DAIRY INDUSTRY HERE SHOWS LARGE INCREASE

C. W. Lehmburg, county agricultural agent, announced Wednesday that he would go to South Texas next Monday and purchase another carload of fine dairy cattle for the farmers of Runnels county. This will be the fourth car of dairy cattle shipped into this county since January 1, 1928.

Farmers of this county are taking more interest in the dairying industry since the completion of the local creamery at a cost of almost \$20,000 to business men and farmers, and the dairy farmers are buying better stock every month.

Some 100 head of fine cattle with high butter records have been unloaded here for the farmers through the co-operation of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce, the banks, and Mr. Lehmburg.

In further pushing the dairying industry, six bull circles have been formed in four communities, Hatchel, Dry Ridge, New Home and Hagan, and others are being worked up by Mr. Lehmburg. The bulls are of the very highest rating and as soon as all the circles are organized the herds will be tested and insured against any possible loss.

"All the bulls are of proven blood lines with high records for butter," Mr. Lehmburg stated. "These circles are being formed in carrying out an intensive breeding program in which we hope to better all dairy herds of the county."

The local creamery has been doing an excellent business since the first of year and buttermilk, butter and other products of the co-operative factory are in demand by local and out-of-town dealers.

DRILLER'S BODY TO CLAYVILLE PA.

King-Holt Co., local undertakers, shipped the body of B. R. Bell, about 41 years of age, who was killed here Monday afternoon while removing a large tank from a steel tower at the Q. Victor Miller home on Sixth Street, to Clayville, Pa., where funeral services will be held late this week.

Bell was injured about 5 o'clock Monday afternoon and died about 9 o'clock in the Halley & Love Sanitarium. He is survived by his widow and other relatives.

Bell was a 32nd degree Mason and members of the local Masonic lodge received a telegram Tuesday from his lodge in Pennsylvania, asking that they see to arrangements here. Masons will have charge of the services in Clayville.

Deceased was well known in oil circles, having operated in many of the major fields of the United States and was a stockholder in several oil companies.

IRISH FLYER DUE IN QUEBEC TODAY

(By International News Service) MURRAY BAY, Quebec, April 18.—Major James Fitzmaurice, head of the Irish Free State air forces, who accompanied Baron Huenefeld and Captain Herman Koehl, German aviators, on their trans-Atlantic flight, is expected to arrive here this afternoon with Duke Schiller.

Fitzmaurice will confer with Miss Berta Junkers, daughter of the famous German airplane manufacturer, on the problem of getting replacement parts to the Bremen at Greenly Island.

QUEBEC, April 18.—How and when Captain Herman Koehl and Baron von Huenefeld will leave Greenly Island seemed a mystery today.

The ice-breaker Montealm failed in its attempt to reach the island and was ordered back to patrol work.

The only alternatives are a flight from the island in the Bremen, in a relief plane, or to leave by dog-sled.

It has not yet been determined how badly the Bremen is damaged.

WAR CLOUDS GROW DARKER

LONDON, April 18.—War clouds loomed darker over the Chinese horizon today as the result of sanguinary engagements between the Nationalists and Northerners along a 400-mile front, according to Tokyo despatches to the London Daily Express.

British vessels have been shelled nine miles below Hankow, according to Honk Kong despatches to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, April 18.—The Court of Criminal Appeals today affirmed the death sentence of P. W. Howard, convicted in El Paso county for the slaying of N. V. Nixon, taxi driver, of Ward county.

The criminal appellate court also affirmed the death sentence of Robert F. Blake, sentenced in connection with the slaying of J. Fred Conner, of Swisher county.

Blake had asked for a reversal on the grounds of insanity.

DALE'S MOTION IS OVERRULED

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Savage cross-examination of Admiral J. K. Robinson, star defense witness in the criminal conspiracy trial of Harry F. Sinclair, minimized considerably the testimony of the witness who previously gave relative testimony leading to the leasing of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve.

On direct examination Robinson sought to assume the full responsibility for the lease, but Owen J. Roberts, special government prosecutor, savagely cross-examined the witness and developed that Robinson and Fall agreed to keep the Sinclair lease a secret in fear of what "meddlesome congressmen might do."

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Fresh evidence indicating that former Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall wrote a mysterious oil memorandum found in the files of the Senate public lands committee in January, 1924, was unearthed in the oil inquiry today.

