"GOLDEN EAGLE" REPORTED FOUND

U. S. Court Refuses to Accept Defense Papers

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, August 20.—Counsel for Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti were unable to file a petition for a review of their conviction of murder in the United States Supreme Court today because the papers presented were held to be not in satisfactory form.

Finding that there is no justice of the Supreme Court in Washington, Michael Musmano, chief defense counsel, asserted that his associate, Arthur Hill, of Massachusetts would see Justice Holmes today for the purpose of asking him to stay the execution of the two men until the Supreme Court can pass on the two petitions for review when it meets in October.

BOSTON, Aug. 20.—Arthur Hill, attorney for Sacco and Vanzetti, said today that he had been informed by Elias Field, associate counsel, that Justice James Morton, of the United States District Court, had refused to issue a writ of habeas corpus and that he had also refused Field permission to appeal to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals.

NEW LIFE INSURANCE COMPANY PLANS BIG BUILDING IN ANGELO

SAN ANGELO, Aug. 20.—The Western Reserve Life Insurance Company, which opened in San Angelo for business this week, is planning on the erection of a ten to twelve-story building in San Angelo within the next year, according to a statement by J. M. Shannon, president of the company and one of West Texas' best known ranchmen, bankers, and capitalists.

The company opened its offices in San Angelo with a capital and surplus of \$200,000 paid up. Mr. Shannon is the heaviest stockholder and was elected president.

COTTON UP \$3 A BALE

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 20.—Cotton prices soared to a new record for the season here today on the publication of a decidedly bullish boll weevil report.

The advance was around three dollars per bale.

WASHINGTON, August 20.—The Department of Agriculture's tenth boll weevil report issued today reported that the weevils were injurious in 46 Texas counties with an average infestation ranging from 4.8 per cent at Waxahachie to 89.8 per cent at Port Lavaca.

Barney Carter, of Ranger, another official of the company, has been in the city for the past two days looking after interests of the Western Gas. He declares work on the main line is progressing rapidly and that the city distribution system will be commenced within the near future.

CHICAGO, August 20.—Quick divorces obtained at a \$5 rate might be as equitable to everyone concerned as the present method of court hearings, in the opinion of Judge Joseph B. David of the Chicago Superior Court.

"A judge hears 40 or 50 cases a day," said Judge David. "He can't investigate all of them. The situation rapidly is becoming impossible.

"I don't know but that the law should fix it so that two people who are tired of living together can go to the county clerk, pay \$5 and get a divorce."

Judge David expressed his opinion in a remark from the bench. He never gives interviews.

"Dallas Spirit" Believed to Be Down in Water

HONOLULU, Aug. 20.—The Signal Corps at Luke Field today intercepted two messages said to be from an unidentified vessel saying the "Golden Eagle" was found.

The messages were partly indecipherable. The Signal Corps has no idea whether the messages are authentic.

Approximately 25 ships cruised at full speed ahead over the great circle, the route the flyers are believed to have taken.

A mysterious red flare at midnight sent the steamer West Sequana to a spot approximately 250 miles west of San Francisco, but after cruising about the vicinity of the flare, the steamer reported that it was unable to find anything of the aviators.

The "Dallas Spirit," was piloted by Capt. Bill Erwin with A. D. Eichwaldt, of Alameda, California, as navigator. The plane radioed two frantic S. O. S. calls shortly after 9:00 o'clock last night and added that the plane had gone into two successive tail spins. Following the wireless flashes the plane's radio was silent.

United States destroyers and merchant vessels answered the call for help and steamed toward the "Dallas Spirit's" last known position, which was about 592 miles west of San Francisco.

The "Dallas Spirit" left Oakland at 2:15 o'clock Friday afternoon on its flight to Honolulu to search for the two Dole flight

been found of the missing Dole flyers in the planes, "Miss Doran," "Golden Eagle," and "Dallas Spirit."

The "Dallas Spirit," piloted by Capt. William Erwin, and his navigator, set out Friday afternoon for Honolulu to search for the missing flyers.

Erwin's plane is believed to have gone into a tail spin about 600 miles out and S. O. S. calls were sent out by the aviators.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 11.—The new Ford will be on the market "within the next few weeks," Edsel Ford said here today in a formal statement.

"When the car is formally introduced within the next few weeks, we shall be able to say that it is the best and most moderately priced automobile we know how to build," said Ford. "We have tested it for getaway and pickup with many other types of automobiles. The tests already made show that it is faster, smoother, more rugged and more flexible than we had hoped for in the early stages of designing. We have known from the beginning that this new Ford would be a handsome car. Experiments have been made with a wide variety of color schemes and body designs and all these have been decided upon."

Ford said that "the new Ford automobile is now an accomplished fact. The engineering problems affecting its design and equipment, and effecting also its manufacture, have all been solved. But before a single car of the new type is offered for sale to the public each part will have been tested under every condition which we have been able to discover in more than 20 years of building automobiles for use all over the world."

