START PLANS FOR CONCRETE ROADS

Runnels Youth Slaying Cats; Shot to Death

Eddie Verner, 20, son of Tom Verner, farmer of the Oak Creek community, northwestern Runnels county, died Tuesday morning about 8:30 o'clock from a wound received in his stomach when he fell while running across a field to kill a house cat with a double-barreled shot-gun.

It is believed the gun was discharged as the boy fell. He lived for an hour after the fatal shot but was unable to explain how it occurred.

Young Verner had been killing cats with the gun and had slain two of the felines when he was crossing a field to kill a third cat.

Higginbotham Bros. & Co. undertakers were called to prepare the body for burial. Services will probably be held Wednesday afternoon.

1 REPORTED DEAD IN POLL FIGHT

CHICAGO, April 3.—One man was reported to have been beaten to death and two others were seriously injured in an election brawl in Cicero, a suburb of this city, today.

Automobiles loaded with armed gangsters were touring the polling places.

RECOMMENDS BIG TAX CUT

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Secretary of the Treasury Andrew W. Mellon today recommended a maximum tax reduction of \$200,000,000 to congress, a decrease of \$25,000,000 from this October proposal.

In appearing before the Senate finance committee today, Mellon declared his "top" was based upon appropriations already made.

Should congress appropriate \$30,000,000 for flood relief, the maximum reduction ought to be cut to \$181,000,000, Mellon said.

Brewster Co. Won't Plant Cotton in '28

AUSTIN, April 3.—Governor Moody today signed a proclamation making Brewster county entirely a non-cotton zone.

The proclamation also establishes regulated zones in Martin, Midland, Howard, Andrews, Dawson, Ector, Loving, Winkler, Crane, Upton, and portions of bordering counties.

Cotton may be raised under regulations in all with the exception of Brewster county.

SAYS MAYOR CAN NOT BLUFF DRY

WASHINGTON, April 3.—The federal prohibition bureau does not propose to be bluffed out of Chicago by Mayor William Hale Thompson, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Seymour Lowman stated today.

The government is out to clean up Chicago regardless of local politics, Lowman asserted, in branding as absurd the charge that Senator Deneen had inspired the present federal dry raids.

HOUSE MEMBER DIES TUESDAY

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Representative James A. Gallivan, veteran member of the House, Democrat, of Massachusetts, died in Cambridge Hospital this morning, according to advices received by friends here.

Mr. Gallivan frequently took the part of the enlisted man against the officers in the American army during the World War. He was noted as a fiery orator.

Says Harding Knew About Teapot Deal

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Birch Helms, vice-president of the Texas & Pacific Coal and Oil Company revealed today before the Senate oil committee that President Harding was advised thirteen days after the former Secretary of Interior Albert B. Fall had leased the Teapot Dome to Harry F. Sinclair, and that all other oil companies were barred from bidding for the huge naval reserve.

Helms testified that Fall told him three days after the Sinclair lease had been signed that the Teapot Dome would be "held open for another month."

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Former Senator Irvine Lenroot, Republican of Wisconsin, today branded as "absolutely false" the statements attributed to Albert B. Fall that the Republican party leaders had urged the former secretary of interior to conceal the \$100,000 "loan" given him by Edwin L. Doheny, lessee of the Elk Hills naval oil reserve.

Lenroot declared that he urged Fall to "tell the truth."

OIL STOCK SALE ORDERED HALTED

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., April 3.—Fenton T. Stockard, state securities commissioner, today ordered 51 oil companies and agents of other states to cease selling oil stock in Missouri.

None had been licensed to sell in the state.

Stockard declared that the promoters have been using the mails principally to dispose of wildcat stock.

Thirty-one of the companies have headquarters in Texas.

At the regular meeting of the City Commission tonight at the city hall, the matter of paving five blocks of West Hutchings Avenue will be definitely decided, it was learned Tuesday morning.

"This matter will be settled tonight," one of the commissioners stated at noon Tuesday. "We do not yet know just what action will be taken but the question will be discussed and definitely settled."

