MUSIL MAKES BOND IN NEW LIQUOR CASE

I. E. (Ike) Musil, charged with possession of intoxicating liquor for the purpose of sale, was released from the county jail Tuesday morning after making bond in the amount of \$2,500. His alleged accomplice, John Reinders, charged with the same offense and whose bond was set at \$1,000, was still in jail.

Musil and Reinders were arrested Sunday, one mile south of Rowena when Sheriff R. E. McWilliams and his chief deputy, John White, and Sheriff Willie Warren of Concho county, raided the Musil farm house, taking approximately 300 gallons of whiskey, beer and wine.

Walter Duncan, arrested near the city Sunday for Concho officers, on a liquor charge, was released on \$1,000 bail Tuesday morning. Jess Beard, also under a liquor charge is still in jail. His brother, Lloyd Beard, held on a misdemeanor charge, is in jail here.

Derwood Pogue and Ernest Price, charged with theft of an automobile, have not made their bonds of \$1,000 each.

FORD COUPE STOLEN IN COLEMAN SUNDAY

Chief of Police F. V. McCall was notified by Coleman officers Monday of the theft of a Ford coupe parked near a Coleman church Sunday night while its owner attended services.

The highway number was 189-201 and the motor number was 14,652,961.

Chief McCall only recently recovered a stolen car in a local garage for a Dallas rent car agency after the car had been parked in a storage room by the thief. It remained there some two weeks and Chief McCall located it upon receipt of notice from Dallas asking that he look for the car.

MAY STOP ALL PUBLIC MEETS

Dr. E. R. Walker, city health officer, said Tuesday morning that unless the citizens of Ballinger co-operated with local physicians and health officers in efforts to curb the spread of small pox that public gatherings would be prohibited.

"I want all the citizens of Ballinger to co-operate and assist in every way possible in curbing the spread of small pox," Dr. Walker said. "Several cases have run along, supposedly being chicken pox, and such cases are dangerous."

Dr. Walker said the spread of small pox could be stopped if the citizens would only take an interest in their health and report all skin eruptions to the city health authorities.

There are claimed to be several cases of the disease in the city now and others may develop unless school children are vaccinated, it was pointed out.

Next year the pupils will have to show a certificate of vaccination before they are allowed to attend school, it was stated, and now was declared to be a good time to commence the preparedness program as several cases have been reported to the city health department and are under quarantine and others may not have been reported.

PILOT FIGHTS FOR HIS LIFE

QUEBEC, April 24.—Gately resisting the ravages of double pneumonia and pleurisy, Floyd Bennett is fighting hard for his life in the Jeffrey Hale Hospital here.

Dr. Bachrach, New York specialist, brought two oxygen tanks when he arrived yesterday with Mrs. Bennett.

Bennett became ill when he flew a Ford tri-motored plane from Detroit to this place with spare parts and fuel for the disabled Bremen, trans-Atlantic plane now being repaired at Greenly Island.

LAKE ST. AGNES, April 24.—Trappers from the surrounding country are trekking here today to await the arrival of the German trans-Atlantic plane, the Bremen, now being repaired on Greenly Island under the supervision of Ernest Koeppen, Junker's expert airplane mechanic, who rode with the American flyers in the Ford relief plane yesterday.

The Bremen will be moved to ice in the Strait of Belle Isle for the take-off.

Twenty natives have been commandeered to move the huge plane when repairs are completed.

STEWART SAYS HE GOT MUCH MONEY

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, April 24.—Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, told the Senate oil inquiry board today that he received \$759,500 of the Continental Trading Company's mysterious \$3,000,000 Liberty Bond slush fund and transferred the bonds to the "trust fund" of the Standard of Indiana and the Sinclair Crude Oil Purchasing Company, in which they would share equally in the event of his death.

He testified that the bonds were given him by Henry Smith Osler, president of the Continental Company.

Senator Thomas Walsh, Democrat, of Montana, later announced that Stewart's testimony purged him of the contempt charge as far as the Senate was concerned, however, he will not escape prosecution for contempt in the federal courts.

GREAT BRITAIN RAISES GAS TAX

(By International News Service) LONDON, April 24.—A new budget measure introduced in the House of Commons today strikes a hard blow to American and other foreign oil companies doing business in Great Britain.

Beginning tomorrow a tax of 8 cents per gallon will be imposed upon imported gasoline, light oils, exclusive of lubricating oils.

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, April 24.—The First Methodist Church here today turned back to Ranger Captain Frank Hamer, \$400 of the \$1,000 bribe alleged to have been taken from F. A. Dale.

Hamer immediately gave the money to the First Christian Church.

Dale is suing for the return of the money which he claims was a retainer fee.

J. B. Pace, Jr., principal of the Senior high school, has purchased the first Whippet six of the new series to be delivered in Ballinger. The sale was made Monday afternoon by A. B. Middleton, salesman for the Sykes Motor Co. The new sixes were received in Ballinger last week and the formal showing was held Friday.

CLAIMS HALTED BIG ROBBERY

(By International News Service) DALLAS, April 24.—Local officers claim they frustrated a plot to commit a major robbery in the business district here today with the arrest of Wesley Osgood, escaped murderer from McNeil's Island, California, following a tip.

Osgood was arrested when he attempted to shoot into a detective squad in a raid on a local rooming house.

Fred W. Greber, president of the West Texas Telephone Company, of Brownwood, and R. P. Canady, connected with the same company, were in Ballinger Tuesday morning looking after business.

MADDEN LEADS HOUSE IN FIGHT FOR FLOOD BILL

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, April 24.—Thunderous applause from backers of the Jones-Reid flood control measure followed the announcement of Representative Madden, of Illinois, that he would support the measure following a conference with President Coolidge, in which the latter said he would not insist on New Orleans, Missouri and Illinois interests guaranteeing damages on the Bonnet, Kelly and New Madrid floodways.

Madden, however, declined to predict a withdrawal of the president's threat to veto.

NOT LAWFUL TO PAY OFFICERS FROM AUTO TAX

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, April 24.—The Attorney General's department in an opinion to Bascom Cox, county attorney at Brownsville, ruled the county was without authority to use any part of the funds from registration of motor vehicles to pay expenses of county officers.

SEVEN CASES FILED IN CITY COURT OVER THE WEEK END

Seven cases were filed in the city court over the week-end by Chief of Police F. V. McCall, some of which have already been settled with pleas of guilty being entered and fines paid.

One case for disturbing the peace was filed, two for speeding, two without proper highway number plates, one left turn, and one for parking on wrong side of street.

Chief McCall issued a second warning Tuesday to dog owners of Ballinger.

"Pay your dog tax now. You are subject to a fine every day your dog is loose without a tax," the officer said.

The city has dog tags and persons owning dogs may obtain them at the city hall by paying a tax and placing it on the dog's collar.

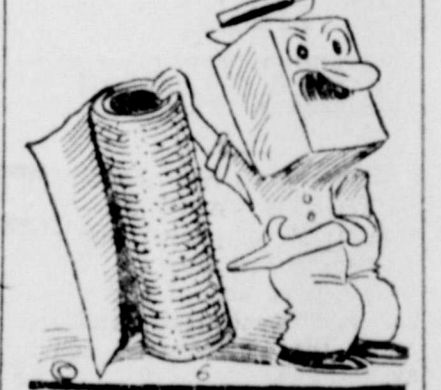
