YOUNG MAN KILLS HIMSELF **NEAR THE CITY**

G. T. Hoffman, about 19 years of age, a timekeeper for the Atex Construction Company, constructing the main line of the Western Gas Service Company, east of Ballinger, shot and instantly killed himself Saturday afternoon on Bluff Creek in the Marshall Lett pasture.

The body was found by Mr. Lett about 10 o'clock, who phoned officers. Sheriff R. E. McWilliams went to the scene of the suicide and made an investigation. Judge C. H. Willingham, justice of the peace, who held the inquest, declared it was suicide without a doubt.

The youth left a note addressed to his parents in Eastland and told how they might be reached.

The young man is said to have left the camp about 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning and to have gone to Winters first. Then he wrote the note and carried out what the note stated. 