The new car, Ford declared, has accomplished a speed of 65 miles

per hour over average road conditions, consuming less oil and gasoline than any previous Ford model put to similar tests. In a recent test, Ford added, one of the new cars was driven 110 miles in two hours, traveling 27 miles the first half hour. 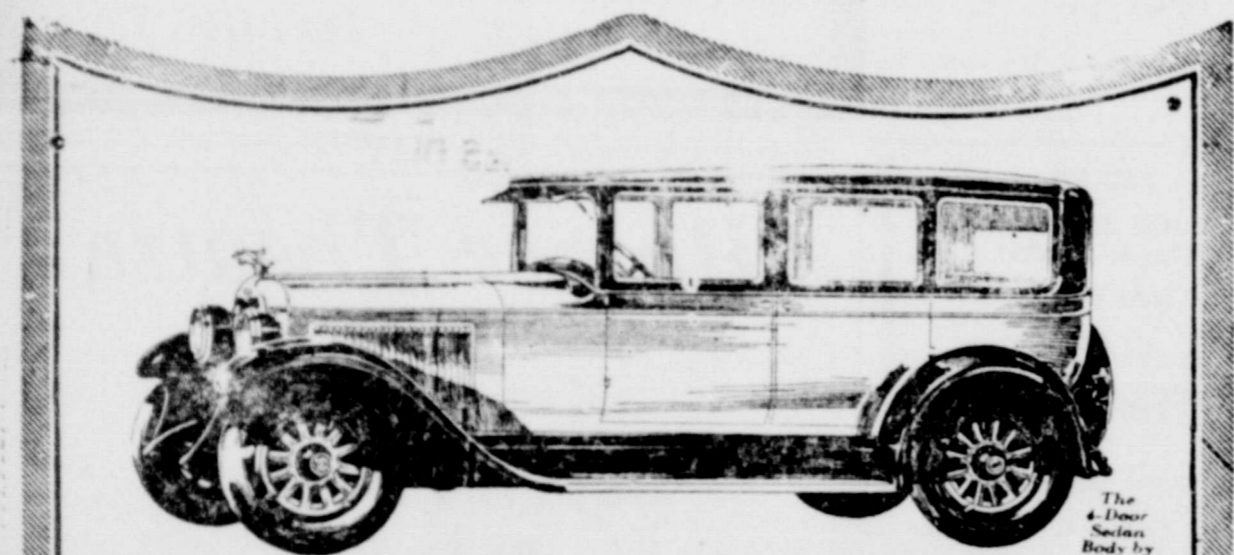

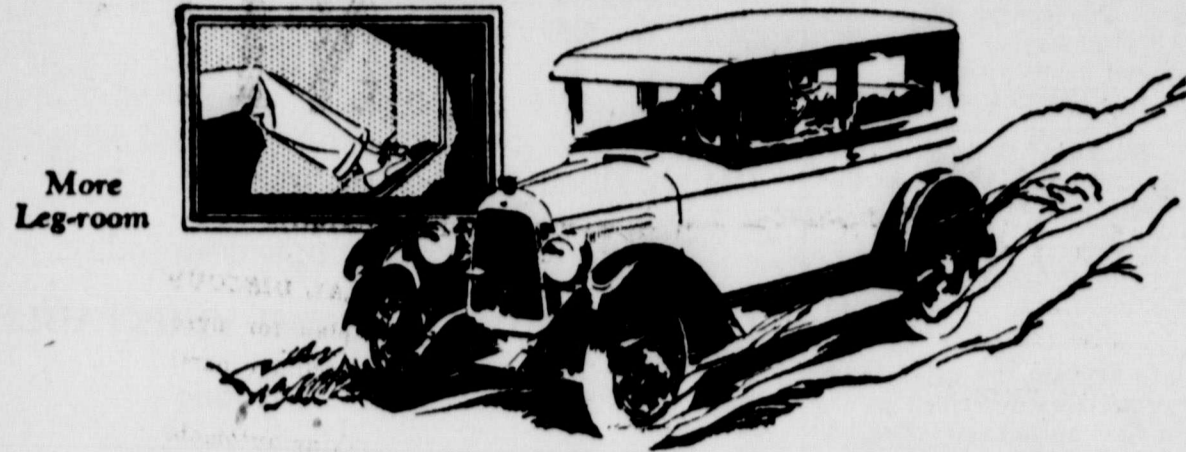

ITHACA, N. Y., Aug. 20.—Most farmers should value their time at one-half cent up to one cent a minute, advises Dr. George F. Warren, director of the farm management department at the New York State College of Agriculture.

"Probably no other single mistake on the part of Americans, and especially American farmers, causes so much loss as does loss of time," Dr. Warren asserts. "Some farmers now spend a dollar's worth of time saving a half dollar's worth of goods. One can't afford to spend ten dollars' worth of time repairing an old machine that is not worth ten dollars after the job is done."

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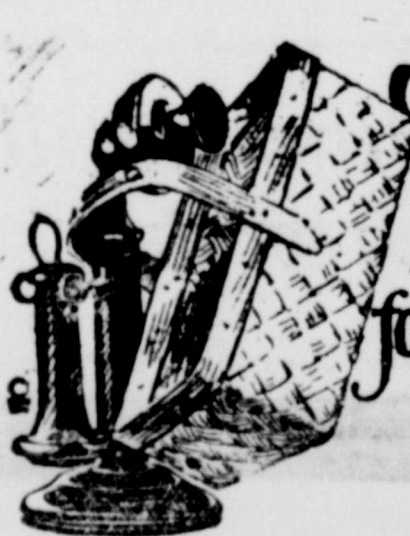
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
