MEMBER INTERNATIONAL NEWS

LOCAL PHONE OFFICE ADDS TO EQUIPMENT

Additional equipment is being installed this week in the local office of the West Texas Telephone Company, M. C. Atkins, local manager, stated Wednesday. A crew of linemen and electricians arrived in Ballinger Tuesday afternoon from Brownwood and started the improvements Wednesday morning.

This work will include the installation of 160 new lines on the switchboard, giving straight lines to 800 members and party line designations to 1,460 members. This improvement is being made with the view of Ballinger showing a rapid growth in the next few months. Considerable improvement was made a year or two ago which company officials thought would take care of Ballinger's communication service for several years, but the country and business in general is developing more rapidly than predicted and augmented service is necessary. This work is but a part of the 1928 building and replacement program of the West Texas Telephone Company in Ballinger and environs.

The Ballinger office now has 1,272 city and rural subscribers, Mr. Atkins stated.

"When the business justifies, we will build lines into the Reeder and Wilke additions, north of the city," Mr. Atkins stated. "We will probably have a number of subscribers in these new residential districts within the next few weeks, but cable lines will not be extended until our list of subscribers increases."

ROTARY CLUB TO GET CHARTER

Members of the Ballinger Rotary Club will attend a banquet at the Hotel Central tonight at 8:15 o'clock, at which time Ellis H. Boyd, of Fort Worth, governor of the 41st district, will deliver the charter to H. C. Lyon, president of the local organization. A fine program will be carried out.

Claude Wild, manager of the San Angelo Board of City Development, will be toastmaster at the banquet.

There will be several speakers from the local club and from other West Texas clubs. Plans are made for an attendance of about 160, with 100 of that number visitors from nearby Rotary clubs. Rotarians will probably come to Ballinger with Mr. Boyd from Fort Worth, San Angelo, Abilene, Brady, Sweetwater, Brownwood and clubs from other cities will probably have representatives.

Members of the Southwestern University Choral Club, appearing here this afternoon at 4 o'clock at the high school auditorium, will have a part on the Rotary program. Local musical talent and readers will also be presented.

President Lyon said Wednesday morning that an excellent program had been prepared and that the local civic organization would start off right. Several luncheons have been held by local Rotarians previous to the presentation of the charter.

Club members will first meet at the American Legion auditorium, at 8 o'clock, and adjourn to the banquet room of the hotel.

President Lyon said an executive committee meeting would be held Wednesday afternoon at the offices of the Chamber of Commerce, at which time Governor Boyd would be present.

JURY TO GET BYRNES CASE LATE TODAY

(By International News Service) SAN ANGELO, Mar. 28.—Testimony in the murder trial of Floyd Newton Burnes, 24, who is charged with the slaying and mutilation of Myrna Juergens, 14, was concluded at 10 o'clock this morning when the defense rested after placing only one witness on the stand.

He was Carl Bussey, who previously had testified for the state. Bussey is alleged to have been the man who rode around in San Angelo with Burnes after the triple slaying.

Judge J. F. Sutton recessed court while he prepared his charge to the jury.

Closing arguments are expected to start about noon and the case will probably rest with the jury late this afternoon.

Byrnese was recently indicted for the death of the Juergens girl, her mother, Mrs. W. J. Juergens, 38, and grandmother, Mrs. Rose Schirra, 62.

HAMER ANSWERS JURY SUMMONS IN 2 KILLINGS

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, March 28.—Captain Frank Hamer, of the state ranger forces, was today summoned by telephone to appear before the Upton county grand jury to tell what he knows about the alleged existence of a "murder ring" in the state.

The veteran ranger recently charged that as a result of the Texas Bankers' Association, paying a \$5,000 reward for dead bank bandits, the ring had been formed to lure innocent men to death through frame-ups in order to collect rewards.

Hamer will leave for Upton county tonight.

TWO KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK

(By International News Service) BONNER SPRINGS, Kansas, Mar. 28.—Two stockmen were killed and five others were injured in rear-end collision of two Rock Island trains at Lorene, near here, this morning.

Charles Lass and R. E. Maxwell are dead.

All were in the caboose which caught fire after the crash.

The man was seen rushing from the place immediately after a shot was fired, with blood dripping from his hands and spattered on his gray suit.

FAVORS GOVT. OPERATION OF MUSCLE SHOALS

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, March 28.—After a year's consideration, the House military affairs committee today formally committed itself for government ownership and operation of the Muscle Shoals power system by the decisive vote of 11 to 4.

The committee voted to floor the new bill of Representative Morin, Pennsylvania, setting up a \$10,000,000 government corporation to operate the project for making fertilizer and production of hydro-electric power.

CONNOR GETS APPOINTMENT

COLLEGE STATION, Mar. 28.—A. B. Connor, acting director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at A. & M. College since 1926, was today appointed director of the station, succeeding Dr. B. Youngblood, resigned, according to an announcement by Dr. T. O. Walton.

Connor is a native of Falls county.

Gibson & Johnson's No. 1-A. P. Serratt, C. M. Carpenter survey, two miles north of Ballinger, was making oil under the swab Wednesday at noon, but H. F. Gibson, in charge of operations at the well, decided to get a control-head before endeavoring to give the well a thorough test. A 200-barrel storage tank has been erected northeast of the well.

Mr. Gibson would not commit himself when asked how much he estimated the well would make but others estimated it was good in its present condition for between 25 and 40 barrels of oil daily.

