Five other men are in custody of the police suspected of circulating pictures of the mutilated body of William Edward Hickman's victim.

## ELEVENTH STREET TALKS OF PAVING

Citizens living on Eleventh street are beginning to talk paving and the city commission may be asked within a short time to continue the paving program by including that street. Mine officials said the explosion was caused by escaping gas.

PARIS, Feb. 24.—The old-fashioned Peek-a-Boo openwork motif has returned with the new springtime models now being shown at the smart dressmakers and make women hope for warm, sunny days later on.

It comes on little all-over embroidered jackets to be worn with a coral-colored frock which has touches of blue in the belt and at the neck and wrists. Another in cadet-blue is embroidered in silver and worn with a frock of blue georgette. A black one embroidered in white is worn with a frock of black crepe de chine.

Many attractive color combinations come with peek-a-boo sometimes very small and sometimes very large.

Peek-a-boo effects are also produced by the meeting of scallops and points. A very smart tailored coat-dress in navy-blue flammings is scalloped around the bottom and opens over a front of pleats, white georgette which has

two scalloped bands of the blue on the skirt.

**GENERAL SCOTT'S JAW IS  
PUT ON EXHIBITION BY  
DENTISTS IN CONVENTION**

CHICAGO, Feb. 24.—A model of General Winfield Scott's jaw, the largest known jaw in the world, was placed upon exhibit here at the Chicago Dental Society convention.

The jaw measured slightly more than four inches in diameter or about twice the size of the average jaw.

"The hero of Chapultepec," explained Dr. Ernest E. Dalton, who constructed the model, "had a massive and impressive face. It was the face of a true conqueror, it's wide and heavy jaw bearing evidence to the iron determination of the warrior."

"During his lifetime he was the marvel of contemporary dentists."

General Scott not only figured in the war of 1812 and in the Mexican War in which he dictated the peace terms following the capture of Mexico City, but he was commander in chief of union forces in the Civil War, retaining that post until he retired because

of advanced age.

The model was made from a cast taken at the time of General Scott's death.

## Boys and Girls to Aid Funds For "Constitution"

(By International News Service)  
**CHARLESTON NAVY YARD,** Boston, Feb. 23.—America's school children have already contributed nearly \$500,000 to the fund for the rebuilding of the United States frigate Constitution, victor in forty-two naval battles and the ship that more than any other single unit in the navy, made the present prosperity of the United States possible.

Practically \$300,000 more must be raised before it will be possible to finish the work that has already begun on the wooden ship that earned the title "Old Ironsides" because the iron shot of the enemy's guns caromed from her wooden sides as if they were made of iron.

Navy officers have taken charge of the work of raising the money, as agents of the children of the United States, and in the past two years have sent out over 1,110,000 colored reproductions of Gordon Grant's painting of "Old Ironsides."

### Selling Souvenirs

A large sum of money has been realized from the sale of these reproductions, although the price of each one was only 25 cents. Wood and metal from the frigate have been made and carved into tiny nautical mementoes and sold to many citizens.

It is the intention of the naval authorities to rebuild the Constitution as nearly as possible according to the lines of the original ship as she was sent down the ways of Boston shipyard in 1797.

Her length over all will again be 204 feet and her breadth of

beam, 45.6 feet. Her displacement will be 2,250 tons. The wood used in the rebuilding will be brought as was the original wood, from as many of the states as possible and when the work is completed the Constitution will be the nation's ship, a true representative of all the forty-eight states, not only by the bonds of school children's affection but also in the very material used in her from bottom to mast.

### To Have Regular Crew

Leaving her berth in the navy yard, the Constitution, when she is rebuilt, will be placed in charge of a regular crew of navy officers and navy men and will start a tour of the United States.

"Old Ironsides" will swing down the Atlantic coast from Maine to Florida, Florida to Texas, Lower California to Alaska and finally if it is possible the ship will visit even the Great Lakes ports, entering from the St. Lawrence River.

In every port at which she visits the Constitution will be open for inspection and the school children will be given every facility to visit and see the many relics of a struggling nation that the ship represented in the early years of the nineteenth century.

For seventeen years, 1778 to 1815 the Constitution was the American representative on the seven seas. The suppression of the French privateers in the West Indies was her first commission.

