## FIRE DESTROYS GIRLS COLLEGE; LOSS HEAVY

(By Associated Press)  
GREENWICH, Conn., Dec. 23.—Ely Court, an exclusive girls' school, was destroyed by fire today with the loss estimated between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000. A man named Lingard is believed to have lost his life in the blaze.

The school had closed for the Christmas holidays after 100 students had departed for their homes.

London's Hobo Pigeons Face Official Outlaw  
(By Associated Press)

LONDON, Dec. 23.—The hobo pigeons of London may be outlawed by a special act of parliament.

The ownership birds have increased their flocks at St. Paul's Cathedral and other public buildings in such numbers that the London County Council will submit a bill empowering the officials to put an end to the vagrant pigeon population. ## Many to Go Without Xmas Unless Citizens Come to Aid

The entire citizenship of Ballinger so far have contributed the pitiful sum of \$15 to make the poor happy for Christmas.

On the same date last year they had contributed \$225, and the year before that \$306.

With more families and children in want than ever before in the history of the town, practically nothing has been given.

Many families plan to have a great Christmas around their own fireside, with their loved ones and everything that heart can desire, and only a few blocks distant will be women and children sick, cold and hungry. While they take their bundles from their family trees, one mother in Ballinger will sit by the bedside of a one and a half year old baby and pray for its recovery, without any food, fuel or medicine.

Christmas day—while one mother in the city looks after the browning of the turkey to be served to a happy family and friends, another mother living in the "flat" will do a washing on the cold ground, without shoes or wraps, so that three little girls can have some bread and bacon for their dinner.

Another expectant mother with two little boys already, will start Christmas morning by carrying some drift wood from the river so that the little one, without clothing, can stay warm, and this woman will do any other job that she can find to make a little money.

Twenty families in Ballinger will go without any Christmas cheer at all unless the citizens rally to the cause tomorrow.

## EAST TEXAS COTTON ACREAGE IS REDUCED

### UNKNOWN MAN KILLS COUPLE

(By Associated Press)

LONGVIEW, Dec. 23.—The East Texas cotton acreage will be reduced 18 1/2 per cent in 1927, returning from more than 1,000 questionnaires mailed to farmers, bankers, merchants, secretaries of chambers of commerce, and county agent, throughout 70 East Texas counties, it was indicated. The questionnaire was recently sent out by the East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

About 3 1/2 per cent of this year's crop will not be harvested, while 14 per cent of the East Texas crop is being held by the farmers.

The questionnaires further indicated that only about 8 1/2 per cent of the cotton held had been stored and borrowed on.

Tests Sleeping Brain  
for Ability to Learn  
(By Associated Press)

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 21.—A University of Minnesota psychologist is seeking to determine whether learning can be acquired in sleep.

Prof. W. T. Heron is conducting the experiment on himself. He has rigged up a telephone with an electrically driven phonograph so that sounds are conveyed to his ears by head-phones. The contrivance is so arranged that when he releases his grip on an automatic switch, as he falls asleep, the phonograph starts operating softly.

"Whenever I awaken, the renewal of the grip on the switch will immediately stop the machine," he said. "In this way I will be sure that I will not hear the material in the waking state.

"It does not seem to be beyond the realm of possibility that the human being may learn, at least to some extent, while asleep."


