600 ARE DEAD IN SERVA QUAKE AREA

(By Associated Press)
VIENNA, Feb. 15.—A dispatch from Belgrade to the Graetz Tagepost says casualties from the earthquake which rocked sections near there yesterday are estimated at 600 persons.

BELGRADE, Feb. 15.—Doctors and medical supplies are being rushed to the earthquake stricken zones of Herzegovina, Dalmatia and Bosnia by airplanes.
No authentic list of loss of life or the number of injured is expected for several days because of the breaking of wires by yesterday's convulsions. It is feared, however, that the death list will mount into hundreds.

CRIMINAL CASES BEING TRIED

Seventeen cases on the criminal docket of the district court had been called at noon Tuesday, and of this number only one trial was called. Dan Raines, 16-year-old boy, charged with burglary, entered a plea of guilty and was given a two-year suspended sentence.

PRIVATE MAIL PLANES FLY 2,174,772 MILES

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Airplanes carrying mail under contract for the government flew 2,174,772 miles during 1926.

The figures given out by the Department of Commerce, do not include the mileage made by the Postoffice Department's own transcontinental service, which has not yet been transferred to commercial operators.

The flying was done on 13 different routes, the longest of which has Dallas and Chicago for its terminals. Nearly half a million miles were flown by the planes on this route. The next most used route, from Salt Lake to Los Angeles, ran up 303,924 miles of flying.

ORGANIZES TWO BIG COMPANIES

SAN ANGELO, Feb. 15.—George A. Henshaw Jr., the 33-year-old millionaire, made so by his deal last week with the Texas Company when he sold his 320-acre lease in the Fry field, Brown county, is now the head of two large operating companies with headquarters in San Angelo, it was announced here Monday afternoon.

The first company, Henshaw & Co., Inc., is capitalized for \$2,000,000. It will be an operating company in West Texas.

The second company, George A. Henshaw & Co., capitalized for \$2,000,000 and headquarters also here, will also be an operating company.

Chicago and New York capital is behind these two concerns, it was announced.

Mr. Henshaw has recently made two of the biggest deals ever reported in the West Texas oil fields, and as a result is now rated in the millionaire class. At the present he has other holdings in West Texas fields and he and his companies expect to obtain more leases on which to operate.

SELLS MACHINERY TO T. & P. I. CO.

The machinery of the old Citizens Ice Company plant on the A. & S. Ry. right-of-way in the eastern part of the city, has been sold to the Texas Light & Power Company by the West Texas Utilities Company, it was announced today by Earl Morley, district manager of the company here.

The machinery is being loaded out and will be shipped to Llano where an ice plant is under construction.

The building, Mr. Morley declared, will be used as a warehouse for the construction department of the utilities company.

"We have been contemplating utilizing this building for a warehouse," Mr. Morley said, "and recently we sold the machinery to the Texas Light & Power Company. As soon as all the machinery is out, the building will be converted into a warehouse."

The purchasing company has men here looking after the removal of the machinery and in about two weeks the building will be vacated.

Wyoming Hunters Prepare for War On Marauding Wolves

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Feb. 15.—A war to exterminate the remaining six grey wolves of packs that once numbered more than a thousand, has been declared in Wyoming. The Jackson Hole country, long the rendezvous of roving Western "bad men," will be the scene of the offensive.

Federal predatory game hunters, armed with long range rifles equipped with special telescope sights enabling the hunters to pick off an animal at 400 yards, with the advent of spring will begin the hunt. The quarry are six wary trap-wise prowlers, the remnants of a horde of wolves that formerly did hundreds of thousands of dollars damage to livestock.

"Splitrock," "Searface," "Three Toes," and "Five Toes," have become famed in legends of Wyoming stockdom as the most notorious of killers. The losses occasioned by their packs' attacks caused the federal government to send its best hunters into the state to eliminate the creatures.

AMNESTY BILL NOT UP TODAY

AUSTIN, Feb. 15.—The Ferguson amnesty repeal bill failed to come up for final passage in the Senate today after successfully passing three roll calls on parliamentary questions, when proponents of the measure failed to muster a four-fifths majority to suspend the rules to pass it to a third reading. The delay, however, is only temporary, as it will come up on a third reading automatically later in the week.

Indications were today that it would pass as some 18 or 19 Senators voted with the bill on every question, with two to five marked present, while seven opponents voted against it on various parliamentary questions.

ONE KILLED IN NITRO EXPLOSION AT BORGER

CRANE WELL IS FLOWING 8,000

Special to The Ledger:
SAN ANGELO, Feb. 15.—West Texas' best oil well came in today on the University school land, one mile South of the Churchfield in Crane county, and is making 330 barrels per hour, or an average of 7,920 barrels per day. This is the Finns-Continental well.
This well surpasses the Mid-Kansas-Transcontinental No. 1 Yates, in Pecos county, which came in for 110 barrels per hour but increased to 300 barrels per hour, making 7,200 barrels daily. The exact depth of the new well is not known.