## AIRPLANES SOON TO PASS AUTOMOBILES AS IMPORTANT INDUSTRY

(By International News Service)  
**CLEVELAND, O., Feb. 24.**—That the airplane industry is going to be greater than the automobile industry ever was is the statement made here by William B. Stout, general manager of the airplane division of a large automobile concern. Stout explained that an airplane bought last June costing \$45,000 carried 16,000 passengers at \$5 each and another machine was bought with the profits.

"And think of it, this machine works only three hours daily," he added. Commercial airplanes can now support themselves in the air financially."

Stout asserted that air travel is the safest kind of travel. The

only unsafe feature of air journeying is the taxi ride from and to the airport, he opined.

"There is no more monotonous way of traveling than flying," Stout said. "The traveler hangs up his hat and coat, then when he gets no sense of speed, no thrill of height, 40 per cent take a nap before reaching their destination."

Two new airlines are contemplated in the near future, Stout stated, which will make Cleveland the only city in the United States on two transcontinental air lines. The routes will be east of Pittsburgh and west of Detroit to St. Paul.

## U. S. TOBACCO EXPERTS ASK BIGGER SALARIES

**CAIRO, Feb. 20.**—The charms

of Egypt with all its Eastern lure is not sufficient to attract hard-headed American experts in tobacco-growing whom the Egyptian government wanted to invite. American experts seem to feel that a year in America is worth two in Egypt, asking Egypt to pay them just double the salary which they earn in America.

The Egyptian minister in Washington has informed his government that two experts whom he consulted have asked \$10,000 a year each, although their salaries in America were between \$5,000 and \$5,600.

## British Firm is Given Contract for the Greatest Sluice Gates

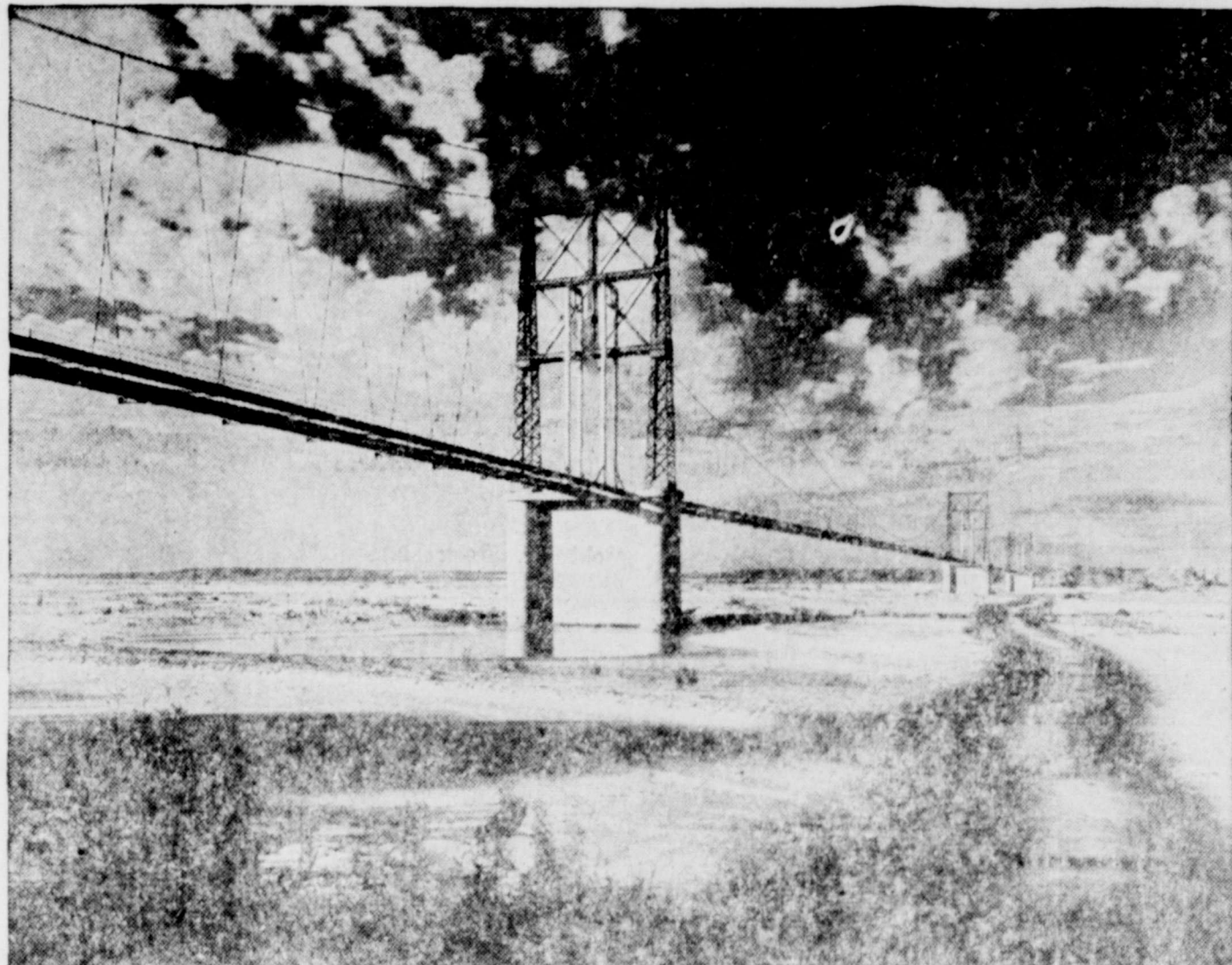
**LONDON, Feb. 24.**—The contract for the sluice gates for the Sukkor barrage, on the River Indus, the biggest of its kind in the world, has been placed by the India Office with the firm of Ransome & Rapier, of Ipswich, England.