Paving of Hutchings Avenue calls for the expenditure of more than \$6 per front foot due to the fact that a rainstorm disposal system must be constructed at the same time.

Paving of Broadway and Eighth Street is well underway by Brown & Root, contractors. A concrete crew is now busy laying curb and gutter in the 800 block on Broadway.

Plans are being formulated by the Commissioners Court of Runnels County, and the Ballinger and Winters chambers of commerce for an election to vote bonds for the concrete paving of the two main highways of this county; from the Taylor county line to Concho county, and from the Tom Green county line to the Coleman county line; about 60 miles of road. This matter was discussed at a called session of the board of directors of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce Tuesday morning.

County Judge Paul Trimmier, representing the Commissioners court, was present and laid plans before the chamber. He declared that the county's part in this work would be about one-fourth of the total amount, the other three-fourths to come from the State and Federal governments. An estimate of the total cost of the concrete highways has not been compiled but engineers on this plan will have figures within the near future.

Judge Trimmier declared the Commissioners Court was heartily in line with this program. Each of the four commissioners is said to favor the work and is ready to do his part toward securing such a road.

Within the next few days Judge Trimmier and representatives of the good roads committees of the Ballinger and Winters chambers will go to Austin to meet with the State Highway Commission to ascertain the exact amount which might be expected from the state and federal highway departments.

A. K. Doss is chairman, and C. P. Shepherd and R. E. George compose the local committee, with Mr. Nance of the Nance Motor Company, Winters, chairman of the Winters committee. This plan has been brewing for

PUP "SANDWICH" FLOOR IN MIDDLE OF A LARGE PITTSBURGH BUILDING

(By International News Service) PITTSBURGH, April 3.—A remarkable engineering feat is to be started here soon.

An entire new story is to be "grafted" onto a building by inserting it between the first and second stories, and the 40-year-old granite pillars supporting the

building are to be substituted by smaller steel pillars.

The architectural operation is to be performed on the Granite Building, weight 4,500 tons, height, eight stories, soon to be nine; location, in the heart of Pittsburgh's business district, at Sixth Avenue and Wood Street.

The regular routine of the business and offices in the building will not be disturbed, it is claimed.

Theodore Eichholz, Pittsburgh architect and former lieutenant-colonel in the U. S. Engineers during the World War, has undertaken the task. He says the project will cost about \$200,000 and will be finished within 90 days.

The work of "jacking up" the big building has been let to the John Eichley, Jr. Company, famous firm which has acquired an international reputation for performing "impossible" feats of removal. The Eichley firm, which has moved bridges, buildings and other structures, on one occasion "transplanted" an entire village to a point twelve

miles downstream on the opposite side of the Ohio River.

The plans for the "sandwich floor," as it has been called here, have been approved by the city, the building's owner, tenants, and all other parties concerned.

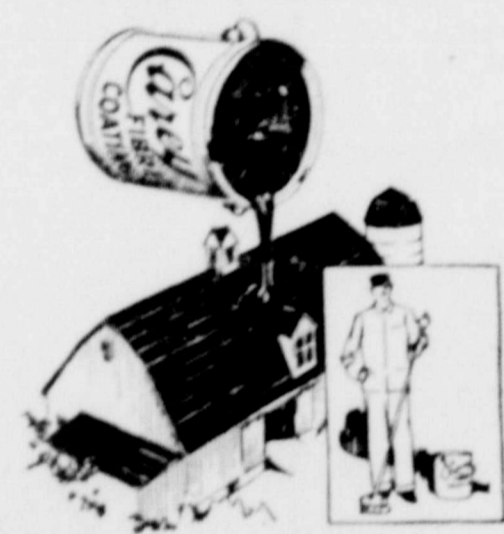

PACIFIC COAST STOCK TRADING WAVE CONTINUES

SAN FRANCISCO, April 3.—The great wave of investment enthusiasm, now sweeping over the Pacific Coast is establishing new records almost daily on the San Francisco stock exchange.

