ROAD COMMITTEE GOES TO ABILENE FOR MEET

County Judge Paul Trimmier, R. E. George, C. P. Shepherd, J. D. Motley and probably others from this city with representatives of the Winters Chamber of Commerce went to Abilene Friday for a meeting with State Highway Commissioner W. R. Ely and Gib Gilchrist, highway engineer.

The meeting is for the purpose of ascertaining as near as possible the extent of aid for concrete roads in this county from the State and Federal governments.

A. K. Doss, chairman of the local committee, was unable to go to Abilene today but was there on other business Thursday and had lunch with Judge Ely and Mr. Gilchrist.

"They told me we had to do something," Judge Doss said. "Judge Ely said that every county in Texas and Oklahoma from Tulsa, Oklahoma to Del Rio, Texas, had fallen in line with the concrete work with the exception of Runnels and Edwards counties. That if we did not get busy and build a concrete road from Taylor county to Tom Green county over highway No. 30, that the State and Federal governments would build a road direct from north of Winters into the highway west of Miles and completely cut out Ballinger."

Judge Doss believes something must be done immediately.

VICTORIA BOND ISSUE APPROVED

S. Barnett, were seriously injured. They are recovering in a Coleman hospital.

The Coleman National Guard Thursday donated eleven tents and a number of blankets for use by the victims. Food and additional clothing were also donated. Some fifteen houses were in the path of the tornado.

Quite a number of chickens were killed and blown away but other farm stock did not suffer.

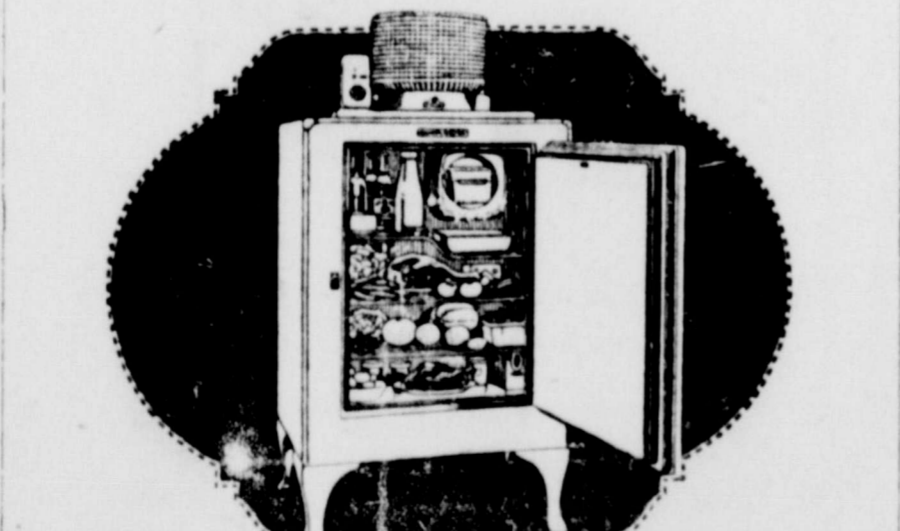

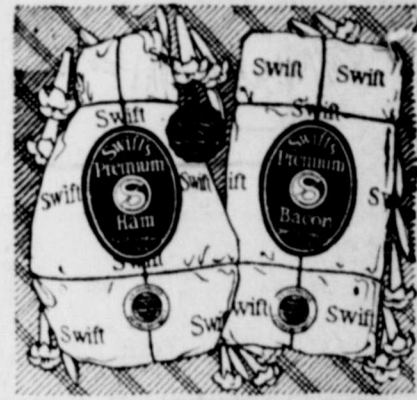

DEATH TO SEAL OLD SECRET OF 'HELL BENDERS'

DENVER, April 6.—The mystery of what became of the "Hell Benders," probably can never be solved as the result of the death here of Col. A. M. York, who was instrumental in bringing about the downfall of the multiple murderers.

The "Hell Benders," composed of John Bender, Sr., his wife, John Bender, Jr., and a mysterious daughter Kate lived on a farm in Kansas. Whenever a traveler stopped with them, he usually was never seen again. Col. York's story, also verified by Edmund Pearson in a book on notorious murders of the early days, disclosed that his brother, Dr. William H. York, of Independence, Mo., left his home on horseback for Fort Scott, Kans., the home of the colonel.