A metal gate, 60 feet wide and 18 feet 6 inches deep, will be fitted in each of the 66 spans of the barrage.

The Sukkor barrage will provide irrigation for 6,000,000 acres in the province of Sind. Seven canals will take off the barrage, one of them, the Rohri canal, with a length of 200 miles, being the largest of its type.

Each gate will weigh about 40 tons, and the water load on it when holding up to the full supply level will be 300 tons.

### Harvard Men Study Deserted Mines In U. S. and Mexico

(By International News Service)  
CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Feb. 23.—Harvard men will explore some of the oldest and deepest mines of the new hemisphere during the coming summer in the interests of science.

Professor D. H. McLaughlin, accompanied by two students from the department of geology, will leave here at the close of classes in June and set out for the Sierra Madre Mountains in Mexico. The trip will occupy three months time.

It is the plan of Prof. McLaughlin to explore the depths of several of the ancient gold and silver mines.

He expects to confine his explorations to the Sineloa region, which is near Durango. Little geologic work has ever been done in this region because of the great diversity of relief which makes the mountains practically inaccessible.

The last exploring expedition to this region was started over fifty years ago.

The mines in the Durango region have been standing idle for decades, many of them flooded.

It is the hope of Prof. McLaughlin that a result of the expedition will be the re-opening of the mines as a profitable venture aided by scientific knowledge acquired by the party.

PRUSSIA SUES KAISER FOR \$200,000 CLAIMED OVERPAID ALLOWANCE

(By International News Service)  
BERLIN, Feb. 24.—The state of Prussia is suing its former ruler, Ex-Kaiser Wilhelm, for nearly \$200,000.

The case will be decided by an arbitration court consisting of a representative of Prussia, a representative of the former kaiser, and a neutral.

When after the revolution of 1918, Prussia seized all of its de-throned ruler's possessions, it allotted to the imperial family 50,000 marks a month to live on, pending final settlement of the property question.

In 1920, following a national referendum election in which a proposal to confiscate these properties without compensation had been rejected, Prussia returned half of the seized estates to the kaiser by mutual agreement. Now Prussia claims that Ex-Kaiser Wilhelm should also return to it half of the annuities, minus the loans floated to pay it. This half amounts to 471,000 marks.

### New Ice Stations to Be Erected By W. T. Utilities Co., One Here

The West Texas Utilities have let the contract here for the immediate erection of an ice station on Broadway. The station will be built on the corner lots across the street from Dr. J. W. Bladdell's home.

Mr. Earl Morley showed the Ledger a picture of the type station that is being erected by the company over West Texas and it will be another beauty spot in Ballinger. The building will be a Spanish type house of stucco and tile roof. Cement drives lead to the station and the grounds will be turned into a lawn and flower garden. The work on this station will begin at once and it will be finished in time to serve the ice patrons for the coming season.

