## 91 NEW CARS REGISTERED IN THIS COUNTY

Ninety-one new passenger cars have been registered in Runnels county during the past two months, according to W. L. Brown, tax collector.

Mr. Brown says this is a very good record of auto dealers in this county.

In January, 46 new automobiles were registered at the collector's office, while in February, 45 new cars were registered. There were no trucks registered in January but in February there were four, they being Chevrolets.

Following is the list of new cars registered:

January: Whippets, 19; Chevrolets, 9; Chryslers, 7; Pontiacs, 5; Dodges, 3; Studebaker, 1; and Willys-Knight, 1.

February: Chevrolets, 15; Whippets, 15; Chryslers, 4; Dodges, 4; Oaklands, 3; Buicks, 2; Essex, 1; Hupmobile, 1; Chevrolet trucks, 4.

Sale of the Whippet cars led all others for the two months period, with some 34 being registered.

## CLOSED SEASON ON SCALE FISH

AUSTIN, Tex., Mar. 5.—Fish in fresh waters are protected by law during the next two months for the purpose of reproduction. Attention to the statutes closing fresh waters of the state during March and April of each year, was directed by Will J. Tucker, game, fish and oyster commissioner.

The law likewise prohibits any character of fishing with artificial lures or the use of seines for the catching of any species of fish during the two months.

Fresh waters of the state are defined by law as including all rivers and streams and all lakes subject to overflow from rivers or streams, whether they be publicly or privately owned.

Special laws prohibit fishing for bass, perch, crappie or catfish during March and April in the counties of Comal, Bexar, Kerr, Bandera, Medina, in the Southwest and along the waters of the Big Wichita river in Wichita, Archer and Baylor counties in North Texas.

In all other districts fishing for catfish and other species other than crappie and bass is permissible, providing only ordinary lines and baited hooks are used.

After the two months of spawning season has closed the spring fishing season will begin in earnest but it will be necessary for all persons using artificial bait to possess a license.

It was unofficially reported that they were bound for St. Louis.

BUFFALO, Mar. 5.—Mrs. Evangeline Lindbergh left here at 9:50 o'clock this morning in a Ford-Stout plane, piloted by Lieutenant Albert Hegenberger, for her home in Detroit.

She was accompanied by four companions.

DETROIT, Mar. 5.—Mrs. Lindbergh and companions landed here shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon.

## EXPLODE GENERAL IDEA YOU CANNOT TEACH AN OLD DOG NEW TRICKS

(By International News Service) CLEVELAND, March 5.—The old belief that adults are unable to learn as quickly as children was "tabooed" here by Dr. A. Caswell Ellis, director of Cleveland College, who discussed adult education with visitors recently.

"Experiments show that adults up to the age of 45 learn the ordinary school subjects more rapidly than children," Dr. Ellis declared.

"The younger the child the longer it took him to learn reading, writing, shorthand, typewriting or whatever the subject."

"It is true that after the age of 25 the rate of learning falls off slightly for adults, but at 45 the rate is only one-sixth slower than it was at 25."

"But on the other hand, the breadth and depth of understanding which the older person brings to his studies, makes his comprehension of the subject vastly superior in many cases."

## TEX-OKLA. LINE SET BY COURT

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, Mar. 5.—The Supreme Court today issued a supplemental order in the Texas-Oklahoma boundary case and more definitely fixing the line.

This makes the Eastern Texas-Western Oklahoma line "the line of the true 100th meridian, longitude, west of Greenwich extending north from its intersection with the south bank of the south fork of the Red River to its intersection with the northern boundary line of Texas as surveyed and marked under the act of 1858."

He urged the passage of the Raikin bill amending the Sherman anti-trust act to give the Department of Justice the power to break up the alleged combination.

**DRIVERS' CODE**

Put chains over tires when streets and highways are slippery. Coasting on hills in bad weather may lead to skidding when brakes are applied.

**New Electric Inventions Include Many Unusual Mechanical Devices**

PITTSBURGH, Mar. 5.—Science, leaping forward in great strides, is recording new inventions and achievements whose very suggestion in the dim and distant past would have excited mirthful ridicule.

In proof whereof there is offered the exhibits which the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Company presented at the mid-winter session of the National Association of Iron and Steel Engineers, attended by 250 experts from all parts of the United States.

Some of the exhibits, developed by Westinghouse engineers, were:

The "Televox"—a "mechanical man" which receives orders over the telephone and executes them automatically, doing such domestic duties as sweeping, dish-washing, etc.

A "Photo-glow" tube—a device which controls electric currents by its sensitivity to light and shadow.

**Counting Shadows**

A "shadow-counter"—an instrument for tabulating attendance. A beam of light was centered on a delicate relay, extremely sensitive to shadows. A person interfered with the light beam, thus casting a shadow on the relay which then operated a meter similar to that on a street car which "rings-up" fares. The working principle of this invention revolves around the "photo-glows."

A cobalt magnet—capable of lifting 30 times its own weight.

A new electric locomotive—which eliminates the "third rail" and overhead trolley.

An automatic rolling mill—a miniature rolling-mill was constructed to show how a billet of steel could be automatically carried through various processes of rolling and shearing. This was done by means of the photo-glow and an ingenious method of time

limit and control which prevented over-straining of motive equipment, speeded production and eliminated more labor and overhead.

Following the exposition of these very latest achievements of Westinghouse engineers, the discussion turned to other inventions which attracted wide attention during 1927. These were:

**The "Sound Analyzer"**

The grid-glow—a current controlling device so sensitive it can be operated by the mere approach of a human hand. It was by means of a grid-glow that the late Judge Elbert H. Gary sat in his office in New York and put into operation the huge new electrical steel works at Homestead at the completion of part of a \$37,000,000 improvement program in the U. S. Steel plants at Homestead, Braddock, Duquesne, and other points in the Pittsburgh district. Judge Gary merely held his hand about two inches from the grid-glow and transferred within a few seconds to Homestead, several hundred miles distant.

A "sound analyzer"—an instrument which picks up the hum of an approaching airplane and automatically turns on the floodlights at flying fields. A dem-

onstrator of this was made at Bettis Field, airmail port, and the flyer was enabled to make a perfect landing on a brilliantly lighted field out of a pitch-black sky.

**GERMAN RAILROADS OFFER COMFORT BAIT TO WIN TRAVELLERS**

(By International News Service)

BERLIN, Mar. 5.—New bait for the American tourist has been prepared by the German railroad company in its new sleeping and dining cars, designed to win the title of the most luxurious in the world. The new sleeping cars are eight feet longer than usual, permitting the beds to be made larger. There are but eleven compartments to each coach.

Each compartment, finished in grade one maple and birch with Gobelin draperies and Persian carpets, is equipped with hot and cold running water, a large mirror and reading lamps. A thick layer of felt under the corridor carpet diminishes the sound of the porter's footsteps. The new coaches are painted a bright red on the outside.

The government tourist bureau reports that during the year just closed more than 100,000 Americans visited Berlin. The authorities reckon on at least 150,000 next year, as the result of their intensive propaganda, of which

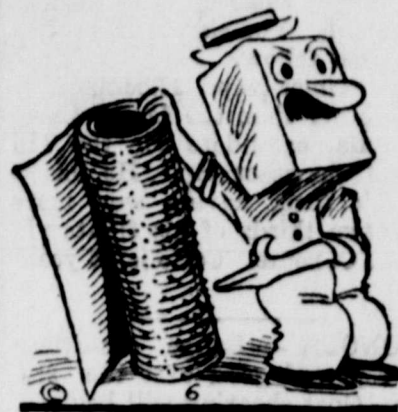
