CLAYTON DENIES MARSH CHARGE

WASHINGTON, April 4.—A previous general denial that 172,000 bales of cotton shipped to New York storage in the 1926-27 cotton season was "culled" out of millions of certificated bales in order to produce a low grade pool that would "drug" the New York futures market was supported before the Senate investigating committee yesterday by specific figures as to the actual grade and condition of the stock.

William L. Clayton, Houston cotton trader, accused by Arthur R. Marsh of the New York Cotton Exchange of having assembled the cotton in New York as a market club, informed the committee that the stock was today the "most desirable cotton in the world," and that the only reason it was not moved out to consumption in two years was because of the "bad situation of New York as a spot cotton market."

HOUSTON, Apr. 4.—When Will L. Clayton returns to Houston from his fight in Washington against charges of manipulating the cotton market, he will be given a testimonial dinner in the nature of a vote of confidence by the Knife and Fork Club.

(By International News Service) SAN FRANCISCO, April 4.—Attorneys for William Edward Hickman today began drawing up an appeal to the Supreme Court from the death verdict imposed on the youth for the slaying of little Marion Parker, 11-year-old schoolgirl.

HEAR DEATH AFTER BLAST

(By International News Service) RANGER, April 4.—Cecil Turner, 28, is near death in a hospital here with the upper part of his body covered with burns received in a mysterious explosion at his place eight miles north of here.

The authorities found no trace of an explosion around the house. Members of Turner's family would not relate the details and Turner has made no statement.

TAX IS CUT TO 12 PER CENT

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, April 4.—The Senate finance committee today voted to cut the present 13 1/2 per cent corporation tax to 12 per cent in the new tax reduction bill, after two unsuccessful attempts had been made by the Democratic members of the committee to cut the tax to 11 or 11 1/2 per cent.

HAS NEW ARMY HOUSING BILL

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, April 4.—Representative James, of Michigan, today introduced a new army housing bill for construction of air service posts in 1930. The bill totals \$8,500,000.

The following recommendations are for Texas: Duncan Field, San Antonio, \$323,000; Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, \$206,000; primary flying field, San Antonio, \$911,500.

ATTORNEY DIES OF SHOT WOUNDS

(By International News Service) SHERMAN, April 4.—The body of Frank J. Kim, county attorney of Marshall county, Oklahoma, who died last night in a local hospital from gunshot wounds was today forwarded to Madill, Okla.

Kim received the wounds following a dispute with Sheriff Ed Long, of Marshall county, Monday of this week.

MADILL, Okla., April 4.—Sheriff Ed Long had himself locked up today following the death of County Attorney Frank J. Kim, last night at Sherman, Texas.

DEATH VERDICT IS AFFIRMED

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, April 4.—The case of O. T. Alexander, convicted wife murderer, of Harris county, was affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals today.

Alexander was convicted in the district court on July 6th, last, and sentenced to death.

RUMOR SAYS TROTZKY DYING

(By International News Service) LONDON, April 4.—Unconfirmed reports were widely circulated here today that Leon Trozky, one of the founders of the Soviet government, had been shot by an assassin in Russian Turkistan, where he was exiled.

Trozky is reported to be dying.

See New Uses for Cotton in Increased Building Operations

RAWLEIGH, N. C., April 3.—Rapid growth in home ownership and the willingness of state and municipal governments to undertake extensive public improvements should be reflected in increased consumption of cotton in the United States, according to E. C. Morse, in charge of the New Use section of the Cotton-Textile Institute.

Mr. Morse was a speaker here recently in the annual textile week celebrated by the textile school of the North Carolina State College.

"In the last decade we have witnessed a tremendous growth in home building throughout the country," Mr. Morse said. "It has been estimated that in the last three years an average of \$2,500,000,000 has been spent each year for residential building. It is reasonable to state that a very large proportion of this investment in homes has been made by individuals to whom cotton fabrics have been a very practical necessity.

"When homes are built, as they are being built in this country, there are bound to be additional requirements for materials to be used in furnishing them. The modern home requires a great variety of cotton fabrics just as definitely as it requires bricks or wood or hardware. There are draperies to be hung, furniture to be covered, beds to be made, towels to be used and numerous other ways in which cotton textiles serve as household necessities.

"Just now when there is so much interest in color for interior decorating, it is worth noting that more attention is being given to the exterior of the home. Here again, cotton is extremely useful for awnings with

Oil Showing Encountered Near Lohn

Special to The Ledger:

SAN ANGELO, April 4.—Promising oil paying sand was encountered Tuesday afternoon in the Tulsa Drilling Company's No. 1, J. J. Kirkpatrick, survey No. 1187, six miles northwest of the town of Lohn, McCulloch county, at a depth of about 420 feet, according to advices received here today from the well.

The well bailed four barrels of oil, graded at 39 gravity, 60 degrees, and no water. The bit had penetrated the sand only about a foot. Setting casing was underway today and the rigging of a new line was also in progress which indicated the well would probably be deepened this afternoon.

Chas. F. Newson, San Angelo, is secretary-treasurer of the Tulsa Company, and is in charge of operations. At present he is making headquarters in Coleman county.