New and attractive ice sales stations, of modified Spanish design, soon will be ready to give ice service to patrons of the West Texas Utilities Company in five of the 100 communities served by it.

Contracts for six sales stations, all of the same type architecture, similarly equipped, and almost the same size, have been awarded by the company. Four of the contracts went to Thomas & Montgomery, San Angelo contractors. Two others will be built by W. D. Ford of Munday.

Two stations will be erected at San Angelo, one each at Ballinger, Coleman, Quanah and Vernon. Those at San Angelo will be started this week, while the Coleman and Ballinger projects will be under way shortly after March 1. Mr. Ford will start construction of the Vernon and Quanah stations the last of this week or early next week. All of them will begin operation by May 1.

The stations at San Angelo will be erected at the intersection of South Chadbourne street and Avenue A. The other will occupy a site at North Chadbourne and Ninth streets. That at Ballinger will occupy the north 70 feet of Lot 1, Block 1, Flowers Addition, and that at Coleman will be built on property acquired sometime ago by the West Texas Utilities Company.

Each station will measure 24 by 24 feet and will be of brick and tile, covered with stucco—similar to other ice stations the company has erected in a number of its communities. All walls will be insulated with a four-inch cork board. All stations, except that at Vernon, will have two serving platforms for the convenience of patrons and to prevent traffic congestion. Each will set back some 25 feet from the property

line. Concrete driveways will extend from the streets to the platforms.

The ice vaults in each building will have a capacity of 15 tons. Automatic chutes, which carry ice from the vaults to the platform, will be installed. These chutes make for economy of operation, dispensing of one man. Ice will be stored at the plant in each community so that it can be automatically cut to the proper size by moving the lever to the automatic chute.

Electric signs, with a floodlight at the back focused on the building, will be erected at each station, as well as nine similar buildings of the West Texas Utilities Company in other communities.

The policy also insured against injuries sustained through the wrecking or disablement of a Private Automobile or Horse-Drawn Vehicle not being used for the transportation of passengers for hire or of merchandise for a business purpose; in consequence of being Struck, Knocked Down or Run Over by a vehicle while on a public highway; by Drowning while at a bathing beach at which a life guard is stationed; by the Burning of a Church, Theatre, Library, School or Municipal Administration Building in which the insured is at the beginning of the fire, by the collapse of the outer walls of a building while the insured is therein; or in consequence of Cyclone, Tornado or Lightning, indemnities as follows being payable:—

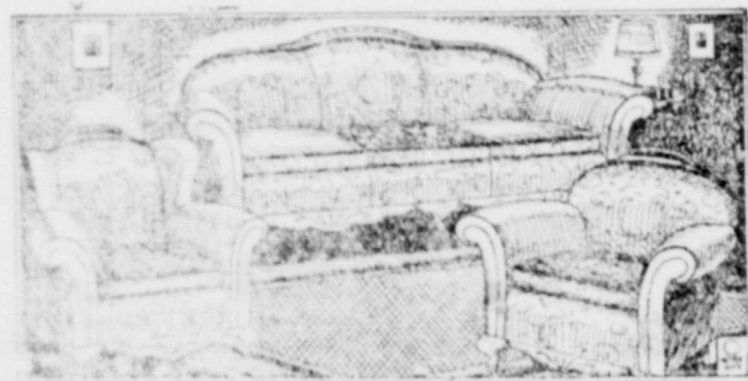

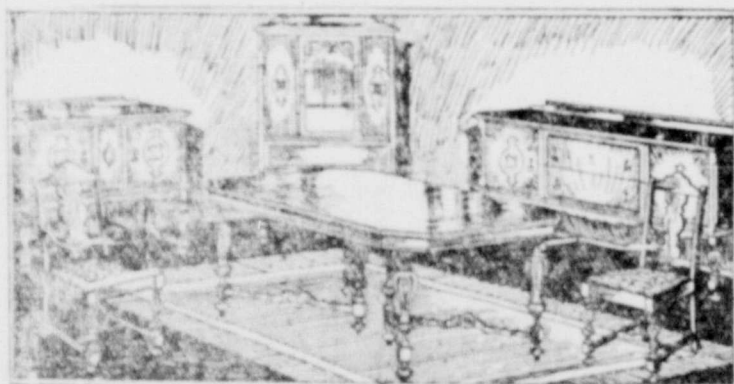