A. & S. CHANGE NOT CONFIRMED

No official announcement has yet been made here as to the proposed sale of the Abilene & Southern Railway to the Texas & Pacific system, but it has been rumored that the Interstate Commerce Commission has agreed to render a decision in this matter some time in May.

In the meantime the road is being operated as it has been in the past with a train daily, each way between Ballinger and Abilene. This is a combination passenger and freight train, such as was operated several years ago and which was again adopted after the motor car business showed to be a losing proposition.

A. & S. business out of Ballinger has been holding up well and it is believed that it will continue to hold up. Much freight is hauled in and out over the railway and during muddy and disagreeable weather, many passengers are on the trains. Recent weather conditions made the trains do a very good business in the passenger line.

At present, construction of 1,000 feet of new track is under way on the north side of the station, and it is being extended into the block between Eighth and Seventh streets, adjoining the J. M. Radford half-block, upon which Mr. Radford is reported to have made plans for a grocery warehouse.

Mr. Radford some time ago purchased this half-block and at present there is only one residence on the lots. The building will not take up the entire half-block, but will be a large structure. When construction on this building is to be started is not known here, but the A. & S. has built a siding for the purpose of giving the Radford concern direct loading and unloading conveniences when the building is erected.

FLYER DIES IN PLANE PLUNGE

GALVESTON, Feb. 15.—Lieut. P. F. Cadell, 29, of New Orleans, was killed today when the wings of a training plane, which he was flying with Private Carl Assley, buckled, allowing the plane to drop into the Gulf of Mexico, about three miles offshore.

Assley, who was sitting in the rear cockpit, succeeded in clearing the plane, and with his parachute landed in the water. He was rescued by a Red Cross life boat.

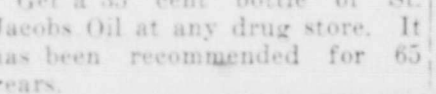

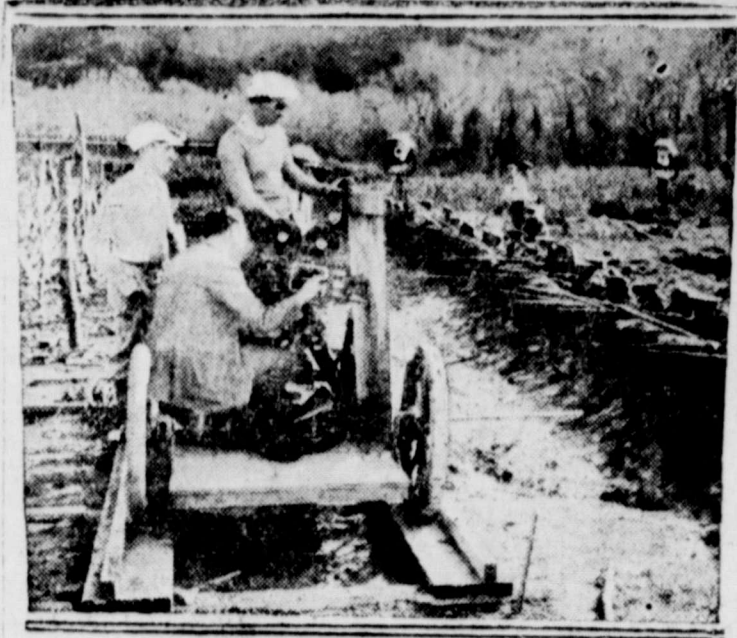

Getting Close-Up of War

(By Associated Press) BURBANK, Calif., Feb. 15.—The blank-cartridge proof shield substitutes for war's steel plate protection when the motion picture camera undertakes to give the public an idea of what a line of riflemen looks when firing and director were in danger. GIVES THREE CHIEF CAUSES OF MARITAL TROUBLES

(By Associated Press) BUFFALO, Feb. 15.—Mothers-in-law, incompatibility, and drink are the prime causes of marital difficulties, believes George L. Hager, judge of the 30-year-old domestic relations division of the Buffalo city court.

"Early marriages are best in most cases," says Judge Hager, "although some who marry too early fail to understand the responsibilities of married life."

Veteran Trainer of Epinard, With Three Fortunes Lost, Is Now Building Another



(By Associated Press)
 MAISON-S-LAFITTE, France, Feb. 15.—Eugene Leigh, "the man who brought out Epinard," has won 1074 races and \$1,214,098 in stakes in his 40 years of active service as a trainer of thoroughbreds on the French and American turfs.

