DAIRYMAN IS CHARGED WITH KILLING BABY

AUSTIN, April 10.—Murder charges were filed today against Gus Mueller, dairyman, who Saturday afternoon confessed to burning the body of a six-day-old baby of Mary Pat Zelt, his 15-year-old step-daughter.
Mueller is also charged with kidnapping.
Mueller's brother, Jacob, whom the girl charges is the father of her child, is charged with criminal assault.

GERMANS BUILD GIGANTIC PLANE FOR U. S. FLIGHT

LONDON, April 10.—Dwarfing in size all existing heavier-than-air machines, a gigantic new plane designed to inaugurate an air service between Germany and America is now being constructed in secrecy in Germany, according to information reaching the intelligence section of the Air League of the British Empire.
The plane, which will be fully described in the April issue of "Air," the official organ of the league, is declared to be revolutionary in design, with a wingspan of 158 feet and a complement of 12 engines, developing 6,000 horsepower.
The secret of the machine was revealed by Brigadier-General P. R. C. Groves, secretary-general of the Air League, in an interview.
Persistent Rumors
"During the last few months," he declared, "there have been persistent rumors regarding this machine. We have now obtained exclusive information, which we are publishing in the April issue of 'Air,' our official organ.
"The craft, which is a flying-boat, and inaugurates a new phase in aircraft design, is under construction in the works of the German Dornier Company, situated on the Swiss side of Lake Constance. It is expected that it will be completed by the end of this year.
"The wing-span of the machine, which is a monoplane, will be approximately 158 feet, and its weight when fully loaded about 44 tons.
"The working crew will comprise nine men—two wireless operators, two pilots, a navigator, two engineers and two stewards.
"Seating and sleeping accommodations will be provided for fifty passengers, and there will also be a dining saloon.
Flying Boat Service
"The machine will inaugurate a German flying-boat service across the Atlantic Ocean to New York. The provision of a number of power units, instead of a single engine, greatly decreases the chance of a forced descent, and even if such were to occur the boat would be able to ride out rough seas while wirelessing for help.
"Germany is determined to create a mercantile air marine in the shape of great metal flying-boats, which will capture the ocean traffic of the world."

CHICAGO "TWO GUN" ELECTION IS ON TODAY

CHICAGO, April 10.—Hardly had the polls opened when the police department received reports of machine guns barking on the West Side, where hoodlums and gangsters attempted to intimidate the voters this morning.
A dozen election workers were kidnapped, one man shot, and several ballot boxes reported stolen.

CHICAGO, April 10.—The issues were being fought out today in Chicago's widely heralded "two-gun" election. The major parties' candidates for United States senator, governor, and the usual run of state and county offices are being chosen.
Thirty-five thousand special guards and the full police force were mobilized here to preserve order at the polls.
Before midnight the police department dispatched 80 detective bureau squads to search for Titus Haffa, Thompson ward leader, who had been reported kidnapped.
Fair weather prevailed for today's balloting.

OIL CASE GETS UNDERWAY MON.

WASHINGTON, April 10.—The tale of graft and corruption "reaching to the very roots of the government," was unfolded today as the criminal branch No. 2 of the District of Columbia Supreme Court opened for the Harry F. Sinclair, oil magnate, conspiracy trial.
Owen J. Roberts, government special counsel, addressed the jury, outlining transaction whereby Sinclair obtained the Teapot Dome lease from the former secretary of the interior department, Albert B. Fall, and charged that a bribe of \$233,000 motivated the deal.
Daniel Thew Wright, Sinclair counsel, told the jury that this United States naval reserve was being drained by adjacent oil wells. He claimed that Fall, former Secretary of Navy Edwin B. Denby and President Harding were interested in saving the oil for the navy.
WASHINGTON, April 10.—Thomas W. Miller, former alien property custodian, now under a jail sentence on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the government, today was subpoenaed by the Senate Teapot Dome investigating committee.

FORMER GOV. DIX IS DEAD

NEW YORK, April 10.—John A. Dix, governor of New York from 1910 to 1912 died here today. Dix was 67 years of age.

FORTY-TWO NEW CARS REGISTERED IN MARCH

One Willys-Knight and four Chevrolet trucks were registered. The total number of passenger cars registered since October 1, 1927, is 4,749, while 388 trucks were registered in the same period.