The unsigned memorandum declared Fall never got a dollar from Sinclair and the latter never spent a cent for Fall's Three Rivers Ranch in New Mexico.

With Clarence Chase, Fall's son-in-law, on the stand, Senator Walsh developed from Chase that the memorandum apparently was written by the same party and on the same typewriter as in Fall's letter to Senator Leavort.

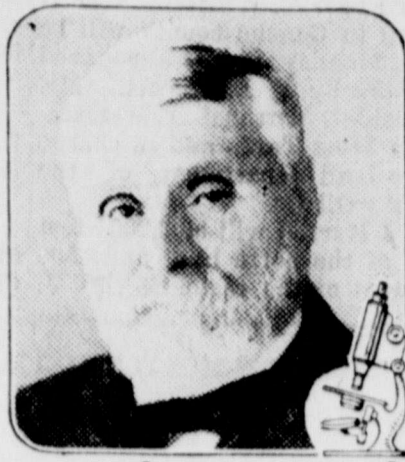

STUDENTS AT CAMBRIDGE SCORED FOR BAD CONDUCT BY AUTHORITIES OF TOWN

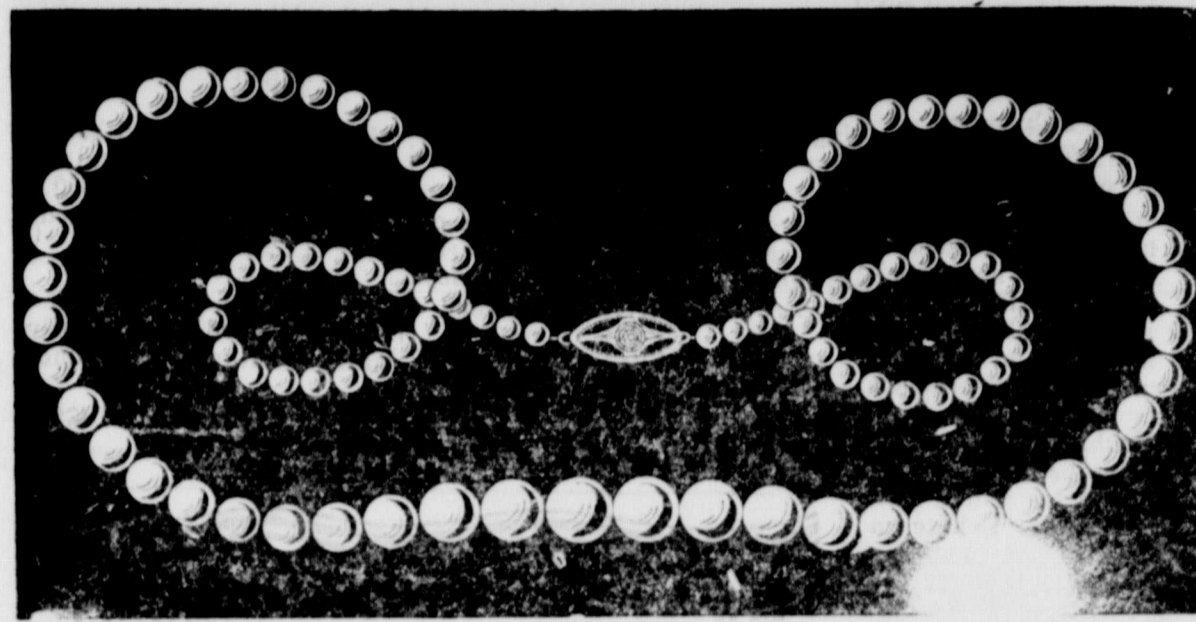

No. 1 Harrell will be 3,200 feet south of the north line and 500 feet west of the east line of J.

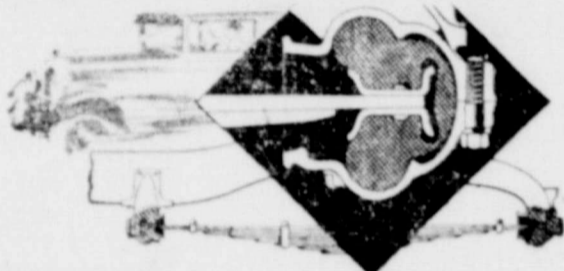
