Troops Fire On Mob; 3 Killed; 31 Wounded

(By Associated Press)
TAMPA, Fla., June 1.—Three men were killed, and nineteen wounded, seven seriously, in two clashes with troops last night during rioting around the county jail where twelve others were wounded Monday.

There were clashes throughout the night between the soldiers and a mob of 2,000 persons. At one time during the disturbances the troops opened fire with machine guns stationed about the jail.

Rioting has been in progress intermittently since Sunday when a mob gathered around the jail to search for B. F. Levins, confessed murderer of five persons, all members of the same family.

TAMPA, Fla., June 1.—Sheriff Pierce announced today that thirty persons had been arrested as members of the mob that attacked the county jail here.

He added that every member who can be identified will be arrested.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—Captain Charles A. Lindbergh today accepted the invitation of President Coolidge to return immediately to Washington aboard the cruiser Memphis.

It was announced that the aviator is expected home on June 11. It is planned to have the Memphis come direct to Washington where the flyer will be received officially on behalf of the nation.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—Secretary Davis, chairman of President Coolidge's cabinet committee to welcome Charles Lindbergh home, said today that it was expected that the reception in the capital would take only one day and that immediately afterwards, Lindbergh would leave for New York, probably by airplane.

ASBURY PARK, N. J., June 1.—Disturbances described by the Coast Guard and municipal authorities as either an explosion or an earthquake were felt along the New Jersey coast this morning from Tom's River to Sandy Hook, a distance of more than 50 miles.

There were two distinct shocks. No damage was reported, although considerable excitement prevailed at Asbury Park where shocks were the most severe.

United States army authorities at Fort Hancock believe it was a slight earthquake traveling from south to north.

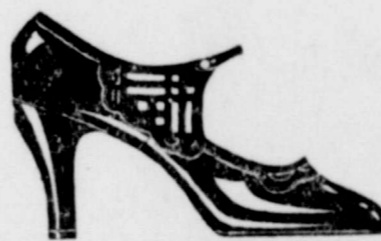

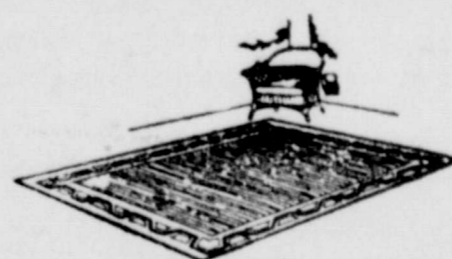

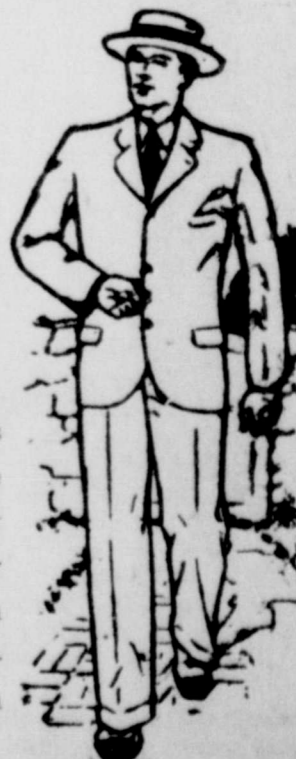

WATER SUPPLY NOT YET LOW

Rumors to the effect that the water supply of the city of Ballinger was getting low and that only about two weeks supply remained in the two city lakes on Elm Creek, were denied Wednesday morning by J. R. Lusk, city secretary and water superintendent. "We have plenty of water right now," Mr. Lusk said, "and there is no use for the citizens of Ballinger to become alarmed over a prospective water shortage. There is enough water in the two

lakes to keep the city supplied for three or four months and then if rain does not fall we will have to get to the Colorado River again as we did in October 1921."

Rains three weeks ago washed the river and creek out and gave a fresh supply of water. The creek stopped running about two weeks ago but the river is still running, however it is getting low.

The last time it was necessary to go to the river for water was in October 1921. A pump located on the east bank of the river near the bridge kept Ballinger in water from October to May, 1922.