In the first half of March, 1928, the market value of securities traded on this exchange, exceeded \$103,000,000, or nearly 2 1/2 times the value of securities traded on the floor of the same exchange in March, 1927.

The San Francisco exchange today ranks as the largest exchange in the United States outside of New York city, according to Sidney L. Swartz, its president. This position has been attained in less than a year.

In the first 2 1/2 months of 1928, the business on the San Francisco exchange was more than 50 per cent of the volume of business transacted during the entire year of 1927 and exceeded by a wide margin, the volume of business transacted in 1925. The total value of transactions was more than \$346,000,000.

In 1927, the San Francisco stock exchange traded securities with a total market value of more than \$653,000,000.

The story of the remarkable growth of this exchange, really dates from September, 1927. Prior to that time, the market value of

the securities traded averaged about \$30,000,000 a month. In September, the market value jumped to \$84,000,000. In December, the value of securities traded was more than \$131,000,000. In January there was a slight falling off but in February, a short month, with two holidays, an all time record of more than \$142,000,000 was established.

The value of securities traded in March will exceed \$200,000,000. Transactions averaged more than \$9,000,000 a day.

NEVADA BANK LOOT MISSING FROM CACHE REVEALED BY BANDITS

VIRGINIA CITY, Nevada, Apr. 3.—Who got the \$30,000 loot taken in the sensational robbery of the Virginia City Bank and buried it in a remote spot in Six-Mile Canyon?

This question baffles officials here.

The men who buried it, now serving five to twenty years in the penitentiary at Carson, don't know. The bank and surety company officials don't know. County officials don't know. No one knows—apparently.

Robbery of the Virginia City bank last October supplied a sensation. A second sensation came with the conviction of Charles Fitzsimmons and George Moore, accused of the robbery.

W. O. Heinrich, consulting criminologist of Berkeley, contributed to their conviction by proving in court that hairs found on certain articles corresponded with theirs—one of the articles being a cap found near the bandits' abandoned automobile in

Six-Mile Canyon.

Facing 20 years in prison, Fitzsimmons and Moore decided that to reveal the hiding place of the bank loot would mean a shortening of the sentence. So they drew a map showing the exact whereabouts of the cache and asked that the money be dug up and returned to the rightful owners.

The searchers, including five prominent citizens and a surety company representative found the cache.

They found the tin can in which the money had been reposed.

But they did not find the \$30,000.

Mystery was added to the strange disappearance of the money because the cache was in a spot which defied detection. One might range over the hills for months, walk over the very hiding place, and never see it, investigators declared.

PARIS IS PLANNING BIG RECEPTION FOR QUEEN MARIE SOON

PARIS, April 3.—Paris is getting ready to receive Queen Marie of Rumania this spring. Rumor has it that she is starting out on a lengthy voyage to find a husband for her youngest daughter Ileana. Paris will be her first stop where she will undoubtedly see her son, Prince Carol who is now living in a chateau in Normandy. From there she will go on to Spain and then to England.

Paris will not find the beautiful queen who came to visit and shop in former years. Since the death of Ferdinand, she has been living a quiet and solitary existence. She is no longer the fa-

mous coquette of other days. Her face is much paler and shows its wrinkles. She receives visitors rarely.

The Queen-Mother, Helen of Greece, occupies herself almost entirely with the education of her small boy-king, Michel. Her health has recently improved and it is no longer feared that she will lose her eyesight.

Prince Nicholas is a great hunter and does little besides ride through mountain and valley in search of game.

(By International News Service) INDIANAPOLIS, April 13.—An international 24-hour automobile speed duel will be staged on the Indianapolis Motor Speedway on April 16th when America's fastest stock car will compete with Europe's speediest creation on wheels, for a \$25,000 stake.

A Stutz Black Hawk automobile piloted by Gil Anderson, who recently established an American speed record of 106.52 miles per hour in such a car on the Daytona Beach in Florida, will race with a Hispano-Suiza car driven, according to advance reports, by Charles T. Weyman, famous de-

signer of automobile bodies. Both Anderson and Weyman will have relief drivers.

