Raid Nets 300 Gallons Whiskey, Beer and Wine; Two are Held

Three Held in Plot to Kidnap Movie Actress

LOS ANGELES, April 23.—With three suspects jailed, a plot to kidnap Dolores DelRio, beautiful Mexican actress, for a \$100,000 ransom was revealed here today.

It was also learned that the star's Hollywood home has been guarded by detectives for the past two months.

The details were revealed this morning by Gustavo Carillo, in a purported confession to the police.

Rosa Ayala, recently discharged as a maid for Miss DelRio, is also implicated.

The aim of the proposed kidnapers was to extort the ransom from J. L. Asunsolo, wealthy resident of the city of Mexico, Dolores' father, and the producers of her films.

Car Thieves Arrested In Stolen Car

Some thirty minutes after they had stolen a car, Derwood Pogue and Ernest Price of this city were in safe hands and en route to the county jail. They had taken the car belonging to Claude Reagan, who lives north of the city, Saturday afternoon, and were arrested near Old Runnels by Mr. Reagan, Hugh Campbell and son, Rollin, and W. T. Mathis.

The car, a Ford touring, was parked next to Mr. Campbell's Chrysler on Seventh Street, near a Mexican restaurant. The four men went to get their cars, late Saturday afternoon and Mr. Campbell found his car with a smashed fender. A Mexican youth standing nearby was asked a few questions and declared that two men got into the Ford, and after smashing the fender on the Chrysler, proceeded to go north on Seventh and over to Broadway and north on that street.

Mr. Campbell and the other three started in pursuit to capture the two men and regain the stolen car. They were arrested near Garland Nunn's place at Old Runnels, on the Ballinger-Abilene highway, five miles north of the city.

In the meantime, Sheriff R. E. McWilliams had been notified of the theft and accompanied by Night Watchman O. R. Jonas left to follow Mr. Campbell's posse. They met the four men with their prisoners near the Old Runnels cemetery and escorted them to the county jail.

Sheriff McWilliams said Monday that he believed he had a good case against both men.

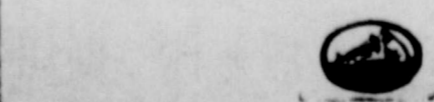

I. E. Musil, alleged moonshiner-bootlegger, is held in jail under charges of possession of intoxicants for the purpose of sale, with his bond set at \$2,500, while his partner in business, John Reinders, is also held with bond set at \$1,000.

Neither had made bail at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon.

Some 300 gallons of whiskey, beer and wine were confiscated in a raid Sunday morning at 11 o'clock when Sheriff R. E. McWilliams, Chief Deputy John White, and Sheriff Willie Warren of Concho county, raided the farm house of I. E. Musil, one mile south of Rowena, and arrested Musil and a young man, John Reinders, about 26 years of age. The two men were brought to the county jail here with the confiscated beverages. Musil has a wife and four children.

Sheriff McWilliams declined to make public Monday his source of information which led to the raid, but declared that he had been receiving information bit by bit for several weeks and that Saturday brought him a tip sufficient to make a raid.

The raiding party arrived at the Musil farm about 11 o'clock and at 1 o'clock returned to Ballinger with their prisoners and all the beer, wine and whiskey that a Chevrolet truck could accommodate.

The intoxicants were placed with other confiscated beverages on the top floor of the county jail where several hundreds gallons of beer and whiskey were already stored, together with stills and beer making machines.

It was estimated by Sheriff McWilliams that about 100 gallons of the "stuff" was whiskey, some of it in one gallon jars, one 5-gallon demijohn full, some in plain

whiskey bottles, while the remainder in bottles was labeled "Hill & Hill" and "Old Taylor." The "bonded" whiskey is believed to have been corn whiskey, bottled and labeled not far from the place where it was seized.

There were three kegs of wine which, while reported to have much "kick," tasted "something terrible." It was said these kegs contained between 30 and 60 gallons of the fluid. Whether the wine had either a brand or a name is not known.

The beer is alleged to have been made by Musil and his associate in the distilling business as a large crock was found in the house that contained brew in the making.

It is alleged that the whiskey was sold for \$2.50 per pint, while the beer was sold at 25 cents a bottle. The price of the wine was not learned.