REQUEST FOR GUARDS REFUSED

MOODY SCOUTS ADRIEN IDEA

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, April 4.—Gov. Dan Moody, in a prepared statement today, scouted the idea advanced by Frank Adrien, representative of the American Book Company, that the school fund may lose several hundred thousand dollars through failure of the textbook commission to make the geography adoption.

"I am skeptical of Adrien's professed desire to conserve the school funds of Texas," Gov. Moody stated. "He is more interested in selling high-priced books for the firm he represents than in saving money for Texas school children."

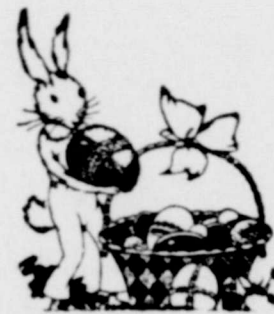

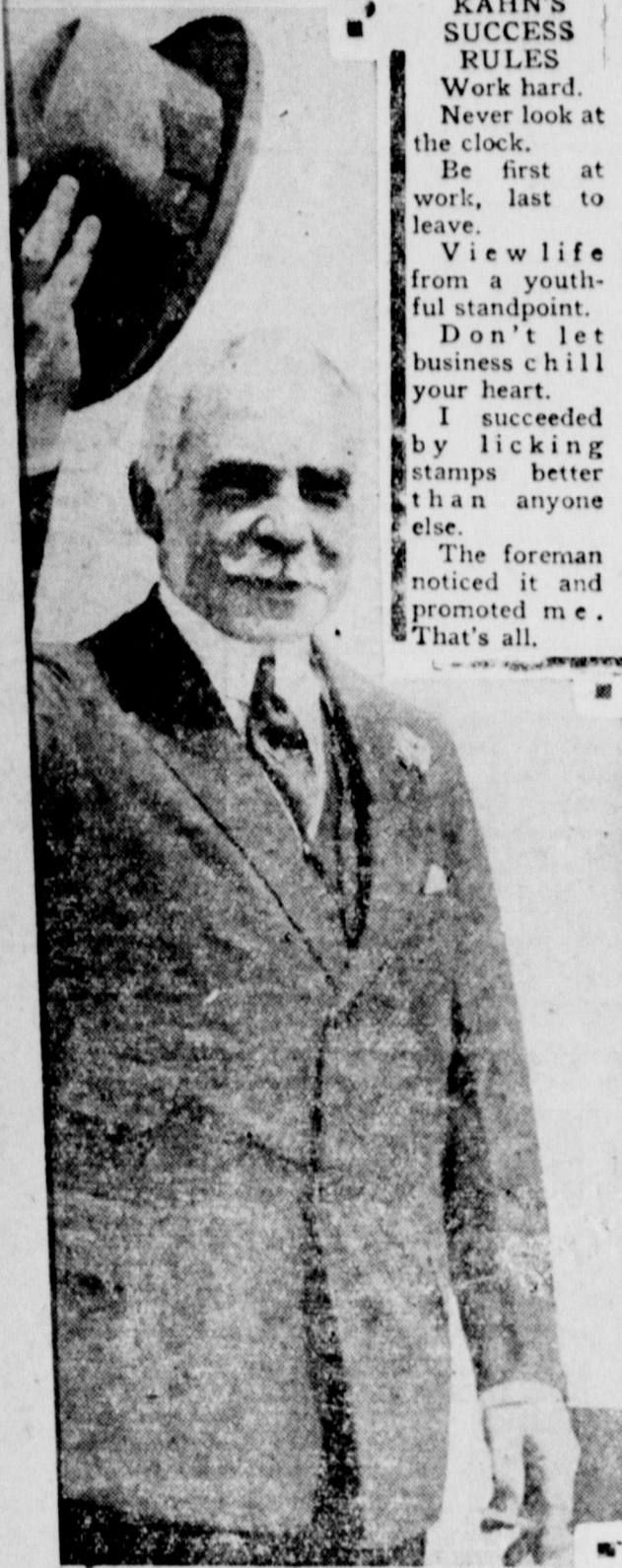

"BOOTLEG BONDED" GIVES DISTINCTION TO NEWEST VARIETIES OF LIQUOR

(By International News Service)
 PITTSBURGH, April 4.—Prohi-
 bition has brought another new
 term. It is "bootleg-bonded,"
 and denotes all that species of
 liquor which, while known to the
 purchaser as not to be the real
 bonded article and sold at a price
 below the original, yet is replete
 with official-looking labels and
 seals.

There was a time when a cheap-
 ly printed label slightly re-
 sembling that used on some brand
 of "fond memory" was sufficient
 guarantee for any bootlegger to
 furnish that his was the "real
 stuff."

In the place of the "Four
 Roses," "Old Crow," or "Rum's
 Head" of 1908, the liquor of 1928
 appears under three brands—
 "moonshine," "bootleg-bonded,"
 and "real stuff."

Under the first classification
 are said to fall all of the poison-
 ous varieties which have given
 bootleg liquors the reputation
 they bear. It is in the second and
 third classes that the majority of

prohibition disinters find their
 solace and it is here that the pro-
 gressive dealers vie with one
 another in their efforts to give
 their product that highly-desired
 genuine look.