The forthcoming race grew out of an argument between Weyman and F. Moskovic, president of the Stutz Motor Car Company, at the Paris, France, automobile salon, over the relative merits of American and European cars.

Both Weyman and Moskovic have posted \$5,000 forfeits in case of non-appearance.

A crowd of 30,000 to 50,000 motorist enthusiasts is expected to witness the race.

ARTIFICIAL GAS FROM SOFT COAL FOR AUTO POWER

By George L. Carey

(International News Service Staff Correspondent)
 PITTSBURGH, April 3.—Automobiles of the future may purr their ways over super-highways, propelled by artificial gasoline made from soft coal, when the predicted shortage of oil has become a reality.

Discussion of methods for achieving this goal will probably form one of the principal topics of discussion at the Second International Conference on Bituminous Coal, here November 19th, under the auspices of the Carnegie Institute of Technology.

Fleets of transcontinental airplanes may sail over dead and forgotten oil fields and over factories operated with a new and smokeless fuel made from the black wealth in the hills of western Pennsylvania and surrounding states.

Invited to Conference

The entire modern world is interested in these changes which will have an incalculable effect upon the future of bituminous coal and nearly all foreign countries represented in Washington have been invited to send delegates to the coming conference.

Although more than 1700 delegates from thirteen different nations were present at the first conference held in 1926, officials of the school look forward to larger delegations and a more widespread representation this year.

In the Old World educational centers Dr. Baker is investigating new sources of scientific information and inviting the foremost fuel technologists to add their knowledge to the vast store which will be assembled at the coming proceedings.

It is reported at the institution that Dr. Baker has already received several acceptances from prominent European scientists.

Smokeless Fuel

In Nature's stores of soft coal technologists expect to find the key to smokeless fuel, fertilizers made from coal, low and high distillation processes for the production of useful products and gasification of coal.

All of these subjects and others equally important were discussed at the first conference and this year scientists will come bringing news of further progress which has been made toward the various goals and new fields

which have opened to their view. In its constant press onward civilization has overcome all obstacles which the pessimists of the various ages believed would bring the downfall of civilization. The extinction of the whales would cut off the supply of oil, they said, and man bored into the bowels of the earth for a new and greater supply of oil.

"The supply of natural gas will soon be gone," they mourned, "and we will be without good lights." Giant streams were harnessed and compelled to release their perpetual surge of power to light millions of lights better than those supplied by gas and give power which it had never possessed.

So now while pessimists are predicting that the cars of the future must stand idle beside empty oil wells, science is preparing to open the way to a field of cheap fuel so plentiful that before the last of the great oil fields is drained, petroleum may be of no more commercial importance than whale oil.

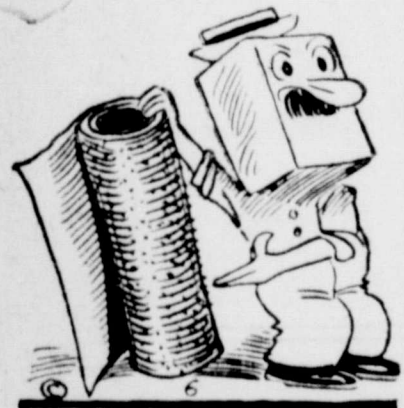

TO CONSTRUCT NEW BUILDING FOR PASTEUR INSTITUTE

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, April 3.—Construction of a suitable building by the state for the establishment of a health laboratory for the state health department to replace the Pasteur Institute now situated in a building at the Austin State Hospital, will soon be under way, according to announcement by Dr. J. C. Anderson, state health officer.

The last legislature made an appropriation of \$25,000 for the purpose of buying the necessary land and building and equipping the building. It was found, however, that the state owns half a block of land situated on East Fifth Street, and acting under an opinion by Attorney General Claude Pollard, the Board of Control has turned this land over to the state health department on which to construct the building.

This action obviated the necessity of having to buy additional land on which to erect the structure. The laboratory of the state health department and the Pasteur Institute will be combined and housed in the new building.
