Says Al Will Get The Votes

HOUSTON, Mar. 21.—Describing himself as a Presbyterian who believed in "hell, hanging and camel," Thomas W. Gregory, former attorney-general in the cabinet of Woodrow Wilson, declared in a speech here before the Smith For President Club that Governor Al Smith, if nominated, might lose "200,000 thin skinned Democratic votes in Texas," but would gain more than double the number in states where no other Democrat would have a chance.
"He will lose his votes where it doesn't hurt to lose them," said Gregory.

Declaring for an uninstructed delegation, Gregory said "The Texas delegation should act as hosts to the visitors from every section, should listen to the views of all our brethren and finally do what is best for the good of the party. We cannot afford to do less than this."

"It is my matured judgment, as it is of the most influential Democrats in the East, with whom I have come in contact, that Smith is the only man we can elect and that he can probably be elected against any man the Republicans may put up."

Ridiculing the fears that some have on the Catholic question, Gregory said "there are many who believe the Pope would be ruling, in event of Smith's election, and strange to say, some of them are still outside the asylum. 'I have sporting blood. Let's give one a chance,' said Gregory.
He pictured Hoover as a man "without convictions on any subject in the world."

Rev. W. S. Maddox, 87, formerly of this city, one of the first Baptist preachers in Rannels county, died Tuesday morning in Austin, according to information received here in the afternoon by a son, Lee Maddox, of this city.

Funeral services were held in Austin Wednesday afternoon, interment being made in an Austin cemetery, where he has two brothers buried.

William Solomon Maddox was born July 4, 1840, in Hunt county. He moved to Grayson county in 1844 with his family and resided there until October 1, 1881, when he moved to Old Rannels, former county-site of this county.

He was the second Baptist minister to serve in Rannels county, preaching in Ballinger, Old Rannels, Coleman, Walthall and many churches in this immediate section.

He was married to Miss Mary P. Baker in Grayson county in 1861. He served in the war between the States, being a member of the 131st Texas Infantry.

Rev. Maddox moved from Ballinger to Coleman almost 30 years ago but visited here frequently when physically able. His wife died some 15 years ago and was buried in the Oak Lawn, Taylor county, cemetery.

Rev. Maddox is survived by six sons: Lee, of this city; Price, of Maryneal; John, of Austin; C. W. of Fort Worth; Holmes, of Lordsburg, N. M.; and Frank, of Lubbock; a daughter, Mrs. Grace Henderson, of Lubbock; two brothers, Joe E., of San Antonio; and B. F., of Tulsa, Okla.; and a sister who lives in Kentucky.