Never Seen Again

When Dr. York reached the home of the Benders, he stopped for the night. This fact was proven by neighbors along the road who had talked with Dr. York before he stopped.

Dr. York was never seen alive again. The colonel, believing the Benders guilty of foul play, started an investigation. He was led astray by information furnished by John Bender, Jr., that bandits had been seen in the neighborhood and that they had shot at several people. Col. York investigated, but found no trace of any bandits.

When he returned to the home of the Benders, the place had been deserted. Then he knew he was on the right track. He, with twelve men, searched the premises and found a trap door in the floor of the kitchen.

Cellar Graves

Underneath was a dark cellar and a secret tunnel leading to a sunken garden where Dr. York's and ten other bodies were found buried.

Immediately, the men, led by Col. York, set out in search of the Bender family. When they returned, all were silent as to either their success or failure. Other than a great number of knowing glances cast by members of the "law enforcers," no one had ever said a word concerning the fate of the Bender family. It was generally believed that Col. York and his men hung the entire Bender crew.

Col. York was the last to die of the party. He was 91 years old.

STEFANSSON ON MEAT DIET SAYS IT GIVES ENERGY

NEW YORK, April 6.—Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Arctic explorer, has been subsisting for two weeks on a 100 per cent meat diet.

"It's O. K.—for me at any rate," he said at the end of the twenty-third day.

In fact, he "felt a little more energetic" than when he started.

Stefansson has been eating nothing but meat for so long a period for the purpose of scientific demonstration. The experiment was conducted by the Russell Sage Institute of Pathology as part of extensive study of diets which it has been carrying on for the past fifteen years. The institute wanted information on the effects of an exclusive meat diet on head production and blood pressure.

Gains Weight

Karsten Anderson, who accompanied Stefansson on many of his arctic expeditions, went him one better. He has been living on nothing but meat for nearly two months. At the end of that time Anderson reported no change in his physical well being.

"I gained a few pounds, but I was otherwise unaffected," said Anderson.

The experiments were con-

ducted in New York city. The diet consists of steak, roast beef, and tongue. Calf's liver was prescribed once a week.

"I'm convinced that the meat diet is an excellent one, but I would not recommend it for everyone," said Stefansson. "It would be too expensive. The meat of various kinds which I have been consuming is equivalent to three sirloin steaks, and might cost \$5 and \$6 a day at current restaurant prices."

No Harmful Results

Stefansson said he wanted to prove to skeptical vegetarians that he could live on an all-meat diet in New York's temperate climate without harmful result. He remarked that the meat-eating Eskimos usually die of old age or injuries and that as a rule they are well-built, being neither thin nor fat.

While Anderson gained weight, Stefansson lost five pounds. When Stefansson started on his meat diet he felt lackadaisical about getting up in the morning. Now, he said, he "feels like jumping out of bed and getting to

work."

Stefansson and Anderson plan to continue the meat diet indefinitely. The experiment is in charge of a committee of twelve physicians, headed by Prof. Raymond Pearl of Johns Hopkins. The committee found no evidence in Stefansson of high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries, kidney trouble or other ailments attributed to meat eating by some doctors. Anderson was also found to be in good physical condition.

EAGLES HAVE NO FEAR OF ROARING AIRPLANES

CLEVELAND, April 6.—A pair of bald American eagles living high in the crotch of a red oak tree on a farm in Clyde, O., which is on the air-mail route west of Cleveland, have no fear of planes, according to John Barr on whose place they make their "home."

Sometimes these large national birds take the air when a plane flies over their nest and follow it for several miles; and frequently the big birds sit on a limb, just roll their eyes upwards at the giant featherless bird which has usurped their airways.

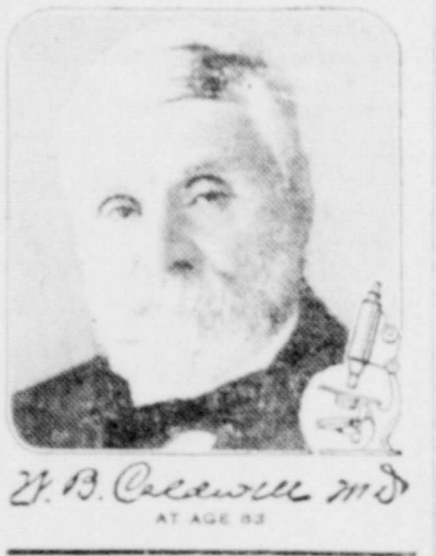