WINGATE STILL HAS A PUBLIC WEIGHER OFFICE

County Judge Paul Trimmier said Tuesday morning that the Wingate precinct was still entitled to a public weigher, if the people wanted one. A false impression was created some time ago in a story appearing in The Ledger in telling about the various changes in public weighers, and justice of the peace precincts, causing Wingate citizens to believe they had lost the public weigher's office.
"It has not been abolished," Judge Trimmier said, "but a weigher has not been elected in that precinct in about fifteen years."
Commissioner's precinct No. 2 embraces the territory covered by the justice of the peace precinct and the public weigher's precinct, Judge Trimmier declared.

AUSTRIA WANTS A NEW CREDIT

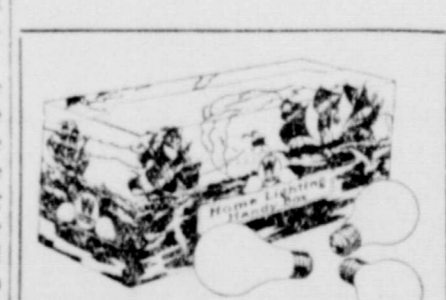

FLOOD BILL IS IN DANGER

WASHINGTON, April 10.—President Coolidge feels the flood control legislation is endangered by entanglements which seriously menace the hopes for adequate relief measures in the present congress, it was stated at the White House today.
Coolidge believes that the present compromise Jones-Reid amended bill will entail ultimate expenditure of \$1,500,000,000 against the original army plan of \$300,000,000.
He also believes that placing the entire cost on the federal government involves a dangerous precedent.

Eaton, formerly county agent of Runnels county, and a real booster for the cause, has just been elected president of the All Southwest Dairy Show at Lubbock, and the show will be given a place in the State Fair at Dallas next fall. Dairying is rapidly becoming the big sideline on the farms of West Texas, and Runnels county is keeping pace with the best of them.

Automobile accidents are on the increase. For the week of March 24-31 in Texas 77 persons were injured and 27 killed in auto accidents. From January 1st to date there were 1552 injured and 389 killed in Texas. For the same period last year the injured numbered 1229, and killed, 374. Some of these were in the unavoidable class, but a large majority of the hurts and deaths were due to recklessness. The casualty list can be reduced if motorists will use their heads more and their feet less.

CRYING AND CREEPING ESSENTIAL PARTS OF BABY'S GROWING UP

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., April 6.—Crying, creeping and kicking are an essential part of the growth of any baby.
On this fact, Dr. John E. Anderson, head of the University of Minnesota's child welfare department, and Dr. William A. McKeever, also a Minnesota University child specialist, are agreed.
Crying, according to Dr. Anderson, is a part of the exercise which aids a child in growing physically, and unless children cry excessively, parents need not get worried about it.
Kicking is also a part of the process by which infants naturally develop, according to Dr. Anderson. Loose garments which will allow the child to kick vigorously were recommended by Dr. McKeever.
Creeping was described as an essential part of the child's development, and parents were warned against being "persnickety" about soiled dresses and mischief.
Crying, kicking and creeping are the "divine" rights of children," Dr. McKeever said.

FRANCE AND ALGERIA ARE CONNECTED BY TELEPHONE

PARIS, April 10.—Direct communication between France and Algeria was established when Minister of Commerce Bokanowski in Paris talked with Governor General Bordes in Algiers over radio-telephone.

Hot Oil Treatment Keeps Marceline Day's Hair Beautiful

Rub it Well Into Scalp, Then Steam Hair Before Shampooing it

IN spite of the daily use of grease paint which is applied even to the roots of the hair and the occasional wearing of wigs, Marceline Day's hair remains beautiful and lustrous. She declares that this is due to simple hot oil treatments which she takes at home.

"In making the hair beautiful," says Miss Day, who plays the leading feminine role in Lon Chaney's starring vehicle, "The Big City," for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, "the wise idea is to literally go to the root of the matter. Hot oil nourishes the roots and therefore makes the hair itself beautiful.

"About once a month I give my hair the following treatment: The hair should be parted all over the head, the parts being about an inch and a half away from each other. Mix together the same amount of olive oil and mineral oil and add a few drops of oil of tar. This mixture should be heated until it is quite hot, but will not burn the scalp. Rub it into a small rubber stiff brush

and apply the oil in each part rubbing it in well with the fingers until it is all through the roots.