He wants to make it an even million and a half before retiring. Three separate times in the course of his career "Gene" has been reputed to have been worth a million dollars. His friends say he went "broke" after each million.

"This one I'm going to keep," he says. In addition to the great stakes he has won he has made several fortunes in successful bets for owners of horses under his training.

Leigh looks forward to the 1927 season—his forty-first—with confidence. Forty-seven horses are being conditioned in his stables.

"I could look after a few more but I have no room," he said. "Koussar, by Ali Bey out of Manigance, is the best three-year-old I have this year. He is entered for the French Derby and the Grand Prix. Should he win either, it would bring up my average."

The Wertheimer brothers, Paul and Pierre, the latter being the owner of Epinard who is now in stud at the Dixie Farm in Kentucky, have 21 horses among "Gene's" forty-seven. Coram, be-

longing to M. Paul, is being pointed for the Lincolnshire to be run in England March 24.

Leigh looks to the development of one or two "cracker-jacks" from among the 12 two-year-olds he will send to the barriers this year wearing the colors of Bradford Ellsworth, of New York, who will make his debut as an owner on the French turf this year. None of Leigh's horses will enter the Epsom Derby, however.

"Gene" as he is familiarly known to every race follower in France, was the pioneer American trainer in France. Coming to Paris in 1902 he introduced American training methods and won 112 races in his first two years.

In 1909 after a bad year on the turf Leigh decided to go in for hog raising. He lost his stock in

the great flood of 1910, however, and returned to racing.

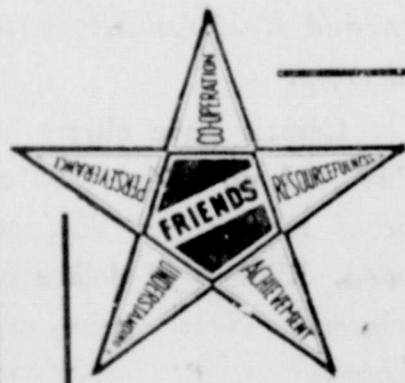

Builds Pyramid to Warn Coming Generations

(By Associated Press)

MONTE NE, Ark., Feb. 15.—At the side of a hill up in the Arkansas Ozarks, not far from here, a huge pyramid is rising to hold a message for another civilization.

As each stone falls into place, an invalid builder watches. He is W. H. ("Coin") Harvey, 76, who as the author of "Coin's Financial School" was an international figure 30 years ago. The world, in his opinion, is in a pretty bad way and his one ambition is to live until the pyramid is completed, so that he may leave a warning of the "evils" of the present and past civilizations.

Harvey is writing a book of several volumes in which will be included the views of many noted men with those of his own. It also will contain a history of the world as far back as there is authentic records. A key to present languages will be attached.

With a base of 40 square feet, the pyramid will rise to 130 feet. It will contain two chambers, each with concrete walls eight feet thick. In these will be placed copies of his book, sealed in glass containers.

At the top of the structure will be a metal plate with this inscription:

"When this can be read, go below and find a record of and the cause of the death of a former civilization."

A similar plate will be placed on the lower vault with the inscription changed to:

"Go Within."

After the walls are finished, a year will elapse before the openings are sealed, so that they will have thoroughly dried. Harvey already has spent in excess of \$10,000 on the pyramid, but has no estimate of the final cost. Several years will be required to complete the work.

situation of the entire civilized world.

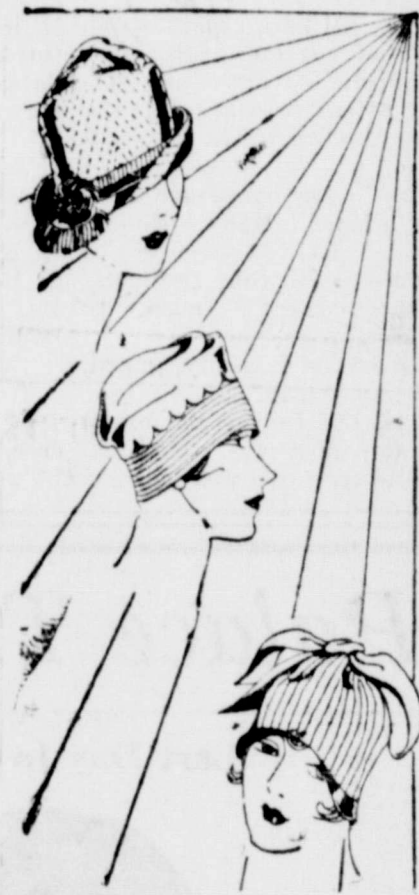

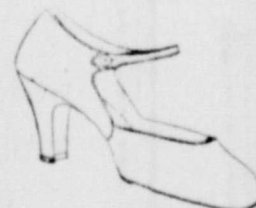