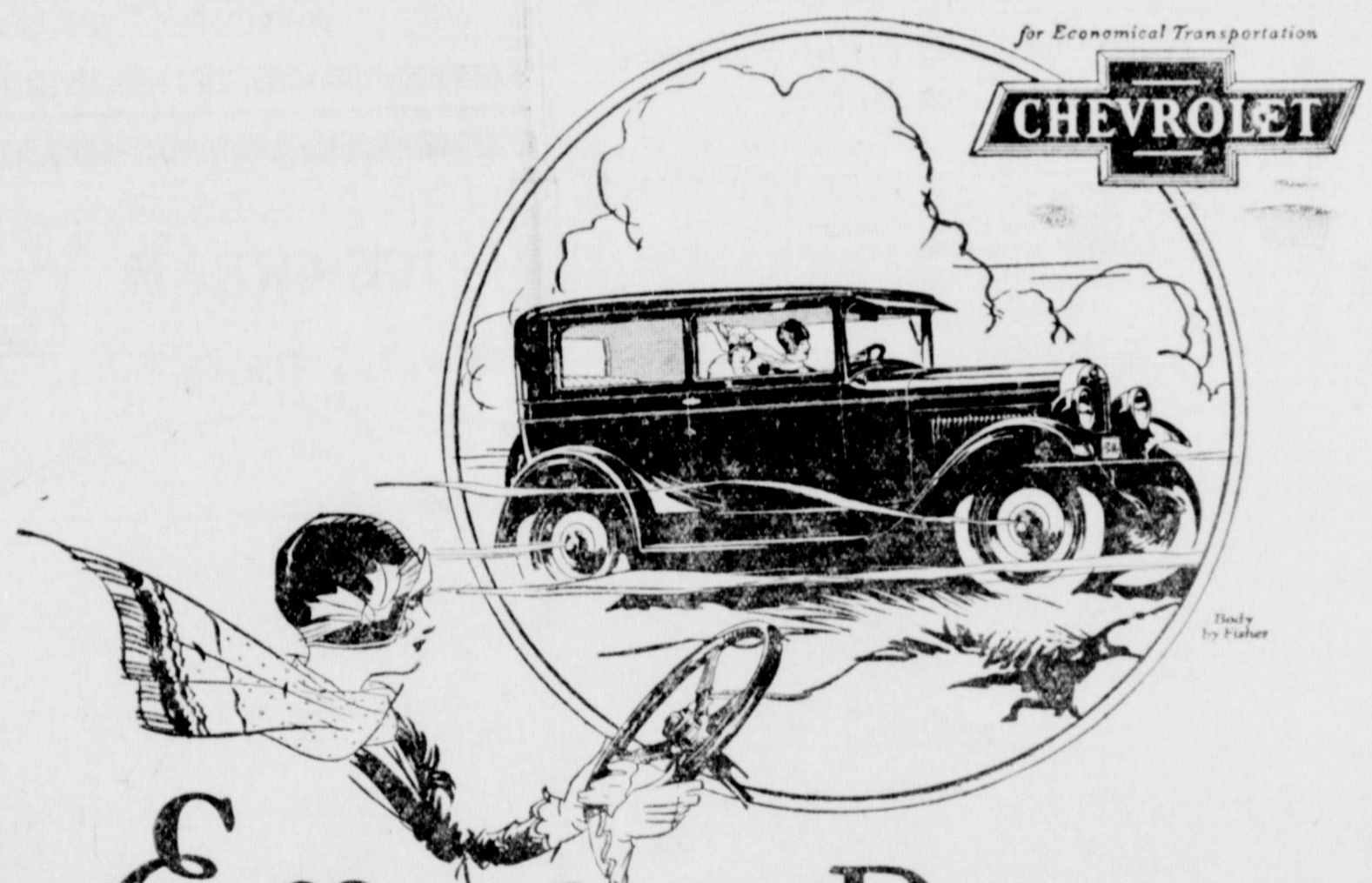

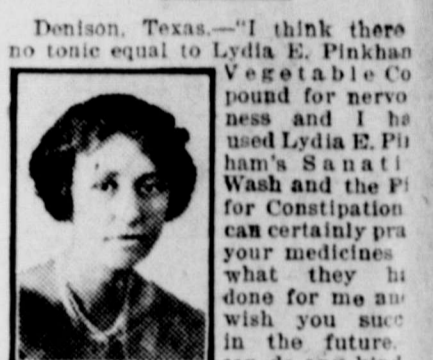
Orville Wright, who with his brother, the late Wilbur Wright,

GALVESTON TO ATTRACT BEAUTY IN BEACH SHOW

Contests now are being held in Mexico, England, Belgium, Luxembourg, Spain, France, Canada and other countries to determine the creme de la creme of pulchritude in each nation preparatory to entering them as contestants here.

California, Oregon and Washington will represent the beauties of the West Coast of the United States, while New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania will send "ambassadors" of beauty from the East Coast. Several of the interior states are sending beauties, too.