The hole is standing 916 feet in oil with no water and is making a little gas. When the swab was run the first time Wednesday morning, it did not reach the bottom and when pulled from the hole, blew the line saver from its fastening several feet up the cable.

Core-drilling deepened the hole to 2,332 1/2 feet Monday afternoon. The top of the sand was encountered at 2,325 feet, the top of the pay being reached at 2,328 feet.

Gibson & Johnson have about 950 acres of the original block of about 1,350 acres, after selling some to the Texas Company, who took about 160 acres; the Phillips Petroleum Company, approximately 80 acres; and the White Eagle Oil & Refining Company, about 80 acres.

The well is on the A. P. Serratt farm, of about 200 acres, some 3-4 of a mile east of the Abilene & Southern Railway tracks.

There were a number of land men, scouts and geologists employed by the major companies operating in Texas at the well today.

Swensondale Underreams Swensondale et al No. 1-E. A. Werner, near Benoit, is reported to be completing an underreaming job to land casing at about 2,518 feet. This well is expected to get some kind of pay within the next 80 feet and operators are watching developments closely.

One New Location Agnew & Sons, Inc., have a block of about 4,500 acres six miles west of Ballinger on the

Colorado River and are rigging up to spud within the next few days. The location is on a tract of land in the R. R. Russell estate, south corner of the H. Hallien survey No. 13 1-2.

Others Drilling Vacuum Oil Company's Owenwood No. 1-Fowler, 4,800 feet west of No. 2 McMillan, is drilling around 1,000 feet.

Griswald et al No. 1-Willingham, southwest of the Nos. 1 and 2 McMillan, is "coasting" after cementing casing around 1,500 feet, for the second time.

Marland Oil Company's No. 1-Hamp Byler, west of the city, is drilling at 1,065 feet today.

Marland Oil Company's E. L. Smith No. 1-A. Herring is endeavoring to get a straight hole to about 126 feet. Some trouble has been had but drillers believe this will be overcome with a little more work.

May-Schneider No. 1, three miles east, on the Colorado River, is underreaming to 1,700 feet to land 8 1/4 inch casing with tools in the bottom of the 1,740 foot hole.


McLean et al No. 1-Clayton, is shut down awaiting the arrival of 8 1/4 inch casing to run to 1,080 feet.

Kennedy et al No. 1-Talley, north of the McMillan wells, is drilling around 2,300 feet.


Globe Oil Company's No. 1-J. H. Webb, ten miles down the Colorado River, is understood to have been drilled to 2,500 feet the depth called for in the contract. This well is also coasting.

SIXTEEN DEATHS FAIL TO AFFECT ATLANTIC HOPS

NEW YORK, March 28.—Sixteen lives have been lost in attempts to fly across the Atlantic Ocean, but that will not deter other aviators from trying it again as soon as warmer weather sets in.

Capt. Herman Koehl, the German "ace", is now making preparations to make the westward flight. If he succeeds he will be given a prize of 100,000 marks offered by the Aero Club of Germany.

France has a number of aviators who are eager to try the flight that brought disaster to Nungesser and Gollé, and other brave souls.

Eastward flights are also contemplated this summer even though that trail has been blazed by Lindbergh, Byrd, Chamberlin and others.

ated that he may attempt another long non-stop flight. Cesare Sabelli, Italian war flyer, and another as yet unnamed pilot, plan a New York-to-Rome hop in a new long range Bellanca monoplane.

German Woman to Fly

Thea Rasche, the German woman flyer, intends to return to the United States soon to prepare for a non-stop flight from New York to Berlin.

Of the sixteen persons who lost their lives trying to span the ocean, nine were making the westerly trip and seven were headed eastward when they met disaster.

WILL PUSH TAMPICO-MEXICO SHORT LINE

(By Trens News Agency) TAMPICO, March 28.—Work on the railway line between the city of Mexico and Tampico, known as the Tampico Short Line, is to be pushed as rapidly as possible under instructions from Mariano Cabrera, general manager of the National Lines of Mexico.

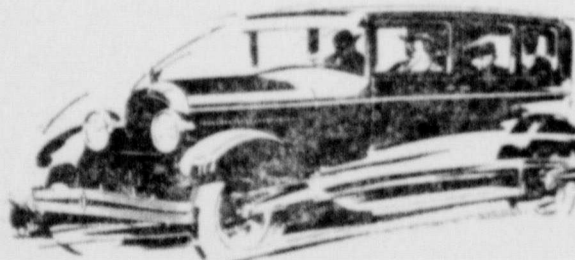

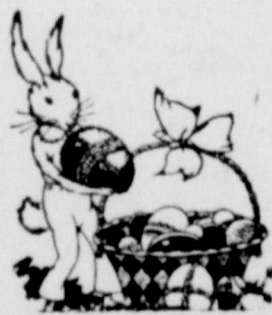

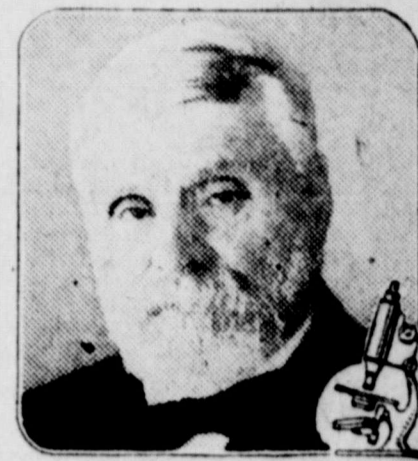