"Soak a Turkish towel with very hot water, wring it out and wrap it around the head. This should be done eight or ten times. Allow the oil to remain on for two or three hours or until the scalp has absorbed it. The hair should then be shampooed in the regular way, using a good soap or liquid.

"If the hair is given daily care with a brush and shampooed once every two weeks, this is the only treatment necessary to keep it beautiful and the veritable crowning glory."

PHIL SCOTT CLAIMING LEGAL RIGHT TO MEET TUNNEY IN ENGLAND

LONDON, Apr. 10.—Phil Scott, British heavyweight champion, and ex-horizonal champion, is the legal contender for Tunney's title, in the opinion of Charlie Rose, Scott's manager in London.

In an interview he declared: "I think Heeney will have to prove that he is superior to Scott before the British public will give a heavyweight contest their support in sufficient numbers to enable Tex Rickard to satisfy Tunney's financial demands.

"Apart from that," he added, "I am of the opinion that it would be an insult to the intelligence of the British public, as Scott has beaten Heeney twice, to overlook the British champion's claim to a match in this country with Tunney."

HERO TO STAY IN ARGONNE GRAVE

NILES, O., April 10.—The body of Private Daniel Jones, of Niles, member of company G, 59th infantry, will remain buried near the Argonne where he was killed in battle Oct. 4, 1918, at the request of the soldier's mother, Mrs. Mary Jones, who has just learned of the discovery of Daniel's grave in France. Jones' body lies in an isolated spot in Bois de Faye, Meuse, France. Identification was made by means of a dog tag around the war hero's neck.

Mrs. Jones plans to visit her son's grave this summer as Uncle Sam's guest along with other Gold Star mothers.

PARIS RAISES RENT ON GROUND AT THE EIFFEL TOWER FOR FIRST TIME

(By International News Service)

PARIS, April 9.—Things are always going up at Eiffel Tower but the rent there has begun to rise for the first time since 1889, the year it was constructed.

The four sides of the tower enclose 600 square yards for which the Eiffel Tower Company pays \$200 a Year. This amount is about the annual rental of a maid's bedroom in the adjoining apartment houses. City fathers have just discovered the assessment for Eiffel Tower has never been revised.

For three years the surface of Eiffel tower has been used for an electric automobile advertisement, so the revised assessment may set a new world record.

American Engineers To Offer Plan For Uniform Traffic Light System

(By International News Service)

NEW YORK, April 9.—Street signs, signals, and markings will be the same in all the cities of the United States, and confusion in traffic control will be wiped out, if recommendations in a report by the American Engineering Council are carried out, it was announced today by A. W. Berresford, president of the council.

Motorists will be assured of standards as a result of a nationwide survey, in which conditions in more than 100 cities, with a population in excess of 35,000,000, were exhaustively investigated, according to Berresford.

"Recognizing the wide variation both in type of signs, signals and markings and in their meaning," Mr. Berresford said, "The American Engineering Council, working in co-operation with the Conference on Street and Highway Safety, aims to eliminate the maze of colors, shapes, and meanings that has been attached to every conceivable accessory for the regulation of traffic."

Signals Vary

"The State of New Jersey has written part of these recommendations into a uniform state law now before the legislature, which, it is expected, will be enacted during the present session."

"Almost every motorist has had the experience of driving through several cities on a single day's trip, finding different signal systems in each city. He has found that these different systems, with different light arrangements and in different locations at the crossings, have actually meant different things for the same color light."

"In driving about the country, motorists will find green-yellow-red systems, in which the yellow means that all traffic is to be halted and pedestrians are to go, in which a five-second cautionary or warning interval is indicated, in which only right or left hand turns can be made, or in which he will also have to wait for a bell

to ring before proceeding further.

"When the green comes on he is doubtless as badly confused because when he wants to turn to the left in Washington, he must first pull over to the right and wait for the light to change, whereas in the next large city he comes to, Baltimore for example, if he wish to turn left on the green light he pulls over to the left hand side of the street and weaves through oncoming traffic."

"His problem would be expected to be solved when the red comes on, and he would doubtless stop, but in some places, like Atlantic City, red actually means 'Go' for all who wish to turn to the right at intersections. In at least one other city he will find a single red light that will come on and demand that he stop, when he can proceed the red light simply goes off."

