## NEW WELL TO START WEST OF CITY SOON

Announcement was made here yesterday morning by H.C. Agnew of Mineral Wells, that drilling would be started in about one week on Agnew & Son's 4,500-acre block, several miles west of Ballinger on the north bank of the Colorado River. Rigging is now underway and operations will be started in about a week, Agnew stated.

This lease takes in about all of the Russell estate up the river and a few other tracts. Agnew & Son also have a commercial lease on all of the old Smith ranch, on the Colorado River.

The new location is about 508 feet from the south line and about 90 feet from the east line. H. Allen survey, section 13 1-2.

**Serratt Not Settled**  
Gibson & Johnson's No. 1-A, P. Serratt, two miles north of the city, which has attracted considerable attention during the last few weeks, has not yet been brought in as a settled producer. It makes oil at intervals, but operators believe the hole to be good for a producer of 25 barrels daily or more.

The tubing and rods have again been placed in the well after it was shot with ten quarts of nitroglycerine and cleaned out this week, but a bumping test has not been given the hole since.

The corrected steel line measurement gives the total depth at 2,347 feet, with four feet of sand, from 2,343 to 2,347 feet. The shot was given from 2,342 to 2,346 feet last Thursday.

Attehorn No. 1-King, north of city, is underreaming around 10 feet to lower 5-inch casing. The total depth of the hole is now around 3,400 feet.

Griswald et al No. 1-William, 2,300 feet southwest of the McMillan wells, is drilling below 800 feet.

Marland Oil Company's No. 1-Mump Ryler, three miles west of Ballinger, is drilling around 523 feet after setting 12 1/2 inch casing to 1,380 feet.

Vacuum Oil Company's Owenwood No. 1-Fowler, west of the McMillan producers, is drilling around 1,500 feet after setting 12 inch casing.

## NUECES COUNTY GETS STATE AID

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, April 7.—State aid on two projects totaling \$42,000 were awarded in Nueces county at a recent meeting of the State Highway Commission, it was learned today.

Twenty thousand dollars was for drainage structures on highway No. 12-A, one mile west of Agudule, and \$20,000 for the building of 1.2 miles of roadway to Corpus Christi on Highway No. 16.

The county pays one-third the cost.

## COL. G. G. ODOM IS HURT IN FALL FROM A HORSE

Colonel G. G. Odom, about 76 years of age, pioneer of this section, prominent ranchman and landowner, is at his home on Ninth Street here today, recovering from what may prove serious injuries received when he was thrown from his horse while riding in a pasture at his ranch northwest of this city.

Col. Odom, his wife and daughters, Mrs. John Currie and Mrs. Conda Wylie, were spending a few days at the ranch and Mr. Odom was out riding in the pasture about 7 o'clock in the evening, looking over some cattle when his horse ran under a telephone line and knocked him from his mount to the ground.

Col. Odom sustained an injured collar bone and other injuries. It was feared at first that he had suffered internal injuries and he was removed to the ranch home, where a local physician was summoned. He was removed to his home in this city early Saturday in an ambulance. He was reported to be resting very well at noon.

## EIGHT ARE DEAD IN FIRE NEAR CISCO

CISCO, April 7.—Residents of the Biz section are horrified today over the burning to death of R. N. "Boss" Jackson, his wife and six children, at Dothan, five miles west of here last night.

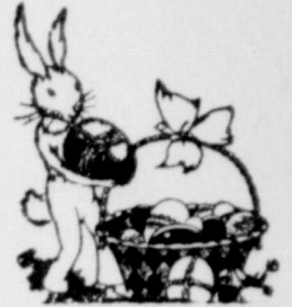

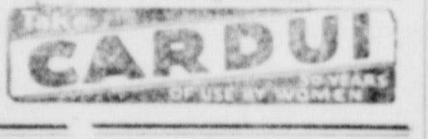
