## HICKMAN CLAIMS HE IS 'GREATER THAN CHRIST'

(By International News Service)  
LOS ANGELES, Feb. 3.—"Greater than Jesus Christ" that was the claim made by William Edward Hickman, kidnapper-slayer of little Marian Parker, to Dr. R. O. Shelton, defense alienist, who was on the stand in Hickman's trial today.  
Shelton testified that Hickman kidnapped and murdered the 11-year-old girl to test his powers of unemotionalism.  
Shelton said Hickman made this declaration in his own handwriting.  
"Hickman firmly believed he was under the direction of a special Providence. He would have killed his own mother, if she had stood in the way of his providence. He said he was greater than Jesus Christ," Shelton testified.

## FOLDING AIRSHIP TO TRY LONG HOP THIS SUMMER

(By International News Service)  
LONDON, Feb. 3.—A baby airship, that can be folded up when not wanted, or can, at the end of a journey, be attached to mooring mast brought along in a lorry is due to fly from England to America this summer before the R-100 is ready.  
The airship is not built yet but Lincoln Sutton, managing director of British Airships, Ltd., says:  
"This ship will be flying in June, and at that time I hope to be in it over the Atlantic. We want to be the first absolutely all-British airship to land in Canada. The airship will be of a semi-rigid type. It will take only four months to construct."  
A feature of the airship is that the linen used for the envelope will be dipped in a bath of metal which, it is claimed, will make it tremendously strong, impervious to lightning, fireproof and weatherproof. The vessel will cost \$150,000.  
It is designed to carry thirty people, apart from a crew of six or ten men. Its range would be 1500 miles, and would enable it to cross the Atlantic by making a call at the Azores.

## Engineers are Instructed to Make Water Survey

The first move for a substantial improvement and increase in the municipal water supply were taken this week when the City Commission instructed Forsgard & Davis, city engineers, to begin as soon as possible a survey of a proposed dam site on Elm Creek.  
C. L. Davis, chief engineer, in making this announcement Friday stated that work would start as soon as the surveying on the paving contract is completed.  
City Secretary J. R. Lusk said Friday that he believed it would be some four or five weeks, however, before this work is started. Probably some of the work can be done by the engineers before that time, it was added.  
At present there is no prospective dam site under consideration by the commission, but a tentative site is expected to be selected by the time the engineers finish the street program. It is not known how much water the city will ask the State Board of Water Engineers for, but it will probably be several months before a permit will be asked.  
The water system has been considerably improved in recent years, but as the population of Ballinger increases the supply

## STEWART FACES SENATE CHARGES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Facing a citation for contempt of the Senate, Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of directors of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, today again defied the Senate public lands committee by refusing to reveal any knowledge of the Continental Trading Company's \$3,000,000 Liberty Bond fund.  
The refusal was placed in the record in order of form, the basis of contempt proceedings.  
Stewart flared with anger and threatened to leave the committee room when Senator Cutting of New Mexico, Republican, told him there was a "possible assumption" that he was committing perjury.  
Stewart characterized the statement as an insult.  
Cutting then withdrew his statement.

**AMERICAN AID SOCIETY SENDS 241 PERSONS BACK HOME IN 1927**

(By International News Service)  
 PARIS, Feb. 3.—The annual report of the American Aid Society in Paris shows that a total of 241 persons were sent back to their native land during 1927 and 146 were sent to seaports and to friends. A total number of 693 asked for transportation. One hundred and twenty-five stranded students were helped and 63 stranded seamen. These two classes are usually the ones who ask most for aid. Cables were sent to families and friends in 57 cases; care in hospitals was arranged for 49; 208 beds were given and 601 meals purchased. Twelve positions were secured. The number of cases totalled 1,390, and the society spent 393,892 francs during the year.

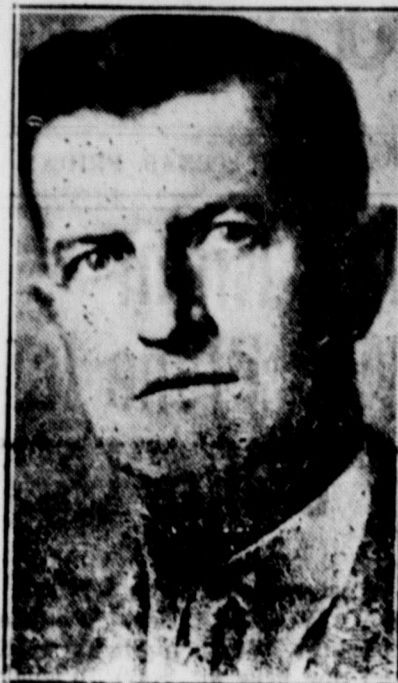

**Taxation Is Biggest Issue, Says Runnels Boy in Governor's Race**

FT. WORTH, Feb. 3.—The question of taxation has been found as the greatest issue in the minds of Texas voters today, according to Louis J. Wardlaw, Ft. Worth attorney who recently announced as a candidate for governor.  
 "Since my first announcement went out I have received literally hundreds of letters from persons, both friends and inquirers, and they all want to know my stand on tax matters," declared Wardlaw.  
 "It seems that at this very time of the year the property owner is more interested in tax matters than at any other time, because usually each voter already has paid his taxes in month of January, or is bothering about where he will find the money with which to pay his taxes."

"Another noticeable thing is that all of these letters show that not only have taxes been increased, in many places to the constitutional limit, but the assessed valuations also increased. This makes the burden on the payer a great deal heavier. That is the reason I pledged in my first announcement that if I am elected governor of Texas that I will not sign for appropriations that will necessitate such an increase in taxation as to make the burden almost unbearable for the tax payers, as is the case now. "Being a land owner myself, I can readily appreciate just what other property owners are facing. "I think the three most important matters facing Texas today are tax readjustments, better educational facilities and roads. "I am an advocate of all three. I favor a tax readjustment in order to not only equalize taxation, but also to reduce taxation by a careful expenditure of

public funds. "I think educational facilities of Texas should be enlarged to afford better opportunities for those in rural communities and small towns where heretofore the best of educational advantages could not be had. "The matter of good roads is one that could not be overlooked by anyone. Good roads have so much to do with our growth and welfare that every man who is a candidate for governor should give road building his closest consideration. "I would be in favor of the creation of several road districts in the state, with a commissioner in charge of each that would be responsible to the people only. "I fact, I would want to give every co-operation to the people that would be possible. I am against a centralized government, which gives to one central body

the right to say what any district or area should or should not do, regardless of the local conditions that might exist."

Wardlaw has been practicing law in Ft. Worth eight years. For 17 years he was an attorney and ranchman in Sutton county, having served six years as county judge at Sonora. Before that, he was a resident of Ballinger, where his father farmed.

Wardlaw still has ranching interests, with ranches now in Val Verde, Edwards and Erath counties. He also has some oil interests in Texas.