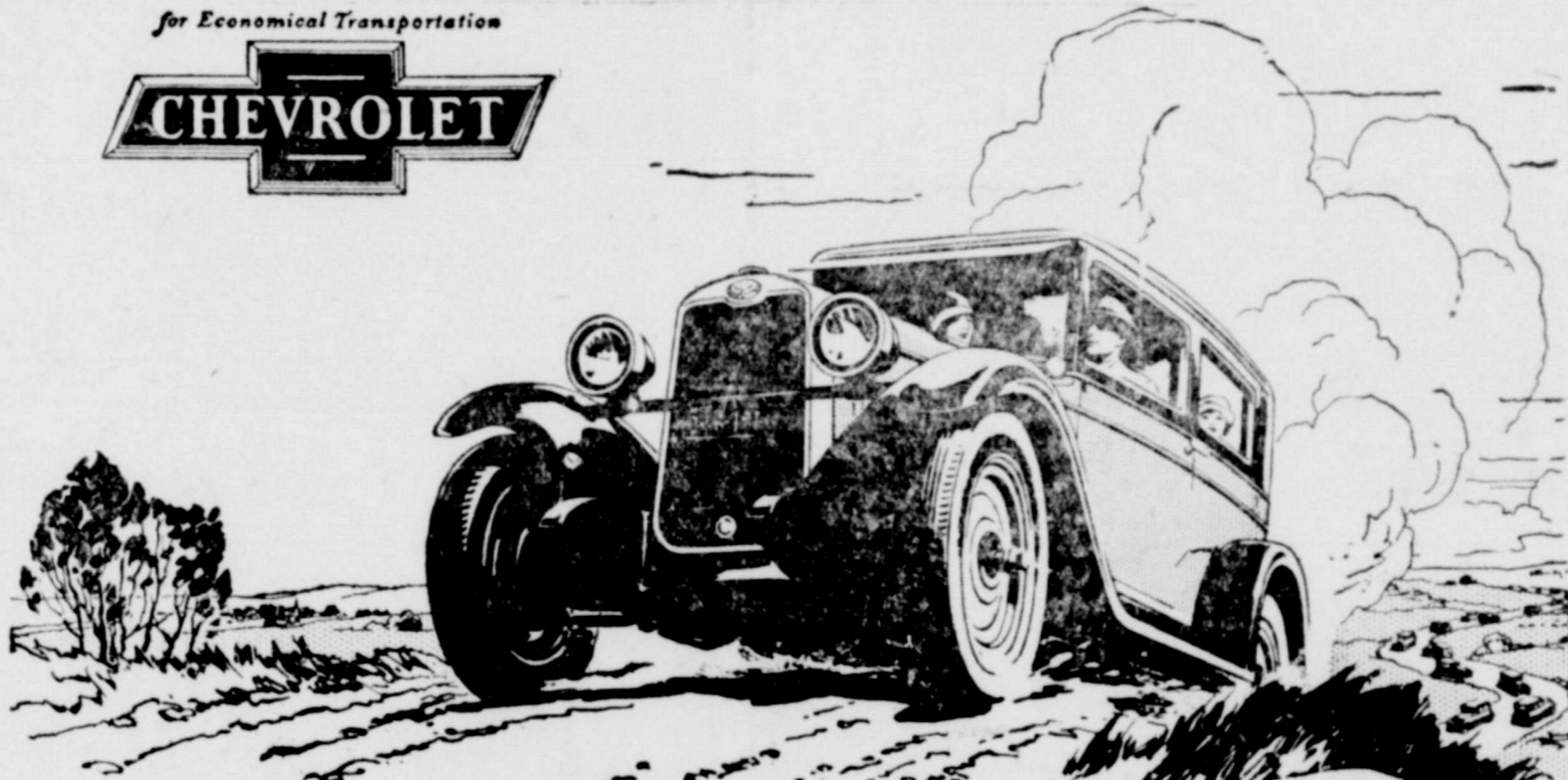

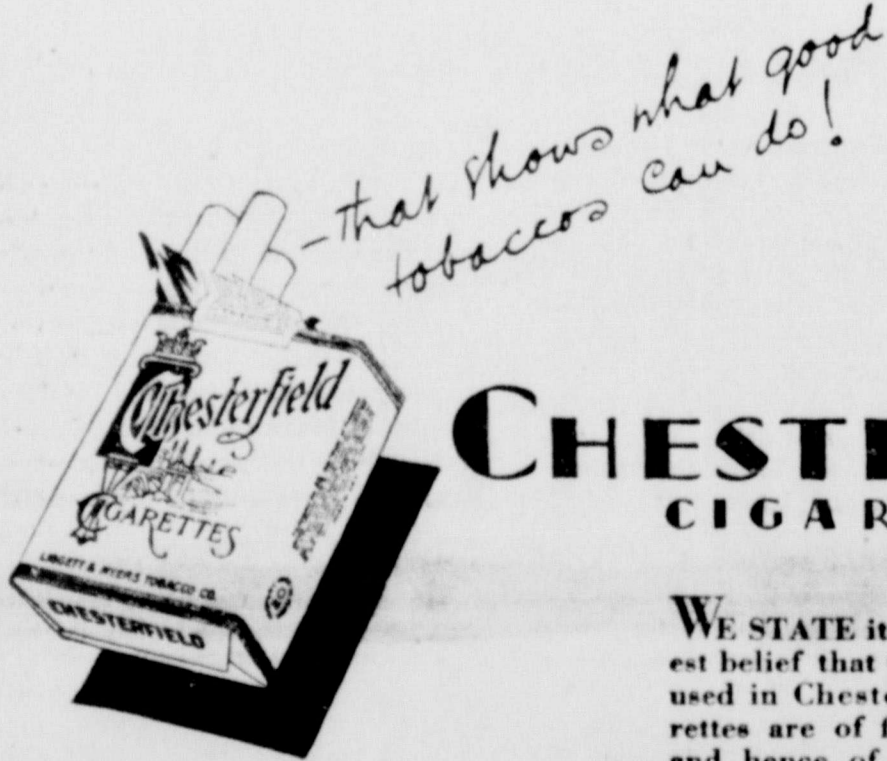

TWO DENVER STUDENTS MAKE OWN TELESCOPE WITH CRUDE MEANS

(By International News Service) DENVER, March 20.—Richard Haber and Cedric Kaub, two Denver youths and graduates of local high schools, have found a hobby in making and using telescopes.

The boys have completed an instrument of surprising precision. They have no instruments with which to measure the curvature of the lens, but it is perfect to one millionth of an inch.

Their entire equipment is composed of a tin can with a hole in it, a razor blade and a kerosene lamp. Powdered carborundum was used to grind the mirror to approximately the right curvature, then a finer grinding material, rouge, was used. The piece of glass would be placed on the top of a barrel, and the youth doing the grinding would walk around and around the barrel, to insure even grinding. It took seven months of diligent labor in odd hours for the boys to complete their mirror reflector.

Their present telescope is powerful enough to separate the two stars that compose the north star as seen by the naked eye.

PAYS BACK MONEY STOLEN 16 YEARS AGO

He blamed Juarez gambling for his loss of the company's money.

LONDON, Mar. 21.—An international conference to consider fixing the date of Easter will probably be called by Sir Austen Chamberlain, British foreign secretary, sometime during the present year.

This is the result of the House of Commons passing without a division the Stabilization of Easter Bill, which fixes Easter definitely on the first Sunday after the second Saturday in April.

Should the bill receive the third reading and pass through the House of Lords, "the government will regard it as an intimation to proceed with certain inquiries," according to Sir Austen, and the "government would be asked to summon a conference of the great international nations."

At present Easter fluctuates from year to year, and it is urged that a fixed Easter will benefit all sections of the community.