Dry, hot winds, blowing from the southwest during the past few weeks have helped to dry up

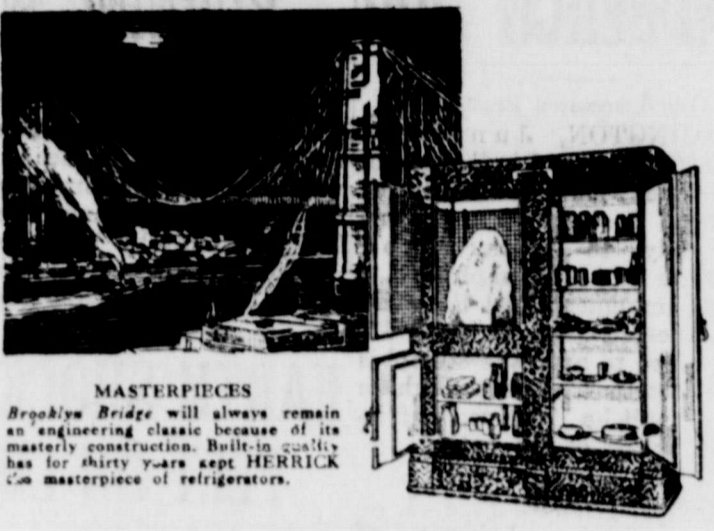
the last rain and have made the country as a whole pretty dry but the creek has plenty of water left. The river has been going down steadily during the time that has elapsed since the last rain and will soon be in holes unless rains fall here or further up the watershed of the Colorado.

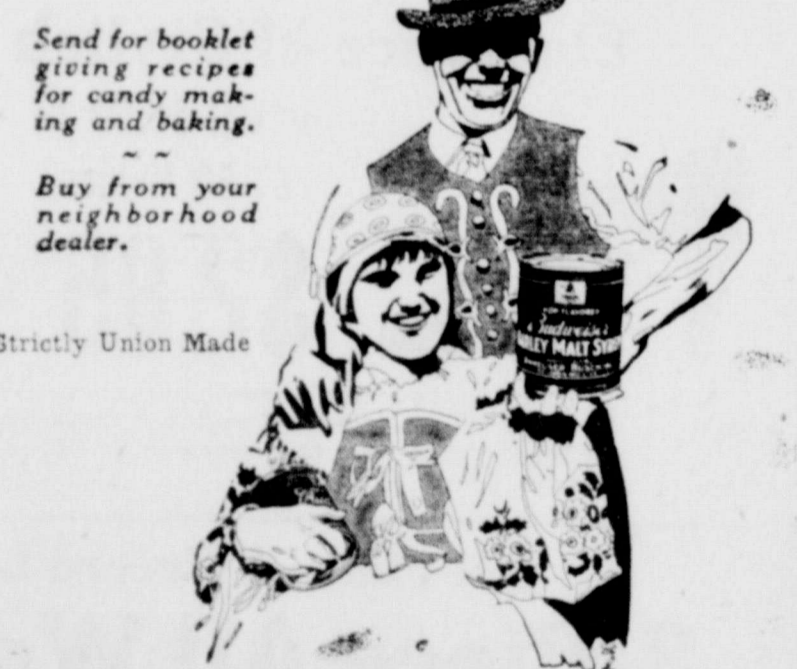

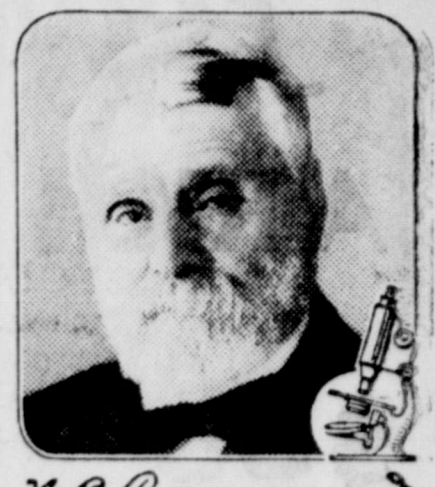
