



Storm Loss is Heavy

(By Associated Press)

TYLER. April 7.—A destructive rain and hail storm yesterday inflicted heavy damage in sections of Smith, Wood, Harrison, Cherokee and Franklin counties. Reports coming in here today indicated that some of the estimates placed the damage done to property and crops as high as \$2,000,-000.

The center of the storm was apparently in the fruit and berry section of Smith county.

Roofs were riddled with hail of which some stones were as large as two inches in diameter. Some of the small houses were blown from the blocks on which they were sitting.

Mineola reported a \$40,000 damage in the business district caused by flooding of the buildings and damaging of the stock.
