Wingate Boys' Agricultural Club On July 7th we had two club demonstrations at Wingate, the first in judging hogs. In this work a class of three brood sows, belonging to Mr. Dunn were used. Mr. Lehmberg explained the fundamental points that enter into the making of a good brood sow, such as size for age, form, quality, condition and breed characteristics. After these points were thoroughly explained the entire club was required to study the three sows for about 20 minutes, then to place them and give their reasons for their placings. Mr. Lehmberg then placed the sows and gave a correct set of reasons for his placings.

The other demonstration consisted of judging grain sorghums. The four varieties of grain sorghums used in this demonstration were milo, kaffir, Spur feterita, and standard feterita. Mr. Lehmberg explained the distinguishing points in these four varieties, calling special attention to the fact that whenever varieties in any of the respective classes are mixed that that disqualified the class.

We are very thankful to Mr. Lehmberg for his persistence and his patience in trying to teach us the underlying fundamentals of practical farming that will mean so much to us in becoming successful farmers in the future. Club Reporter.