Lights of Many Colors

"Who has not driven from city to city to find red, yellow, green, white, blue and other colored signs in every conceivable shades used in traffic control. Shades as numerous as colors, and messages of greater variety and content may be found on the signs."

"Pavement markings are less numerous in color and word arrangements and locations, but they are nevertheless widely diversified in various cities."

"All of this American Engineering Council has aimed to correct by recommending a comparatively few standards which, it is intended shall be of great assistance to tourists, to municipal officials, and to manufacturers of the various products—a real public service if the recommendations can be carried into effect."

The work of the American Engineering Council's Committee on Street Signs, Signals and Markings has been under the direction of W. B. Powell of Buffalo, N. Y., traffic engineering of Baltimore, serving as chairman, and A. C. Oliphant of Washington, D. C., executive secretary.



CHICAGO BUILDS AERIAL BEACONS TO HELP FLIERS

By Francis L. Armstrong
(International News Service Staff Correspondent)

CHICAGO, April 6.—Two aerial beacons, each the largest of its kind in the world, will light the way of aviators seeking Chicago.

Atop the new Morrison Hotel, 638 feet in the air, Mayor Thompson's Lindbergh Light will be constructed shortly.

The Roanoke Beacon, a gigantic vertical beam will be erected 520 feet above the street on the Roanoke building, according to an announcement just made by Walter Greenbaum, Chicago broker and aviation enthusiast.

The plan for the Roanoke beacon has been approved by the Department of Commerce at Washington, according to Greenbaum, and specifications for the Lindbergh Light will be submitted to the department and to the bureau of lighthouses shortly.

Work Begins Soon

Work on the Roanoke beacon will begin in June, and the light will be ready for use in July, according to present plans. The beacon, to rise on a steel tower 45 feet above the Roanoke building, will throw a single shaft of red light into the sky.

The Roanoke beacon, according to its designers, will penetrate fog which often drifts in from Lake Michigan, and will be visible for at least 100 miles on a clear night. An auxiliary beacon will be pointed toward the proposed lake front field to direct the fliers after they have reached the city.

Neon tubes, arranged in twenty-four units, will supply the light for the vertical Roanoke beam which will be, literally, a forty-five foot tower of light.

There will be no conflict between the two beacons, members of the Mayor Thompson aero committee said.

"The Lindbergh Light will be a white, revolving light visible for 287 miles," one member of the committee explained. "The Greenbaum beacon will be stationary and red, giving it fog penetrating qualities."

"In fact, under these plans Chicago will have two splendid airplane beacons, each the largest of its kind in the world, and they will make Chicago one of the safest cities in the country for night landing."

For Night Flying
Construction of suitable beacons

for night flying was felt necessary here because of the fact that Chicago is becoming one of the country's largest aerial terminals.

Mail and commercial planes are landing here on night trips constantly. Because of the dangers involved in flying over Lake Michigan, it was explained, huge beacons pointing out the location of the city from a great distance have become necessary.

The two lights, when built this summer, will constitute a big step in development of the city as an airport, it was understood.

As soon as plans for the Lindbergh Light are approved by the Department of Commerce, the city is expected to appropriate \$20,000 for machinery to generate power, and construction of the light will follow immediately.

