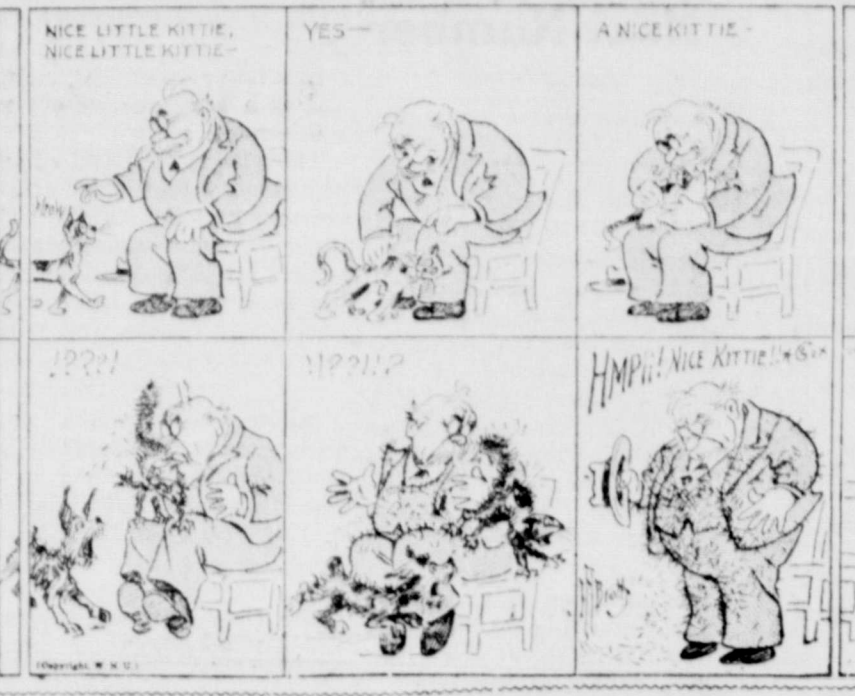

For the week ending November 7th there were 84 auto accidents reported in Texas and of this number 13 were fatal. Accidents reported from all other causes for the week Nov. 1-7 totalled 38, 19 of which were fatal.

Included in the accidental deaths from other causes other than automobile were 12 deaths from falls, and thus we see that the auto is not the greatest agency for death by accident as some might believe.

The auto death rate is indeed small when we consider that 99 per cent of the people are riding on rubber and most of the 99 per cent is trying to win the race.

We have our unavoidable mishaps, but no doubt most of the victims making up the above list of fatalities would be enjoying life today if those responsible had exercised a little common sense caution.

AMERICAN SILK WORMS MUST WORK YEAR ROUND

(By Associated Press)
LOS ANGELES, Nov. 23.—Southwestern United States some day will become one of the greatest sources of supply for raw materials for the silk industry but American methods will extend the operations to a year-round basis. This is the opinion of Mary G. Ingersoll, University of Southern California instructor.

Until recently the United States had done little in sericulture, but a silk enterprise has been launched at Escondido, while mills are operating at Hermosa Beach, Glendale and Los Angeles.

The "cotage" system of the Orient will find little favor here, Miss Ingersoll says, "since it operates only a few weeks of the year. The most primitive methods are used in the Far East, where the silk worms and the mulberry leaves upon which they feed largely are produced by the individual who has only a few acres on which to work and considers silk-raising as a side-line."

Under proposed American methods the silk farms will be operated on an intensive scale, while the mills will be kept in operation the entire year.