This is the third time that Musil has been arrested in Runnels county on liquor charges, it was learned at the court house Monday. He was arrested several years ago by J. P. Flynt, former sheriff, and was sentenced to serve two years in the penitentiary. After serving his term, he returned to Rowena and went into the safe business. While in this business, Sheriff McWilliams raided his place and found evidence sufficient for a charge, but the case was later thrown out of court.

Sheriff McWilliams believes he has enough evidence this time to convict both Musil and Reinders.

County Attorney C. P. Shepherd was busy conducting an investigation Monday morning before Judge C. H. Willingham, justice.

WESTERN JAILS CURB RIGHTS OF PRISON AUTHORS

(By International News Service)

LOS ANGELES, Calif., April 23.—Should inmates of California prisons be allowed to write for publication in the great world without?

Or should they be restrained from all literary endeavor on the grounds that such a restriction is part of the penalty for their crimes?

Lively discussion of these questions was aroused in Los Angeles as a result of the action of the California prison board in ordering a halt on all writing by prisoners for publication on the grounds that the board is "running prisons and not literary bureaus."

Los Angeles writers declared works of English literature might never have been written if prisoners were not allowed to write. They cite these instances:

Daniel DeFoe wrote "Robinson Crusoe" in prison. John Bunyan wrote "Pilgrim's Progress" in prison at Bedford, England, during the seventeenth century.

Oscar Wilde wrote "Ballad of Reading Gaol," a poem of a prison experience, and "De Profundis," while a prisoner. O. Henry, one of the great

writers of the present age, was in prison and some of his masterful letters to his daughter during the period of his imprisonment remain a part of his contributions to literature.

Sir Walter Raleigh wrote a complete history of the world in prison.

Francois Villon, the immortal "Vagabond Poet," wrote most of his great poems in prison.

And Francis Scott Key wrote the United States national anthem, "The Star Spangled Banner," while in a prison cell.

Engene Biscailus, under-sheriff of Los Angeles county, was one of those most emphatic in his opinion that the state prison board is right in curtailing the literary endeavors of the men in prison cells.

Los Angeles county jail said:

"I have put a stop to all writing in the Los Angeles county jail and expect to keep a stop on it. We give every prisoner his full jail rights, but treat him as a criminal and not as the victim of circumstances."

Ray Long, president and editor in chief of the International Magazine Company, declared he recently read a manuscript sent to him by a noted California convict author and that the article was well written, but had been rejected because "it would not be good taste to publish many of the manuscripts offered by prison authors."

Monta Bell, film director and author, said he was not in favor of convicts being restrained entirely from writing, but thought it was improper to allow them to write articles criticizing prison administration.

"If Daniel DeFoe had not been allowed to write while in prison we would not have had his immortal 'Robinson Crusoe,' a story which often is termed 'the father of English fiction.'"

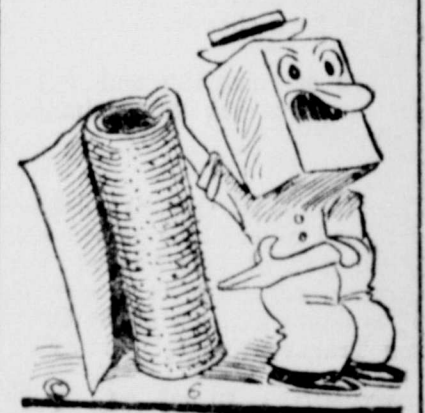

Were Moustache Cups In Style When Your Last Photograph Was Taken?

Washington, D. C., April 21.—Mr. and Mrs. America and the Little Americas have their photographs taken on an average only once in every twenty years, George W. Harris, chairman of the national advertising committee of the Photographers' Association of America, declared here today.

This average was arrived at, Mr. Harris said, through a survey recently made among the photographers of the United States and Canada to determine just how many individuals are photographed each year.

There are 7,000 photographers in America, Mr. Harris said, and each averages about 1,000 sittings a year. This means, in other terms, that only 7,000,000 persons get their photographs taken each year. Since there are something like 125,000,000 people in the United States and Canada, it will take twenty years to photograph these two nations at the present rate.

As a result of this survey, the Photographers' Association of America is laying plans to double the business of the photographers in the next four years by encouraging each man, woman and child to be photographed at least once in every ten years. They are particularly directing their efforts toward more frequent photographing of children that the parents may have a photographic

record of their growth from childhood to maturity.

The photographers are calling attention to Henry Ford's proverb that "nothing is permanent but change" and are issuing a challenge to all America to stay the hand of time through "photographs that live forever."
