SENTENCE FOR SLAYER DEFERRED UNTIL TUES.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 11.—Contending that William Edward Hickman, confessed slayer of little Marian Parker, who was adjudged sane by a jury, had been deprived of the right of a trial by jury on the charges of kidnaping and murdering the child, the defendant's counsel today demanded a new trial.

Hickman's sentence, which was to have been pronounced today, has been deferred until next Tuesday.

Supporting his motion, Jerome Walsh, chief counsel, recited sections of the federal and state constitutions.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—There were 4,251,507 tons of cotton seed received at the mills for the six-month period ending January 31, this year, as compared with 5,277,668 for last year, the Census Bureau announced today.

CONTRACTORS RUSH PAVING OF 8TH STREET

Paving work on Eighth Street is progressing at a rapid rate with curbs and gutters for two blocks completed and the excavation about finished near the lower end of the street where the paving will connect with other paving in the downtown section.

This work was started two weeks ago and since that time the workmen have not missed a day. Better progress has been made than was hoped for and almost the whole of Eighth Street is now ready for other work.

The present improvement program calls for paving to be done on 25 blocks in the city, on Eighth Street, Broadway and Hutchings Avenue. This job will cost more than \$100,000.

SLUSH FUND IS TRACED TO THE G.O.P. COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Senatorial evidence that \$25,000 of the Continental Trading Company's Liberty Bond "slush fund" had been traced to the Republican National Committee, was laid before the Senate public lands committee today by Basil Manley, who conducted an investigation with government agents acting for the committee.

Manley said the bonds traced were used in payment of a debt of the Republican committee thru Senator Coleman DuPont, Republican, of Delaware.

Senator Walsh immediately announced that Will Hays, movie czar, former chairman of the Republican National Committee, would be called upon to explain the transaction.

40 Miners are Trapped

(By International News Service)
IMMINS, Ont., Canada, Feb. 11.—At least six are dead, and the populace is anxiously awaiting the arrival of a rescue train rushing with a special apparatus in a last desperate effort to save the lives of 40 others trapped in the fire-swept Hollinger mine here.

The only hope, experienced miners say, is that the trapped men might have been warned of the approaching poisonous wave and broke a compressed air hose, thereby getting fresh air.

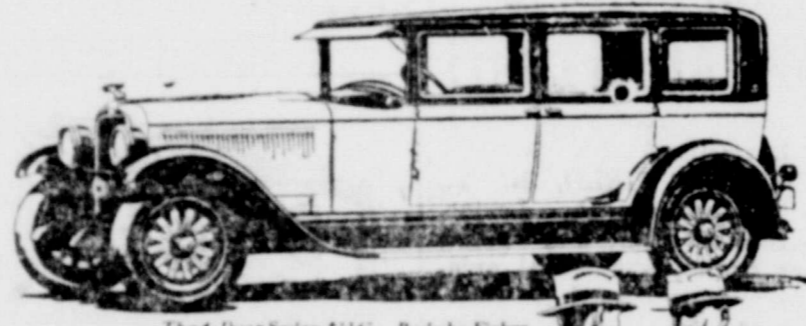
