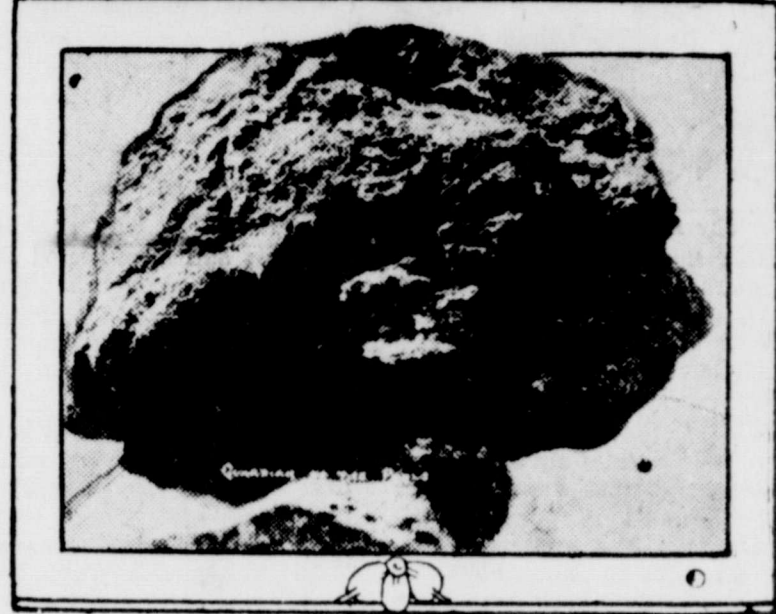

Granite Pinnacles Near Pres. Coolidge's Camp Await Names

RAPID CITY, S. D., June 18.—Scores of granite pinnacles which rise in grotesque formations along the Needles highway in the Black Hills are waiting for names.
Around and between these Needles and through tunnels, the Needles road in the state park winds northwest from the game lodge, where President Coolidge will make his summer home, to Sylvan Lake, 20 miles northwest of the lodge.
And if the President and Mrs. Coolidge care to name a few of the strange rock shapes during their summer sojourn, South Dakota will be glad to have them do it.

The Needles were once huge granite slabs, left standing on their sides by nature's upheaval in the Black Hills. Parts of the rock softer than others yielded to wind and frost, and centuries of erosion have left a vast wilderness of the stone columns, hewn by the elements into every conceivable shape.

Only a few of the more notable structures have been named. Some of these are the Needle's Eye, where time has pierced a hole through one of the columns; the Traffic Cop; the Mitten, and the Guardian of the Pools. Balanced rocks and "stone faces" abound.

WILL FEAST ON BUFFALO MEAT

STAMFORD, June 18.—Cattlemen of the West and breeders of the Southwest from out-of-state points will feast on buffalo barbecue here, Friday, June 24, when R. V. Colbert, widely known rancher and banker of this region, will serve as their host.

The occasion will be the first public sale and auction of Colbert's Anxiety 4th Hereford breeding herd and will take place at the Colbert ranch, three miles north of Stamford.

A rare draft of animals will be offered, consisting of 75 head which will include 25 mature cows, 20 two-year old heifers, 10 yearling heifers, 10 heifer calves, and 10 choice young bulls. These are direct descendants of the Guggell & Simpson herd, are said to be the best ever drafted from a single herd.

The buffalo for the mid-day barbecue will be provided from Colbert's picturesque Shackelford county ranch, on which he keeps a herd of some twenty bison.

Lindbergh, accompanied by his mother and a number of prominent persons of the nation, started the day off by being driven through the streets of St. Louis filled to capacity with cheering crowds.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Secretary Wilbur of the Navy department today received a letter from Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, thanking the department for the courtesy shown in placing the cruiser Memphis at his disposal for his return from Europe.

ST. LOUIS, June 18.—"Slim" Lindbergh is a Boy Scout now and he is tickled about it, looking more boyish than at any time since he flew into the reknown files.

Today he received the honor at the hands of three khaki clad lads who looked not a bit younger than he.

 TOKYO, June 18.—Japanese "flappers," bobbed haired, short skirted and rouged, are frowned upon by the metropolitan police department as a result of numerous letters from "indignant citizens."

The police, while agreeing with the protest against western styles being adopted by Japanese maidens, are at a loss to know just what they are to do about it. Their only course is to keep their eyes on the most conspicuous "flappers" and, if the latter are detected flirting or otherwise misconducting themselves, to hale them before the juvenile authorities.

A writer in the Chuwo expands on the "flapper" subject as follows:

"At the sight of a caricature of the modern girl which I recently saw I burst out laughing at the ridiculous figure. The modern girl gets herself up with bobbed

hair, rouged lips and cheeks, a short skirt and high-heeled shoes. Just to think of such a sight is painful enough, but when you actually see a live specimen on the street the feeling is much worse."


