## OHIO MOURNS FOR SEN. WILLIS

(By International News Service)  
DELAWARE, Ohio, Mar. 31.—Ohio is in mourning today for its favorite son, Senator Frank B. Willis, who died suddenly here last night in the midst of a homecoming welcome prepared by thousands of his fellow citizens.

Senator Willis was stricken by a cerebral hemorrhage and died within a few minutes as he was preparing to make a campaign speech for the presidential preference primary.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Politicians here were shocked at the sudden passing of Senator Frank B. Willis, Republican, of Ohio, and speculation began today as to its effect upon Herbert Hoover's fight for the Ohio delegates. Hoover followers declare Ohio's anti-Hoover forces will disintegrate now that their leader is gone.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Congress adjourned today in a mark of respect to the late Senator Frank B. Willis, of Ohio.

While it is usual for the Senate to adjourn when a member of that body dies, the House adjournment is an unusual tribute. Willis formerly served in the house.

COLUMBUS, O., Mar. 31.—Close friends of Governor Victor Donahey predict that Cyrus Loecher, Democrat, of Cleveland, will be appointed to fill Senator Frank Willis' seat in the United States Senate.

Loecher had already announced his candidacy in opposition to Senator Fess, Republican, in the November election.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Suggesting that there was "something strange and unnatural" in the death of Senator Frank B. Willis, Senator Tom Heflin, of Alabama, caused a sensation today when he suggested to Mrs. Willis that she should have a chemist in whom she had confidence to examine the contents of her husband's stomach.

**IDLENESS NO LURE FOR AGEING JUSTICES OF U. S. SUPREME COURT**

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Idleness and plenty apparently hold no lure for justices of the United States Supreme Court.

The privileges of retirement from the bench at the age of 70 on two-third salary has not been claimed by three of the nine members of the court.

Chief Justice William Howard Taft and Associate Justices Oliver Wendell Holmes and Louis Brandeis all have passed their 70th birthdays.

Many justices of the court, in the opinion of close observers, have refrained from retirement in the past because of the smallness of the pay. With the raise in judicial salaries voted by congress last year, the retirement pay of a member of the court would be more than \$9,000 a year.

Justice Holmes, who recently celebrated his 87th birthday, is the senior member of the bench both in age and in length of service. He has sat on the court for more than 25 years.

Chief Justice Taft observed his 70th birthday last fall while Justice Brandeis is in his 71st year. The youngest member of the court and President Coolidge's only appointee, is Justice Harlan Stone, who is 55 years old.

PARIS, Mar. 31.—The handkerchief still remains one of the most popular feminine accessories and this spring is being worn in as many ways as there are temperaments—which means something!

It comes on everything from the pure sports costume to the evening dress. Large tussor kerchieves painted in Japanese design and cross-barred ones in colored crepe come for morning costumes and wear with plain tailcoats.

Jeanne Lanvin puts the handkerchief on a number of afternoon models. It hangs loosely below the neck at the back, with a little upstanding upper edge. One of the most striking comes in yellow net embroidered in gold paillettes and worn with a frock of yellow tulle.

Yvonne Davidson, wife of the well-known sculptor "Jo," is very fond of the kerchief motif and puts two on several of her models with a hip-yoke, one being knotted at the neck, and the other at the hips. An evening gown of a large printed chiffon has a big kerchief of taffeta printed in exactly the same design.

Large squares of chiffon are edged with lace on two sides to form the initial letter of the fair wearer's name. They are carried as pocketties or knotted about the belt, about the wrist, or hanging over their shoulders. The mouchoir of lace is very smart to wear over low-cut evening gowns at the theatre or in the restaurant.

Chiffon kerchiefs, embroidered with jewels and held in place with a floral spray are worn with suits boasting tailored collars. Some of the most beautiful of fashions are obtained with a large square of lace, the color of the main design exactly matching the frog over which it is worn. One of these shawls which is fastened with two jeweled clasps is edged with a large trail of chiffon and is worn so that the trail appears to be a part of the frock beneath.

**PERPETUAL MOTION IDEA MAY LEAD TO CLOCK REVOLUTION**

(By International News Service)

GENEVA, Mar. 31.—A new bid for the solution of the perpetual motion problem has been made here by a young engineer, Jean Louis Reutter, the son of the municipal treasurer of Neuchatel. Reutter, who has been pursuing his experiments for more than ten years, started by assuming the feasibility of harnessing to clock-work the energy produced by the perpetual motion present in the varying differences of the atmospheric pressure and the temperature. His instrument is really a clock propelled by a metal borometer.

Realizing that the clocks to be used in the experiments must be so constructed that they run with a minimum amount of energy, he set to work, and perfected two clocks which have now been running without stopping and without re-winding for several months. They require only one-thousandth part of the amount of energy necessary to drive an ordinary clock.

The smallest daily variations of temperature and atmospheric pressure are sufficient to keep the clock in motion.

It is believed in clock-making circles in Geneva that the present invention heralds a complete revolution in the clock-making industry, and may lead to very important developments in other branches of science.

The letter is addressed to Mr. Peter Miller, who had told his friend Mr. Perry, then proprietor of the Morning Chronicle (1794) of Burns' impecunious condition.

Between them they settled on a plan for bringing the poet up to Fleet Street. Mr. Perry, it is recorded, very spiritedly made Burns an offer of an annual stipend for his services on the paper, but the offer was refused.