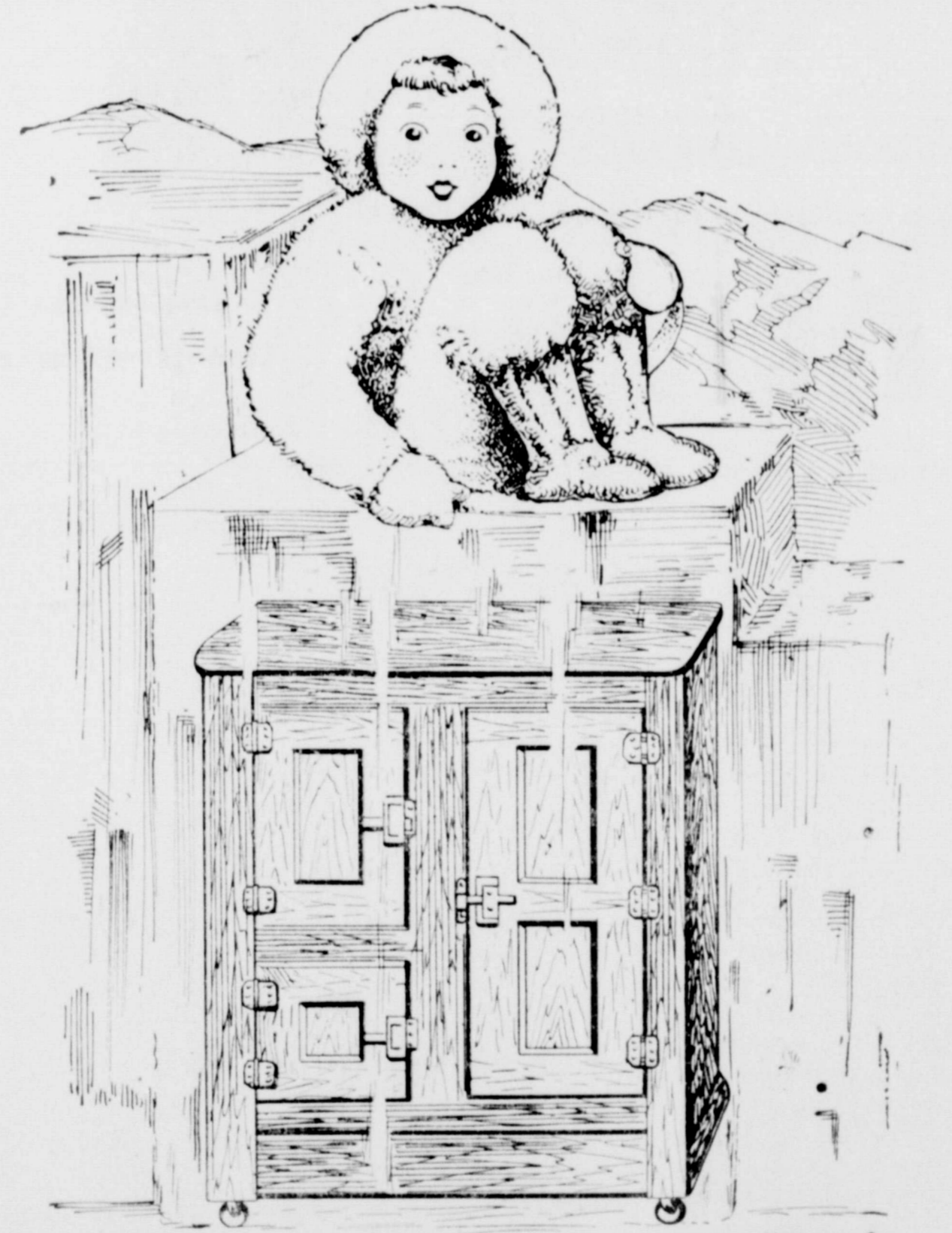

\$6,500,000 in New Highway Work Since January 1st, '28

(By International News Service)
 AUSTIN, April 10.—Since Jan. 1st the State Highway Commission has launched nearly six and a half million dollars of highway construction.

The exact figure for contracts awarded to date since January 1st is \$6,418,633.

Approximately \$7,000,000 more of construction contracts are in sight for the next 100 days, and if the department's funds hold

out, it is proposed to continue at this rate for the entire year.

If this program can be followed out the year 1928 should turn in about \$24,300,000 of contracts let.

In addition to the 341 miles of asphalt topping which was contracted for the past week, there remains, already bid upon, 55 miles in five counties, which is being held up because the counties have not provided suffi-

cient right-of-way. The counties have been given until April 24 to provide the needed width.

Approximately 540 miles more of rock and gravel highways, located in the north and north-western parts of the state will be given asphalt topping later in the year, the contracts to be awarded probably in July.

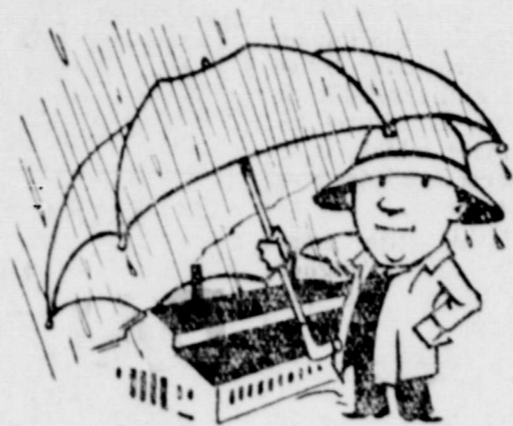
